THE NEWS AT ROME.

In the Chamber of Deputies to-day the Marquis Viscount Vencosti, Minister of Foreign Affairs, confirmed the reports received from Zanzibar of the murder of the Italian Consul, the captain and a number of other officers of the Italian warships Volturno and Staffetta, and the wounding of a hundred or more other Italians by Somalis at Magadoxo. The men had tallen into an ambush and were caught without warning. The Government, the Minister said, would take energetic measures to punish the Somalis who were guilty of the outrage.

THE HAMBURG STRIKE.

The Mayor's Veto Vote Does Not Suit At Bremen the Trouble is Over-Hamburg-Bremen, Dec. 3.—The strikers to-day adopted an agreement concluded with the warehouse company and a committee of the strikers for the settlement of the dispute, and the striker

Hamburg, Dec. 3.—The Employers' Association has written a long letter to Senator Hachman justifying their refusal to arbitrate on the ground that the strikers are falling to receive foreign aid and are becoming weaker, while the work at the port is being performed by foreign dockers who are continually arriving and are glad to work for the wages offered. A patched-up compromise would only lead to further disputes, "for," they said, "it is not a fight about wages, but is for supremacy." Finally, they object to an Arbitration Court comprising one representative of the employers and four representatives of the strikers.

London, Dec. 3.—The leaders of the London dock laborers declare they have received telegrams from Hamburg informing them that a large majority of the English non-union laborers who went to Hamburg to take the place of strikers are refusing to unload vessels and are returning to England. The London Dockmen's Union is subscribing one shilling a week per man for the support of the Hamburg strikers.

A National Testimonial to be Given to Ambasador Eayard at Christmas.

London, Dec. 3.—The Daily Telegraph announces its intention of opening a public subscription for the purpose of presenting Mr. Bayard, the United States Ambassador, with a national Christmas gift as a token of respect and good will on the part of the English people, in view of his approaching departure from the country. The Telegraph will head the list with a donation of £100, and will welcome the smallest contributions. The paper suggests that rare and unique editions of the works of Chaucer and Shakespeare, of which it has already secured command, be procured as a suitable gift to Mr. Bayard.

STOCK MARKETS STRONG. That Did Not Weaken wall-Street to Any Considerable Fxtest.

New York, Dec. 3.—The Evening Post's financial article says: All things considered, the stock markets showed a good deal of strength to-day. London sold at the opening, St. Paul particularly being quoted on the early forenoon market a full half point below the New York parity. But there was little local weakness. The London selling had its basis, doubtless on the St. Paul's gross returns for the fourth week and the full month of November. The decrease for the week from 1895 was not perhaps as heavy as had been anticipated, but it was hardly a cheerful showing. For the month the St. Paul's earnings were \$678,167 short of 1895, the Rock Island's \$198,138. The October gross returns of the same companies decreased respectively only \$371,752 and \$88,839 from the previous year. But there has been no good reason since the farm communities adopted the not unreasonable policy of holding back their wheat, to expect any more favorable comparison. Anyone who observes the weekly receipts of grain nowadays and compares the figures with the receipts last month or with 1895 will understand the November granger statements. The local operators, however, were not disposed to follow London's selling. The market was extremely dull, but in the majority of stocks it was strong all day.
