PERSONAL.—The London Free Press of Friday has the following—"We understand that Mr. Robert Rae, who has for some years been connected with the firm of Messrs. W. J. Reid & Co., will leave London on Monday next for Guelph, having been engaged in the well-known establishment of Mr. James Massie, wholesale and retail crockery merchant there. Mr. Rae leaves behind him many sincere and attached friends, who will wish him every prosperity in his new home." We may add that Mr. Rae's friends—of whom he made many when formerly residing in Guelph—will be glad to welcome him back again.

CARPENTER IN THE CITY OF HAMILTON.—This case, in which the W. G. & B. Railway was deeply interested (if things innately might be said to feel an interest) and which was to have been heard at the Hamilton sittings of the Court of Chancery, has, by the consent of counsel on both sides, been laid over till next term. Our readers know of course that the suit is simply an attempt to prevent the transfer of Great Western Railway bonds, held by the City of Hamilton, to the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway. While the question of the legality of the transference remains undecided no use can be made of the bonds for the purpose of building the new railway, and as it depends upon them to give it a start the contractor is not likely, after this turn of affairs, to begin work before spring at least.

THE METEORS.—A writer in the Hamilton Times gives the following as his experience in star gazing, on Friday night: About 8 p. m. a few struggling meteors were seen, and the number gradually increased until midnight, when the writer counted 30 in 15 minutes—these being only a portion of what were actually falling, as the eye could only take in a small space at one time. The direction of the meteors at this time was from north to south, running parallel with the earth. Many rushed up from below the horizon. The writer retired at one a. m., and again turned out at five o'clock, when the number of meteors had still further increased and were pouring down direct from the zenith toward's the earth, the great belt of meteors having risen to that position since midnight. Some presented the appearance of Roman candles, lighting up the earth like a succession of flashes of lightning; others were like flaming rockets, leaving a long train of fire behind, again others which crossed the field of the milky-way left a faint line of smoke behind them; this was quite perceptible as it hid for a moment a portion of the great nebula. The sky at this time was faintly covered with an illuminated haze, no doubt produced by meteoric dust, which must accompany the belt of meteors in their wild flight around the sun. The meteors continued to fall until daylight shut them out from view. Many thousands fell in the course of the night.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.
 J. E. Smith has been gazetted Collector of Customs for the port of Toronto.

In Hamilton they are fining farmers for exposing the flesh of diseased animals for sale.

The Kincairdine Salt Company have commenced pumping. They obtained their charter on the 10th inst.

The Bishop of Oxford is sorely distressed because his only daughter and her husband, a Staffordshire rector, have embraced Romanism.

The people in the neighbourhood of Kincairdine are amusing themselves and doing service to their country, by squirrel exterminating expeditions.

There are twenty-three officers in the British navy who were at the battle of Trafalgar. Ten of them are admirals, one of whom was a lieutenant at the time of the action.

A young man named Love, was caught on a revolving shaft in a grist mill, at Lunenburg, on Wednesday evening, and when discovered he was dead, though still whirling round.

The Mohawk Indians met at Deseronto on the 5th inst., and elected a chief in room of the one lately deceased. After the ceremony, the new chief treated the tribe to an "oyster and coon supper," in real native style.

The Halifax Reporter says:—"We scarcely ever saw a time when there was so much work for everybody not too lazy; wherever you turn there are building, excavating, repairing and painting operations going on, and there need be but little poverty this winter, for everybody seems to do well."

The Prince and Princess of Wales are to leave England about the middle of November for a Continental and Eastern tour. They will proceed first to Paris, Germany and Denmark; afterwards Greece and Asia Minor will be visited; and finally, the royal travellers, in company with Sir Samuel Baker, the African traveller, will make their way up the Nile, as far as the second cataract.

PEAT IN LUTHER.—A correspondent of the Toronto Telegraph, writing from Annapolis, says:—"In the township of Luther there is a large marsh consisting of nine thousand acres, commonly known as the 'Blue Swamp.' This marsh is said, by those who have been accustomed to such work in the old country, to contain peat of the very best quality; and what is still better, there is an almost inexhaustible supply, the mould being from fifty to one hundred feet deep."

SEED WHEAT FROM THE BLACK SEA.—The Vercheres Agricultural Society has adopted resolutions in favour of a further importation of Black Sea wheat from Odessa direct. Mr. Perreault is to proceed to Odessa to purchase 150 bushels, which is to be sold at \$5 per bushel for seed. Former importations of this kind of wheat have been followed by magnificent crops in every part of the Province where it has been used.

THE ISLAND OF SAN JUAN.—The question as to the ownership of San Juan, an island on the Pacific coast—a question which at one time threatened, through the folly of Gen. Harney, an American officer, to embroil England and the United States in war—has, it appears, at last been settled. Great Britain has formally waived her claim to a joint occupation of the island, and it will now, as it has been in fact for years, become the sole property of the United States. This another cause of possible complication is happily removed forever.

SHERIFF'S COURT OF ENQUIRY.—The Durham Chronicle says: On Friday last, Sheriff Maughan, assisted by his Deputy, held a Court of Enquiry at Durham, under a writ of extent, to ascertain particulars concerning property owned by A. B. McNab, the absconding and defaulting postmaster, from Durham, at the time and subsequently to the date of the bond which he gave for the faithful performance of his duties. Prior to the Session of Parliament of 1866, the property, real and personal, of any person entering into any bond or covenant, or being indebted to the Crown, is bound by such bond or covenant from the date thereof.

There are many admirable qualities in the character of a Spaniard. Spaniards are brave, and, as a general thing, too proud to descend to an ignoble action. But they are terribly lazy. Work is regarded by the majority as degrading. "In Spain, no man works," says the pompous Don in the play. The majority of them are clever enough to succeed in any walk of life but they lack energy and perseverance. Thus we find English engineers employed on all the public works, superintending the construction of railways, and irrigation canals, and although a few Basques and Asturians may be found assisting them, none of the pure Castilian race can be seen thus "degrading" themselves.

FIGHT WITH A WHITE BEAR.—A short time ago a party of Harbor Grace fishermen, while out in their boat on an uninhabited part of the coast, were attacked by a white bear of enormous size. The animal came from the north on an iceberg, which grounded some distance out from land. Being in want of food he evidently thought to make a good meal of the fishermen, and so struck out for their craft with prodigious speed. He got on board over the bows, and made a furious attack on them, and after a short resistance, they found him too much for them, and saved themselves by leaping overboard. While he, as master of the situation, feasted upon a seal which the men had captured, they had swam a considerable distance off and been picked up by another boat's crew. They all then returned to the charge, and heaving alongside of the first boat, began to heave labor his bearship with oars, and compelled him in turn to seek the water, when he swam ashore and betook himself to the woods. The men pursued him, and after a vigorous hunt, brought him down with their guns. The brute showed fight till the last, and as one of the men ran forward to dispatch him with a knife, he seized him by the arm and inflicted a terrible bite. He measured eight feet six inches in length.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15th.—The Rio Janeiro letter dated Oct. 13th, gives the correspondence in reference to the violation of the American Legation by President Lopez, of Paraguay including the official report of Minister Washburn, which fully confirms the account of the atrocities of Lopez reported in previous letters. The news is to the effect that Lopez was still posted at Villetta. The allies were slowly marching northward. Some of the most prominent leaders of the conspiracy against Lopez are said to have been executed. Cholera has appeared in the allied camp.

LONDON, Nov. 15th.—The Elections absorb the attention of all classes of people. Little business will be done during the week. The cotton trade at Liverpool will be suspended on Tuesday or Wednesday, and the breadstuffs market will probably be closed on these days. In London the Stock exchange will be closed on Tuesday. Sanguine Liberals estimate that Mr. Gladstone will have a majority of 130 in the next House of Commons. The prosecution by the French Government of parties who promoted the subscription for a monument over the grave of M. Bandon, one of the victims of the coup d'etat of the second of December, has resulted in the conviction of several Journalists and others, all of whom have been heavily fined and additionally punished by a suspension of their civil rights. The decision of the Courts in these cases causes much popular indignation in Paris and symptoms of unusual agitation have appeared. The police and military authorities in Paris are taking extraordinary precaution against the disturbance of order.

PARIS, Nov. 15th.—Bourse closed yesterday, heavy Bourse. —Of 4c.
LONDON, Nov. 14th.—A fine meteoric display was witnessed by observers at the Oxford University to-night.
LONDON, Nov. 14.—Rio Janeiro advices to Oct. 24th have been received. The news from Paraguay is to the effect that the allies have reconnoitred the position held by Lopez, and that it is thought to be unassailable. Gen. McManis, United States Minister to Paraguay, had arrived at Rio Janeiro en route to the scene of his labors. Advices from Buenos Ayres indicate that the new President of the Argentine Confederation at Sacramento is in favor of continuing the war with Paraguay.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—Giacchino Rossini, the great Italian musician and composer, died in this city to-day in his 77th year.
BERLIN, Nov. 14.—The Prussian budget was submitted to the Diet to-day. Baron Von Der Heit, the Finance Minister, in his remarks, said the financial difficulties of Prussia were merely transitory, and that the position of affairs in Europe was favorable to the preservation of peace. Nothing of an official character has been made public, or submitted to the Diet, with reference to the umpire-ship of King William, on the question of the claims of the United States against Great Britain for depredations committed by the Alabama.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The South American mails bring the following intelligence from Paraguay: A battle took place on the 24th of Sept. at Villetta, where Lopez was strongly entrenched with all his troops. The allied forces attacked his position but were repulsed by means of ambuscades which had been laid in the woods. The loss of the Brazilians in killed and wounded was very heavy. After their defeat the allied army went into camp at Palmes, where they were constantly harassed by the Paraguayan guerillas, who frequently cut off their supplies and interrupted their communications. The Brazilian land forces bombarded Augustura but without effect. It was reported that a revolt had broken out in the Argentine Confederation against President Sarriento.

MADRID, Nov. 15.—A band of malcontents who held possession of Seville since the revolution but obstinately refused to obey the orders of the National Government, were yesterday disarmed by the regular troops after a fierce combat, and complete quiet has now been restored in that city.
LONDON, Nov. 15.—The French Government have commenced a prosecution against the Galicia newspaper for infringement of the Press Law.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The regular mail steamer from Rio Janeiro arrived to-day. She brings late news from the seat of war. The Allied army was before Augustura. The Paraguayans came out in force and attacked it; but were repulsed with a loss of 350 killed and wounded. It was fully confirmed that President Lopez had shot his brothers Berugo and Henancio. Many of Lopez's troops were deserting.

MADRID, Nov. 14.—The Provisional Government has declared all the Spanish colonial ports free. Anchorage duties are abolished.
LONDON, Nov. 14.—No meteors were seen last night owing to its being cloudy. The spirit of rebellion is making rapid progress in the Austrian portion of Poland, and in old Poland itself. Democratic clubs are organized in Galicia, Bohemia, and all along the frontiers bordering on Russia and Prussian Poland. The Democratic Association of Lonsberg, the capital city of Galicia, has just issued a manifesto, in which the following is to be found: "The restoration of Poland is not in position with the interests of Austrian monarchy. It is, on the contrary, necessary to the maintenance of peace in Austria and Europe. The mission of Galicia is to maintain the idea of consanguinity with the other Provinces of Poland. The relation of Galicia with Austria must rest upon a federal basis."

AMERICAN DESPATCHES
NEW YORK, Nov. 15th.—The Rio Janeiro letter dated Oct. 13th, gives the correspondence in reference to the violation of the American Legation by President Lopez, of Paraguay including the official report of Minister Washburn, which fully confirms the account of the atrocities of Lopez reported in previous letters. The news is to the effect that Lopez was still posted at Villetta. The allies were slowly marching northward. Some of the most prominent leaders of the conspiracy against Lopez are said to have been executed. Cholera has appeared in the allied camp.

HAVANA, 14th.—The Rebels have appeared on the railroad track between Natchez and Puerto Principe. They captured a train of cars with a number of passengers on board. Four of the latter were retained as prisoners, and the others were allowed to proceed to their destination on hand cars. The baggage vans were plundered of their contents and the railroad was torn up for a considerable distance. Heavy and continuous rains during the past week, have prevented the picking of the cotton crop on the plantations.

The North West Question.

The London Railway News of the 31st gives, on what it believed to be reliable authority, information to the effect that the negotiations which have taken place between Sir George E. Cartier and the Hon. William McDougall, the delegates from Canada, and the Colonial Office in England, with respect to the assumed territorial rights of the Hudson's Bay Company, have been brought to a close.

It was announced a short time since that the Hudson's Bay Company would receive at least one million sterling for the cession of the rights which they claimed over this portion of British North America. Her Majesty's Government, we believe, do not recognize any claim on the part of the company for compensation in regard to territorial rights, and the Government of Canada absolutely refuse to enter into arrangements for the purchase of rights which they assert do not exist.

The London Canadian News, which, on such matters, is generally a good authority, asserts itself to be in a position to state that the expectation that any money will be paid by the Government of Canada may be at once abandoned, and that an announcement to this effect will be forthwith made. It adds the following:

"The government of such a territory as that embraced in the present discussions between the Hudson Bay Company and the Imperial and the Canadian Governments is necessarily, a costly matter, certainly entailing an expenditure of not less than £25,000 per annum; and even if the Company were inclined to loan this outlay, which we hardly think can be contemplated, it must be remembered that that corporation could not properly assume such a charge, and, therefore, the constitution of Rupert's Land into a Crown colony—and the march of events requires that this be now done without further loss of time—must be undertaken at the instance of one or other of the two governments. It is believed that the Canadian Executive are prepared to incur the necessary outlay not only for the establishment of a government, but also for the opening up of proper means of communication between Red River and Dominion; but beyond this no further pecuniary liability will be assumed by Canada."

The Edinburgh Scotsman confirms the statement as does also Herapath's Railway Journal. The latter journal says that the Canadian delegates have brought intelligence of such a state of Canadian feeling as utterly precludes the idea of a purchase of the territory from the Company. On the other hand, it adds that it is impossible to allow the Company to sell to the United States, so the Company must keep on as best it may. However, Sir George E. Cartier and Mr. W. McDougall, C. B., are to be passed through the usual process of a feed, and it is thought that this may soften them at least to the extent of making them say what they mean. The effect of these announcements was that the stock of the Company immediately fell 1/2 to 1 per cent.

A PROTEST.—Mr. Blanchard, has protested against the return of Mr. McDonnell for Inverness, on the grounds of undue influence, intimidation, bribery, and other corrupt and unlawful means having been used by McDonnell and his agents, and other parties in his behalf, in connection with the election and to secure his return; and also on the grounds of irregularity in the lists furnished the various presiding officers by the Sheriff. The Union candidate has no doubt good grounds for bringing his protest, but he must know that between him and his opponent the members of the Nova Scotia Legislature are not likely to be impartial judges. They have not exerted their energies to secure his defeat in order that they might overturn their own success by the quiet decision of a committee of their number; they did not vote secret service money to be expended among the electors without a determination to enjoy all the advantages it might purchase them. But if Mr. Blanchard do not obtain his right he may solace himself with the hope—rendered reasonable by the aspect of things political in his Province—that the time is fast drawing nigh when his cause will be in the ascendant, and when the influence and money of rabid anti-unionists will be impotent to defraud him of his seat.

A trotting match, long talked of, but frequently postponed on account of bad weather, has at last come off at St. Catharines. The stakes were \$200 a side, best two to three in waggon. The competing horses were "Grantham Chief" and "Whirlwind," two stallions, on one side, and "Rattlesnake," a gelding, and "Lady Tartar" on the other. The latter team won by taking the second and third heat. Best time, 2 min. 50 1/2 sec.

Notice is given from Whitty that application will be made at next meeting of the Parliament of Canada for an Act to incorporate the Dominion Bank.

LOCAL ITEMS.

A Young Men's Christian Association has been organized at Orangeville.

Furs to the amount of \$400 were stolen from a shop in Peterborough a few nights since.

The village of Elmira, Co. Waterloo, has taken stock of the Dominion Telegraph to the amount of \$1,500.

The Guelph Advertiser sees no difference in colors. It is willing to take either Brown or White as a candidate for centre Wellington.—Telegraph.

The Baptist Church at Elora, which has been without a minister for some time, is now supplied by the Rev. John Gerrie, who has gone to the village to reside.

Sportsmen are finding the reward of their labours this fall. Numerous carcases of venison are finding their way down from the northern townships, and it is perhaps somewhat surprising that the deer are all in excellent condition.

THE REPEAL MOVEMENT.—Hon. Wm. Annand, leader of the Government in Nova Scotia, has a long letter in the Chronicle of the 14th, on Mr Howe's course. The letter is temperately written, respectful to Mr. Howe, and puts the best possible face on the repeal movement. He says he is confident of winning repeal. While admitting the difficulties to be encountered, he says parliamentary reform, Catholic emancipation, repeal of the corn laws; or, coming nearer home, responsible government, free trade, and other reforms, have all been won in the face of difficulties even greater than those which stand in the way of repeal. He is sanguine that either by union with one or more of the maritime provinces, and even without such aid, repeal will be obtained, if the people remain firm.

A CAPITAL LAW.—The Council of Chicago has passed an ordinance to the effect that any person that shall be found sitting around an entrance to any office or place of business, or private house or houses, or sitting upon the railing of any of the above-named places, shall be deemed guilty of loitering, and, on conviction, shall be fined a sum for the first offence not exceeding \$100, nor less than \$25, and for the second he shall be fined a sum not less than \$50, nor exceeding \$100, and for the third offence not less than \$100. An exception is made in favor of the owner or occupants of such places, who are privileged to loiter as much as they like in front of their own places of business. Such a law is very much needed in nearly every Canadian city and town with the addition of being especially severe on those who loiter on street corners on week nights and especially on Sundays.

FIRE.—The alarm of fire was given a few minutes after six, on Saturday evening. Mr. Horsman's hardware store being in danger. It appears that the clerks had requested permission to illuminate one of the windows to a greater extent than usual, and they consequently arranged and lighted a number of lamps, which all burning brilliantly, produced a very fine effect. Immediately above these some chandeliers were suspended, and the men, in adjusting the smaller standing lamps which were in the window had occasionally come in contact with one of these, and as the lower part screws on to the iron rod by which the chandelier hangs, the twisting caused by its being frequently touched unfastened it, and it fell among the lamps below. One or two were broken, and the oil scattered over the window, producing a flame that looked rather dangerous. Hence the ringing of the fire-bell; but the clerks put the fire out in a few minutes by throwing some mats on it, and long before a crowd could collect not a vestige of it was to be seen. No damage worth mentioning was done. It was most providential that the fire was got under in the very beginning.

Mrs. Anne Bishop has found a fresh husband in Australia. Lake St. Charles, near Quebec, is reported to be frozen over strong enough to skate on. It is said that a considerable reduction in telegraph rates will be made by the Montreal Telegraph Company about the beginning of next month. Messages of ten words can then be sent to any point west of Kingston for 25 cents. Mr. Molesworth, P. L. S., is making a survey in reference to a scheme which has been mooted to drain the swamp country between the Thames and Lake Erie. His report is looked for with interest by western members. DEPARTURE OF THE GOVERNOR.—Lord Monck and family left Quebec on Saturday morning. The Lieutenant Governor of Quebec was not present nor was any of the local Cabinet. Gen. Wyndham was sworn in Administrator the same day. A private letter to Gen. Wyndham states that Sir John Young has just sailed, via Cunard line, and will be here in a fortnight.

THE YELVERTON CASE AGAIN.—The case of "Mrs. Yelverton" came again before the Court of Session in Edinburgh on the 29th ult. Mrs. Yelverton applied to have the former judgment of the court and of the House of Lords set aside, on the grounds that the Scotch court had no jurisdiction to try cases in which the parties were not resident in Scotland 40 days before citation. The court dismissed the action, on the ground that it had no jurisdiction.

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

He pleaded that the barrels were received late on Friday, and the case was dismissed. Those Morgan was charged with being drunk on the street on Sunday. As it was his first offence he was dismissed.

YANKEE URQUITY.—It is said that Scotchmen are to be found everywhere. If we remember right, it was the Rev. L. Taylor who found a countryman at the top of one of the Pyramids, busy disposing of his wares to tourists. But they are hardly equal to the genuine Yankee. An exchange informs us that "A Boston man, Mr. Edward S. Benson, has been elected Mayor of Yokohama, Japan, with a salary of \$3,500 in gold, and a house free of rent. Another American, H. W. Grinnell, of New York, has lately been appointed Inspector General of the Japanese navy. Another, Gen. Paul Frank, is chief of Ordnance in the Japanese army. Gen. Ward and Capt. Burgevine, both Americans, long led a foreign detachment of the Chinese army, and still another American named Burlingame, is in the diplomatic service of the same country." When Barnum obtains possession of the North Pole, with which to stir up the animals in his menagerie, then, and not until then, will the ambition of Yankeeedom be gratified.

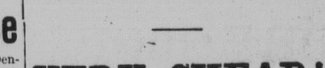

THE POSITION OF VOLUNTEERS.—We quote from the Ottawa *United Service Gazette*:—As enquiries are constantly being made regarding the position in which volunteers of various periods of services are placed under the new Militia Law in reference to such service, we give the answers to those which have come under our notice, plainly and as briefly as possible. 1st. Volunteers who had on the first of October, 1868, completed their full period of five years' service are entitled to their discharge in the usual way. 2nd. Volunteers who had on the first of October, 1868, completed three years' continuous service will be entitled to their discharge after six months from the date of re-enrollment in their corps, provided they give the necessary notice at the time they re-enroll. 3rd. Volunteers who have not completed three years' continuous service prior to the first of October, 1868, and re-enroll to complete their period of service, cannot be permitted to leave their corps without giving six months' notice. 4th. Volunteers who re-enroll under the new law, of course, bound by the terms at the head of the service roll which they sign, and the word "Volunteer" applies to officers as well as to the men of the corps so re-enrolled.

YOUNG SMOKERS.—Dr. Decaisne has made observations upon 38 children, from 9 to 15 years of age, who were in the habit of smoking to a greater or less degree, and has detected most terrible effects produced upon 27 of them. He found that smoking causes in young men a very marked alteration of the blood, diminishes the normal quantity of the globules, and brings on paleness, palpitation of the heart, noisy breathing at the carotids, and difficult digestion. No treatment produces any effect as long as the practice is not discontinued. Children who smoke contract a taste for intoxicating drinks, and their mind falls gradually into a state of torpor. These physical disorders are easily relieved or disappear of themselves if the use of tobacco is totally given up at an early stage.
