St. Johns, N.F., Sept. 3.—The passengers on the wrecked steamer Hanoverian behaved with admirable coolness. All Lord Churchill Makes the Amneuncement
—Russia Declared to Have Largely
Modified Her Claims.

London, Sept. 3.—Lord Churchill delivered an address at Sheffield this evening,
in the course of which he said there was no
reason as yet to regret the absence of
coercion in Ireland. He also said he was
glad to announce that the Afghan frontier
question had been settled, Russia having
largely modified her claims.

The speech was extremely mederate in
tone. Lord Randolph referred to the
Russian ambassador to England as a most
cultivated and accomplished gentleman.

The liberals, the speaker said, had left
the Afghan negotiations in a dead
lock. Their last despatches before
the retirement of the liberal party
from power were stern and uncompromising. Lord Dufferin and Col.

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
