A WEALTHY NEW YORK OPERA-TOR'S SEARCH FOR HIS SON.

The Lad Twice Kidnapped and Lost After

All-A Sensation at the Village of St

MONTREAL, Dec. 26.-The village of St. Jerome was the other day the scene of an ex-citing attempt at kidnapping on the part of a rich and prominent member of the New York stock exchange. It seems that three years ago J. G. Rigney, a broker, sued his wife for divorce, a counter action be ng taken by the lady at a subsequent date. The parties sepa-

divorce, a counter action be ng taken by the lady at a subsequent date. The parties separated, the wife living by herself and taking with her two children, a litt e girl and a boy of ab. ut 10. The boy was kidnapped whilst playing in front of his mother's house in New York and handed over to his father. He lived some time with Mr. Rigney, but one morning, as he was going to school, three unknown men seized him and hurried him into a coach, from which time all trace of him and his mother was lost. For two years, despite the fact that a 1 the detective agencies of Canada and the United States were on the qui vive to discover their whereabouts, it was only during the hunt after absconding Bank President Hinckley that Detective Pahey got a clue which eventually led to the indentification of Mrs. Rigney and her boy. Mr. Rigney was informed of their whereabouts by wire, but that night they fled f om Montreal, and for two months more their hiding place became a mystery. Finally the lady was located at Dorval, mixing amongst the best society, including the family of the hon. member for the county in the house of commons. Again the husband was telegraphed for. On his arrival here he consulted counsel, and by advice of Mr Laflamme, Q.C., ex-minister of justice, a habeas corpus was issued ordering Mrs. Rigney to appear before a judge of the court of Queen's cench and show cause why the boy should not be given into the custody of his father. Armed with a writ and accompanied by a bailiff, the New York broker proceeded to Dorval to serve the papers on Mrs. Rigney, but the wife had, aided by a prominent queen's counsel, again made good her escape. The disappointed husband returned to New York. The Anniversary of St. Stephen's Day St. Johns, Nfld., Dec. 26.—A despatch from Harbor Grace states that the orange demi ration passed off quietly. A procession co

own. Except, let us say, when he quotes popular proverbial slang, which he knew well

One of the new things of the day-supposed to be-aye, one of the particular developments of the year 1884—is over-production and over-pressure of competion. 



GROWL FROM EGYPT.

THE EXPEDITION COMMISSARY DE PARTMENT BREAKS DOWN.

A Change of Base—The Relief of Gordon

Postponed for Another Two Months— Trying to Bribe the Natives. Lendon, Dec. 28.-News from Egypt is not of the most satisfactory character. Gen. Wolseley has decided to abandon the astempt to reach Shendy by the desert route from Korti, thus cutting off a great bend in the Nile. He has accordingly changed the base from Korti to Mereweh. This change places the relief of Khartoum two

aths further into the future than ex-Gen. Wolseley is far from satisfied with the arrangements for the expedition. He has sent furious complaints to the war office of inefficiency and absolute break office of inefficiency and absolute break down of transport and commissary services. Although a good two months has clapsed since the pioneer corps left Sarass, only 1500 of the 7000 men composing the full force of the expedition have reached Korti. British envoys have left Korti for the Kabbabish and other tribes, which are only weakly attached to the mahdit. cause. The envoys will endeavor to persuade the tribes to enter into an alliance with the English

A despatch from Korti says the English expedition is about ready to start. It will consist of 900 infantry and 1500 cavalry, with six screw guns and 1800 camels. The Nineteenth Hussars will start Monday and ascend the Nile on the west bank, to act as

Kort, Dec. 28.—The British cavalry have been ordered to be in readiness to march to Merawe.

Cairo, Dec. 28.—The mudir of Dongola telegraphs that a native who left Khartoum a fortnight ago has arrived at Dongola. Heispent four days spying the mahdi's position and reports tha rebels suffering from famine. Many bodies are strewn about the country unburied. The rebels are discouraged by Gen. Gordon's repeated at tacks and many dispersed on hearing of the British advance. He repeats the report that a large number of the mahdi's regulars have joined Gordon.

SUAKIM, Dec. 28.—The Haddendowas killed the chief of the Beniamer tribe and many of his followers while trying to re lieve Massala. The rebels have captured the Roweyah salt mines, 100 miles north killing many merchants and inhabitants. The survivors have left in boats and are expected to arrive here to-morrow.
