



the cost. Flants intended for winter in the house should be kept in pots during the summer, and encouraged to make a vigorous, though not rapid growth; at all times be kept well cut back in order to secure compact form or shape, and not allowed to flower. When brought into the house they are to be re-potted, using a pot but one size larger than the one in which/they were grown, and in case the roots have not al.' ready filled the pot in which the plant was growing, use the same sized pot, but tak away the soil not filled with roots, and re-place with fresh soil. It is worse than useless to give a plant more soil than it can use, or to add fresh soil until the roots have filled the old, for this encourages an other form of plant dyspepsia, which is eommon among the many causes of plant fatality, and certain it is that the absence of flowers is in the main due to over-potfatality, and certain it is that the absence by being given half a pint twice a day for awhile in his feed. 
