



The Privy Council has made a new departure in consenting to be-come the forwarder of a petition to a Local Legislature. It seems to us that the Council might have let the Bishops send their petition direct. And it seems to us that the Council is not courteous to the Manitoba Legislature when it asks that body to review its work in the Manitoba school case, with a view to taking "speedy measures to give redress in all matters of religion to which any well-founded complaint or grievance be ascertained." That is a sort of intimation that the Manitoba Legislature passed its school law without giving the matter due consideration. It seems to us that the Gov-ernment, having discovered that it was not legal, or not politic, to give the bishops the legislation they asked for, should have said so, and yet the matter rest there. To ask the Manitoba Legislation which the Dominion Government finds itself unable or unwilling to und is no part of the business of His Excellency's council, and to petition the Manitoba Legislature in the interest of the bishops and against the feelings of the great bulk of the people of Canada, is, on the part of His Excellency's council, going too far out of its way.
