There were two bands of music in addition to the St. John Pipe Band and stirring Scottish songs were rendered by a chorus of thirty male voices. 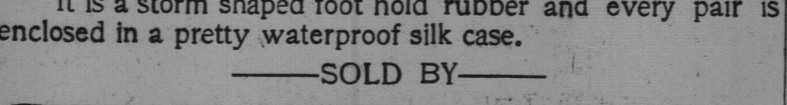

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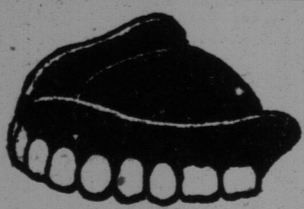
