That the latter contingency will arise and the scheme at the last minute fall thru does not seem in the least probable; in fact, yesterday's meeting of the county fathers, the first to deal specifically with the big question, looks decidedly favorable to the carrying out of the whole scheme.

About 4 o'clock yesterday they got down to hard-pan, and the committee, composed of Messrs. Gardhouse, Nigh, Cameron Ahnis, W. H. Pugsley, Skelton, Harris, Coulson and Teft—every municipality being represented—wrestled long and seriously with the matter. At the conclusion, while no great progress had been encountered, and it looks like fair sailing.

Frank Barber, the county engineer, has prepared a blue-print showing in detail every foot of the proposed rought in the opinion of Reeve Coulson of Stouffville it stops just where it ought to begin. Offered \$100,000 to New York Journal of Commerce, But Was Turned Down.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.-Revelation of several attempts to buy the edi-torial support of The New York subsidy legislation, which the paper has consistently opposed, was made to the house ship subsidy investigation committee to-day by Alfred W. Dodsworth, business manager of The Journal of Commerce and Commercial

Bulletin Mr. Dodsworth testified that about six years ago an unknown man came into his office and offered to pay The Journal of Commerce \$100,000, taking 1,000,000 copies of his paper for the insertion of an article in one issue, supporting the ship subsidy legislation. This man refused to disclose his identity unless his proposition was to be accepted. Mr. Dodsworth said he immediately called his brother, John W., into his office as a witness to the conversation, and the proposition was turned down as an attempt to make an

improper arrangement.

Pressed by the committee, Mr. Dodsworth said that about thirty years ago his father was sitting in his office, the same publication, and John Roach, the shipbuilder, who was then active for a ship subsidy bill, entered the office, laid down a blank cheque, asked Dodsworth, sr., to fill out the cheque and stop writing against ship subsidy. The offer was refused,


