





Married men in Quebec cannot make gifts of property to their wives sons given for the creation of heavy through a deed of donation. Moreover, a wife cannot give property to her husband. Either must die to give a present that the Quebec laws will approve.

And furthermore, married men and women living in this province cannot go into another province and there make a gift of property to each other. That is, if their legal residence remains Quebec. "What we

have we hold," is the situation." But the word property does not embrace everything that a man may give his wife or the "Missus" may give her husband. He may give her birthday and holiday presents, bracelets, rings, jewellery and other like things, but all in accordance with his means. Property, for the purpose of the recent ruling, means everything else other than the exceptions just mentioned, land, house and moveables of every kind.

In order to evade the restrictions of this law, the general practice now is to "buy" the right to marry a girl. That is, before marriage, the nappy couple go before a notary public, where the man solemnly unlertakes in writing to give the brideelect a sum of money—say ten housand dollars-and all the furniture that may be or may ever, be in the common domicile. This gift is in consideration of the girl's love and ffection for the man and in anticipation of her marriage to him. The furniture is safeguarded by stipulance of any issue of the marriage. cash is safeguarded, because the nan does not actually hand it over. defers payment until he wants to out something in her name, or until he goes bankrupt, in which latter case she files her claim for the mount mentioned in her "contract" against her husband's estate and ranks with the other creditors for

In the legal world one ruling from a judge has general application and becomes a precedent. So when Mr. Justice Bruneau declared a deed of nation made from husband to wife illegal, he set up a rule for all to low, or gave an interpretation of an existing rule.



Weekly Meeting

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL. he regular meeting of the Municiacil was held yesterday after-Mayor Cook and Councillors fartin, Collier, Ryan and Dowden

After reading and confirmation of intes of last meeting, communicas were tabled from the Actingmager of the Newfoundland Govnent Railway as follows:-(1) Asking use of land, Council pro-

perty, near the Cold Storage premises. so that the present wooden sheds at the entrance to the Dock may be temporarily placed there during work of rebuilding the latter.

(2) Asking use of land West of the Gas Works and laying of tracks thereon to facilitate unloading of freight during the coming season. (8) For permission to utilize land

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tars.

south of Cousens' property, Southside, for quarrying purposes, in connection with the rebuilding of the Dry Dock. as also permission to use a certain portion of new made ground, Southside Road, for erection of stables.

The Council realize the necessity and urgency of this important work. and are only too glad to do all in their power to assist in the undertaking. and expediate matters for the Government. They willingly acceded to the several requests mentioned above, but could not, under the Municipal Regulations, permit stables to be erected at the place mentioned, as the Regulations call for certain facilities which are not obtainable on the site at the resent time. The City Engineer was nstructed to meet the Manager of the Md. Railway, and point out to him he lands the use of which will be givthem for at least two years.

The Superintendent of the Nfld. ight & Power Company, in reply to ouncil's letter in which explanation as asked as to why street lights were ont on Friday, Saturday and Sunday last week, stated that the service, articularly in the western section. ad been completely out of commission owing to the storm on Friday night; that the transformer in some fifty-seven lamps had been burnt out. Every effort had been made to quickly resume the service.

In the matter of unused street car rails, West of Rawlins' Cross, on Milliary Road, Supt. Morris stated that he question as to whether these would used in future was at present in bevance, but if the Council would defer the matter for at least another fortnight pending instructions from head office, it would then be given consideration. This was agreed to. As to the notification of the Council re condition of rails in other parts of the town, he tated they would receive immediate attention of the Company.

The Company also wrote with regard to lights on Pennywell Road, beeen Golf and Cashin Avenues. Their spector reported that the lamps in this locality had been deliberately broken. The Inspector General is to be asked to have a watch kept in the section, and if possible locate the guilty parties.

Bowring Bros., Ltd., complained of the Cove near their premises, particularly of the unsightly W.C., and asked that steps be taken to remove same as also to improve conditions generally at this place. They stated that the truckmen who occupy a stand in the Cove generally park near the sidewalk much to the annoyance and inconvenience of pedestrans going to and from their office. They had interviewed the truckmen as to the possibilby of occupying another site, and they thought this could be satisfactorily arranged . A Committee of Council will visit the place and take up the several

matters mentioned. Mr. A. Penny wrote re damage to his property when the roof of the cart shed at the Sanitary Stables collapsed last fall. This will be attended to. Mr. N. Pike offered gravel for road purposes. This was referred to the City Engineer.





Captain John Roberts was given a testimonial signed by 123 of the 238 first cabin passengers.

All the persons interviewed spoke of the tragedy of the spectacle at which men as well as women wept unshamedly. Captain Roberts said that in his forty years at sea he had insurance man, said:

Cross-examined by Mr. Winter:-Witness examines all the boilers of the sealing fleet; it is usually done in the fall. He is usually notified by the owners when the inspection is required. It is not necessary that the own ed. It is not necessary that the owners have their engineers present at the inspection. When repairs are nec-

essary they are done by the owners and the Inspector is sent for afterwards. When the first hole was seen in the boiler, the witness would have examined the damage and if necessary would have returned to port to have permanent repairs made; otherwise, a plate bolted on the inside and outside, with some asbestos, would have repaired the damage. There was never any serious risk to life. Boilers have been burnt down at sea hundreds of times; an engineer is lucky if he does not have to do that in his exper-

Re-examined by Mr. Bradley:-In the summer the boilers of these ships are usually opened up. There is usually a hogey, with the smoke box going through the boiler. This would not have much effect on the bottom of the boiler. Great care has to be exercised with a boiler in the sum-
