Wifful Waste—Things to Think of— Thanksgiving Day.

To the Editor of The Evening Mercury.
Sin;—The Lord Jesus Christ when on earth wrought two miracles to supply food for those who needed. On the first ension he fed five thousand men, besides women and children; on the second four thousand men, besides women and children. But although He was an Almighty Provider, He would not sanction waste, for on both occasions the fragments were gathered up.

Unhappily with nations calling themnot so: economy is ignored. Canada is a recipient of these bounties; He fills its barns with plenty, but what do we do with it? Every year Canada's distilleries and breweries destroy more than two millions of bushels of grain of various kinds which if converted into wholesome food, instead of being transformed into poisonous liquors, would supply two hundred and fifty thousand (one in 12) day, a bonfire was kindled on the Market Square, and four thousand bushels of grain—the proportion for the population of Guelph-were to be publicly burned up? Yet it is being destroyed in our midst year after year by its distilleries and breweries; twelve months food for file hundred people being thus worse than wested. Is this wicked waste to continually go on? Let every God fearing man and woman say decisively no state of things to be altered? Very state of things to be acted very coasily. No one class of the community has rendered so much help to the Temperance cause as Ministers of the gospel have; but there is much yet to be done before Canada is emancipated from its greatest incuous—the druk traflic. Now the people rightfully expect that the Ministers of the Gospel shall be their promoters and leaders in every good work. Let Ministers fearlessly lift up their voices in denunciation of the ne-farious liquor traflic—a traflic that impoverishes the many to enrich a few. By such fearless action they will rally around them those of their respective churches who really love God and their fellow man, and create a more healthy sentiment on this important subject than now exists, and its effects will be widely seen and felt.
