man met death. Several persons who had known he woman in life declared that she had told them she had been married to Porter Charlton, the son of an American naval officer. Charlton is described as being 23 years old. The woman apparently was about 35 years old.

called that recently a young couple had occupied a villa on the shore of the lake. Three days ago they lisappeared. The woman spoke English. Her companion attempted French.

The police believe the death of this woman is in some way connected with the mystery surrounding the finding last April of the body of Miss Esteila Naples, where it had been washed in from the bay.

Known in New York. NEW YORK, June 10 .- Mary Scott Castle startled New York on August 3 last by shooting Wm. B. Craig, a New York lawyer, as he stood in "Peacock Alley" at the Waldorf Astoria. But her revolver was small, the bullet was deflected by a fountain pen in Craig s pocket, and he was uninjured.

Mrs. Castle, between sobs said that she had not meant to kill Craig, but that he had done her a great wrong. Craig said the woman was in love with him and had pursued him. He is m urried and lives in New York. Mrs. Castle was released under \$3000 ball, furnished by her brother, Captain

Proposed Merger of Wire and Nail Mills Has Caused Big Corporation to Become a Competitor, President Plummer Says.

HALIFAX, N.S., June 10.—(Special.)

J. H. Plummer, president of the Dominion Steel and Coal Company, and General Manager Butler were entertained at luncheon by the Board of Trade this afternoon. The gathering included representatives of the finan-cial, industrial and commercial life of

Mr. Plummer announced that a company had been organized, under the auspices of the corporation, to erect plants for the manufacture of wire, wire nails and other finished wire products. The Steel Company's policy, hitherto, in this regard has been to confine its business to the manufacture of wire rods for the supply of wire and nail mills thruout Canada, and this policy would have been maintained if the business had remained, as at present, in the hands of a number of independent concerns. The proposed merger of the larger wire and nail mills had forced the corporation to move in the proposed direction for the protection of its own interest, and of the interests of its customers, who do not go into the merger. It will also serve the public interest by making a monopoly impossible.

Location in Doubt..

The location of the new mills has not been definitely settled. A plant located within the steel works at Sydney would have distinct advantages in the way of cheaper production, but some disadvantages in regard to distribution, and it may be found best to build near the points where the reducts go into consumption.
The president said that the steel orporation now employs about 12,-90 men, and that these men earn on

he average better wages than do any ther class of men in the Dominion. The output in value of the product of the works was \$116,000,000 annually and half of this went back into the

When he left Teronto recently, the Steel and Coal companies were, in effect, one, for a majority of the shares of the old companies had been exchanged for stock in the new, giving the Canadian Steel Corporation a pre-

dominant voice.

Speaking of the prospects of the company, he said that, while much had been done, a great deal remained to be accomplished and would be to be accomplished and would be achieved. New furnaces were being built, and yet the demand for steel from the Dominion keeps ahead of their capacity. A new finishing mill was also being built.

GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY

"Highest Man Up" to Be Convicted For Participating in Vast Underweighing Frauds.

NEW YORK, June 10 .- Charles R. Heike, the white-haired secretary of the American Sugar Refining Company, was convicted to-night on one count of an indictment, charging conspiracy to defraud the government of customs duties on sugar.

Ernest Gerbracht, former superintendent of the Williamsburg Refinery, was convicted on all six counts. For James F. Bendernagel, former cashier of the refinery, the jury stood 7 to 5 for acquittal. He will be tried again.
This ends the government's sec

attempt to imprison the group of men responsible for the vast underweighing frauds, to which the so-called trust has virtually confessed by the restitution of more than \$2,000,000 in duty. Heike is the highest official of the company upon whom blame has been

He faces a possible sentence of two years in the federal penitentiary, and a fine of \$1000. He is 65 years old and broken in health and spirit. Convicted on all six counts, Gerbracht can be sentenced to twelve years in prison, with a maximum fine of \$40,000. He is 64 years old.

According to the city officials the proposed subway under the viaduct at Yonge-street cannot be carried west so as to leave Cottingham-street open because of the tracks crossing the street on an angle.







As to churches, that 67 per cent. of the total number took action in the matter, and in about 80 per cent. of these, or one-half of the whole, the majority of the votes cast was in favor of union.

As' to membership, that the membership of the voting churches is 73 per cent. of the whole, and that while a little less than half of the mem-bership of these churches expressed any opinion, 78 per cent. of all the votes cast were in favor of union.

While the above represents the actual votes cast, it must also be reported that the returns were in all cut about a dozen instances accompanied by various criticisms and suggestions. In almost every case, emphasis was laid on the desire for a shorter and simpler creed. Some par-ticularized special elements in the creed that were more or less objectionable. Others objected to any sort of a creed as a basis of union, and others agree to the ministers' special relation to the creed as ambiguous

As to polity, the greatness of the proposed union and the vast variety of interests involved make the necessary organization too complicated for some to understand, too much ma-chinery some say. 




