ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY,
For the year ending 5th January, 1845.

GENTLEMEN—The Ninth Board of Management of the St. George's Society, about to lay down the offices to which they were elected on the 5th January last, beg leave to render to the Members in General Meeting assembled, their Report of the proceedings and condition of the Society during the past year.

It affords the Board unfeigned pleasure to announce the continued success and increasing prosperity of the institution, so dear in its objects and reminiscences to our fellow countrymen, both as regards the state of the funds, and the general harmony and utility of its operations in the relief of deserving persons of our origin.

The first gratifying occurrence which the Board has to report, is the celebration of the Festival of St. George, which presented last year a new feature, and was attended with complete success. The Board congratulates the Members on the honor which the Lord Bishop of Montreal conferred upon the Society, by preaching a Sermon written expressly for the occasion; a distinction which cannot be too highly appreciated, since it marks in the eyes of the world the approbation of His Lordship, and his sanction of the motives which govern our

Association. The collection in the Cathedral on the occasion, in aid of the Charitable Fund, amounted to thirty-five pounds. The Board cannot doubt that this gratifying notice, taken of their efforts by so high an authority, will have the beneficial effect of inciting the Society to persevere with redoubled energy in the work of Charity, in whose cause they are enrolled. Having for their Patron, the distinguished Personage who holds the reins of Government, and whose continued good wishes for the welfare of the Institution, expressed in a letter from the Private Secretary, of the 10th April last, the Board is happy to acknowledge ; and enjoying the sanction and countenance of the Bishop of Montreal, the St. George's Society may reasonably expect, not only that new Members will haste to join their ranks, but that those Members of the Society who now limit their participation in its affairs to the payment of the Annual Subscription, will be warmed to take a cordial and active part for the future in proceedings, which, the more they are known, redound to the honor of the Institution.

At the request of the Society, a copy of the excellent Sermon above alluded to was obtained, and printed with the Bishop of Montreal's consent. It has been admired, wherever read ; and in stating that a few copies remain as of record, amongst the documents of the Society, it would be inexcusable not to notice in this place, the liberality of one of our Life Members, and late President, whose donation of one hundred copies, made the cost of printing this Sermon fall lightly on the funds.

Charity being, beyond question, the main object of our Association, and our bond of union, the attention of

the Members generally will doubtless be directed with the greatest interest to the proceedings of the Sub-Committee, to whose management the Charitable Fund is entrusted. It is certain, that to no section of the Society are the Members under greater obligation than to the gentlemen who compose that Sub-Committee—before whom cases of distress and applications for aid are brought, to be examined, adjudicated, and relieved, according to the pressure and emergency of each claim.

From the 5th February last, to the 29th November inclusive, the number of cases reported by the Charitable Committee, as applications for relief under the rules, amounted to fifty-five—of which *fifty-three* were found deserving, and received aid from our funds in money, clothes, passages home, and to Montreal, with provisions. All these cases are reported fully in the minutes kept by the Charitable Committee, and form an interesting catalogue of benefits conferred, it is confidently believed, on deserving and grateful brethren, who have fallen into misfortune in this distant Colony.

Amongst the fifty-three relieved, will be found, persons aided in settling upon lands near Quebec—widows and orphans enabled to return home, after loss of their protectors in this country; those who were unable from infirmity to bear the severity of the winter, forwarded to a more genial climate; while labourers, mutilated by accident, or the inclemency of the weather, shipwrecked mariners, and persons debilitated in Hospital, have each received a measure of relief, corresponding with their wants. Such a table of benefits conferred, must command your approbation and ap-

plause ; and amongst the cases to which the Board has referred, there is one of a person once in affluence, and another of an aged man of eighty-six, whom destitution and ill-treatment have thrown upon the charity of his countrymen. There will be found also in the list, several persons who have been relieved by the Society, on the recommendation of the Sister Societies of St. George in Montreal and Upper Canada, with whom it is at all times so desirable to maintain a friendly correspondence, and unity of action in the cause of Charity. In accomplishing this good work, the sum of £65 3s. 5d. currency, has been expended by the Committee of Charity ; and it is to be hoped that the Members will record their sense of the efficient manner in which that most interesting and important part of the business of the Society has been conducted.

During the past year several new By-Laws have been adopted in general meeting. Their operation will doubtless be found conducive to the advantage of the Society ; and the Board notices this part of the subject with the greatest satisfaction, as it proves the interest taken by individual members in the good government of the body. A Report of a Sub-Committee, recommending certain amendments to the standing Rules and By-Laws, as now printed, was presented at the last Quarterly Meeting, and lies over for consideration on the 24th March ensuing. The additions to the By-Laws passed during last year, and the verbal alterations and other amendments which may possibly be adopted at the next Quarterly Meeting, will call for a new edition of the Standing Rules ; copies of which are now not only

scarce, but the existing By-Laws themselves, in consequence of frequent alterations, are not sufficiently easy of attainment, as a reference, by the Members, collectively. This matter is respectfully recommended to the notice of the Board of Management, to be elected this day; as are also the subjects of the Diploma, of the additional Collars required for the increased number of the Board, and of the Badges to be worn by the Members collectively.

The Treasurer's Report, is hereunto annexed. His accounts have been duly audited by the Sub-Committee of Accounts, and found to be correct. The Board congratulates the Members on the very satisfactory state of the funds of the Society, which healthy condition may be attributed mainly to the zeal and perseverance of the Treasurer. In January last, the permanent fund amounted to £620 currency, the amount funded is now £700, showing an increase during the year of £80. The balance in hand belonging to the Charitable Fund is £86 15s. 10d., including about £15, however, due from the permanent fund, while the current expenses for the past year have been reduced to the small sum of £12 1s. 9d. The Board begs to refer for further particulars to the Report of the Sub-Committee of Accounts, herewith submitted.

The Board reports also, with great satisfaction, that the Society now consists of 172 Members, of whom 22 are Life Members, showing an increase, since the last Anniversary, of 10 Ordinary, and 3 Life Members.

It must be highly satisfactory to the Society to learn, that the Physicians continue to dispense their zealous

and gratuitous services to the poor of English and Welsh origin, who require medical treatment. It appears by their Report, herewith submitted, that *thirty-four* persons have received such relief as their cases required, during the past year ; and looking at the constant readiness of the Medical Officers of the Society, to give their professional aid whenever called for, the Board feels much pleasure in echoing their own words, and in offering "to the Chaplains, the Members of Committees, and the Society in general, thanks for the zeal and trouble taken by them in searching out, and bringing under notice the different cases of sickness and distress which have, during the year now ended, been the subjects of their professional care."

The only matter which now remains to be reported by the Board of Management, relates to the proceedings had on the subject of a Welsh Banner. At the Quarterly Meeting of 24th June, it was agreed, that the St. George's Society, being composed of persons of English and Welsh origin, it was expedient that an additional Banner should be procured for the Society, by a subscription amongst the Members, to be called the "BANNER OF CAMBRIA," in honor of the ancient Principality of Wales, and to be carried in all processions between the Banners of St. George and Britannia. A Sub-Committee has since been appointed, to carry out this object, which will, doubtless, meet with the attention of the new Board of Management.

In conclusion, the Board now retiring from office, beg to express their high gratification at the general aspect of the Society's affairs. The Institution may now be

said to be established on a firm foundation, and to have fairly entered on a career of usefulness, which will be enlarged from year to year—and finally, be worthy of the name it bears, and the country whence we derive our origin.

All which is, nevertheless, respectfully submitted, &c.

COMMITTEE OF ACCOUNTS,

OF THE

ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY.

Your Committee have the honor to report, that they have examined the Treasurer's books, which they have found correct, and have much gratification in congratulating the Society on the prosperous state of the funds. A larger amount of arrears and annual subscriptions has been received in the course of the past year, than during any preceding—which they attribute mainly to the zeal, activity, and perseverance of the Treasurer, and also to an increasing conviction on the part of their fellow-citizens of the philanthropic views, and continued usefulness of the Society. The disbursements chargeable to the General Fund, have also been less in amount during the same period, being only £12 1s. 9d.

■

The Permanent Fund now amounts to the sum of £700, which is invested in Montreal and Quebec bank stock ; this fund is, however, indebted to that available for charitable purposes in the sum of £15. 3s. 4d.

The balance of the Charitable Fund is now £86. 15s. 10d., (including the amount due by the Permanent Fund,) being a larger amount than has ever previously appeared to the credit of that fund at the same period.

Your Committee regret that it becomes their duty, in obedience to the By-Law, No. 16, to recommend that the names of a few Members, be struck out of the list, in consequence of their not having paid up their arrears, or given satisfactory reasons for their default, after having being duly notified to that effect ; the names of these persons will be handed in to the President by the Treasurer.

All which is humbly submitted.

TREASURER'S REPORT,
FOR 1844,

Presented at the Annual Meeting,

JANUARY 6, 1845.

The Treasurer has great pleasure in reporting the condition of the Society to be prosperous and thriving.

The Permanent Fund has been increased during the past year, and now amounts to £700.

The Charitable Fund, after the operations of the past year, remains good, amounts to £86. 15s. and 10d., available for charitable purposes.

The amount of arrears collected, and subscriptions paid for 1844, exceeds, by a considerable amount, those of any former year ; the condition of the Society, in this particular, is in a perfectly healthy state, scarcely any remaining unpaid, and out of 180 Members, only 5 have come within the operation of the 16th By-Law, the loss of whom will not be felt by the Society, these persons not having contributed to the funds for the last three years—ten Members have been added during the past year.

The actual number of Members on the list, is as follows, viz :—22 Life Members, 8 Honorary, 151 Ordinary Members, 143 of whom pay the annual subscription—making a total of 181 on the list of Members.

The Treasurer congratulates the St. George's Society upon its present condition, and future prospects of doing good. The available means at the disposal of the Charitable Committee, for the ensuing year, will be ample and sufficient to enable them to carry out the benevolent designs of the Society to the fullest extent.

The Treasurer, in conclusion, cannot omit to again recommend to Members to become Life Members, the prosperity of the Society having been much increased by those who have already done so.
