CONSTITUTION

OF

The Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal.

INCORPORATED BY THE STATUTE OF CANADA 14 AND 18 VICTORIA, CAP. 171,
FOR PROMOTING THE FOLLOWING OBJECTS, VIZ:

1st.—The encouragement and support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Montreal, including the creation of funds towards the augmentation of the Stipends of poor Clergymen; and towards making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, and for Widows and Orphans of the Clergy of the said Church in the said Diocese.

2nd.—Circulating in the said Diocese the Holy Scriptures, and such publications as have the sanction of the Church, viz :—Prayer Books, Homilies, Catechisms, Collects, and Canons, with the addition of Books and Tracts circulated by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge in London.

3rd.—Obtaining and granting aid towards the endowment of Parishes or Missions, according to the establishment of the said Church in the said Diocese, and the management of all matters relating to such endowments.

His Excellency the Governor-General, if a member of the Church of England, shall be requested to become the Patron of the Society.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal shall be the President of the Society, and shall be *ex-officio* Chairman of all meetings of the Society, and of all Committees thereof, at which he may be present. The Vice-Presidents shall consist of such Chairmen of the different District Associations of the Society as are hereinafter provided for, and such others as shall be nominated at the General Annual Meeting of the Society from among its members.

The Annual Public Meeting of this Society was held in the MECHANICS' HALL, on WEDNESDAY EVENING, 20th January, 1864, at 7 o'clock.

THE MOST REVEREND THE LORD BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE, Metropolitan, in the Chair.

Moved by S. Bethune, Esq.; seconded by Rev. Mr. Hoffman of New York, and

1. *Resolved*,—That the Report now read be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Secretary.

Moved by B. Chamberlin, Esq., B.C.L.; seconded by Rev. Canon Bancroft, D.D.:

2. *Resolved*,—That while this meeting desires to express its thankfulness to Almighty God for the continued progress of the Church in this Diocese, and the successful exertions towards raising some endowments for the maintenance of the Clergy, it would remind all the friends of the Church that many of the Missionaries in the country places are dependent for a large portion of their support on grants made by this Society.

A Collection was then taken up amounting to \$162.

Moved by W. Wright, Esq., M.D.; seconded by The Right Reverend Dr. Odenheimer, Bishop of New Jersey, U.S.:

3. *Resolved*,—That this meeting acknowledges with much satisfaction many instances of endeavours to produce greater unity and communion between Christians in different parts of the world, and specially as manifested in the action taken by the Convocation of the Church of England and the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States at their last sessions, with respect to the Eastern Churches.

Moved by E. Carter, Esq.; seconded by Rev. F. Codd, Missionary at Clarendon:

4. *Resolved*,—That the thanks of the meeting be given to all those who have taken an active interest in the working of the Society, during the past year—especially to the Lay Committee, Honorary Counsel, Treasurer, and Secretary.

Moved by Lieut. General Sir F. Williams, K.C.B.; seconded by Rev. W. B. Bond, M. A.

5. *Resolved*,—That the thanks of this meeting be presented to the Right Rev. the Bishop of New Jersey, U. S., for his kindness in advocating the claims of the Society this evening, and to the Most Rev. the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, Metropolitan, for presiding.

On the previous Tuesday evening, the 19th, at 7 o'clock, there was a Full Choral Service in the Cathedral.

The special Annual Sermon before the Society was preached by Rev. R. Lindsay, M. A., of Brome.

REPORT.

1863.

The Committee of the Central Board of the Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal, before entering upon a report of their proceedings for the past year, would invite all the members of the Society to unite in ascribing thanksgiving and praise to Almighty God for His past blessings. "Except the Lord build the house their labour is but lost that build it." If success, therefore, has attended the work of the Society, which has for its object the glory of God, the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom, and the building up of the Spiritual Temple, it must be imputed solely to the aid and protection of Divine Providence. Our duty is to be thankful that we are permitted to be the instruments for continuing upon earth the work of Christ's Church, and to use our privilege with all diligence.

The Committee are more forcibly impressed each succeeding year of the great importance of this Society, with regard to the future extension of the Church in this Diocese, and they would desire to convey the same impression to the mind of each of its members, reminding them of their individual responsibility of spreading abroad through their own generation, and handing down to the succeeding, a knowledge of their great privileges as children of God. This Society is a means given us by the Divine Head of the Church for the promotion of this great work, and as such it demands the most earnest and hearty support of all the members of our communion. The objects of the Society are of such a nature as to enlist the sympathies of all Churchmen; no matter how they may differ upon minor points, all must admit that it is necessary the Church should send forth Missionaries, and with them the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer; that she should make provision for her aged or infirm labourers, and when they are called away, for their widows and

orphans. The immense importance of a Missionary Institution in the present position of the Church—thrown almost wholly upon the voluntary support of the people—must appear evident to every one; and since the Church Society is the only Missionary organization we have, it is devoutly to be hoped that it will in this character commend itself to the esteem and affection of every member of our Church, and that all will consider it an imperative duty to aid, in every possible way, to promote its objects.

If this course was universally pursued by Churchmen we might then hope the day not far distant when the services of our Holy Church should be permanently established in every settlement in our Diocese. With prayer to the Divine Head of the Church that all may be stimulated to yet greater exertion in the Society's cause, the Committee would desire to lay before the Society, the general features of their proceedings during the past year.

The above statement exhibits an increase in the amount raised in Montreal of \$96.

The amount raised in the Parishes and Missions in the country during this year, \$1,399 42, is the same as that contributed the previous year ; and although no increase appears, yet this is not to be looked upon as the effect of any diminution of zeal or interest in the Society's cause : large contributions having been made this past year, in some of the Missions, towards local endowments.

A decrease of \$130 appears in the sums collected in the Diocese after the Sermons for Missionary purposes. This is a matter to be regretted, as the steady working of the Society in maintaining her Mission work must depend largely upon this source of revenue.

The income of the Society has been, from ordinary sources, \$523 60 more than last year.

The thanks of the Society are due to the members of the Montreal Parochial Association, for their exertions in the Society's cause. The Association has paid to the Treasurer \$1920 39, which includes \$265 66 contributed through the Missionary boxes. It is to be hoped that many who have not hitherto availed themselves of the uses of the Missionary box, will do so ; for in them a ready and appropriate means would be always at hand for testifying thankfulness to God for many and constant daily mercies.

During the past year the S. P. G., by a resolution of the 20th February, set apart for the purpose of Church endowment of the Parishes within this Diocese, a sum of £1000 stg., on condition

The following Reports have been received from the different Parishes and Missions; and in accordance with the request of the Bishop, the Reports of those Missionaries receiving aid from the Mission Fund of the Society, are placed together at the commencement of the Annual Report. The Missions aided by the Society are marked*

•BERTHIER.

Rev. W. C. MARRICK writes:—In reviewing the proceedings of the past year your Missionary finds deep cause for thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church. It is my privilege to report that the amount contributed for Church objects, at Berthier, which is sustained by the Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal, exceeds that of any previous year, and what deepens my thankfulness still more, I have reason to believe that love to God and His Church are the motives which mainly led to produce this gratifying result.

The period having arrived according to the good hand of God upon us, when the progress made in the preparatory steps towards the establishment of the Berthier Mission admitted of a movement being commenced for its permanent endowment, a subscription towards this necessary branch of Church organisation, on which the future support of the Ministry in many parts of the diocese may be said to depend, has been finally entered into, amounting to upwards of \$1000, of which the sum of \$456 23 has been collected, and the balance secured by notes bearing interest, the whole to be allowed to accumulate until sufficient to provide an annual revenue which would render the Mission self-supporting. The very seasonable and generous offer of assistance towards endowments from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, to which venerable body the Church in the Colonies is under so many obligations, afforded a great stimulus to this important movement, and will contribute largely to its ultimate success.

In the month of July the ladies of the congregation of St. James' Church formed an Association for the promotion of parochial and benevolent purposes. The first fruits of their praiseworthy exertions have been the raising of \$300 by a bazaar, which, with \$80, the proceeds of a very successful concert held in the earlier portion of the year by the members of the choir, and some donations, will be devoted towards the building of a School-house, the want of which has been long felt in the Mission, and which, when erected, will prove a valuable auxiliary to the Church, and a pleasing monument to the zeal and activity of the members of the Association.

Among the other noteworthy events of the year, I have pleasure in mentioning the visits of the Rev. the Rural Dean of Hochelaga, who favored us with his presence and assistance on two occasions, on one of which he took a leading part in a parochial meeting, and on the other delivered an interesting and instructive lecture. The system of Rural Deaneries has been already productive of much good in the Diocese, and when the proposed General Board of Missions is constituted, it will be found an effectual instrumentality in keeping up a connection between the Missions and the Board, and in carrying out the details of its work.

Rev. J. C. DAVIDSON writes :—Throughout the year the services have been regularly maintained, each Sabbath, in Trinity Church, morning and evening, and in Christ's Church in the afternoon.

A beginning has been made towards the endowment of this Mission, which, I hope, will be gradually carried forward to a satisfactory result.

Wishing to be relieved from the actual superintendency of the Missisquoi High School, efforts were put forth, in concurrence with His Lordship the BISHOP OF MONTREAL, but without success, to secure a suitable supply for this department of the work. I hope, by the commencement of the next scholastic year, to obtain such assistance as will relieve me from everything connected with the school, excepting its general oversight as a part of my Parish work. In the meantime it is being carried on as vigorously as possible, and is doing good service in the community.—I have to speak in the highest terms of my present assistant, Mr. L. H. Fuller, A. B., who devotes himself faithfully to his duties under my direction.

• EDWARDSTOWN, ST. REMI, AND HAVELOCK.

Rev. E. G. SURTON.—In this Mission the following is an account of the work done, in a pecuniary point of view, for the past year; which in a measure according to the people's ability, reflects the state of their feelings towards the work of God and his Church. The Church Society suffers as usual, because local wants are many and urgent. Church Society's subscriptions \$10; Missionary purposes, Sermon collections on two occasions, \$4 95; Widows' and Orphans' collection, \$3 06; Offer-

tory collections, \$31 84, viz. : Edwardstown \$15 97½; St. Remi \$14 14½; Havelock, \$1 72; Missionary support, \$87 20, viz.: Edwardstown \$28 20. St. Remi, \$52 00½; Havelock, \$7 00. Other local Church objects, Church steeple, \$59 23½; Church, Church-yard and Fence, \$9 25. Melodeon, \$43 12½. Making altogether a total of \$248 66 for the year.

In Edwardstown there has been regular Sunday service throughout the year with Sunday-school : and I do not think that there is reason to suppose that the work is retrograding; for though our progress is not rapid, it is, I trust, all things considered, the paucity of the church population in these parts, and the uncertainty of entire voluntary support,—satisfactory. Our Sunday-school is not attended as it should be; too many parents continue asleep on the vital point of accepting religious instruction for their baptised children.

At St. Remi there is also a regular Sunday service with Sunday-school. The latter is conducted in the winter season by two young ladies, who thus render important service. Here numbers are also but small, but a spirit of unity and zeal exists, which strengthens the weakest cause. Nor may I forget thankfully to acknowledge the regular and devoted services of Miss DUNN, who presides at the melodeon, and both by vocal and instrumental efforts so freely leads the sweet offering of praise and thanksgiving in Divine service.

At Havelock a fortnightly service is held for the benefit of a small congregation who may be considered but poor. They have no church, are unable to build one, and have to assemble where best they can. Their pecuniary offerings are, on the whole, praiseworthy.

*GRENVILLE, CHATHAM, AND PETITE NATION.

REV. F. S. NEVE.—Nothing calling for remark has occurred in these two missions under my pastoral care. The duties performed by me, as detailed in the last report, have been repeated through the past year, without intermission. The financial account is as under.

*HEMMINGFORD.

REV. E. DU VERNET.—Since my last report we have succeeded in erecting a Parochial School-house on the Church lot at Hemmingford. Such a building was much needed, as many of the members of our Church

felt that the District school was not of such a character as to justify them in sending their children there.

It will be a serious tax on our people to keep up this school, as we are already heavily assessed for the school in the village. I therefore hope that ere long we may be able to obtain some extraneous aid from the Colonial and Continental Society. The sum of \$130 has already been subscribed, and with a little extraneous aid we should have no difficulty in securing the services of a well qualified teacher. Some of the collectors for the Church Society have not yet handed in their papers, and this in a great measure accounts for the small amount under the head of annual subscriptions. I hope however to get them before the end of the year.

*KNOWLTON.

Rev. J. SMITH reports:—In giving a summary of my labours as Assistant Minister and Master of the High School for the past year, I have to report that the School returns closing the scholastic year numbered 96 pupils, many of whom have become teachers. Having appeared before the Local Board of Examiners were found duly qualified. Brome Wood was opened as an Out-station in January last. I continued to hold service and Sunday school once a fortnight until October last, when the Rev. T. W. FYLES entered upon his labours as resident Missionary. There are 3 stations still under my ministrations with Sunday schools, Tilbitt Hill, Mooney Hill, and Mysoner Hill. I also take part in the services in Knowlton, and preach every alternate Sunday evening to a gradually increasing congregation. The services at the different stations are well attended by attentive hearers, many of whom, I believe, are interested in the services of our Church. There have been 4 baptisms, 3 infants and 1 adult who appeared very seriously impressed with the Holy rite.

Several families are willing to give a portion of their means for the continuance of the ministrations of the Church amongst them. The sum of \$50 (in cash and kind) has been subscribed for the keep of a horse. A detailed report of the subscriptions will be found under Brome Mission.

*MASCOUCHE AND TERREBONNE.

REV. GEORGE HEATON.—I stated a year ago, that having been only six months in residence, I was unable to present any satisfactory report.

I regret that I am still almost similarly circumstanced. The church here is somewhat in debt, which impedes the progress of the work I had in view, viz.: increased accommodation, and a few necessary repairs on the building.

The Mission at present yields a money stipend to the clergyman of £75 a year. This is not adequate to maintain one's family, to say nothing of keeping a horse, a necessary appendage of Missionary labor. It is true the farmers around me have very materially assisted in the way of transport to my different appointments.

The Methodists have been very friendly to me since I took up my residence here.

TERREBONNE.—This church, 5 miles from the other, supplies a very important object. Many protestants, scattered far and wide, visitors from Montreal, and occasional strangers from the States, find here an opportunity of public worship. The congregation, at best, is not more than 30 persons. They receive a weekly attendance, except when I can get no one to drive me. The holy communion is administered once a month, when I can depend upon a conveyance. Total amount raised in 1863. \$59.85½.

* MORIN AND MILLES ISLES.

REV. JOSEPH MERRICK.—Being little more than three months since this Mission came under my charge, I can only report of the work of the Mission so far as that of a beginning being made; which thanks to the Almighty Disposer of all things, promises well, and gives encouragement as to the future.

The members of the Church in the Mission have expressed repeatedly the debt of gratitude due by them to the late Missionary, the Rev. H. B. WRAY, who has done much for the Mission in the erection of two Churches, and is otherwise labouring for their best interests.

I am thankful to be able to say, that I have kept up on each Lord's Day, the services at both churches, which are nine miles apart, the roads being hard to travel over, and often dangerous. The congregations are generally large and the people thoughtful and serious.

Two Sunday schools have been organized, in which I take part myself; and during the week a Bible and Singing class is held: the attendance is very good, and it appears to be highly valued by the people.

At Morin, a site for a Parsonage house, adjoining the Church, has been given as a gift by a member of the congregation; the logs required for the walls and timbers of the roof and floors are being furnished by

the people, together with the other labouring work required in the putting up and finishing of the building. A lot of land of 100 acres, as a glebe has been purchased in the neighbourhood; half of the cost to be borne by the congregation, and the other half to be provided through, I trust, the kind assistance of the friends of the Church.

I feel great pleasure in acknowledging many acts and tokens of kindness received by me and my family from the people of the Mission: and also from christian friends in other parts of the Lord's vineyard, to whom we return our best thanks.

* ONSLOW.

REV. F. G. C. BRATHWAITE.—The Townships in this Mission suffered severely from the failure of last year's crop. Nearly all the farmers, finding their wheat either deficient in quantity, or quite unfit for eating, were obliged to buy flour for their winter and summer consumption. Not only was the wheat unfit for making flour of, but it was useless for seed. Oats and potatoes, and hay and straw were equally deficient in quantity and quality. An opportune arrangement however, of the Councils of the several Townships, prevented the want of seed, and even the want, in some cases, of food, from being so pressing and so serious as it might otherwise have been. But this year God has blessed us with

better seasons, better crops, and a more hopeful prospect of the coming year. Yet, for all these drawbacks, the contributions of the Mission are in some respects somewhat in advance this year of the contributions last year. For, if we take away the six hundred dollars against the Church, that Mr. SMITH, in his goodness, gave up last year,—(an exceptional sum, that we cannot have the pleasure and good fortune to add very often to the yearly receipts of the Mission,) we have left \$608 96, as the sum contributed last year, by persons within and without the Mission. But the sum collected this year, in the same way, amounts to \$653 75; thus exceeding last year's contributions by \$44 79. This year, also, there are a few exceptional items, which we shall not be able again to add to our yearly accounts. But yet, I trust that we shall have an equivalent to these items in yearly increasing contributions to the Church Society. This year, we are in considerable advance of last year, in the several amounts that we have sent to the Treasurer of the Church Society for particular purposes. Last year we sent him only \$5 85; now, we have sent him \$34 00, of which \$19 09 was collected by lists sent round among the people. In July last, we struck off one item from the list of our wants, by getting a bell for the Church, most of the cost of which has yet to be met. On the parsonage, there yet remains a debt of some two hundred dollars; Mr. SMITH's energy having diminished the debt to that sum. As soon as this debt can be liquidated, we shall put a stone foundation to the parsonage, build a kitchen and a stable (both of which we want very much), and, I hope, paint the buildings generally. I have taken care, this year, to count, at each service, the several congregations. I have thus been able to strike a more correct average of the numbers attending each service, than I could last year. The consequence is, that the numbers that I shall give are considerably less than last year. The several congregations are certainly smaller than last year; but yet with this gain, I hope, that the persons attending the services are either decidedly church people, or, with inclinations leaning churchwards. Of course, every now and then the congregations are quite as large as those mentioned in my last year's report, except in the case of the back settlement of Onslow, in which place I inadvertently made the number excessive by at least twenty. The total attendance for the year, at church, and at five out stations, has been 4072. This gives an average of $36\frac{1}{4}$ to the church, at every service; $39\frac{3}{8}$ to the back settlement of Onslow and Bristol; $19\frac{7}{8}$ to J. Taber's School-house; $23\frac{1}{2}$ to McLean's School-house, Eardley; $23\frac{1}{2}$ to Riopel's School-house, Bristol; and $19\frac{3}{8}$ to Rodden's School-house, Eardley. The last mentioned place is a new station, at which I commenced a service last July. It is a place 15 miles hence, which has only been accustomed to Methodist meetings. As all my Sundays are filled up, I hold a service there on every third Tuesday,

in the evening. The people attend fairly, and I trust that they will gradually come to love the Church. Of the persons confirmed in May, 1862, fifteen, out of twenty-three, have become communicants. We count 23 new communicants this year; viz: at the church, 4 men, and 2 women = 6: at the back settlement of Onslow and Bristol, 1 man, 3 women = 4: Riopel's School-house, Bristol, 3 men, 3 women, = 6: McLean's School-house, Eardley, 1 man, 4 women, = 5: J. Taber's School-house, Onslow, 2 women. There is an increased attendance at the Holy Communion, at the churches, of 7 men, 4 women, = 11; and at McLean's School-house, of 19 women, over last year: but in the other 3 congregations there is a decrease in the congregation in the back settlement of Onslow and Bristol of 16 women, while there is an increase of 9 men, reducing the decrease to 7: in the congregation at J. Taber's School-house, there is a decrease of 2 men, 1 woman, = 3: at Riopel's School-house, Bristol, a more marked and unsatisfactory decrease of 8 men, 11 women, = 19. On Christmas day we had a congregation of 70 at the church, and 12 communicants, of whom three communicated for the first time. I have to thank Mrs. D. C. McLean, Mrs. J. McLean, and Mrs. Charles Campbell, for taking charge of Sunday schools for me, in the out stations to which they belong. The Sunday school at the church is rather smaller than it was last year, owing chiefly to some of the children having left the neighborhood. Three adults have been baptized this year, viz: 1 man, and 2 women. The Baptisms altogether have been 36, i. e. 6 more than last year: marriages, 8, i. e. 3 more than last year: burials 12, the same number as last year: in all 56; or 9 more than last year. I thankfully acknowledge the kindness to me and mine of several members of my congregations during the year that is just past. The offertory at church for Diocesan Synod was \$1 06: for Church Society, on Christmas day, \$3 82: for Mission Fund of Church Society, on Thanksgiving day, \$3 29: for Widows and Orphans, \$3 07: for Clergy Superannuation Fund, \$1 08. I append a table of the money contributed for the year 1863.

REV. J. GODDEN.—It is, I hope, with a due recognition of God's mercies that I am able to report, that the work of the Church in this Mission has been carried on during the present year, almost without any inter-

ruption. Three full services have been continued, and sixteen miles travelled nearly every Sunday in the year. Services are also held in both churches on all the great festivals. Holy Communion is celebrated monthly in both churches. The attendance at the services is good, and the order and responses churchlike. The Society will be glad to learn further, that although the masses round us still go to a melancholy extent, each one his own way, yet our faithful few are manifesting an increasing interest in the work of the Church among themselves, and also in its Mission work in the Diocese at large. The annual meeting of our Branch of the Diocesan Missionary Society was well attended, and I am happy to report an increase in the amount raised for Missionary work (\$38 66) (\$38 66 being this year sent to the Parent Society) thanks to our active lady collectors and to the zeal of Mr. PARKER, the Secretary, and we hope to increase it still more next year. Fourteen children and four adults have been baptized in the Mission since my last report. During the year a Parochial school has been established in the Mission, and is doing much good. The Sabbath school in this village is kept up through the year and is effectually doing its work; during the winter months it is under the charge of Mr. L. A. PERKINS. Two new Sabbath school, were opened in the Mission last spring and continued through the summer, each in charge of Miss Faulkner, the teacher of our Parochial school and Mr. A. BARAY respectively. A Parochial library has also been started, aided by the S. P. C. K., and by S. DAWSON, Esq., Montreal, to whom our special thanks are due for his very liberal donation of 71 volumes of useful works towards the institution. The Ladies' Sewing Society in Potton has been as usual very active; they have matted the church, furnished new trimmings for the pulpit and lectern, and contributed towards the library; while their sister Society in Bolton have painted the church fence, aided in finishing the horse-shed, and paid for a melodeon from the proceeds of a pic-nic, for the success of which they are indebted to their friends in several Missions around them for the kind interest which they manifested in their work. The spacious horse shed at Bolton church, which is an indispensable appendage, is being finished, and, as I observed last year, so now, chiefly through the exertions and liberality of Mr. J. McMANNIS. I name these things that the Society may see we are making some progress, and not depending altogether upon our "rich uncle;" and more, with God's blessing, we would have done, were it not for the removal of several of our people from this Mission, whose places I regret to say are filled by those who are entire strangers to our Zion. REV. A. O. TAYLOR, reports :—Mr. Henshaw furnishes the Missionary with house and fuel. The collection on Thanksgiving day amounted to \$6 00.

*ST. LUKE'S, MONTREAL.

REV. JOHN IRWIN.—On account of the peculiar circumstances of this Church and the absence of the incumbent for some months in Britain, no collections have been made for the purposes of the Church Society, except that on Thanksgiving day. The Congregation have, during the summer, been energetically pushing on the work of completing and enlarging the Church, which is expected to be reopened for Divine service on Sunday 24th of January, 1864. The services have, meanwhile, been regularly performed in the basement, and thanks are justly due to the different Clergymen who gave their assistance during the absence of the Incumbent, while collecting Funds in England and Ireland. It is hoped that the English-speaking population of the Quebec Suburbs will largely avail themselves of the increased accommodation thus provided, and the Church be thus rendered self-supporting. The total amount collected for this work, up to the present, is \$2567 73, of which some \$586 00 were contributed by friends "at home." The expenditure, however, has exceeded \$3000, leaving the Congregation indebted to their Treasurer. More will be required for the completion of the building, and it is hoped that the friends of the Church of England in Canada will aid this struggling Congregation in their laudable enterprise. The collections for the poor have been necessarily small.

The Incumbent of St. Luke's Church has likewise charge of the Protestant Worship at the Montreal Jail. His report in this behalf cannot differ to any considerable degree from that rendered last year. There has been the same attention at the Services, and, he regrets to add, the same trifling results from his weekly visits among the prisoners. There have been frequent cases of *apparent* reformation; but they have been seldom lasting. This is partly owing to the generally crowded state of the Jail, and the consequent difficulty, notwithstanding the constant care of the Jailer and his assistant, to isolate the less criminal inmates from their more guilty companions. There is an urgent demand for reform in this direction. The prison ought, by all means, to be enlarged.

*WEST BROME AND BROME WOODS.

REV. T. W. FYLES.—I cannot tell of any considerable amount raised in West Brome and Brome Woods for the Church Society : many of the people in the Mission are poor, few of them are Churchmen, and I have been resident amongst them for three months only ; still I have some things of a pleasing nature to report.

My reception in the woods was kind in the extreme : teams were sent to the Railway station for the conveyance of my furniture ; and in welcome to me a public supper was provided, to which sixty of my neighbors sat down.

I have made the School District No. 8 my head quarters. It is in the heart of the woods, but it is central also as regards the whole Mission, and it has natural advantages which will ensure the growth in prosperity of its inhabitants.

Soon after my arrival, the following resolution, betokening the friendly disposition of my neighbours, was passed at a public meeting :

Moved by Mr. J. BENHAM, seconded by Mr. W. MOFFATT, and carried unanimously :

"That this meeting, being deeply sensible of the obligations the Mission of West Brome and Brome Woods is under to the Rev. Canon Bancroft, D.D., and the congregation of Trinity Church, Montreal ; and also to the Rev. R. Lindsay, M.A., and the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Knowlton, doth hereby commission the Rev. T. W. Fyles to express its gratitude to those gentlemen, and those congregations, for the interest manifested by them in the spiritual well-being of the inhabitants of this part of the Township of Brome."

An acre and a-half of land has been made over to us by Mr. Joseph Benham. It is the best site in the district for a church. Hiram Foster, Esq., has promised us \$100, and C. Dunkin, Esq., M.P.P., \$25, towards the cost of the building. G. B. Baker, Esq., has given us an order for 5,000 feet of hemlock lumber, and Mr. Hastings one for \$45 worth ; and the inhabitants, with hardly an exception, have come forward, offering liberally logs, personal labor, and team-work. During the severe weather we lately had, a company of our men worked in the woods, felling trees, and hewing out the frame of the Church. In this work I had the pleasure of assisting. So severe was the cold that the feet of two of our men were frozen.

From Christian friends in Montreal I have received many valuable presents—from Mr. and Mrs. Falkiner, communion plate ; Mr. Lindley, lectern ; Miss Rogers, chairs for chancel ; Mrs. Gibb and Miss O'Connor, altar cloth ; Mrs. Gibb, set of book markers ; congregation of St. John the Evangelist, \$22 20 ; J. Nelson, Esq., plans for church ; Miss Ridge and friends, \$20 43 ; Miss Barlow and friends, \$13 ; Rev. E. Wood, M.A., and Wardens of St. John the Evangelist's, reading desk. I collected also

in Montreal enough money to purchase a good lending library, and other things necessary to the immediate working of the Mission. I am still in want of \$500 to pay for the completion of the church, the erection of sheds, and the fencing in of the burial ground.

ABBOTSFORD AND ROUGEMONT.

REV. F. ROBINSON—Reports that the ordinary contributions for Church purposes in his charge, this year, do not fall short of last year's return; while the special subscription to the Endowment Fund gives additional evidence of a most gratifying nature, that our people are not unwilling to make great exertions to sustain the cause of Christ and his Church. The unusually large amount, for this Mission, (exceeding twenty-one dollars) collected at the Thanksgiving services, also indicates that we have amongst us those who esteem it a duty to "honour the Lord with their substance," and to thankfully acknowledge that it is He who causeth the earth to yield her increase.

Two years ago we attempted to create a partial endowment, and some of our people were then willing to contribute "after their power," and even "beyond their power," or at least beyond what worldly prudence would suggest; but it appears that God's time was not yet come, for the effort failed.

This year, encouraged by the liberality of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and further stimulated by the Christian example of the Rev. THOMAS JOHNSON, the late Incumbent of this Mission, who gave *one thousand dollars* to the fund, our people have given willingly and largely, according to their means, and set an example worthy of imitation in many a more wealthy and populous community. The heartiness with which the contributions have been made is of more immediate value in a spiritual point of view than the sum raised, shewing as it does that God has been with us, "making his people *willing* in the day of his power," and preparing them to receive those blessings which He has promised to pour out upon those who honour Him.

At Rougemont the church has been painted both outside and inside, and this without incurring any debt.

BEDFORD, MILTON AND SOUTH ROXTON.

THE REV. G. SLACK has only recently assumed the charge of this Mission, and not being yet resident, cannot report as fully or satisfactorily as he could wish to do.

Considerable repairs have been made to the Parsonage house, which had never been finished in the upper part. A subscription of \$100.00 from NELSON ADAMS, Esq., which had been promised on a former occasion, but which, owing to peculiar circumstances, had remained unpaid, was applied to this purpose, Mr. Adams adding to it about \$40. Upwards of \$75.00 in money, materials and labor, has been contributed by the parishioners for the building a stable. On Thanksgiving day the amount of \$4.00—offertory collection—was transmitted to the Treasurer for Missionary purposes. It was reported by the late incumbent that \$8.00 each had been contributed to the Missionary Fund and Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

MILTON AND SOUTH ROXTON.

THE REV. G. SLACK, who has labored for twenty years in this Mission has the painful task of reporting that, with the close of his incumbency, Milton will cease to be the station of a resident Minister, the congregation being too small to justify the continuance of the privilege which it has enjoyed for the last thirteen years of the ministry. The church and every thing connected with it is in perfect repair. The offertory collection from Easter to Christmas, amounting to \$12.00 has been paid over to the Treasurer as the contribution of this congregation to the Missionary Fund. The collection for general purposes amounted to \$3.50 from the two congregations—that for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund \$2.25. On Thanksgiving day, \$4.00 were collected. The total sum from Milton will amount therefore to \$10.87½, and from South Roxton \$23.50 for Missionary and \$4.02½ for Church Society. Total \$45.90

We have taken part with Trinity church, Montreal, in opening the new Mission, Brome Woods, for which this Mission has agreed to subscribe \$200 per an. to the funds of the Church Society. The new Mission commenced the 1st of October, 1863.

We held our annual Missionary Meeting for the Propagation Society.

From the amount subscribed to the Mission \$100 is applied to the Endowment Fund, and \$50 for expenses of assistant minister to out stations.

There is a large extent of country around us without Sunday schools and the ministrations of religion on the Lord's Day. We hope that by increased interest in your Society's work more missions may be established.

The amount collected for all purposes in the Mission during the past year was \$1153 80.

BUCKINGHAM.

REV. W. MORRIS writes—That nothing particular, beyond the usual routine of ministerial duty, has occurred in his mission during the past year.

At his out-stations the times for Divine service have been so arranged as to be easily remembered by the people, and large congregations (but still of a very mixed character) have been found in attendance; and he feels thankful to Almighty God, who has enabled him, during the past year, to fulfil all his appointments.

The amount promised by the congregation at Buckingham in aid of the clergyman's salary has been nearly paid, and the sums collected in aid of the funds of the Church Society are as follows:

CHAMBLY.

REV. HENRY JAMES PETRY writes:—Entered upon the duties of this Parish on Palm Sunday. Found the congregation had somewhat fallen off, in consequence of there not having been a resident clergyman for many months. It is gratifying to be able to state a considerable improvement in the regularity of the attendance, and in the number of communicants. The Parish embraces about seventy Protestant families scattered over a distance of twelve miles. Of these the Wesleyan body claims a slight sprinkling, while the rest comprise the Church of England mem-

bers, to whom alone, of course, my visits and ministrations are confined. An awakening and intelligent interest in church matters is exhibiting itself by many practical proofs. It must be remembered that this Mission is entirely self-supporting. Though the pressure, as yet, does not fall evenly upon all, in proportion to their means, yet the cheerful alacrity manifested by those who do more than their fair share, is gradually stirring up some who have hitherto been too cautious, or indisposed to put their shoulders to the wheel. The Parish is making endeavours to form an Endowment Fund. A few of our leading people met together this month, and made up a sum of \$2000, by which they hope to secure the bonus, \$400, offered by the S. P. G. District collectors have also been busy in obtaining aid towards this object from the parishioners generally, and, with few exceptions, have met with encouraging success. A Sewing Society has been organized, and promises to be a source of assistance to the fund. The subscriptions to the Church Society are at present suspended, as all the collections are applied to local purposes, the current expenses of the Church, the Rector's salary, the claims of the fund, and improvements, in many particulars in prospect, absorb our energies, and severely tax the pecuniary resources of the Parish.

A daily morning service was held through the summer at half-past seven, and the festivals observed by full service, with appropriate lectures. These services are suspended during the winter months. The Sunday school is attended by all the available scholars belonging to the Church, numbering about thirty. An agency for the sale of the Society's Prayer Books, Bibles, &c., having been established in the village, the parishioners and others can supply themselves with books at a cheap rate.

BRETHOUR.—I am sorry to have to state that little has been done in this Mission towards the general objects of the Society, more particularly as I know that we are under many obligations to this and other Dioceses for assistance in our difficulties. This I am quite satisfied is not forgotten by my parishioners; nor is it from any unwillingness on their part to contribute that the Church Society has not been aided, Our local demands are numerous, yet I am sure the members of the Church might do more to assist a Society which has been such a liberal benefactor towards them, and the good of which is felt all over the Diocese. The civil war in the United States has seriously affected my congregation, together with a succession of bad crops. Let us hope that the present year will tell a different tale.

GORE.

REV. J. GRIFFIN.—With thankfulness to Almighty God I am happy to record that there are encouraging tokens of deeper spiritual life in my congregations than heretofore; especially in some of our young people, an increasing seriousness and love for that "holiness without which no man shall see the Lord."

But it is matter of sorrow to me that my health has not permitted me to preach the glad tidings of salvation either so often or in as distant places as formerly, and yet I am gratified to find that the congregations of the Parish Church are as large as usual, that my gracious Master still allows me to do the work in His vineyard, even in the imperfect manner in which it has been performed; and that I have not been compelled to close the church more than one Sunday during the year.

Our Report of the year just closed shows, I am sorry to say, a falling off in our annual subscriptions. Because of the failure of the crops the last preceding year, and although the present harvest is abundant, the people can afford to do nothing for the Society; at least for another

year; they require all their surplus produce to liquidate the debts contracted during the year of failure. Even enough has not been raised within the Mission to free the West Gore Church of debt, contracted in its erection. There still remains £5 unpaid.

In consequence of the land of the Gore being so very bad, ("the poor we have always with us,") the produce of these worn out hills and rocky fields, barely support the farmer and his family. They have been so hard pushed for money that several whole families have been compelled to part with their old homes in the Gore, for the far west, or some other new settlement; also, many of our young enterprising men, who are eager to make better their condition elsewhere, have left their homes here; consequently, from these causes, during the past year our population has considerably decreased.

The Missionary acknowledges, with gratitude and thankfulness, a very handsome present of a light waggon for his use, from I. J. GIBB, Esq., long a supporter of the Church, and the Missionary's friend.

HUNTINGDON (WITH HINCHINBROOKE.)

REV. F. BURT.—Glancing over the past twelvemonth I can report progress, though, as heretofore, in a small degree;—the former obstacles still existing,—a widely scattered people, a general lack of public-spirit- edness, and the voluntary system, without any adequate glebe need- ed by every country minister. Yet the choice of Churchwardens has been again most happy. The proceedings of our village Easter vestry were varied by an unusual and pleasing incident. The members, for themselves and others, unanimously presented me with a copy of Holy Writ, accompanied by an address. The people of the Gore, Hinchinbrooke, with Mr. Pickover, a warden of St. Paul's, (together with a few of the village congregation) furnished me with a set of new wheels for my buggy; the former set through lightness of build and much use, having given out. As a new phase in our church matters also, I may mention a successful soiree brought about by the indefatigable exertions of many of our members in each of the Townships under my charge. I must name Messrs. Jas. Hyde, C. Blachford, John Donnelly, E. McClean, D. Hopper, and S. Pickover, with their wives; for their zeal was the life of the affair. By the proceeds we paid off nearly all the debt owing so long on the small glebe; a balance on the fence account; and acquired a small extra stove for St. John's. In the same church, I may state, that my eld- est daughter presides at the harmonium, and so our services are assim- ulated (to the best of our ability) to well conducted churches, for we have chants in the proper places, and of course hymnic music, to the praise of God, and to the satisfaction of many grateful ones who are not backward in expressing thanks. Our communicants' list shews an increase; and the village Sunday school keeps up. I take a class, and

ST. STEPHEN'S CHURCH.

REV. J. ELLEGOOD reports:—The reason that the amount subscribed to the Church Society is not more this year, is that unusual demands have been made upon the Christian liberality of the Members of the Congregation of St. Stephen's Church since our last return was sent in. They have not only been called upon to assist in putting St. Stephen's Church in a thorough state of repair, but to subscribe largely towards the erection of the Church of St. James the Apostle. Now that St. Stephen's has been so completely renovated, and all the necessary Church furniture provided, it may be reasonably hoped, that a largely increased measure of Missionary effort will be manifested by this Congregation for the future.

The amount as shown by return does not include the contributions to the Church of St. James the Apostle.

Both the Day and Sunday Schools at Point St. Charles are flourishing, and it is hoped and believed that their combined instrumentality is carrying on a work of a great usefulness among the population where they are situated. A Wednesday evening Service has been commenced in this District which has been well attended.

TRINITY CHURCH.

REV. CANON BANCROFT has great pleasure in again reporting an increase in the total amount contributed to the Diocesan Church Society, although, in consequence of absence by reason of domestic affliction, one of the sermons was inadvertently omitted. This he hopes will be rectified by a proportionate advance the present year.

At the earnest request of the Rev. R. LINDSAY, and the inhabitants of West Brome and Brome Woods, Eastern Townships, with the concurrence of the BISHOP and the CENTRAL BOARD, the young men of Trinity Church have undertaken to raise \$300 per annum for three years towards the establishment of a Mission in those localities. The Rev. Mr. FYLES was appointed Missionary in September last, and the promptness with which the effort has been made and the success which has attended it, call for an expression of gratitude to the Great Head of the Church.

A Day school has been established in connection with Trinity Church, which has been largely attended. A considerable sum of money was collected by C. WALKER, Esq., to whose indefatigable exertions the Committee and Congregation are mainly indebted for the success of the enterprise.

The Congregation and Sunday school having still further increased, it has been found necessary to make arrangements for the erection of a new edifice. A site has been purchased, and the building will, D. V., be commenced immediately. Every department of the Church is in efficient working order, and the Incumbent desires to record his gratitude, first, to GOD; and secondly, to a devoted and affectionate people, whom He has inclined to second him in every work and labour of love, and upon whom, he prays, every spiritual blessing may descend.

SABREVOIS.

REV. B. P. LEWIS.—The subscriptions for the Church Society are not so large this year ; yet the Society will be pleased to learn that the members of our Church are contributing to the Gospel cause more largely in another way than in years past, by subscribing to the maintenance of the Church in Sabrevois ; part of the means hitherto used for this object, may now be applied to other work in the Diocese. I forward two subscription lists to be inserted in the annual report. Some of the same names occur in two other lists ; but I merely give the amounts contributed, viz. \$55 00 for church shed, and \$5 00 for a new church in the Diocese of Ontario, for the Rev. Mr. Whitmarsh.

It is only since last Easter that Sunday collections have been made in our church. The expenses of the church were paid out of the annual subscriptions to the Church Society. The collections are now sufficient to meet current expenses : have amounted this year, counting from Easter, to \$11 42.

SOREL.

REV. WM. ANDERSON.—The Protestant population resident in the town of Sorel has, within the last few years, through death and removals, been considerably diminished. The total number of communicants now amounts to 99.—The attendance last Easter was 60, and on Christmas day 45. The Baptisms for the year were 19, Burials 12, Marriages 3. The financial statement appended to this report is again, on the whole, of a satisfactory character, exhibiting, in the aggregate, a considerable increase on the total amount reported for the previous year. The appeal to the congregation, repeated again this year for the third time, in behalf of the Foreign Missions of the S. P. G., was promptly responded to, by the really munificent contribution of \$110 50, transmitted through the Bishop, to the Parent Society in England, in aid of their mission to the heathen in the East. The largest portion of this amount is the gift of one ever generous donor—but He who “sat over against the Treasury, and beheld them casting in their gifts,” has also seen many another donor, “giving of their penury” and “doing what they could.” The duty of thus giving to distant Foreign Missions, whilst Home Missions are in urgent need, may be questioned by some ;—and the expediency of deferring all such appeals, in behalf of the heathen, at least for a few years, and till a Parish is brought into self-supporting condition, may be urged by others. But if charity begins at home, it should certainly never end there. And with many millions of our fellow-creatures, ignorant of that only name whereby they can be saved, and all these millions our brethren for whom Christ died, and to “every creature” of whom He commands his Gospel to be preached, we should

certainly look, not every man on his own things only, but every man on the things of others also." The Macedonian cry, from these myriads, who are "perishing from lack of knowledge," is urgent;—the command of the Saviour with regard to them, is plain, positive and immediate, And so far as a short three years' experience has tested the mere expediency of such an appeal in the case of poor and dependent missions such as those in Canada, the result has shewn that one of the surest methods of eliciting enlarged support for Christian Home purposes, is to encourage a Missionary spirit among our people for their perishing fellow-creatures abroad. Not one object of the Church Society has in those three years been neglected, or failed of receiving adequate support. Not one Parochial appeal has been refused, or languished in its resources. The effort to create a local endowment has kept pace with that of other Missions;—whilst, with diminishing numbers, the last year's financial aggregate exhibits a considerable increase on the contributions of former years. The total amount contributed from sermons and subscriptions to the Church Society amounts this year to \$128 84. And from the same sources of supply, the Sabrevois Mission has also received, as will be seen in the return, a considerable increase on the assistance of the previous year. A deep and growing interest is felt in this most important Mission, which, it is hoped, will yet prove a great blessing to many in the land. The Endowment Fund has been increased during the year to the extent of \$400, from the payment of the instalments due, on their respective subscriptions, from Miss Cuthbert and Mrs. E. A. Clarke, and of one of his notes for \$200, from W. H. A. Davies, Esq., whose munificent benefaction to the church was mentioned in the last report. Three other notes, bearing interest, of £50 each, from the same generous donor, remain in the Treasurer's hands, and will, it is hoped, shortly be discharged. An interesting Sunday school celebration, the first of its kind in Sorel, was held in September last, when 108 Sunday school scholars, and 13 teachers, assembled together at the Parish church, and after suitable introductory religious services, proceeded to a beautifully selected spot in the neighbourhood, and spent together a most joyous and happy day. The numbers were increased by the presence, in addition to the parish church, S. S., of two small branch Sunday schools, one of them consisting of a few children previously neglected, in the outskirts of the town, and collected together, and taught for many months past, with great assiduity and faithfulness, by Miss Emma Hunt; and the other consisting of a small school, zealously conducted by Mr. James Allen, at one of the concessions, distant a few miles from Sorel. At this little hamlet, which now numbers upwards of 50 Protestant souls, situated in the very heart of the French country, one of the students of the Sabrevois Institute laboured as a Scripture and lay reader with great ac-

ceptance for a few weeks during the past summer. And the hope is prayerfully entertained, that from this small beginning a door of entrance may shortly be opened to a field of largely extended usefulness. Among the local items of church interest deserving of passing notice, is the recent erection of a very chaste and beautiful memorial window of stained glass, in the chancel of the church, the centre compartment of which is put up by Doctor Von Iffland, Superintendent of the Quarantine Station at Grosse Isle, in commemoration of an only and beloved daughter of 22 summers, who died a few months since, and whose remains were conveyed to Sorel, her native place, for interment; and two side lights of the window were erected by T. H. Dunn, Esq., of Quebec, in similar commemoration of two young daughters, deceased nearly together, a few years since, and also interred at Sorel. The work was executed by Mr. Spence, of Montreal, reflecting much credit on his taste and skill, and is certainly a great ornament to the church.

In concluding this summary of parochial work for the year, we would thank God and take courage, most of all desiring, that by every work Christ may be magnified in this Parish, and that not only the temporal interests of the Church may prosper, but far more that a "spiritual house may be built up" of holy and consistent worshippers, "offering up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God by Jesus Christ," bearing like their material edifice and deserving the name of CHRIST'S CHURCH.

SOUTH STUKELY.

REV. C. P. ABBOTT.—The affairs of the Church in my Mission have been upon the whole encouraging. The people of South Stukely have erected a neat and substantial boarded fence around the major part of the Glebe, and have also engaged a workman to build a somewhat extra fence in front of the Church during the ensuing spring; for this latter purpose only \$9 are required in addition to what has already been subscribed to defray the cost. I intend to use every means within my

power to get a Parsonage built during this year. For the last three years I have been extremely inconvenienced as regards house accommodation, and even now I have not the entire use of a house ; but to enter into details upon a subject of this nature would, I think, hardly be in keeping with a Church report, and therefore I will refrain from making any further remarks upon it, except to state that every person comprising my congregation in South Stukely is fully aware that my need of a Parsonage can scarcely be greater than it is at present. The remaining debt on the Church has been the sole cause that has deterred me from urging them to take this step before. My hope however is that there will be sufficient hearty co-operation amongst them to diminish to a considerable extent the debt, and also to subscribe as liberally as their circumstances will allow towards the erection of a suitable Parsonage. There are other things of a local kind which I should rejoice to see effected, such as the erection of a horse shed, and a bell purchased for the Church ; but the outlay for the latter will not be necessary until either the tower is heightened, or a spire built ; however, objects such as these are of comparative minor importance to those already mentioned ; and experience proves that these have much to do in securing a regular and punctual attendance of the members of the Church upon its services.

Believing as I do, that my people, in common with myself, would like to see all the objects I have specified in this report accomplished, I trust that the time is not far distant when I shall have the pleasure of communicating this satisfactory state of things to the Church Society : in the mean time it is for me and them to seek God's blessing upon all our endeavours to promote either directly or indirectly the cause of Christ's Church.

This Evening Service demanded an outlay for lamps, &c., which has been cheerfully met by the people. Our Christmas services were rendered additionally pleasing from the persevering exertions of quite a number of the elder and younger members of the congregation, which resulted in a most becoming decoration of our House of Prayer—and we had the gratifying sight of between fifty and sixty communicants on Christmas day. The Christmas eve service was also enhanced in interest by the catechising and other exercises of the Sunday school scholars connected therewith. The Christmas tree for the children was (most unexpected to the recipients) made the means of presenting very appropriate Christmas offerings from the Sunday school teachers to the Rector and Curate. The latter would here place upon record many other marks of Christian love and respect which have been conferred upon him.

St. ARMAND WEST (PHILLIPSBURG AND PIGEON HILL.)

REV. H. MONTGOMERY.—Among the many causes of devout gratitude and thanksgiving by which we are surrounded, none claim more special recognition than the continuous fulfilment of that most encouraging promise of Christ to his ambassadors, "Lo I am with you alway, even

unto the end of the world." This we have seen graciously verified, not only in increased numbers that have attended the public worship of God during the summer, and in a growing demand for our Prayer Books, by which we are convinced that the excellences of our beautiful and scriptural Liturgy are becoming still more generally known and appreciated; but also in a gradual increase in the number of our communicants, and the success which has attended our efforts to increase the value, convenience and eligibility of our church property in this village. Here our church was inconveniently hemmed in on three sides, which being brought under the notice of the Hon. Judge Aldis, of St. Albans, who owned an adjoining lot, and with true churchmanlike generosity sold it to us for the nominal sum of fifty dollars, American currency, which secures to us an open view to the west, and guards us against any incumbrance being ever placed between us and the street, leading to the south. Of this and other favours, the Judge and Mrs. Aldis may rest assured we shall ever cherish a grateful sense of indebtedness. Wm. Morgan, Esq., of this village, and Mrs. Morgan, members of the Wesleyan body, have also with great Christian liberality let us have a piece of ground in the rear of our church, which they valued at one hundred dollars, on which to erect carriage sheds for the accommodation of those who live at a distance, and have accepted in lieu thereof a pew in the church. This likewise deserve grateful mention and remembrance. The contract for the erection of the sheds and fence has been given to Captain Krans, who is to have the work completed by the middle of next May. Nothing therefore is now lacking but a lot on the east side of the church, to render the site one of the most picturesque and eligible in this part of the Diocese. We have also replaced the old fence on the west and north sides of the Parsonage lot by a new and substantial one; while the Ladies' Association is almost prepared to pay the last instalment to Mr. Bourne of St. Johns on our sweet-toned little organ. At Pigeon Hill, the Ladies' Association also continues to work with unabated energy and efficacy. They have recently placed in the chancel of their neat little church, two beautiful chairs, obtained through Mr. J. C. Spence of Montreal, which add much towards the completeness of the internal arrangements still under consideration. They are also preparing for a bazaar and soiree to aid in liquidation of the debt yet due to the Church Building Committee.

I regret however to say, that our Parish, extending, as it does, eight miles along the frontier of the United States, in the markets of which the principal part of trade is carried on, our finances have become greatly deranged in consequence of the depreciation of the American currency. This not only makes money scarce and hard to be obtained; but the deduction of the discount subjects the general income of the Parish to great diminution, and the clergy to much loss and inconve-

nience on account of the greatly increased prices now required to be paid for every article of produce and merchandise bought with that money. That this trial of our faith should be borne with becoming Christian resignation, and earnest prayer to Almighty God, that the unnatural and ever to be deprecated effusion of blood may soon be stayed, and peace and prosperity restored to that greatly distracted and desolated country, there can be no doubt. Still we are not unaware that much more might easily be done both towards the support of the ministry and the increase of our church funds generally, were the hearts of our leading laymen divinely influenced to take that interest in the temporalities of the Church which the Divine glory and their own solemn responsibilities demand they should. Then would the institution of our holy religion be supported, in some degree, at least, commensurate with the daily increasing population, wealth, and importance of this highly privileged and prospered Province.

ST. JOHN'S.

THE REV. H. F. DARNELL—Has again abundant cause to thank the great Head of the Church for the measure both of temporal and spiritual prosperity granted to this Parish during the past year. The same steady and devout attendance upon the services of the Sanctuary has been observable on the part of the congregation; and the same unanimity and interest on the part of the Church officers, and those who, in various ways, are engaged in the work of the Church. During the summer the Rector, with the concurrence of the Vestry, visited England, partly on account of his health, and partly for the purpose of soliciting aid to discharge the debt upon the High School in this Parish. Not being successful to anything like the required amount, it was, finally determined that an attempt should be made to raise the sum needed (\$1600) in the Parish allowing the payment to extend over the space of five years from Jan. 1864. This plan has been pursued with considerable success; nearly \$1400 has been already subscribed, and there is every probability that in a little while the whole sum will be covered; and thus the church in this locality will be freed from an incubus which has now for many years well nigh paralyzed its energies. Owing to this drain upon our resources the contributions to the Church Society will, it is feared, for the next year or two fall somewhat short of the sum formerly sent in. The deficiency, it will be seen, arises from no lack of interest or appreciation as regards the work of the Society, but from a pressing local necessity.

The Rector, with the assistance of Mr. A. C. NESBITT, (of whose diligence and attention he cannot speak too highly,) has provided L'Academie with a service every Sabbath, except when the roads were impassable, and it is believed that this addition to the means of grace in that district will tend to stimulate the people to fresh efforts on behalf of the Church. I append a detailed account of sums raised for Church purposes during the year:

WATERLOO AND FROST VILLAGE.

REV. D. LINDSAY.—In forwarding our report we have to express our thanks to Almighty God for the success which he has vouchsafed to our labours during the past year. The collection for the Church Society is not so good as I could wish, more especially as we have evident proof of its great usefulness in the grant made to the Rev. G. Robinson. Without this grant, the Missionary work which has been done in connexion with this Parish must have been left, or, at least, most imperfectly done. We have raised \$200 to meet the Church Society's grant to him; and perhaps this may account for our not sending a larger sum. I think that we should give for the distant places above and beyond what we do for ourselves. I do my best to commend the Church Society to the confidence and support of our people, and hope to see them take a leading part in its affairs, for upon it depends the missionary work of the Church. In Fulford—the station for which your grant is more especially made—we are doing, I think, a good work. We have Sunday services and a Sunday school, and the people have contributed nobly of their means towards the erection of a church. They have been helped, as the Report will show, by their fellow churchmen in the neighbourhood, and to whom we still look for more assistance. I am sure, could the subscribers to your Society see what has been done at Fulford, and the six other stations which your grant has enabled us to attend, they would regard it as the true successor to that Venerable Society whose aid is now being gradually withdrawn, and to which our parish has been indebted for upwards of forty years. Boscobel in Ely has obtained the services of Mr. Fortin; as this is more especially the work of the Sabrevois Mission, the report will be made to them. In the

Parish proper the Endowment Fund has been deeded to the Lord Bishop, namely, Mrs. Robinson \$1000; Jonathan Robinson \$500; Luke Robinson \$500; R. A. Ellis \$500; Hon. A. B. Foster \$1500. The interest has been duly paid with one exception, and which will, I think, be arranged with the occupiers of the land in a few weeks. The congregations and communicants at St. Luke's have largely increased. We have adopted the weekly offering, and made the seats free. The result has been much blessed. We are a missionary church, and the fewer obstacles we have in the way the better, and having to pay for a pew is an obstacle which persons trained to attend church do not comprehend. At Christ Church we pursue the same plan with equal advantage. The result of the year is to deeply impress the conviction that, with a little effort, this parish might become self-supporting, and allow the amount which I receive from the Clergy Reserves to be applied for a place more destitute than we are. I hope in some way to bring this about. And I think our people are beginning to have the same conviction, which I pray God will prosper. The following are the sums raised:

WEST FARNHAM.

REV. T. W. MUSSEN.—In preparing a report of our work of the past year, I find much which affords matter of deep thankfulness to Almighty God, who hath stirred up the heart of the people of this Mission, to be liberal in contributing of their means and their labour in the Church's service. A Clergyman's hands are wonderfully sustained, when those to whom he ministers exhibit an interest in his labors, and are found by his side, ready to help, when work has to be done. In March last our bell became cracked. For a time, I had little hope of replacing it. A meeting of the vestry was, however, called, and a determination was soon manifested to procure a superior and larger bell. We have now a fine-toned bell, weighing 700 lbs, procured from the foundry of Jones & Co., Troy, N.Y., at a cost of over \$300. It is true that a large portion of this amount remains yet to be paid; but GEO. WHITFIELD, Esq., who very kindly advanced the money necessary, has given us such easy terms of payment, that I have no doubt the whole cost will be paid without difficulty.

Through the exertions of the people of the village, the Church has been repainted, Wm. DONAHUE, Esq., contributing nearly all the paint requisite. To the people of the country parts of the Mission, under the direction of Messrs. J. MOSHER and G. SNAPE, I am indebted for the erection of a new and comfortable shed in the rear of the Parsonage.

GEO. WHITFIELD, Esq., has with great liberality erected a fence around the Burial Ground and along the front of the Church property. This fence is in length nearly 1000 feet, and in height 6½ feet. The lower part is closely boarded, but the upper part, being of open work, prevents any heaviness of appearance, and supplies sufficient ornament.

To Mrs. WHITFIELD, Mrs. RIPLEY, Miss ELDER, and other ladies, the thanks of our congregation are due, for the tasteful manner in which our Church was decorated with evergreens, and the place of the Lord's Sanctuary beautified for the celebration of the joyous festival of Christmas.

WEST SHEFFORD MISSIONS.

REVD. A. T. WHITTEN.—The people of this Mission have had so many calls upon their liberality, for local purposes, and amongst these the building of a Parsonage House and the support of their Minister, that they have not been able to contribute anything towards the funds of the Church Society this year. The hardness of the times, and the almost total absence of current money, are additional reasons for not making greater efforts to raise subscriptions for the Society. It is, however, hoped, that with the Blessing of God, another year's Report may shew a different state of things.

There has been collected, for the years 1863-4, \$1,500, for the building of a parsonage, and the purchase of a small Glebe. Widows, &c. \$1. Missionary purposes \$1. Up to this date \$100 has been raised for the Clergyman's support this year.

RAWDON.

Rev. C. ROLLIT.—Of the amount collected for local purposes, \$187 20 is paid up. Pew rents, \$22 80. Contributions in Produce for the support of the Missionary, the remaining 60 being for the purchase of two stoves and current expenses for the maintenance of Divine Service.

Week-day Services, for which I have six stations, each served once a fortnight, are very well attended; the state of the roads both in summer and winter occasionally prevent our assembly, but not often; and there is reason for thankfulness that they have not been wholly in vain.

EDUCATION.

Extract from Report of Colonial and Continental School Society.

NORMAL SCHOOLS.—74 students have been admitted to the Normal School, all of whom in their turn pass through the Model Schools of the Colonial Church and School Society.

MODEL SCHOOLS.—The following is a summary of the numbers in these schools: Boys, 183. Girls, 140. Infants, 110. Total 433.

COUNTRY SCHOOLS.—The number now in operation in the Diocese of Montreal is 21, with about 900 scholars. Income, \$7790. Expenditure \$7786.

MISSION BOARD.

The following report was presented from the Committee appointed to prepare regulations for the guidance of the MISSION BOARD, and adopted by the Church Society at its Annual Meeting, January 20, 1864:

1. That in order to make better provision for advancing Missionary work in this Diocese, and for the better general apportionment of the funds at the disposal of the Church, in any existing Missions still requiring assistance, it is hereby resolved that a Mission Board be now appointed by this Society.

2. That such Mission Board shall consist of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, as President, the Treasurer and Secretary of the Society, the four Rural Deans for the time being, and one Layman, being a member of this Corporation, to be nominated at a Ruri-decanal Meeting held in each Deanery, and to be reported to the Secretary before the Annual Meeting of the Society in January; and also of four Clergymen and four Laymen, being also members of this Corporation, to be appointed at the said Annual Meeting of the Society, one of whom shall go out of office annually, and not be eligible for re-election until after an interval of one year. Seven shall form a quorum, provided that there shall be always three clerical and three lay members present.

3. That the duties of the Board shall be to receive and consider all applications for aid towards opening any new Missions, filling up vacancies, or providing for any alteration in the circumstances of any existing ones;

4. That no applications shall be entertained by the Board, except on recommendation of a Report received through the Rural Dean, from a Ruri-decanal Meeting of the Deanery in which the place requiring assistance is situated ; such Report to state what portion of the Clergyman's salary ought to be borne by the Congregation.

5. That the Board, in receiving such Reports, and having considered the comparative claims and necessities of the different parts of the Diocese, and also the funds at the disposal of the Church, whether arising from the income of this Society or any surplus from the Clergy Reserve Trust Fund, or any unappropriated portion of the grant from the S. P. G. shall recommend to the Bishop what appropriation of the same it is thought expedient to make.

6. That the Board shall have authority to make rules and regulations for the transaction of its business, provided that none of them be contrary to the By-laws of this Society.

7. That the Board shall report their proceedings to the Central Board of this Society at its quarterly meetings, for their confirmation ; and also prepare for the Society a general statement, to be laid before the annual meeting, of all its work during the year, and of the condition and prospects of all Missions receiving aid from the several funds mentioned above.

Moved by Rev. W. B. BOND, seconded by Hon. J. McCORD :

"That in consequence of a Resolution that all its available funds shall be applied to the payment of the salaries of Missionaries, the duties of the Lay Committee are almost entirely superseded ; and therefore it is unnecessary to re-appoint that Committee, but any portion of the duties specified in the By-law, defining the duties of the Lay Committee which may still require attention, shall, whenever occasion arise, be discharged by the Mission Board now constituted.

That in order to enable the Mission Board to receive its full organization without delay, the four Lay members to be nominated by the Rural Deaneries shall, for this year, be nominated by the four Rural Deans respectively, and notified by them to the Secretary ; and that the Bishop be also requested to name the four Clerical and four Lay members of the Board for this year, one of each of whom, to be chosen by lot, shall go out of office at the annual meeting in January, 1865 ; when the regular election by the Society of one Clerical and one Lay member, to supply the place of those retiring, will then commence."

We have now brought our statement for the past year to a close, and on a review of the whole of the proceedings, though the amount contributed for the Mission-work of the Society cannot be deemed commensurate with the ability of the Diocese, or corresponding with its great necessities, yet must it be considered encouraging. But not until the members of our Church better comprehend their *positive obligation* to devote a portion of their substance to the cause of the Gospel and the support of the Church, shall we be found faithful stewards thereof to God, making His service the *first* consideration in all our calculations, giving according to our ability; for if there were a more faithful compliance with the Scriptural precept "Honour the Lord with thy substance, and with the first fruits of all thine increase," then might men more confidently hope that the gracious promise thereto annexed would to them be more fully realized,— "so shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses burst out with new wine."

There is one subject which calls forth our devout thankfulness, since an earnest desire in many Missions has been evinced to make some permanent provision, by means of an endowment, for the future welfare of the Church. And it is highly important that some voluntary provision should in this way be made for the temporal wants of the Canadian Church, especially as the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, which has so nobly commenced and continued in this country "the good work" which its title imports, now reasonably expects to be gradually relieved from the heavy burden which she has faithfully borne during so many years. And this endowment must come entirely from voluntary contributions; for, thrown now almost entirely upon her own resources, the Church in Canada has to depend solely on her principles for spiritual strength and on the free-will offerings of her children for temporal support, in the great work in which she is engaged. The time has confessedly arrived when an earnest and continuous effort should be made in each Mission towards endeavouring to secure a sufficient endowment for its own maintenance; and this should engage the anxious attention of all who value their church, and would perpetuate its blessings. In every settled parish or mission in which a church is erected, and the necessary appurte-

nances are provided, it is strongly recommended that a commencement (if not hitherto attempted) should at once be made towards the endowment of that church, by placing annually a small sum at interest, taken from pew-rents, or derived from special contributions, with a view to the production of an accumulating fund, which, in the course of years, would realize a moderate provision for the Clergyman.

And were the subject fully explained, and the prospective benefits to the Church made known to those of our people who are owners of land, that by the gift of a portion of land, of but little present value, they may be perpetuating the ministrations of the Church, and laying up in store blessings for generations to come, they would not surely withhold the gift. May God, by His Spirit, put it into the hearts of many to do so !

That bequests are so seldom made to the Church, by those to whose stewardship has been committed the riches of this world, is a matter of surprise and concern. The obligations which the Church, and a Missionary Society like this, in connection therewith, has upon her members, should not be forgotten by them in their final disposal of their worldly goods. When it is recollected that the large bequests made to the two Venerable Societies in England,—the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge,—constitute, to some extent, a measure of their settled wealth and means of usefulness; we would urge upon all to emulate, in this particular, the deeds of our fellow churchmen in our Fatherland. And let us ask, to what actions of our life shall we look back with more pleasure, when we shall be entering the vale of death, than to “good deeds done for the House of our God, and for the offices thereof?”

The work, then, set before the Society—the extension and consolidation of the Church in our land—is one which may well call into action the energy and zeal of all the members of the Church; a work worthy of the greatest self-sacrifice; a work, which may be aided by the smallest gift, and furthered by the humblest prayer. May all Churchmen mark well the claims it has upon them.

Both men and means are wanted at the present time, for “the harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few.” As Churchmen,

we ought to rise to the work, as the wants of the Church increase, enlarging the measure of our missionary contributions thereto, and praying the Lord of the harvest to send forth more labourers into His harvest. May the Spirit from on high be poured out upon our Church and land! then shall we not be barren or unfruitful in the work of the Lord. May He smile upon the labours of this Society, then shall we see an abundant increase.
