



NEW FREEZING PROCESS.

The export of frozen fish in quantities is not by any means a new industry for Newfoundland, though perhaps the recent innovation of shipping a full cargo is more novel than continuous, and it is to be regretted that the enterprise which prompted the initial and apparently profitable experiment was not carried further. There are many problems connected with the preservation of fresh fish for exportation, and fish shipping countries have, for years past, been paying the closest attention to them with a view to ultimately overcoming existing difficulties and making the fresh fish export trade a venture in which every one will be able to compete.

The old methods of using ice and snow have not proven successful when the destination is far distant from the shipping point. Indeed on the short route, by rail or steamer from the West Coast to St. John's unless during the cold season, the ordinary cooling process has not been sufficient to keep fish in a good state of preservation, and consequently there is no trade in fresh fish for at least eight months in the year, a state of affairs which should not exist when modern processes of refrigerator transportation by land or water are available.

"The demand for pearls is far greater than the supply." he continued, "and I have advised and assisted several men, including two Army ofthe undertaking, to try pearl fishing in the South Seas. £100 for passage and expenses; £80 for a lugger, £80 for gear, crew and stores for six months, leaving £40 for emergencies, is the total outlay.

The first six months fishing should yield at least two tons of mother-ofpearl shell. This sells in a market which fluctuates between £100 and £200 a ton, and will cover all initial outlay. In addition, of course, there is always the possibility of finding good pearls, which may be worth anything from £50 to £1,000 each. Pearls are not only scarce, but the

Canada's Problem.

Under the laws. Governments are not empowered to act unless there is violence. Without violence or disorder beyond such harmless things as hissing and booing, or tearing an emblem off somebody's lapel, the socalled strikers, directed by the Bolshevist or I. W. W. element, have paralyzed a large part of the West, and heir assumption of the powers of government is spreading daily. There are no riots worthy of the name; the 'strikers" simply assume the governnent of a town, the police and firemen join them, and there is no overt act of which to take cognizance. Yet nothing is done in any of these cities except by permission of the local Strike Committee. In Winnipeg the milk and bread wagons run by such a permit. The Post Office employees join the strikers in one city after another, and the mails are delivered only as the Strike Committee permits. The police of Winnipeg joined the strikers at first, but when the Winnipeg authorities proposed to raise a new police force the regular one returned to work. This sounds encouraging until you hear the reason. They returned to work so that there should be nobody to interfere with the strikers, who as yet had committed no overt acts of disorder. In Calgary the mails are being distributed by volunteers, the regular postal force having quit. Volunteer fire departments are springing up through the West to take the place of the striking firemen. And all these strikes, even those of the Governmen

employees, are sympathetic strikes. The banks of Winnipeg have closed heir doors because they cannot do usiness with the mail and telegraph ervices disrupted. "At the Fort Garry Hotel," says a correspondent, meals are served only to women and children," perhaps by gracious perission of the Strike Committee. In onsequence of the desire of some strikers to get something to eat, the Strike Committee granted a permit to several restaurants in Winnipeg to seep open. The Airmen.

MR. HAWKER'S GREAT FLYING

Mr. Harry George Hawker is old for active work in the air, as airmen reckon age. He is now 38, but—s ifelong teetotaler and non-smokerhe does not look his years. Born in South Australia, Hawker was first known as a daring and skilful competitor in motor-races. When he came to England he took his pilot's certificate at Brooklands, and was engaged by Mr. T. M. Sopwith.

He soon won a reputation as a skilful and daring pilot. In 1912 he won the Michelin Prize, and the next year was a competitor in the Daily Mail 'Round Britain" competition, when he covered 1,040 miles out of the total of 1,540. Just before the war he went back on a visit to Australia, where he gave demonstration flights in an aeroplane of his own construc-

During the war he was testing machines for the Sopwith Company. In 1915 he made a British height "record" at Hendon, only to beat it himself the next year at Brooklands, when, in a Sopwith fighting plane he attained 24,408 feet.

Sturdily built and of middle height. Hawker is cherful, genial, and modest. He was confident of success in the Atlantic flight, but confident in no boastful spirit. In all his long flying career he has-until this last flightmet with only one accident, when he crashed - happily without seriously hurting himself-at Weybridge.

Commander Grieve.

Commander Mackenzie-Grieve, whose magnificent work as Mr. Hawker's navigator is not generally appreciated, is returning to his home at Droxford, in Hampshire, in two or three

Commander Mackenzie- Grieve, with his parents, has been resident at Fir Hill for many years. Droxford is also Admiral Sir Doveton Sturdee's village. Commander Mackenzie-Grieve's father is Captain Grieve, a retired naval officer, who was recently the recipient of many messages and telegrams of congratulation, and also of

two telegrams from his son. It is not the first time that Captain Grieve's household has had to bear anxiety about his son's safety, for he was on the Campania when she met with an accident in the Firth of Forth. Commander Grieve, who was at one time in H.M.S. Revenge, is 39 years of age and a bachelor.

The task of Commander Mackenzie Grieve was very different from that o the Azores. The N.C. 4 and its companions had merely to fly from one point to another fift miles away, and, except for a short distance, they were hardly ever out of sight of one of their beacon lights. Mackenzie-Grieve, on the other hand, has shown that it is possible to navigate an aero plane 1,100 miles over the sea through unknown winds and without speaking single ship, and to be at the end of that time no more than a mile or two from the track he had prescribed for imself _The Times





Drove U-Boat Away.

Salvage Compensation for a British Submarine

Whether a British submarine was entitled to salvage compensation for services rendered to two neutral ships which had been attacked by a U-boat, was decided by Mr. Justice Hill in the dmiralty Court. The ships, the Borgila and the Svanfos, both Norwegian cargo vessels, were attacked by a U-boat on April 15th, 1917. The British submarine G-7 appeared on the scene and engaged the U-boat, ultimately driving it away. The Borgila had been badly damaged, and the submarine assisted in keeping 'her affoat until she was taken in charge by a Norwegian warship. The Svanfos' crew, by command of the Germans, had left their ship, but when the German submarine had been driven away they returned to it although it would, no doubt, have been sunk but for the timely arrival of the British submarine. It was said for plaintiffs that they rendered services at great risk to themselves, and for the defence it was contended that what they had done was only in the discharge of their duty. 



PROPOSITION APPROVED.

PARIS. June 13. The Council of Four has approved the proposition submitted by the Council of Foreign Ministers for fixing the Hungarian frontiers bordering on Roumania and Czecho-Slovakia.

NOT YET, BUT SHROTLY.

PARIS, June 13. The Council of Four devoted the day to the revision of the text of the treaty. By noon eighteen reports had been sent to the revision commission. Several important subjects remain to be revised. These subjects include the Sarre Valley, Alsace-Lorraine, and the League of Nations. The reply of the Allied powers to the German counter proposals is likely to be made public shortly.

LOOKS HOPEFUL.

OMSK, June 6. A. Dialrussov, a radical writer who is chairman of the committee in charge of the preparations of the elections for the Constituent Assembly, which will succeed the Kolchak Govt., has issued a statement that the future Constituent Assembly will have the sovereign power over all political and social problems. It will be the task of the Assembly, he said, to create a new order in Russia, to establish a stable government and to bring Russia into the family of free nations. 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
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
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
