First Lord of the Treasury Talks to His Constituents.

ANGLO-SAXON UNITY IDEA. Has a Strong Hold Apparently of the Government Leader.

The Good Feeling Now Subsisting Between Britain and the United States is, He Believes, So Firm That Nothing in Ordinary Politics Can Upset It—That Kind of Sentiment is Stronger Than a Formal Alliance — It Will Be a Guarantee of Peace and a Benefit to the Whole Human Race.

London, Jan. 30.—The Right Hon. Arthur James Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury and Leader of the Ministerials in the House of Commons, delivered his annual address this evening to his constituents at Manchester.

"But there is surely one great country which, by community of language, religion, blood, origin and even institutions, is well fitted to understand. I need say that the country to which I refer is the United States."

"The only danger lies in the Basque Provinces; even there the people would not fight unless they were well paid. No doubt the pretender might succeed if he could win over the army, but there is no sign that the army is so inclined. I have been authorized and requested to deny that the idea was never entertained that King Alfonso would abdicate in favor of Don Carlos."

Cyriae Are Always Wrong. "According to my observations," said Mr. Balfour, "the world of cyriae is always wrong. I believe the cyriae wrong in this case. If our good relations really depended upon those tortuous circumstances, which after bitter months of communitarianism, they could not be the foundation of what is indubitably the most important species of friendship which, in season and out of season, through good report or ill, is not to be shaken by any event."

A Little Looking Backward. "It was in this hall in 1898, that I first spoke of the international relations between the United States and England—in those dark days of the Venezuelan controversy, when public feeling in America had been aroused by the intently unfounded suspicion that we had some designs of empire in South America."

An Irish Representative Wanted. It has always been felt by the wire-pullers at Ottawa that the representative of Irish Catholic element has been most unsatisfactory, and that it would have to be straitened before a general election.

Has Blair Succeeded? It is stated here that Hon. Mr. Blair took Mr. Costigan's conversion in hand as soon as he entered the Government, and that he has succeeded so well that the ex-Minister of Inland Revenue is expected to accept a portfolio on the eve of the general election, upon which Mr. Blair has been granted by the Government to the Catholic minority of Manitoba.

Are More Concessions Coming? 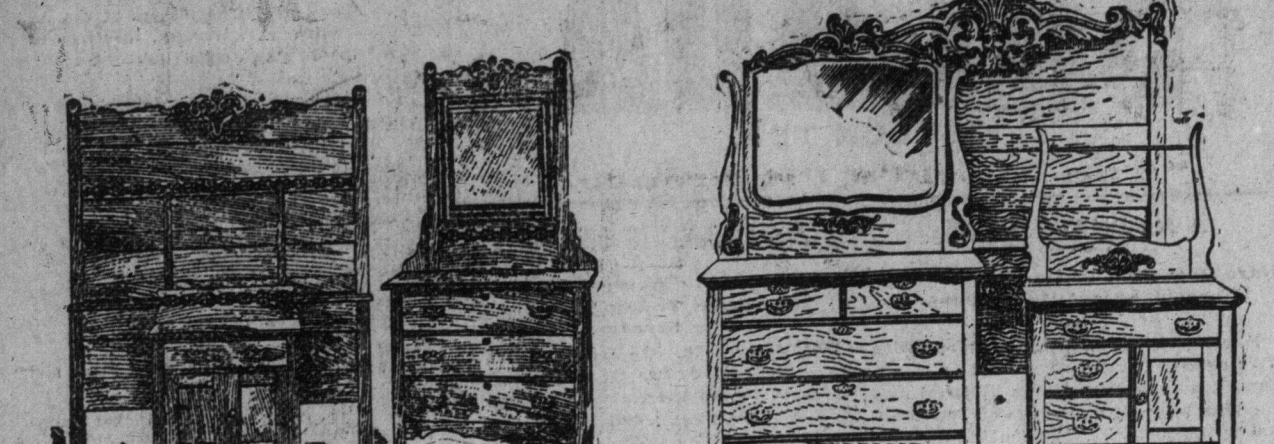

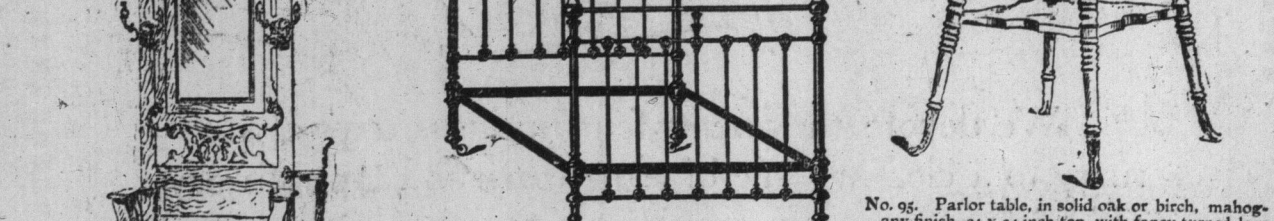

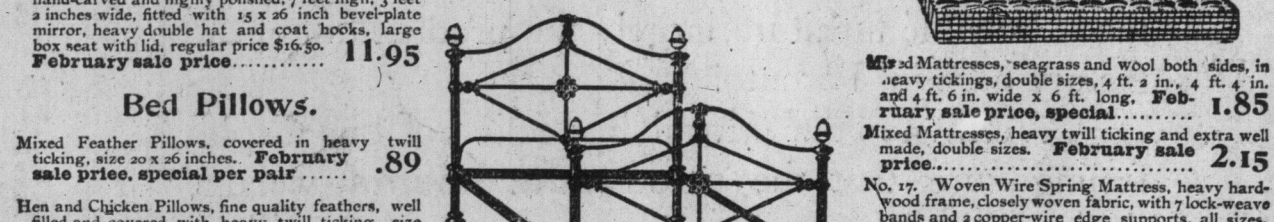

THE COUNCIL AND THE RADIAL RAILWAY. The most important matter the Council will have to decide, in connection with the entrance into the city of the suburban railways, is the conditions on which freight may be handled within the city limits.

The Toronto Railway Co. if it enfranchised another company to lay down tracks, for freight purposes only, on the streets not appropriated by the Toronto Railway Company. Furthermore, we do not believe it would be a violation of the agreement if the Legislature chartered a company to convey passengers from any point outside the city limits, say Markham, into the centre of the city, say St. Lawrence market.

Another point which the Radial Railway Committee ought to investigate thoroughly is that of the space to be reserved in the new market for the accommodation of trolley freight cars, the loading, unloading and storage of produce, etc. We believe the committee cannot err on the side of liberality in the allotment of space for the trolley cars.

When the Toronto Street Railway was converted from horse to electric traction a great mistake was made in not altering the gauge to the standard steam railway width. The standard gauge is 4 ft. 8 1/2 in.

These are among the points that ought to receive the immediate consideration of the Radial Committee. There must be no delay in the construction of the new market, but it cannot be proceeded with until this question of providing accommodation for the electric has been determined.

AN OPPORTUNITY FOR TORONTO.
