Notes

For the Summer months the prayer service will begin promptly at 6 o'clock instead of 7.45. Let us come joyfully to God's house for an hour of spiritual up-lifting. It does not pay in any sense to neglect this hour of prayer. A little adjustment of our duties will enable us to be in our place.

Read this with a thankful heart. According to statistics presented at the New York Ecumenical Conference by Dr. Dennis, there are 249 societies now directly engaged in Foreign Mission work. Of these there are in the British Isles 54; the United States, 49; Asia, 20; Africa, 28; Australia and Oceania, 26; Germany, 15; Netherlands, 10; Canada, 8; Sweden, 7; the West Indies, 11; Norway, 4; Denmark, 3; France and Switzerland, 2; itself; Finland, 1. The total income is put at \$17,161,092, of which over \$1,000,000 came from England and Scotland. The United States contributes \$5,403,000, and Germany \$1,430,000. The total number of missionaries, male and female, including medical missionaries, is 15,667. These, England sends 5,136, and Scotland 653, the United States 4,110, and Germany 1,515. The number of organized churches is given as 10,993, and the number of communicants 1,289,298.—*Messenger and Visitor*.

The *Missionary Review of the World* for February, 1900, gives an item which may surprise many. It reads as follows: "At the recent church congress in Great Britain Dr. Henry Ware, formerly principal of King's College, and one of the writers of the *Times*' leaders, made a strong impression on the conference by calling attention to the amazing growth in numbers, unity and influence, of the 'dissenters.' The facts are too important not to be recorded for permanent use. The dissenting churches had increased from a twentieth to more than a quarter, if not a third of the population. The membership of the Anglican Church in England and Wales was 1,920,140. In the dissenting churches there were 1,897,175. Church Sunday-school teachers numbered 206,271; in the Free Churches there were 381,153. Church Sunday-school scholars were 2,410,209, and in the Free Churches 3,284,963."
