GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

JOHN W. SCOTT SENTENCED FOR KILLING COULTER. Year in the Penitentiary is the Light

Punishment Imposed - Postponemens

Lockport, N.Y., Oct. 23 .- The Scott manslaughter case was resumed this morning, with Dr. Richard Barrington Nevitt of Toronto on the stand. The jury rendered a verdict of guilty of manslaughter in the second degree. Scott was sentenced to one year in the Eric County Penitentiary.


