### MARINE NEWS

Forty steamers, the most of them transatlantic vessels, are tied up at Rosario because of a strike of stevedores.

The lobster fishermen of Campobello and Grand Manan, are getting \$1.00 each for lobsters of three and four pounds out of the traps. The crustaceans bring nearly double the price at retail in Boston.

Two Nova Scotia tern schooners, the Rosanna Belliveau and Edith Belliveau, have been chartered to load logwood at a Haytien port for Mobile. The latter vessel is now at Macoris, with a cargo of coal from Philadelphia.

British schr. Adam B. Markav, of the Niger Company, of London. A. M. King, of Lockport, N. S., master, arrived at New Orleans recently from Burutu, West Africa, making the passage in 48 days, this being the fastest run ever made by any vessel between the two ports.

The Bridgewater Division of the C. N. R. has just received two powerful locomotives of the ten wheel type.

### MASSACHUSETTS TOWNS VOTED "WET"

The Majority Had Voted Consistently "Dry" for Many Years

BOSTON, March 3.—Almost fifty Massachusetts Towns out of sixty-seven voted "wet" in their annual town meetings, complete returns showed today. The majority of these towns returned substantial "wet" majorities, despite the fact that almost all had voted consistently "dry" for the town and Mansfield voted "wet" for the town like Rockport, Middleboro, Lincoln and Mansfield voted "wet" for the first time in their history. The few towns that stuck to the "dry" column did so in many cases by narrow margins or by substantially reduced majorities.

### FARMERS MET AT KENTVILLE

Will Hold Another Convention in April

A meeting of the Executive appointed at the meeting of the United Farmers of Nova Scotia following the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers held in this town recently, convened at Kentville 3rd. All members of the executive were present—namely, William O'Brien, of Windsor, Mr. Nicholson, of Coxheath, C. B.; V. B. Leonard, of Clarence, Annapolis County; M. K. Ellis, of Port Williams and W. A. Bacon, of Digby. In addition to the executive Mr. Taggart, president of the Milkmen's Association, Colchester County, Frank Foster, delegate to the United Farmers of New Brunswick Association, F. A. Chipman and J. Elliott Smith, of Wolfville were present.

There seemed to be unanimity of opinion that a provincial convention should be called at the earliest possible date, and the 14th day of April was set for that meeting. Arrangements are being made whereby at least two sessions will be devoted to organization purposes, to be followed by a mass meeting addressed by some of the foremost speakers in Canada, and representatives of the different provinces.

The executive evidently have carried out their instructions to the letter, and have obtained information which in their opinion warranted the calling of the United Farmers of Nova Scotia together, and ascertain if it is their wish that an extensive organization campaign should be put on.

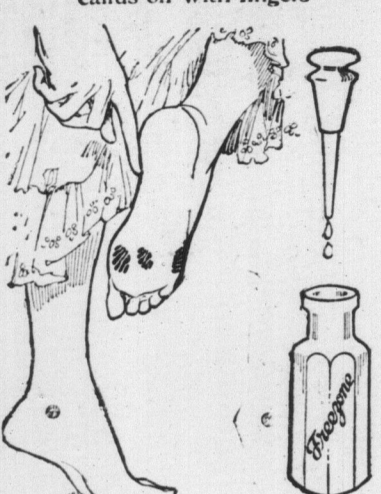

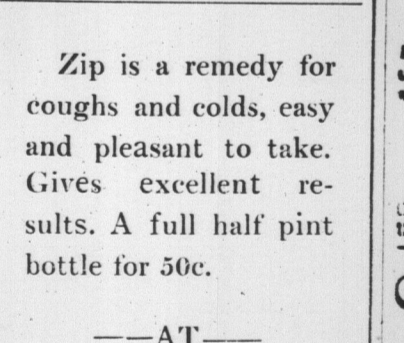

### HEN RAISING

#### Christmas Ashore and a Long Passage of a Yarmouth Vessel

Mr. Lawson, Editor Yarmouth Herald: DEAR SIR—Will you allow me a short space in your valuable paper to ask some of our leading hen breeders a few questions; also to tell them some of my experiences I have learned by raising hens. The question I want to ask is this: Is this a "large egg"? Size 6 3/4 inches by 8 inches, weight 4 ounces—by actual measurement and weighing said egg by a person who bought the egg from me. I have been keeping hens about six years. I bought the first setting of eggs in Lynn, Mass. Rhode Island Reds they were named. Out of two dozen eggs I had four pullets, and from them the next year I raised about twenty pullets. I made a large yard and let them run in it and scratch up the ground. Each year I enlarged the yard until I had about two hundred feet square.

In the meantime I commenced planting a garden and the best part of it was I did not have to plow or spade the ground. The hens had it all prepared for planting, so they helped a lot in my farming and today I have a fine garden by the help of my hens. Now, I think with the liberty they have had and the good care I have given them, may be the result of them laying such large eggs. Of course, the one I have mentioned is the largest. So I thought I would ask through your world wide paper if any person could compete with this; if so, I should like to hear from them; and to use the phrase I once heard an Irishman use. I alleged him of being guilty of doing something one time and the answer he made me: "I believe I did, Sur, for I am a great man." So I think I must be a great man to raise hens that lay such large eggs.

Now, Mr. Editor if you will permit me to tell the story about this Irishman I will try and make it as short as I possibly can. I was second mate of a ship by the name of Bessie Crosby, belonging to Yarmouth, N. S., and commanded by Capt. Ansel Crosby. We left Antwerp on Dec 4th, 1868, bound to New York. We were twenty days in coming to Falmouth. In the English Channel head winds all the way so we arrived late in the afternoon, came to anchor, rolled up the sails and cleared up the decks. The captain told me he wanted me to go ashore and get some geese for Christmas. So I got a boat out and I took four men of my watch. The captain gave me two sovereigns.

We started for the shore, landed all right and we were about one mile from the village, so I took two men with me and left two in the boat to look after her. One of these men was the Irishman. When we were walking along through the field I noticed a large flock of sheep. We went on to the village for our geese, but we were too late. They had sold all for Christmas, so we had to return without any.

When we arrived at the boat it was quite dark. As I stepped into the boat and walked aft I noticed something white in the bottom of the boat concealed under the thwart. I asked: "What have you got here, Pat?" "Oh, be gar, no sheep tries to bite me, and live," so I caught on. While we were gone after geese, Pat and the other chap ran this sheep down, caught it and had it in the boat, thinking I would not see it. So I says: "Pat, do you know the penalty of sheep stealing in England?" "Oh, be gar, who will know about it, if we shove off and get on board of the ship?" I thought, as we did not have any geese the sheep would fill the place, so I said: "Shove off, boys." Of course, I was young then myself and did not see things as I should now.

We got on board with the sheep all right, killed and dressed it and had it cooked for dinner. The next day (Christmas) I gave one sovereign back to the captain and kept one. He never asked me if I paid any more than the sovereign and I never told him. So I did not have to tell a lie. I suppose you will think I was bad enough to help steal the sheep, without telling a lie.

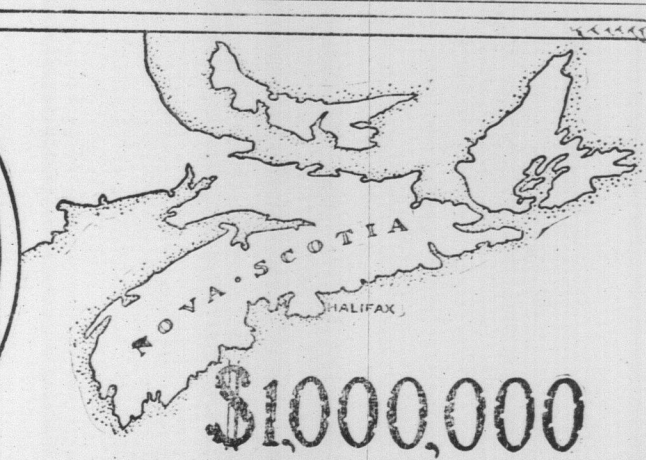
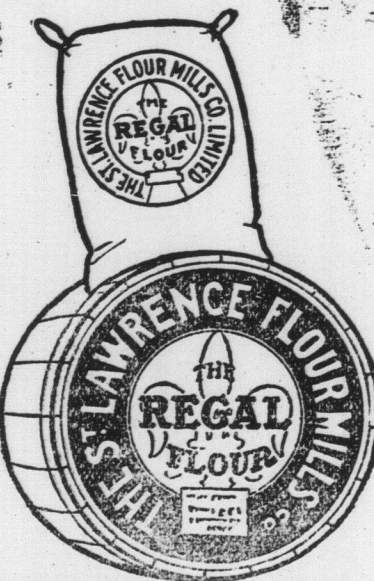
