Record Down-pour Yesterday Sets All New York a Swim.

New York, Oct. 9.—Torrential rains commencing early yesterday morning and continuing with scarcely any intermission until late this morning during which time the unprecedented precipitation of 10.04 inches was recorded at the local Weather Bureau.

Some of the water from the Hudson river has been carried into the city and all the surrounding country under a flood today, causing damage that will amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars.
