**THE IMPERIAL DEFENCE.**

Duke of Devonshire Says it is Progressing.

**A MASSACRE OF ITALIANS.**

Consul Cechi and Fourteen of His Officers Killed in Somaliland.

**Attacked from Ambush and Slain After a Fierce Fight—Cardinals Received Their Red Hats From the Pope—Great Britain Will Pay the Expenses of the Dongola Expedition—Hamburg Strikers Decide Arbitration—General News By Cable.**

London, Dec. 3.—The Duke of Devonshire, in a speech before the British Empire League to-day, said that the idea of imperial unity was progressing in some of the colonies as in the movement, though though in some degree disappointed in the past, was now being revived.

The Duke of Devonshire, in the course of his remarks, said that the Colonial Defence Committee, consisting of representatives of the War Office and the Admiralty, had desired him to make public to colonial citizens the plans consisted of the maintenance of Great Britain's supremacy at sea upon the basis of a system of imperial defence against attack from sea at all places likely to be attacked. This committee, he added, would advocate the creation of adequate fixed defences and troops sufficient to cope with any possible enemy.

The Duke of Devonshire said that the merchants of London might suggest the means of establishing a Home Government and the colonies. Through the agency of the Home Government, the annual fee to shareholders has been done away with, also shareholders at a nominal charge of 7s a share. A limited number of such annual members will be written.

Mr. Charles Tupper spoke of the profound interest in the work and aims of the league, and referring to the statement of the Duke of Devonshire that it was the duty of the colonies to provide for the adequate defence, Mr. Charles Tupper said that no people in the world were readier than the Canadians to contribute to the defence of the empire.

**FOURTEEN ITALIANS KILLED.**

King Humbert's Consul and a Number of Officers Ambushed by Somalis.

Rome, Dec. 3.—Advices from Zanzibar tell of the massacre of Signor Cechi, the Italian Consul, and his fourteen officers with him at Magadodo, Somaliland. It is stated that fourteen Italian soldiers were killed, and the consul and his officers were killed. The caravan was attacked during the night by the Somalis. The latter were repulsed at first, but rallied later, and continuing attacked the retreating caravan. The Italians and their escorts of Askaris sought desperately, but were eventually overpowered.
