

St. Petersburg, July 1.—This has been a day of bewildering uncertainty in St. Petersburg regarding the situation at Odessa. The Russian capital is without direct advices on the subject of the surrender of the Kniaz Potemit this city. Even the Admiralty, the ministry of the interior and other government departments reports are current that the mutineers of the Kniaz Potemiths, after agreeing to surrender on returning to their anchorage, changed their minds and succeeded in corrupting the crew of a battleship which Rear Admiral Kruger left in the harbor.




