John Purdy Sentenced at Cobourg for COBOURG. MOBBING CALIFORNIA CHINAMEN.

Ten Victims Suffering From Knife Wounds -Several Deaths Reported. SAN FRANCISCO, April 29 .- Ten Chinawere brought to this city to-day from Martenez, Contra Costa county, where they, with others, were mobbed on Thursday evening. A band of hoodlums attacked several Chinese houses and tried to drive out the occupants. A riot ensued and shots were fired. One house was entered, and the inmates were thrown from a second story window. The persons who committed the outrage have not been identified. The Chinese brought to this city are lying at the Chinese consulate. It is feared the wounds of some of them may prove fatal. It is reported that several of assaulted Chinamen died at Martinez yesterday, but the exact facts in regard to the matter are not yet known.

The New Vrk Times savs that one of the most antic monopolies of the age has been created by the union of the Edison electric light company with the Gramme electric company. The several large companies that claim the control of all patents for applying the existing systems of lighting by electricity are thus formed into one organization. Some people may see in this the true inwardness of Edison's long delay in showing the practical working of his system on the large scale. His invention was a failure, so it was said, it was another Keeley motor humbug, and he was merely trying to hide the fact as long as possible. Now the indications are to the effect rather that the delay was for purposes of speculation and monopoly. The electric light may be a good thing, but it will not be cheap to the public if the companies controlling the patents have combined. The consolidated company will put prices up close to the limit which the public will "stand." This is a way the great monopoliste have; they are careful to take just as much as they can get without provoking actual rebellion or the development of fresh competition, which might trouble them. If threatened by a popular demand for legis-1 stion to curb their power they will concede just enough to save themselves for the time, and no more.
