## CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT.

EASTER, 1888.

*To the Vestry and Congregation of St. James' Cathedral:*

The past year has been marked by the virtual conclusion of two very important matters affecting the financial prospects of this Church.

First. The litigation over the so called Rectory lands.

Second. The re-settling of the ground rents of the property which, happily, still remains to the Church.

The favourable results in the one case make the Vestry financially independent of the less satisfactory result in the other.

The application for leave to appeal to Her Majesty's Privy Council, which was pending at the time of the last meeting of this Vestry, was an application in the name and on behalf of the Vestry. It therefore presented on its face the preliminary question already more than once argued:—Had the Vestry a *prima facie* right and interest to intervene in the suit on their own behalf?

This point the Privy Council after consideration, virtually decided in favour of the Vestry, by calling upon the counsel for the respondents to show cause against our application. Proceeding to the main question: Did the case seem to involve novel and doubtful questions of law sufficient to warrant Her Majesty in re-opening a decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, the Privy Council, after hearing argument from both sides, came to an adverse conclusion.

Their judgment refers to the apparent unanimity of the Judges in Canada as the circumstance which led the Privy Council to decide against the leave to appeal. It was our misfortune that the eminent Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, from whom an opinion had proceeded in support of our position, was not among the Judges who took part in the final hearing by the Supreme Court. His judgment in our favour had been delivered on the occasion of giving the leave to appeal to that court; and not being delivered in writing and officially reported, it unfortunately could not be brought to the attention of the Privy Council.

A note of the terms of this judgment of Mr. Justice Strong was laid before the members of this congregation shortly after its delivery. The opinion of a Judge of such high authority, who moreover had been especially acquainted with the facts affecting the legal status of our lands, will always justify the action of this Vestry in the matter. For our fuller justification, we may be content to wait for the time

when the consequences of the wholesale establishment of endowed incumbencies in this city shall have made themselves apparent. If those consequences prove to be what the history of our Church in England and in this country must lead us to expect, it will be a consolation to this Vestry to remember that it struggled to the very utmost of its power to prevent that consummation.

All the costs occasioned by the appeals authorized since your present Churchwardens have been in office have been paid. To a large extent they were provided by a special fund subscribed in advance for that purpose by leading members of the congregation.

Among the chief contributors will be found the names of your Finance and Consulting Committee; to whose frequent counsel and assistance throughout the responsibilities entailed by this tedious and anxious law suit, the Churchwardens once more gratefully desire to express their indebtedness.

The original liabilities for costs incurred at the first trial, and which fell as a legacy to your present Churchwardens, will be met out of the increased income from our Park lots within the present and the following year.

We turn to a more cheerful subject—those other lands unquestionably belonging to this Vestry known as the Park lots. Hitherto the income from this property has been about \$800 per annum. The process of renewing the ground rents which has been going on for two years past has involved protracted and troublesome negotiations with the tenants of over sixty different tenements. By the terms of their expiring leases the tenants were legally entitled only to renew for a single term of twenty-one years without any title to compensation for their improvement at the end of the term. Your Churchwardens, pursuing the policy submitted to the Vestry two years ago, have constantly endeavoured to induce the tenants to accept leases more encouraging to the proper improvement of the property. We found it impossible to make any progress until an arbitration had been had with a principal tenant. Since obtaining that one award, a large number of settlements have already been effected on the different streets. The values upon which these renewals are being made practically assure nearly \$6,000 rental from the whole property.

Your Churchwardens recommend that advantage be taken of this settled income to make arrangements with an Investment Corporation to assume the debt of the Church at a low rate of interest, applying the rents to interest and principal until both have been fully paid. Offers have been made to take the debentures representing the debt at five per cent. interest. This interest, and a sinking fund sufficient to pay off the principal in the course of twenty years, will be produced by the rents. By adopting this plan, at the end of that period our Church will stand wholly freed from debt, and will be from that time in the possession of an income for its perpetual support from unincumbered lands *under the control of the Vestry*.

The Church will thus be preparing against what may perhaps be its ultimate destiny, to become a church chiefly for strangers and the poor.

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The existing congregation in the meantime will experience relief to the extent to which the voluntary revenue has hitherto been called on for payment of the interest of the debt, that is to the amount of about \$4,000.

We are now free to take up other important questions. A hearty extension of the envelope system may be hoped for to provide for filling the place which has been so long vacant, of Assistant Minister.

Another object, which appears to us to be of even more urgent importance, is the formation of a fund and the consideration of plans for the immediate repair and for the permanent improvement of the church building. In view of the great advantages that have been handed down to us, something more will be expected of us than merely necessary repairs and ordinary renovation. We believe it will be generally felt that the time has come for carrying forward another stage the work of completing and beautifying the Church. The edifice, already containing so many precious memorials, ought to be rendered more nearly fire proof. The substitution of stone for wood in some parts of the interior will serve in this direction and will tend to fulfil the dignity of the original design. A still more important effect would be produced by the removal of the great mass of wood-work in the east and west galleries. The space lost can be in a great measure compensated by re-seating the floor.

There is everything to encourage us to take up the work in a generous spirit.

The future of the Church seems to be now assured; it stands in no danger of sale and demolition. On the contrary, we may look forward to its becoming a venerable and venerated landmark in the heart of this city. Its destruction, an event at one time so busily threatened, would have been a calamity to be regretted not by this congregation alone. The sentiment of veneration in this new community has few objects to help its cultivation. With the fall of this Church and the building up of the site, something would have been lost to the people of this city that could never have been replaced. Beyond those dear associations it has for many of us, St. James's Church as an institution has historic associations with the past. Not many, perhaps, are aware that on this spot the predecessors of the Mayors of the City of Toronto used to be elected by the predecessors of the present Vestry. During the early part of this century, under the constitution which then obtained, the Town wardens of the Town of York joined to their civil office that of Churchwardens of this Church. In a small faded volume in our vault, the minutes of the first election (in 1807) to the joint office are preserved; thus constituting an official record of the Town of York, as well as of the proceedings of this Vestry.

The founders of the city and the public men who served the Province through its first fifty years—that formative period of its history, are nearly all personally associated with this spot. General Brock probably knelt here on his way to his last campaign in defence of our independence. Governor Simcoe,—the pioneer Governor who planned our first highways,—Lord Elgin, the friend of our constitutional liberties, a long series of good and useful men—have had their seats in one or other of the buildings that have succeeded each other on this site.



The veterans of our elder school of politics and their opponents, the fathers of Responsible Government, used to meet together in peace under the roof of St. James. If Canadian gratitude should ever rise to the height of dedicating an assemblage of memorials to that generation of high minded public servants, to whom Canada owes so much,—where is there a place so peculiarly appropriate for the purposes of the Canadian Westminster Abbey as our time honoured Church of St. James? If busts of those worthy and distinguished men were placed upon its walls without much stretch of imagination, their countenances might be described as looking down in marble upon the places which they had occupied in life.

Respectfully presenting these suggestions, we recommend that the whole question of the repair and decoration of the Church and of providing ways and means therefor, be referred to the Finance Committee of the coming year.

The year just closed has been to the Afternoon School one of very great success. Our attendance has largely increased, and owing to our having an efficient staff of Teachers, the number of Scholars who have left us is comparatively small. We have during the year formed two Bible Classes, taught by Mrs. Brock and Miss Joseph, which have increased largely in numbers, and are very regular in attendance. The Infant Class is our greatest success, under the care of Miss Edith Clark, to whom for her kindness and liberality, too much praise cannot be given : it has grown to very great proportions.

By the envelope system adopted for collections we have been able to meet the running expenses of the School. Our Annual Picnic was held at Victoria Park in August, and our New Year's Tree in January, both of which were decided successes. The expense incurred by these was met by a few members of the Church, and by those who for the small sums of twenty and ten cents were allowed to accompany us to the picnic or to the New Year's Tree. We have much pleasure in reporting our success in amalgamating with the Morning School, and obtaining for the use of both schools a Library, which in point of system and equipment, will equal any in the city. We hope by this means to continue the success we have had this year.

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#### YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE CLASS.

It is mainly composed of the two Boarding Schools, Mrs. Neville's and Miss Veal's, so that the attendance is steady and unvarying. The collection amounting to \$29.61 was given to Diocesan Missions. This class is open to all in the congregation who have been confirmed or are preparing for confirmation.

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#### THE RECTOR'S BIBLE CLASS FOR TEACHERS AND OTHERS.

This Class began its meetings for the autumn, winter, and spring season on 13th) and will continue till the end of June. The subjects studied are the Sunday School Lessons. The attendance has been large, and results very gratifying. The presence of all ladies interested in Biblical study is cordially invited. The Class meets for one hour on Thursdays, at 3 p.m.

## THE INFANT CLASS.

Is still being carried on with satisfaction and success, every Sunday morning new scholars are being received and the attendance is increasing, efforts are being made, worthy of encouragement, to maintain the interest in this class and to make it a suitable institution of the Sabbath for very young children, imparting to them a love for the service of God and instruction in His holy word in an easy, childlike, and natural way, brightened with sweet strains of music adopted to suitable hymns, simple, yet heavenly, childlike, and holy.

The work done this year has been far the most part orders. We are now also doing work for an "At Home," to be given in Easter week; at which we shall have tables of fancy, and useful articles, etc.

The Young Ladies' Auxiliary will combine with us as they did last year.

### Annual Report of St. James' Parochial Missionary Association from March, 1887, to March, 1888.

Our Society has carried on its work for another year, doing the same work in the same way as before; therefore necessarily there is not much to be told about it. Monthly meetings have been held during 9 months of the year, with an average attendance of 17.

At these meetings missionary news and letters have been read. We have received letters from Mr. and Mrs. Bourne in the Blood Reserve, from Mr. Simms and Miss Brown in the Diocese of Saskatchewan, from Mr. Hornes at Lesser Slave Lake, and from several lady missionaries in India and China.

On several occasions we have been indebted to Mrs. Gamble for making interesting selections from missionary magazines, and reading them at the meetings.

During the year two bales of clothing were sent to the Rev. Geo. Hornes at Lesser Slave Lake, and a letter of thanks came telling how acceptable and useful the garments were.

A bale of clothing was also sent to Mr. Page for a Mission at Posen in the Diocese of Rupertsland. This Mission has been taken up this year in place of the one at Beaconsfield, and it is a very interesting and needy one. It is situated near Lake Manitoba. The settlers mostly belong to the Church of England, and as yet no denomination is working there.

Mr. Page, a theological student at St. John's College, Winnipeg, goes out once a month to hold services, having to walk about 30 miles of the way in the bitter cold of a Manitoba winter. He has an average attendance of from 40 to 60 people, many of them having a long distance to walk.

They have managed to put up a church, doing all the work themselves freely, and we have had the privilege of contributing towards the expense of this building.

The Rev. Mr. Brick attended one of our meetings, and gave an address about his work at Peace River. It was at his request that the box of clothing was sent to Lesser Slave Lake.

Miss Romaine, who took charge of the "Geometrical Progression Scheme," for raising money for the Mission Fund, reports that \$141 were collected by that means.

Our Society has undertaken to contribute \$25 yearly, towards the salary of Miss Brown the lady missionary at \_\_\_\_\_

The true test of our work is what we have given, and our treasurer's report shows that the Society has collected \$808.09. A sum slightly in advance of last year's subscriptions, and which, as will be seen by her report, has been sent to Algoma, Saskatchewan, Rupertland, India, beside small donations which were specially designated by the donors.

In some respects missionary work is more difficult than any other because it is not easy to keep up an interest in what we do not see. The only remedy is, to try to gather such interesting and regular reports of the work being done all over the world that month by month our interest may be renewed and increased and the distant workers become real to us. To this end we would suggest that an effort be made to get our subscribers to attend the monthly meeting, and that several of the members be invited each to take up one mission, getting all the accounts to be had of that mission, reading them herself, and giving to the members of the Society a summary of what she has read and carrying on the news of that one station from time to time as fresh recounts of its work come out.

In this way, the result of a year's work would be to make all the members of the Society, attending its meetings; well informed missionary women, who would have an intelligent interest in the work of Christ throughout the world and this would certainly react upon the subscriptions.
