

THE REAL MEANING OF THE POWER BILL

It Extends to Eastern Part of Ontario the Benefits of Cheap Power

THE OBJECTION RAISED BY THE OPPOSITION

Stubborn Opposition Offered by the Conservative Members

Ottawa, April 25.—In the bill passed by the house of commons at the close of last week, granting a charter to the St. Lawrence Power Transmission Company, the federal government extends to the eastern part of Ontario or what may be termed the St. Lawrence counties the benefits the western portion of the peninsula enjoys from the Ontario government's hydro-electric scheme, in the doing whereof, a somewhat anomalous situation was presented to the country.

The undertaking of the Ontario government to carry electric power to the inland centers by a system of transmission lines extending as far from the seat of power at Niagara Falls as electric power can be economically transmitted, will it is universally recognized, prove a distinct benefit to the peninsula. Yet when a scheme presented itself whereby the greater part if not the whole of the eastern section constituting the St. Lawrence counties might be permitted to enjoy similar benefits, the country was treated to the spectacle of those members of the house whose political catechism corresponds with that of the Ontario government, opposing the proposal and doing their utmost to defeat it.

The St. Lawrence Power Transmission bill was not a government measure, but as there appeared no likelihood of the Ontario government taking steps to extend to the eastern side of the province the advantages to be derived from a distribution of electrical current which it had accorded the west, as many points in the east stood in need of some arrangement of the kind and as provision had already been made for the generation of such power, the proposal of the transmission company appealed strongly to the members of the government individually and to the members of the Liberal majority in the house as well.

A charter had already been granted to a company to generate power, as limited, on the St. Lawrence river, but that company had no power or authority to carry its current into the interior by means of transmission lines. In consequence investment in a very large and very important semi-public utility was retarded and a section of country very much in need of electrical power was being denied the privilege of having it.

Therefore, as said, the proposal of the transmission company made an appeal to the majority party in the house. Singularly enough, as it struck many minds—they were probably minds that were not well regulated—the opposition lined up solidly against the proposition and this, in the face of the fact that the hydro-electric

side that the measure was given the aspect of being a semi-public bill.

Relative to the paramount objection raised to the bill by the opposition, the members on the government side of the chamber took the ground that if the destruction of a very great natural beauty was involved as against a small or any ordinary utility, the enterprise would be the subordinate consideration, but to set up the preservation of the natural beauty of a bit of scenery, which though pleasing to the eye cannot be said to be extraordinary, as against a very large and highly important utility, one involving the interests of a large and important section of country they held, could not be justified on any ground.

This was a unanimity of sentiment with regard to the transmission company's bill manifested among Liberal members which gave to the various debates the semblance of the bill being a government measure while the opposition to it on the other side would have seemed to have indicated the same thing, although there was no occasion for division on party lines.

Assuredly it was an anomalous situation; the Liberal members on one side, championing a principle which a Conservative government had pronounced good, but which was opposed unanimously by Conservative members in the federal house. The circumstances afforded another striking contrast between the policies of the two parties as represented by the house membership, the one not being about promoting a policy notwithstanding it had its inception in the other, it found to be a good thing for the people while the other capable of opposing the extension of a large benefit to the country for seemingly no better purpose than to play at politics.

LETHBRIDGE OBJECTS TO THE LITERATURE

Thinks Publicity Department Unduly Favored the North
NOTHING SAID ABOUT IRRIGATION IN ALBERTA
Many Other Small Omissions That Are Very Surprising

have equal recognition in the matter of this province.
In the article concerning railways, pages 54, 55 and 57, we find all railroads now built and that are likely to be built, mentioned with the following exceptions: The A. R. & L. from here to Cardston and from here to the boundary line, this last line being the one by which the Great Northern enters this province. Nor do we find any mention of the C.P.R. Weyburn-Lethbridge branch, nor of the C.N.R. Marysville-Lethbridge branch, both of which are now being built and, therefore, much greater certainties than some of the railroads which are named.

On page 10, under "conclusions as to climate," paragraph C, the statement is made that winter temperatures have no relation to cereal crops, whereas we claim that winter temperature does materially affect the winter wheat and, furthermore, on page 24, under the heading of "The beneficence of winter frosts," you will find this statement on page 10 flatly contradicted. On page 12 in the second paragraph the chinook wind is referred to as bearing moisture, whereas we have always been of the impression that the chinook wind was a dry wind.

On the map which is enclosed with the book we find that railroads now in operation and proposed railroads are both indicated in the same manner as that a stranger has no means of telling from this map which are railroads and which are proposed railroads and would have every reason to believe that they were all operating railroads. Furthermore you will find that in the Edmonton district in the north that all proposed lines are shown whereas in the Lethbridge district lines which are now actually being built, namely, the C.P.R. line from Weyburn to Lethbridge, and the C.N.R. line, commonly called the Marysville line, to Lethbridge, are not shown.

POPE DISPLEASED AT PRINCE OF MONACO

Disapproves of His Visit to Rome to Lecture Upon the Subject of "Oceanography."

Rome, April 25.—The proposed visit of the Prince of Monaco to Rome has resulted in a new order of things at the Vatican, where the prince's act is considered a personal offense to the Pope. It was officially announced several days ago that the prince would arrive in Rome on April 24, and would be received by the king the following day. His lecture on "Oceanography" is arranged for April 25. In an exchange of communications between the Holy See and the prince, the latter explained he was not coming to Rome as a ruler, but as a scientist to give a lecture. The Vatican answered that it could not admit such a scientific or scientific personality of a ruler from that of a scientist. It is pointed out that the prince will give a lecture on the subject of "Oceanography" in Rome, where, while the full and entire independence of the church is not understood, the Holy See must protest against spoliation suffered by the pontiff. Continuing, the communication says: "The Pope can suffer the attention created by the events of 1870, but cannot accept it nor permit public opinion to believe that it has accepted it."

Gatins is known to be a man with plenty of ready money and reputed both here and in the south, where he has been a prominent figure, to be worth something like \$100,000. Gatins was arrested at his home in a big apartment house in Central Park west, where he lived in luxury. He is charged specifically with having on June 15, 1909, engaged in a conspiracy with Virgil P. Randolph, William B. Price and Edward E. 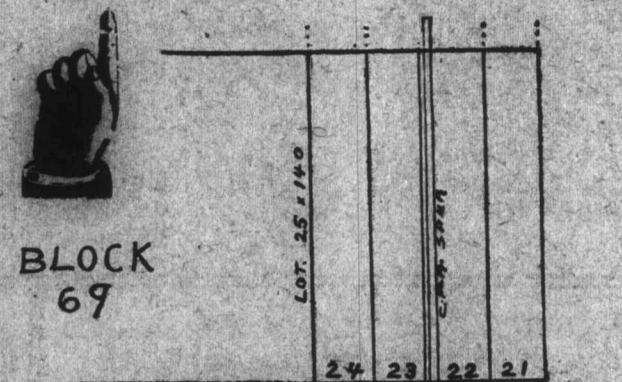

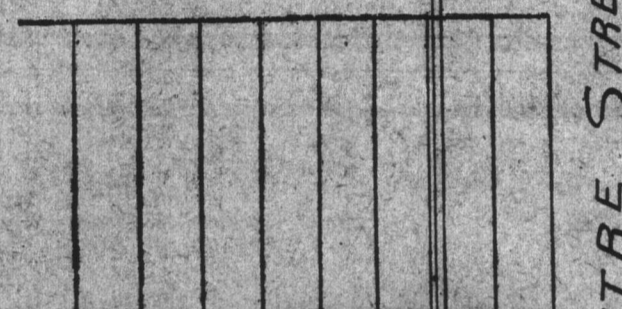

FINLAND WILL DEFEY THE CZAR OF RUSSIA

Will Raise a Clean Cut Issue Upon Subject of the Autonomy of the Country.

Helsinki, April 25.—The Finnish diet proposes to defy the czar in the latter's attempt to rob Finland of its constitution and liberties, and to make it a mere province of Russia. It is conceded that the defiance will accomplish nothing. No doubt is felt that Nicholas intends to pursue his program through whether the diet acquiesces or not.

The Finnish law-makers' action will raise a clean cut issue, however, and places the Finnish people in a position where they can resort to more vigorous methods of resistance after having let the world know that they have done everything in their power to defend themselves by peaceful means against the establishment of a despotism over what has hitherto been perhaps the freest country in Europe.

The first step toward keeping the record straight was taken when the diet referred to a special committee the law the czar had notified the legislators be intended to lay before the diets for the re-organization of the Finnish government. Inasmuch as the proposed law takes from the diet, and vests in the Russian bureaucracy the control of the state railroads, posts, police, civil service and practically every other public service department, it amounts to a kind of left-handed abolition of the diet by leaving it without anything to do.

Nicholas wants the diet to approve this plan as a preliminary to its submission to the duma, but the committee is drafting a report to the effect that the measure is unconstitutional, and that its passage would be an outrage upon civilization.

Upon this it is expected the czar will dissolve the diet, probably forever, shove the bill through the duma and complete the Russification of the public service, upon which a start has already been made without awaiting legal authorization.

THE GODDESS WAS HOKED FOR FOUR BITS IN NEW YORK

But She Returned None the Worse For the Journey.

New York, April 25.—The Egyptian Goddess Neith, whose disappearance from the galleries of the Metropolitan Museum of Art agitated the museum authorities yesterday, turned up on the Bowery today. She had suffered the indignity of being "hoked" for fifty cents. The goddess' form was embodied in a statuette 3.4 inches tall, of great artistic merit, and worth approximately \$1,500. The statuette dates from about the fifth century B. C.

When the connoisseurs of the museum were informed that the goddess had been located on the Bowery, they could hardly be convinced that even on that plebeian thoroughfare the Egyptian deity had been appraised at a bare half dollar.

The peddler, with whom the statuette was peddled gave the detective a description of the poor clad man who brought it to him. The peddler was traced, and he was taken back to the museum, none the worse for her stunning expedition.

GIANT HAT SAVES LIFE OF WEARER

Prevents Glass From Cutting Head of Girl Who Runs Into Window.

London, April 25.—Paris has informed the world of how the sagacity of a hat worn by one of its popular actresses during a promenade in the fashionable little town of St. Germain-en-Laye all but led to a duel. But London is prepared to contend that the justification of the mammoth hat, the Merry Widow lid, has been forthcoming.

Practical experience has been invoked to silence those querulous persons who complain that such feminine headgear blockades the rush of the airway, and in the process, gives women the appearance of huge animated umbrellas, disturbs the acoustic properties of churches and obstructs the vision of motorists who hanker to get glimpses of Niagara Falls, the Pyramids, the Matterhorn and Westminster abbey. Here is the evidence.

"Miss" met with a serious cycling accident yesterday," runs the thrilling recital that appears in an English provincial newspaper. "Her wrake jammed, when she was riding down Crosby street, a steep hill, and the machine sailed along at a great pace. Swerving into Wood street, it ran into the front of the station, and the rider was thrown violently against and partly through a window, consisting of plate glass three-quarters of an inch thick. The impact scattered and smashed the bottles displayed in the window and the girl was severely cut about the face and neck. But for the fact that she was wearing the Merry Widow hat, which partly protected her head and face, she might have lost her life."

"It is now suggested by more men that, in the face of this practical demonstration, the mammoth feminine hat will become strictly de rigueur for bicycling and automobile riding. For no woman knows the day or hour when she may be thrown through three-quarters of an inch of plate glass."

IRRIGATION CONVENTION

Will Meet at Kamloops—Governor General to be Invited

Kamloops, April 24.—The local officials of the irrigation association held a meeting on Friday to prepare for the convention which is to be held here this year. Among those present were Mayor Robinson, Messrs. Richards, Halpin, T. Calloway, (local secretary), and R. M. Palmer. It was decided to suggest the last Wednesday in July as the day for the opening of the convention, which will extend over two and perhaps three days; also that a banquet be held on the evening of the first day, that invitations be sent to Mr. Newell, head engineer of the United States Reclamation Department; the Hon. Clifford Sifton, chairman of the Conservation Commission; F. B. Bennett of Calgary; A. E. Ashcroft, of Vernon; and A. E. Meighen, of Kamloops, to attend and read papers or deliver addresses. It was recommended that his excellency the governor-general, who may be coming to this province about that time, be asked to preside at the gathering and that the premiers of the three provinces of Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia and the premier of Ontario be asked to attend. These suggestions have been forwarded by Mr. Calloway to John T. Hall, Edmonton, permanent secretary of the association.

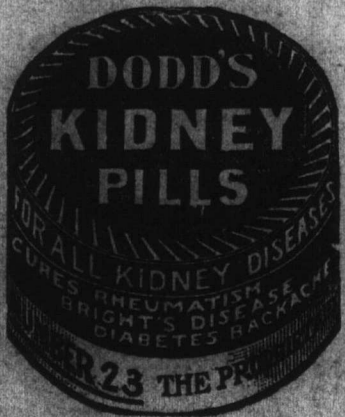

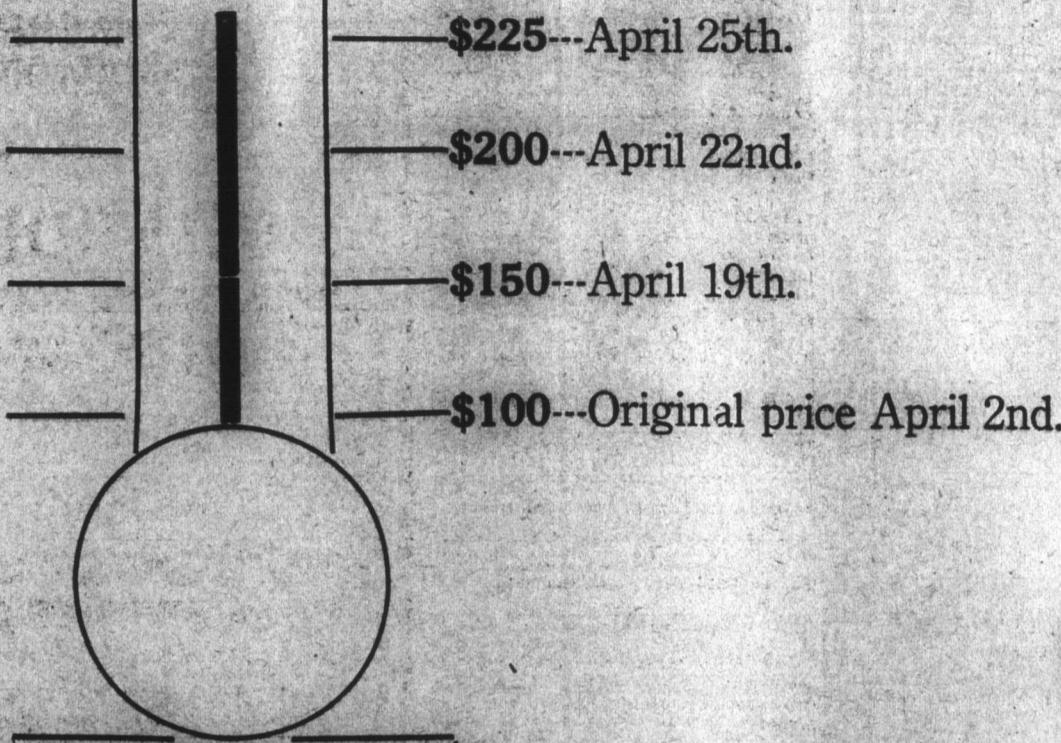
