# Call Hurry-Up Unionist Caucus; Temperance Bill Causing Split I.W.W. AGITATION

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—The political pot, which has been simmering quietly enough for some days past, is tonight bubbling furiously. A hurry-up call has been sent out for a Unionist caucus tomorrow morning. Many of the members were notified by the whips, in person, after the adjournment of the house this effernous.

The common talk is that the caucus has been called to deal with the temperance legislation yesterday presented to the house by the government. It is known that a number of Ontario Conservative members waited upon the minister of justice shortly before the house assembled this afternoon and vigorously protested against going on with his legislation. They represented that the legislation went much further than was agreed upon at the Unionist caucus in the early days of the session, and they also insisted that to proceed with the bills would be to seriously imperil the chances of the Hearst government in the coming provincial election. One of the members stopped Hon. N. W. Rowell on his way to the house shortly before three o'clock, and something like a warm dispute ensued.

The government will also lay before the caucus its railway legislation. This will deal principally with the acquisition by the government of the Grank Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific lines and will probably be endorsed by the caucus without division.

The Liberals had their caucus this morning and were given the outline of the government's railway policy by their leader, Judge D. D. McKenzie. While no official statement was given out, it is understood that the Liberals will oppose the granting of any blanket authority to the government to take over the Grand Trunk lines, either at a price to be agreed on between the government and the company or to be fixed by arbitration. They plan to force the government to pass the bill under the closure rule, and it is hoped that some pro-corporation Conservative senators may join with the Liberals in the upper chamber in holding up the bill. No good reason has been given for the Liberals taking this stand, but it was said tonight by two or three of their number that a big railway deal was usually the harbinger of a general election, and they did not propose to take any chances.



# NO DIFFICULTY IN **GETTING CHARTER**

United Veterans' League Get Legal Firm to Draw Up Application.

Will the United Veterans' League experience any difficulty in securing a charter because of their constitution being almost identical with that under which the Grand Army of Canada operate?

W. E. Roebuck, of the legal firm of Crooks, Roebuck & Parkinson, who is in charge of the work of securing a charter for the U.V.L., is of the opinion that they will have no difficulty whatever in this respect, and stated to The World yesterday that he would be very much surprised if they did not get a cordial reception at the hands of the government when making their ap-

While admitting that the constitu-tion of the U.V.L. was "very close" to that of the Grand Army of Canada, Mr. Roebuck stated that this would not in-terfere with the question of securing a charter, as the constitution of the G.A.C. was not protected by a copy-right, and also, that the latter assoc.a-tion was assisting the H.V.L. in many right, and also, that the latter assoc.a-tion was assisting the U.V.L. in many respects. Mr. Roebuck continued that there was no law which could prevent an association from adopting a similar constitution to that of an existing as-sociation, providing that they did not take the name of the existing associa-tion. Mr. Roebuck added that the two constitutions were "slightly different" constitutions were "slightly different," and stated that among the "minor differences" was the clause prohibiting any government official from holding an executive position in the association, whereas the G.A.C. permit a government official to enjoy this privilege, providing he does not receive a salary

bove \$2000 per year. The World's statement of yesterday morning concerning this matter made reference to the principal points al-ready adopted by the U.V.L. at a meet-ing in Massey Hall and not to those lesser points, which were referred to

another meeting to be voted on.

Flynn's Statement.

In reference to this published statement, J. H. Flynn stated to The World yesterday that it would be impossible for the G.A.C. to state that the two constitutions were identical, when the U.V.L. had not completed the drawing up of their constitution. Mr. Flynn said: "As far as our own constitution is drawn up I have avoided what I consider serious defects in the constitution of the G.A.C. For example, according to the constitution of the Vetterans' League no members receiving-any salary from the government can be appointed an official of the U.V.L. In the second place, all officials of the U.V.L. are appointed to office and re-moved from office by the membership body and not by the executive. In the third place, the amounts of the asses-

ents differ materially.
"The work of obtaining a charter is in the hands of W. E. Roebuck, of Crooks, Roebuck & Parkinson, who assures us that there will be no diffi-culty, in receiving the charter immediately. I will not enter negotiations for amalgamation with any organization until such matter is decided by the membership body of the U.V.L."



Objects to G.W.V.A. Executive Plans Presented to Committee.
