




PARIS, Feb. 24. The Government is considering requiring payment of customs duties in the equivalent of gold as a means of increasing its income, according to one of the Trade journals, published here. As there is no gold in circulation this would mean the fixing of the relation of gold to currency, which the newspaper suggests might be two to one, which would mean that duties would be doubled.






