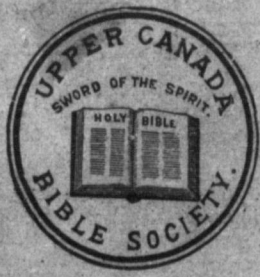

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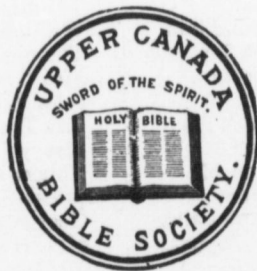

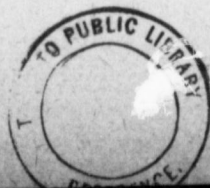

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the 3rd day of August, 1855, and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, and 18th day of November, 1887.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall at the discretion of the Directors be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs

and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alterations has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday schools the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, 18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

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RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.

II. That the Society be denominated "The _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than _____ other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operation into districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society *on sale*. Remittances on purchase account to be made from *proceeds of sales only*.

X. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the _____ day of _____, in each year, at _____, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; moneys voted, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required, and a copy forwarded to the Secretary at Toronto.

XI. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended; shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I bequeath the sum of _____ to the Upper Canada Bible Society, to be paid for the purposes of said Society, to the Treasurer for the time being thereof whose receipt shall be a good discharge for the same.

OFFICE-BEARERS OF BRANCHES

Who by faithful continuous service of 25 years and over have earned grateful recognition by the Board. The years given cover the whole period of service in whatever office.

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FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, 1893-94.

At each returning Anniversary of our Society, your Directors are more and more impressed with the magnitude and importance of the work undertaken. True, its general features are the same from year to year, the peculiar interest and enthusiasm which novelty imparts, can no longer be said to characterize the places, methods and operations of the Bible Society in general, or our Auxiliary in particular, and yet, in these successive annual records, there is much to stimulate to more activity and service, all who fully realize the value of the legacy given by God to the world in His blessed *Word*.

Sir Richard Temple, in speaking at a meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society, said :—" My view of the Bible Society is that it is a great association for publishing, issuing and circulating the Holy Scriptures among some three hundred races, speaking various languages and dialects, parts of all the branches of the human family ; " or, to put it more concisely—" The Bible Society is an association of men, women and children, for the purpose of spreading the Scriptures throughout the whole of the inhabited earth." These statements clearly set forth the object of this great undenominational organization and its auxiliaries, and faithfully, to the extent that funds and opportunity permitted, has this aim been kept in view.

Ninety years ago, at the formation of our Parent Society, Bibles were scarce, cumbrous and expensive. To-day, mainly through its influence and efforts, aided by sister societies, the Scriptures are accessible to the poorest and the humblest classes of the community. It may be asked, How has the British and Foreign Bible Society succeeded in so largely increasing the circulation of the Scriptures ? We answer : By the use of various means, by issuing Bibles in large numbers, by selling them *under cost* price, by making large grants to Missions and Schools for free distribution, by creating a demand for the Bible, through the work of *Colporteurs* and *Bible women*, by arousing interest in the *Word*, by public meetings, by issuing printed matter, and by promoting the movement from which sprang the great Bible Societies of Scotland, Ireland, Europe and America. But while the work of circulating the Scriptures has been developed, and the beneficial results have become very apparent ; *so much* remains to be done, that, were it not for the promise that—" His

Word shall accomplish that which He pleases"—the sincere lovers of the *Truth* might have cause for discouragement.

The printing presses of the British and Foreign Bible Society throw off on an average 13,000 copies of the Bible, or portions thereof, every day; and since its birth, one hundred and thirty-nine million five hundred and fifty-nine thousand (139,559,000) copies have been produced. Were these all now in existence, they could not supply a copy to *one person in ten* of the estimated population of the globe. Large as the supply is, we thus see how inadequate it is to the requirements of the human family.

Again, much is yet to be accomplished in the way of *translation* and *revision*. The *Word* is now printed in about four hundred of the most important languages of the world, 320 of which are issued by the British and Foreign Bible Society; but there are yet hundreds of languages and dialects untouched—and in a large number of the translations, *only a portion* or a *single gospel* has been attempted. Besides the necessity of *additional translations*, those already published have constant need of revision and correction.

Probably *more than a thousand Missionaries, Scholars and Natives* are engaged in the translation of the Scriptures for the Bible Society.

Why are the promoters of the Bible Society so anxious to disseminate the truth of God as found in His Word? Mr. Moody, in speaking on this subject, said that:—"The Bible is the great medicine book of the Spirit—in it you will find a cure for all ills, it has a prescription for every ailment the soul can complain of, it contains a message from God to the individual, and though there are differences in every heart chamber, this key fits every lock. It is for all ranks and conditions of man, the young, the old, the rich, the poor, the wandering, the doubting, the sorrowing, the believing, the dying, the perishing. And love and *reverence* for the *Scriptures* is the *one strong bond* which, despite divisions and differences of creed, binds together the Lord's people of all kindreds and nations and tongues."

These facts in themselves are a strong appeal for continued and increased liberality in the support of our venerable and honoured Parent Society.

OUR WORK.

It is a matter of congratulation and encouragement to our friends and supporters to know that the Upper Canada Bible Society is the strongest and most helpful *Auxiliary* of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

The Board of Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society desires to record anew its sense of God's goodness, and rejoices in the tokens of divine favour with which the year has been crowned. The work of the Society has been prosecuted as heretofore, throughout the extensive field occupied, with continued assiduity and perseverance, and, we trust, with a measure of success which cannot be tabulated by us.

The past year has been one of unusual depression and discouragement, which has been felt in all lines of business throughout Canada, and it is therefore not surprising that our cash receipts are somewhat less than those of *the previous year*. The latter,

however, showed the Society. In and it is worthy substantial adva

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however, showed the *largest amount* ever raised in any year during the existence of the Society. In many of the districts occupied, there has been *much to encourage*, and it is worthy of grateful mention, that several of our Branch Societies have made substantial advances in their contributions over previous years.

The total revenue amounts to \$36,751.52, which is the *fourth* highest on record of all previous years, and under present circumstances this is very gratifying to your Board of Directors, who believe that the apparent deficit does not indicate diminishing interest in the work of Bible circulation, and feel assured that the promised aid of the Holy Spirit will not be withheld wherever faithful work is being done for the Master.

BRANCH SOCIETIES.

The continued zeal and activity of most of the Branches, together with the increased contributions of some of them, afford profound satisfaction, at the same time they reflect commendable credit alike on the officers of the Branches, the local clergymen, and the Christian people residing in those districts.

The visitation of Branches was performed by thirty-four agents, who were Ministers representing all the evangelical denominations, duly appointed by the Committee and approved by the Board of Directors. A number of the Branches intimated their willingness to save the Society the expense of an Agent's visit; the local ministers and officers assuming the responsibility and conduct of the Annual Meetings, etc., etc.

The Board respectfully urges that the officers of Branches desiring to assist in this matter, will communicate with the Permanent Secretary at Toronto, early in the month of September, before arrangements are made, and districts assigned to Agents for visitation during the ensuing fiscal year.

With a view to revive the interest of the people in the spiritual welfare of their fellowmen, not only in Canada, but in all parts of the world, it is earnestly desired that the resident clergymen and the officers of Branches in cities, towns, villages and districts, should co-operate and set apart a day in each year—either a Sunday or a Prayer Meeting evening—and hold a union meeting of the different denominations, calling special attention to the work of the Bible Society, in disseminating the Scriptures in all languages. This plan has been adopted in several places, and has proved interesting and helpful. On application to the Permanent Secretary at Toronto, pamphlets will be promptly forwarded to any one desiring information regarding the work of the Society at home and abroad.

Several Branches which had been temporarily inactive, have been resuscitated, and we trust will be fruitful in the future. There are a few Branches, however, which are only nominal, as they do very little to aid in this great work.

Fourteen new Branches and Depositories have been organized during the year, viz:—(In Ontario)—Courtright, Hawkestone, Hepworth, Kimberley, McIntyre, Mansfield, Teviotdale, Tilbury Centre and Queensville. (In Manitoba and the North West)—Napinka, Nesbitt, McGregor, Oxbow and Lumsden.

Each of those new Depositories has been supplied with a stock of Scriptures in different languages, and in suitable bindings, payment not being required until sales are made; remittance is expected at least once a year.

We have now a total of 581 Branches and Depositories in connection and co-operation with this Society.

Your Directors desire gratefully to acknowledge the sympathy and support accorded by the Officers, Collectors and friends connected with the Branch Societies throughout our entire field, and pray for a rich blessing on each person who has in any way assisted in this great work, for the promotion of God's glory, and the advancement of His Kingdom upon earth.

SPECIAL DONATIONS OF SCRIPTURES.

During the year applications for Scriptures were granted as follows:

2 doz. Bibles for a Mission Sabbath School on Manitoulin Island; 6 German and 6 English Bibles for a Poor House; 1 Arabic and 6 English Bibles for an Italian Mission; 6 French Testaments for a Lumber Shanty; 25 Testaments for the Alexandra Industrial School; 50 Bibles for a Jewish Mission; 50 Testaments for distribution in Shanties, Hotels, Trains and Boats; 20 Bibles for a Mission Sabbath School at Nakusp, B.C.; 30 Bibles and Testaments in Cree Syllabic for the use of Indians at Thunder Child's Reserve, Saskatchewan, N.W.T.; besides numerous smaller gifts from the Depository, and the gratuities of our Colporteurs.

COLPORTAGE.

The work of Bible Colportage has been faithfully prosecuted. Nine (9) Colporteurs have been engaged for portions of the past year—five of those Colporteurs laboured in Ontario, and four in Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

Personal illness and unforeseen circumstances somewhat interrupted the work, but we believe much blessing has resulted from the visits of your Colporteurs, who have read the Scriptures in the homes of many people who seldom, if ever, attend a place of worship. Religious services have been held, Sunday Schools have been addressed, factories have been visited, and the joyful sound of *praise to God* has been raised among people who had, from carelessness, distance, or lack of desire, absented themselves from public Christian gatherings, for months previously. This refers more particularly to the sparsely settled localities in Muskoka and Parry Sound districts, and in Manitoba and the North-West. Special attention is being paid to those needy districts.

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QUEBEC AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Quebec Bible Society continues its noble work with zeal and efficiency.

Through the liberality of the Branches, the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society have been enabled, not only to continue, but to increase the amount of assistance rendered to the Quebec Society for the ensuing year.

We quote extracts from letters recently received from the Rev. Edward J. Stobo, Secretary and General Agent of the Quebec Bible Society, viz :—

"Your esteemed favour just to hand, for which, in behalf of Treasurer and Committee, I express heartfelt gratitude, and trust that the work in which we are engaged shall continue to be prospered of God, as in past years. Your liberal assistance at this season makes our way plain for another year's work on the same scale of arrangement. For the last six years our aim has been to keep our outlay strictly within our income, and to make each month carry its own debts. And we feel free to say that God has dealt with us in a most wonderful way in raising funds for the cause."

"The following resolution was moved by the Rev. D. Tait, B.D., seconded by Mr. T. B. Brodie, and carried :—We would hereby gratefully acknowledge receipt of the very sympathetic letter from the Secretary of the Upper Canada Bible Society, just read, informing us of the transmission of a cheque for two thousand dollars (\$2,000), to be devoted to the work of French Colportage, and we hope that we shall be able to prove worthy of the trust reposed in us as a Committee, and equal to the work which we are attempting in the Master's name, and in behalf of our common country."

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of our Parent Society was held in London, Eng., on the 2nd inst., and was declared by the President—The Right Hon. the Earl of Harrowby—to be one of the largest and brightest he had ever seen on a Bible Society occasion. As the full report, as then distributed, is reproduced in this issue, we simply note a few Statistics, viz :

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BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT, 1893-94.

The Society closes its ninetieth year with a Bible translated, more or less entirely, into nearly 320 languages. Almost 4,000,000 copies have, since March last, been supplied to the Churches and Missionary Societies, or circulated by the Society's own agencies. In almost all the countries of the Old World, and many of the New, colporteurs, over 600 in number, have been employed, and 400 Biblewomen have pursued their sisterly work in the Zenanas of India and the East.

I.—ASPECTS OF FINANCE.

The financial statement which the Committee have to submit for the year ending March 31, 1894, considering the adverse conditions of commerce and agriculture, they regard as satisfactory, and demanding thankfulness to God.

For the purposes of this abstract it may be briefly stated that the new income of the Society amounts to £141,228 14s. 8d., which is £3,683 13s. 9d. more than in 1893; in both cases the Special Deficit Fund being omitted. The sales of Scriptures have yielded £91,740 3s. 11d., which is less than last year by £8,093 3s. 11d. The total receipts, including £1,316 os. 7d., for the Special Deficit Fund, have thus been £234 284 19s. 4d.

The expenditure has been £222,847 12s. 7d., which is £1,890 18s. 11d. greater than in the preceding year. Deducting the total expenditure from the total receipts leaves a balance in favor of the Society of £11,437 6s. 9d.

The large deficits of some recent years have impressed upon the Committee the obligation of limiting the expenditure where it could be done without serious injury to the work. They greatly regretted the necessity for so doing, as did the Agents whose fields of labor were thereby affected. The Committee, however, desire their supporters to understand that no clear call to enlarged operations has been neglected from apprehension of failing funds. They have faith in God and in His Church to believe that where Divine Providence manifestly opens a door for the entrance of His Word the means to enter will be given.

The Committee beg the earnest attention of the Society's friends to one untoward aspect of the present financial statement. The excess of receipts over expenditure is owing to the legacies being much in advance of the average. This does not indicate a sound financial condition. The Committee would be greatly relieved if the ordinary contributions were sufficient to lessen their dependence upon this precarious source of income. Still, remembering that the Society commences the new year not only without a deficit, but with a fair balance in hand, the Committee record their sincere thanks to the donors and their deep gratitude to God, who has inclined and enabled them to give, some out of their abundance and others out of their poverty.

II.—ISSUES.

The total issues of the year ending March 31, 1894, in Bibles, Testaments, and single books or groups of books of the Scriptures amounted to 3,664,456, and the number would probably have been much nearer four millions but for

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some delayed returns. Of the whole, 1,669,588 copies were issued from London for home and abroad, and 1,994,868 from Depots abroad. In Portions only the home issues are higher than those of 1892-3; and those from abroad are scarcely less. Bearing the general depression in mind—and the reports of the year everywhere reflect it—the circulation must be considered full of encouragement.

III.—TRANSLATION AND REVISION.

The work of translation and revision has proceeded vigorously during the year with an ever-deepening and widening ratio of progress. Complete statistics for the year have not yet been received with regard to translations begun and revisions completed, but it may be safely said that more has been attempted, and more accomplished, than in any previous year.

In the East the great versions of India and China are undergoing revision in the light of advancing knowledge; and in Africa and the Isles new languages are being pressed into the Society's service, and rapid progress is being made with versions already begun. In Korea a new version has been begun, and in Java a new version is being completed. Ceaseless efforts are being made by a great army of devoted scholars to render God's thoughts in the words of all men, and larger numbers of strange peoples are daily hearing in their own tongues the wonderful works of God. As we pause to look at the achievements of the past and recent years, the words rise to our lips, "So mightily grew the Word of God and prevailed."

IV.—BIBLEWOMEN.

The returns for the Biblewomen—402 in number—who were more or less maintained by the Society's grants in the year ending September 30, 1893, are in all respects encouraging. The number of Biblewomen receiving grants has increased by thirty two. The number of native women to whom, on an average, the Scriptures were read by them, has grown to 527 a week more than before, and stands now at 22,014. Out of those who are being taught by the Biblewomen to read, no less than 1,577 native women have attained within the year the power of being able to read the Bible for themselves. The whole circulation for the year comes to 15,931 Bibles, Testaments, or detached books of Scripture, being an increase of 2,754 copies on the circulation of 1891-2. The 402 Biblewomen were geographically distributed thus:—India 291, Ceylon 69, Syria and Palestine 14, Egypt 16, China 8, Mauritius and the Seychelles 4. The reports continue to bear ample evidence of the high spiritual value of their work.

V.—OBITUARY AND NEW APPOINTMENTS.

The Society has lost during the year three of its Vice-Presidents—Lord Ebury, Sir Harry Verney, and J. D. Allcroft, Esq.; and five of its Hon. Life Governors—Rev. Dr. Swanson, Rev. R. Watts, Rev. Dr. Johnston, A. Peckover, Esq., and J. Clark, Esq. Mrs. Henry Taylor, a Lady Hon. Life Governor, has also died, and G. Gillett, Esq., of the General Committee. VI.—REVIEW OF THE FIELD.

Let us now turn to the vast world field in which the Society's work is being done, and try to see it, and to hear the voices which come to us from it, as the agents, and especially as the colporteurs, may help us to see and hear. But first let us turn to the colporteur himself.

He is everywhere—a man of the people among whom he labours—a Frenchman in France, a Slav in Russia, a Hindu in Hindustan; he is able to understand his countrymen, and the idiom which expresses the feelings of the heart. Often of high intelligence he possesses not a few popular gifts, and even when of the homeliest cast of mind there are some gifts with which he cannot dispense. He must be of infinite patience. He requires the full indwelling of that Charity which hopes and endures everything. He needs a heart quick with natural sympathy; and, being often himself a householder, the gentle bonds by which wife and children draw him homewards lead him also to enter into the sorrows of many a family he visits and compel him to drop tear for tear. Above all he must be a man of faith; he must seek strength and courage from his Divine Friend in a course of habitual prayer; his life must be hid with Christ in God.

And his daily work, like his own spirit, touches at many points the ever-varying life of man. What a life it is as we may see it through these colporteurs' eyes!—how hard often, and dark; again how kindly and how beautiful; often how troubled with sin and pain,—always how pathetic, how strangely profound. There is indeed nothing more instructive, nothing more suggestive of grave thought than the journals of these men. We open one and find its writer, somewhere in France or in Germany, in a workshop full of atheistic socialists. He offers his books, prefacing them with some friendly salute, but his only answer is to be driven with insult and often with injury into the street. He tries another band of workmen, only to meet with the same success. The day wears on in such depressing experiences; he has sold hardly anything, he has heard hardly one kindly word. "What sighs should we hear escaping from our men's breasts," writes Mr. Millard, "could we but follow them in some of their rounds!" But with a few pages the scene and the spirit change; we find the colporteur seated in some neighborly home; the house-mother, who perhaps remembers him when he was in the village before, confides to him some of her sorrows; he quotes word after word of comfort; he speaks to the children as if they were his own; he pours out his heart in prayer, while they all, kneeling beside him, respond with newly awakened tenderness; he leaves behind him, when he goes, copies of the Gospels and the Psalms. Half an hour afterwards he is on the road with a group of people round him; they have never heard of the New Testament; he reads or repeats some of its words, for his habit is to speak as much as may be in the language of the book he carries, and more than one hand is stretched out for the little Portion, sold so cheap, but containing things so pointed, so heart searching. A little further on we find him toiling up the hill-path leading to a shepherd's hut; it is a most unlikely place, but he could make little of the village below, and an impulse he cannot explain compels him to try his fortune here. He enters to find a poor invalid who welcomes him as if he were a messenger from heaven; he learns that a copy

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of the Gospel had been bought in a distant market ten years before, carried to this spot among the mountains, read with many thoughts and tears, that it became an evangel of peace, and now that he, the salesman of the Word of God, coming so unexpectedly, comes not as a stranger but as a friend. What a reward for all the day's disappointments, and how naturally, as he goes back down the hillside into the valley, does he, like John Bunyan's pilgrim, set out on his way again "singing." Let us think of incidents like these, but endlessly varied, filling up day by day, season by season, the history of the colporteur's year. In truth, the long record of Christian work can show few worthier illustrations of the trials which test men's faith in God, of the obstacles which keep the mind perpetually alert, and, it must be added, of the faithfulness which makes every form of service noble. "These are English books!" said a French postman last year, while his face darkened at the thought of foreign interference; that was the obstacle which suddenly barred the colporteur's way. "But do not you faithfully deliver English letters when they are entrusted to you?" he replied, and the postman assented and waited for the application; that was the skilful turning of the obstacle into a stepping stone of advance. "And I," he proceeded—and we can notice the graver look, and hear the softening of his voice—"I am entrusted with this Gospel of Peace—I am bound to carry it to its address, and it is addressed to every living creature." That is the commission and the faith of the colporteur, to which, in every land, and in the face of a thousand obstacles, he keeps so true.

Such examples as these and such a picture must be kept before the mind as we survey the different countries and receive accounts of the work which has been done. For these accounts, so far as they are statistical—and we often have little beyond statistics—are in themselves but indications of something behind them—something which, compared with themselves, is as life in its force and passion compared with a formula in mathematics. We can represent in figures the number of copies sold, but what can recall out of the darkness of the past and of forgetfulness the interviews, the arguments, the hours of study over the unfamiliar but strangely convincing pages, the hours of prayer, the awakenings of soul and its struggles, the strife of good and evil in the heart, the breakings of light in the darkness, the descent of the angels of God. We cannot bring these things into the statistics, but they are behind the statistics; they are intensely actual and existent, and they are of the very substance and soul of all the work itself. Sometimes they show themselves—distant though very distinct and vital—in the journals; sometimes we see but a face and it is gone, or hear a voice which, when we listen, is silent again; often for the overwhelmingly larger part of the time included, and of the space, they are entirely invisible, but, like all spiritual things, they are always present, always actual, always eternal. Let us remember this world of the unseen—these unregistered realities; let us often turn from the narrative of visible and audible things to its silence, though indeed we may always hear it speak to us if we but listen to our own hearts.

Our journey begins with FRANCE, and there, at the outset, we already feel the icy influences, which—like east winds in summer—so often chill the spirits of the colporteurs. "In France," says M. Monod sorrowfully, "we work on deliberately hostile ground. As in other countries all the forces of the natural heart are against us, but here also all the forces of the dominant Church, with its thirty-five millions of nominal adherents, are leagued against us: and what are we? And yet, in spite of all, there has been advance. The colportage circulation is indeed lower, because the force is less, but the total circulation has been unexpectedly high. "Never, indeed," says M. Monod again, "have there been, in any time, so high sales." There is even better evidence than this. "If we are but careful observers,"

he adds, "we shall find that He who comes not with observation is coming and does not tarry. Numerous are the evangelical churches in France—created, founded and progressing—owing to the sole reading of the Scriptures circulated by our colporteurs; more numerous still the small gathering of working people around a Bible, perhaps the only copy in a village, imported by one of our good labourers." How much does this mean!—and how much also that piteous inquiry of a poor man who imagined that his mass book was the Bible. "How is it that our priest has never told us to search the Scriptures!" One of the most regrettable facts of the year, in France, has been the reduction of the colporteur force by almost one-fifth, and if the men no longer at work were like Guerin of Lyons, the loss has been very grave. This good man died in the fall of the year, and the words of his widow—written in the unreserved confidence of a letter—at once picture, by a single touch, the noble life of so many of his class, and open the springs of natural tenderness. "We have not yet had courage enough to go to the Gard and see the place where my poor husband ended a life so useful and so filled with labour. You cannot imagine the conflict in which he lived—conflict with men's spirit and with the elements. Neither rain, nor wind, nor snow, nor storm, could induce him to take a moment's rest. In winter, in summer, he was off by daybreak, and returned only at night, often drenched through and through. And now, it seems to us he is on tour again, and we expect him home—but he does not come! We shall go to him, but he shall not return to us."

Much of this might be repeated for SPAIN: there also the colportage circulation is lower, for the force has been reduced; but there also the general circulation has been increased.¹ In Spain also we hear of Associations of Bible Readers—those popular *Collegia Pietatis* which have been so often, in days of lost or decaying spirituality, the beginnings of a new Reformation, and the schools where many have found and loved the Wisdom of Christ. About the prospects of the Society's work in this land of many a disappointment, Mr. Jameson is naturally reticent, but he indicates something of the eagerness of his belief and desire in one emphatic sentence: "This I can positively assert: that in Spain the conditions for the circulation of the Scriptures are being prepared as they never have been before."

In ITALY, the third of the great Latin nations, the same record curiously repeats itself. Here, also, the colportage circulation has been reduced, and for the same reason; but here also the total issues for the year are higher.² They are indeed higher than ever before, and it may well stir one's hopes to hear that for the Italian race in and out of Italy—for the Italians who but yesterday were under the rule of the Vatican—for Italy, in which the Bible was proscribed, and all but popularly unknown—the total supply has been close upon 200,000 copies. Even as to the colporteurs' sales, it is full of suggestiveness to note that while France, with a population of 38,000,000 has had, from this source, but 60,000 copies, Italy with a population of only 31,000,000 has had 87,000. Sig. Meille, in his elaborate report naturally discusses the Encyclical of November last, but points out—and English Christians may perhaps require to be reminded of it—that in this characteristic deliverance all the old positions of the Papacy, as regards the popular diffusion of the Scriptures, are unchanged. But there is one sentence—it is quoted from Jerome—which strangely enough is reproduced in the Encyclical, and of which Sig. Meille justly says: "I would have it inscribed in brilliant letters in every Roman Catholic, nay in every Protestant, Church: 'To be ignorant of the Scriptures is to be ignorant of Christ.'—*Ignoratio Scripturarum est ignoratio Christi.*" And he supplies—what the Encyclical withholds—the natural inference—"If the Scriptures

are of such paramount importance.—if he who does not know the Scriptures cannot know Christ, the only Saviour of Mankind, how is it possible to keep the Scriptures from the people!"

Such seem to be the most remarkable aspects of the Society's work in the three great Latin countries. What is to be said of the neighbouring group of Germanic nations in which the Reformation has made its home? The answer to this question may be brief: it will also be felt to be full of encouragement and of promise. It is that among each of these peoples—among the Swedes and Norwegians, the Dutch and the Danes, the Germans and the Swiss, the work of Bible circulation has passed, or is rapidly passing, into their own hands, and that it is deepening and widening year by year. From Sweden and Holland the Society's agents have been already withdrawn. Norway is approaching similar autonomy; with Switzerland the Bible Society is related only as a friendly source of assistance and supply; and in the German Empire its work is primarily directed to the Roman Catholic population and practically limited to them. And there can be nothing more pleasant than the evidence which shows that the German Societies are themselves steadily rising to the measure of their great influence and responsibilities.¹ In 1881 the total circulation was 172,000 copies; in ten years it had risen to 313,000; in 1892 it was 326,000; last year it was 338,000. Within the Society's own special sphere there has also been advance, and its colportage circulation has risen from over 51,000 to over 60,000. This is the work of thirty men, and the accounts of their experience given by Mr. Watt are full of inspiration. The interest is perhaps greatest in the extreme East, where the emotional and susceptible Poles—some of the Romanist, some of the Reformed faith—have shown their deepening interest in the Scriptures by more than doubling the issues of 1892. But here, also, as in the case of France, the peculiar quality, the intensity, the tenderness of the colportage work seems embodied in a personal narrative, and, like that other, it is one of death. Few of its servants have served the Society better than Colporteur Eydam, and his last duties were painfully trying, for he was stationed in Munster, in the very centre of an intolerant Romanism, the monasteries and convents of that Papal city overshadowed his paths everywhere. Like his French brother, Guerin of Lyons, he was attacked with acute illness on a journey, but, unlike him, he was able to reach home; his wife was beside him, and his children, when he died. His latest words, and all his thoughts as he neared the end were of his work and of his untroubled faith; and the last sentence which he feebly articulated as he died was that chosen by the Society in its *Specimens of Languages* as the completest expression of the love of God and the hope of man.

Of AUSTRIA-HUNGARY little can be said in a review so rapid as this, not that there is any lack of matter in that narrative which, constantly the same, is yet constantly varied and continually impressive, but because of the very copiousness of it, and the complexity and the fulness of the population in this great empire.² It is not indeed easy to pass, though it is impossible to particularize, the story which Mr. Millard tells with so much spiritual sympathy—for every example of success holds him with its charm; and whether he speaks of Hungary, where the "increasing circulation is a marvel" to him, or of Bohemia, where "our work is greatly blessed" or of Moravia or Roumania, he lingers on every illustration—and they are many—of the usefulness of the work of his men. For them indeed he has nothing but praise. "Our colporteurs are doing their best to bring the Word of God to

every home and every hamlet in our Empire ; we find them in the miserable huts of wood-fellers, climbing over high, rocky mountains, or in solitary cottages on the plain ; here seeking entrance to splendid mansions, there at the sick-bed of the poor ; colportage is indeed the very backbone of our work." If one sentence only must be chosen to summarize the results of labour so devoted, none can be better than Mr. Millard's own—brief, but limitless in meaning: "Christ's cause in Austria-Hungary is gaining ground year by year."

Nor can any detailed account be given of the Society's work, done in the face of peculiar difficulties, in the TURKISH AGENCY,¹ though these regions must always have peculiar interest to minds of classic culture. To them it is almost indescribably suggestive to watch the influences of a new faith, a new literature, new forms of thought falling, softly as the early blossoms of summer, on the old homes of Greek civilization ; to watch the colporteurs at work in Macedonia—solitary men, found here and there, but the representatives of a power far mightier than that of Alexander ; to meet them in Mitylene—the Lesbos of Sappho, of Alcæus, of Terpander, the very centre of the flower of ancient Hellenic luxury, to learn that in the schools of Greece itself, and in an ever-increasing degree, the New Testament is being introduced. To attempt to estimate the significance of all this is the less necessary, for in one awakening sentence, Dr. Thomas sums up the resultant of the forces at work. "In Bulgaria," he says, "and in other lands of the East, the circulation of the vernacular Scriptures is producing, at present, changes which can only be compared with the Reformation in England and Scotland, and other countries of Western Europe."

This generalization leads us into the EGYPTIAN AGENCY,² for it refers largely to Muhammadans, who still surround, though half-conscious they cannot much longer be defended, the sacred places of their faith. And Mr. Weakley's judgments points in the same direction. 'The mood of the Muhammadan is being altered ;' he receives the colporteur without the malignant scowl of earlier years ; it is no longer strange to hear him give as his reason for declining to buy that he already possesses a copy of the *Injil*.' Indeed, it is largely owing to the fact that so many of those who can read have been supplied that the issues of last year are hardly so high as those of 1892. It is interesting to know that since this became a detached Agency ten years ago, over 100,000 Scriptures have been circulated in Egypt itself, and among the streams of ocean travellers who crowd the Suez Canal. Mr. Weakley notes that, among the vessels most open and friendly to the colporteurs, are those of Russia, and that name, so much more expressive every year, leads us into the great empire which borders at once along their eastern and northern limits both the Agencies we have left.

The journals which lead us first through Northern Russia to the utmost shores of Eastern Siberia, and then by the South into the heart of Asia, are full of glimpses of unfamiliar scenery—ever-varying, bright with changing colour, strangely suggestive of many things in the past and the future—full also of incidents which awake the deeper sympathies of the heart.³ We see and hear all this as page after page is turned—we feel as if we were ourselves visiting these distant places with the writers as our guides. Dr. Nicolson leads us to the great factories near Moscow and shows us the people crowding round the colporteur—those 'Russian people' whose character he bids us notice—'so receptive, so generally full of respect for things

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connected with religion, so thankful for an interest shown in their spiritual welfare'—as elsewhere he speaks of them as bringing 'minds kept fresh and simple through direct intercourse with nature to the Word of God, and when they understand it, straightway attempting to bring their lives in accordance with it.' Then he enters the prison. There also the Gospel is welcome; the library sent by the Bible Society is in full use, and the prisoners 'express their thankfulness for the edification and comfort it affords them.' He directs us afterwards, as the narrative passes on, to one of the sunniest parts of his Agency—the broad valley of the Volga; and at the season—it is the month of April—when the skies are intense blue, when the great river, 'as if rejoicing in its escape from winter,' covers whole stretches of the lower lands with its flood; when the steamers speed from port to port—those steamers in which the colporteurs, through the courtesy of the Directors, travel free; and when every deck and every pier is crowded with passengers, among these crowds the men ply their friendly trade. 'Now,' says Dr. Nicolson, 'it is a Polish merchant who is induced to look into a Bible in his own language, and after making proof of its contents, declares that the Book shall be his constant companion; again it is a Russian priest who makes himself specially useful in inducing the passengers to buy, by telling them that the English Bible Society in all countries seeks to induce the various nations, tribes, and tongues to purchase the sacred volume; again it is a Russian soldier, who, welcoming the Bible as so many of his comrades do, clasps it with fervour, and with audible prayer to his heart.' But it is impossible to do more than watch the rapidly passing panorama: we enter Siberia, guided in the Western Sub-Agency by Mr. Davidson, in the further East by Mr. Keay. We notice, as they do, with wonder, the immensely rapid progress which is being made: the towns growing into cities, the steamers multiplying on the rivers; great industries planting themselves; but everywhere we find the colporteurs—those 'Apostles of the Nineteenth Century,' as Dr. Nicolson calls them—and see with what endurance, and with what success they everywhere pursue their toil.

Full of interest as all this is, the interest is deepened in the south.' Here Mr. Morrison reports the largest total hitherto, excepting the previous year, and 'of single copies sold to single individuals and bought to be read, absolutely the largest ever known.' It is indeed full of significance to notice that, adding the issues of the Southern to those of the Northern Agency, we reach a circulation of above half a million copies, and find that the Russian people receive almost one-seventh of the entire issues of the Society for the whole year. When we remember what lies behind these figures, and when we see revealed from time to time, the details of the work they represent, the impression is very much deepened. At a large establishment near Kertch, as the colporteur passed the doors of the workmen's cottages he heard little but the rudest language and the sounds of dispute and quarrel. He was not unsuccessful in distributing copies, and when the day's work was over he again passed the doors. A great change had come: the unkindly voices were silent: one man with a Gospel was the centre of a group who listened as he read; while from an open window a voice was heard: '*Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judæa.*' A little further on there was another group similarly engaged, and as the colporteur passed he heard the words which, true of his great Master, were also true of the company to which he himself belonged: '*He went about through cities and villages, bringing the good tidings of the Kingdom of God.*' One sees in such an incident a picture of the elevating work which is going forward everywhere. One of the colporteurs, worn out by ceaseless labour, has recently resigned. 'Mr. Morrison, in bidding him grateful farewell, remembers that he has been the means of distributing probably 25,000 copies of the Scriptures on

the Dneiper, that historic river up which the Heralds of the Cross sailed, when they visited Russia for the first time 1,000 years ago.' One of his colleagues, aided by a free pass on the steamers of the Russian Steam Navigation Co., is hardly less busy. 'Ever travelling from port to port visiting the seamen in Sevastopol, the pleasure-seekers in Yalta, the Greeks of Theodosia, the artillerymen of Kertch, the picturesque mountaineers of the Caucasus coast, the men of the volunteer fleet, the new recruits drafted off to the army, the time-expired men who are leaving the Caucasus for their homes.' Near Simferopol we get a picture of colporteur life and endurance which cannot easily be forgotten. 'He had not long left till it began to snow. The snow fell heavier and heavier, the road became blocked, a strong north-west wind howled along; at last the horses cannot move; the colporteur and the driver are gradually drenched to the skin; they push the cart from behind hour after hour; finally they reach a roadside inn, completely exhausted, and the brave man's only remark is, "It is dreadful weather, however it will soon be spring, and I thank God for permitting me to work continuously." This, however, is nothing exceptional. Another colporteur, breaking up fresh ground, visited the Cossacks of the Ural—those wild horsemen who, with the still ruder Kibitkas, inhabit a bleak, raw land, where clouds of salty dust blow about all day long, and where the scanty vegetation is something that only camels can eat. Few parts of the Agency are more interesting than the Caucasus—the historic territory so picturesque in itself, so various in its populations, so full of the movement and progress of the present. From this old land comes a voice which will be welcomed wherever lovers of the Word of God hear it: it is that of the newly appointed Armenian Katholikos, who in a recent sermon said to the people who are so dear to him: 'I bless you my beloved Armenian people; I ask you to read the Gospel and to teach its precepts to your children; love one another and live together in harmony. If you have the love of Christ in your hearts, all will be well, for the source of all that is good is love.' Mr. Morrison's report appropriately closes with a picture of the Colporteur-Translator Aveteriantz sitting in the Hindi Serai of Kashgar, on the edge of the great Gobi wilderness, a case of Scriptures behind him; in front of him a desk, and on it the MS. of the Gospel which he is translating into the language of the people, who come sometimes to watch him, with indefinite curiosity, at his work, sometimes to possess themselves of a copy of the Scriptures to carry into their distant homes.

Little can be said of CHINA, for the river of visible life, of picturesque detail and of incident, so open to the light elsewhere, buries itself here largely out of sight; we have brief summaries, statistics and general statements: it is only here and there we see the spiritual world which lies behind and is above all mere returns, or listen to the voices of the heart. Yet these statistics are full of significance.¹ Despite the depression which has followed flood and famine, despite the very partial access yet gained into some important provinces, the circulation has been unusually high; it approaches a quarter of a million copies and exceeds that of 1892 by more than 50,000. About 160 native and six European colporteurs have been engaged, and they are exerting an influence which must ultimately be revealed. How deep this influence is, how steadily it is spreading, there are not a few evidences. 'The Gospel' writes one of the missionaries in a significant sentence, 'has at length begun to find its way from the uneducated multitude to the literary classes, and among them it is affecting the life and views of thinking men.' Even more significant, perhaps, is the declaration of a native of some education and reflection, a declaration full of that awakening sense of change—that pathetic lament over a departing order of things—that confessed recognition of the approach of a new and mightier power, which was heard once when Christianity won its first great conquests, and which we are beginning to hear in many heathen lands

again. 'These men,' he said, 'have come into our beautiful country; they build chapels, and the sound of their bells is heard far and near. The alarming sound enters even into our ancestral halls, and our family graves. Even our incense loses its power, our sons and daughters will die; and the foreigner and his faith will triumph.'

That voice we may also hear in INDIA: we have already heard it; for there also the sky is slowly being filled with the light of a new day, and many eyes are watching how it is flushing all the spaces of the east. To India, indeed, there can be in this outline, but a reference; for of the six Auxiliaries at work there, only three have as yet sent their reports, and those are comparatively brief. But in every case there has been advance. Even in the apparent exception of Bangalore, the centre of the Kanarese-speaking people, the actual circulation has been less only because the demand exceeded the powers of supply, and the exhausted stock could not be at once replenished. Never has the Madras circulation, except in one case, been so high: fifty-two colporteurs have distributed 75,000 copies, and the demand for vernacular Scriptures here, as everywhere else, is steadily growing. Steadily indeed, as all missionary work also reports; but not too steadily nor too swiftly: not too soon can English Christianity blot out, in the evangelical devotion of the present, some of the painful memories of the past. There was a time—it was before the Christian conscience was awakened about India—when for eighty years there was no church at Calcutta, and such service as there was, was held in a private house; when the only recognition of Sunday was the hoisting of a flag; when one of the oldest and best inhabitants of the city could say that he was not sure that he could produce ten righteous men there, but thought he could produce five; when outside the capital there was no assembly for religious worship, nor any evidence that Englishmen had ever a religious instinct; when natives could speak of Christianity as a religion of the devil.¹ These days are gone—they are perhaps forgotten—yet they may well be recalled if their sorrowful memory may quicken the spirit of thankfulness for the present, or may at all deepen the conviction that the debt England owes to India is incalculably great, that it is all the greater from the unfaithfulness of the past, that it should be paid without stint, without hesitation, without delay.

Little also may be said of PERSIA,² where good work is being done, or of JAPAN, for the record of the year is uneventful, and the progress of Christianity seems to pause before the absorption of the people in their new political passions and cares. But there is one fact which illuminates the story with a light of its own, a light sufficient, indeed, to illuminate many a year of otherwise discouraging labours: it is the history and the yearly record of the Scripture Union,—that union which already numbers 13,000 members with their 300 local secretaries,—which has already done some of the deepest and happiest work of the century; which is planning and attempting more; of which the personal memorials are among the most beautiful and the most touching of those of any Christian community.

Already we have surveyed some of the aspects of work carried on in half a world, but so wide is the Society's field, that there yet remains another hemisphere—continents yet unvisited, great movements to which no allusion has been made. Nor can anything beyond an allusion be made to them now, or in pages which do not so much summarise the larger Report as form, in relation to it, a kind of prelude outline. But in that fuller history it will be seen that the first lady colporteur, sent out by the Society, has found her work among the thirty millions of MALAYSIA,³ that to the same great field have gone four young English-

men to join their countrymen there, and to continue the work they have so worthily and successfully begun: that in the WEST INDIES and in CENTRAL AMERICA the Society's operations are being more fully organized and developed; that the political revolution in the Southern Republics, in CHILI and PERU, and the ARGENTINE, have not hindered, nor even lessened, the circulation of the Word of God, and that in CANADA, as in AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND, the Society has proved for another year how deep the fellow feeling, how indispensable the assistance of its faithful friends who are there. To AUSTRALIA, so important is the Society's work there, a special deputation has been sent, and it is hoped that, as a result, the union between that great colony and home may be more close and more friendly than ever. It will also be found that for AFRICA new versions are being prepared year by year; that, in connection with the Agencies of Morocco and Algiers in the North and the South African Auxiliary at the Cape, much good and enlarging work is being done; that supplies of Scriptures for the great missionary field of the East¹ and the West are constantly being sent; that to Uganda alone, where the newly awakened and eager spirit of Bible study is one of the most remarkable facts of the century, some 66,000 copies have been despatched; that while sections here and there of the continent are being painfully won over as political annexations of the European powers, the whole is being added, slowly, indeed, but surely,—not with bloodshed, but through sanctified learning, through the devotion of many noble lives, through the tender ministries of Christian women,—added race by race, language by language, faith by faith, to the Kingdom of Christ.

It is a survey which cannot but suggest many reflections, many and varying according to the minds in which they arise. But there are two which,—so obvious are they and almost inevitable—will probably be awakened in all.

The first is that of *the multiplicity of languages*. How great that multiplicity, how perplexing, how obstructive to the spread and apprehension of thought, not the most experienced colporteur knows, scarcely the most erudite linguist, not even the far-wandering traveller who, like the old Greek wanderer, has seen many cities and many nations of men. To us in our island home how dimly felt: but there are forty languages needed in the Turkish Agency, forty in the South Russian. The colporteur must carry many books he cannot read, and there is a tender heart in every language which none can touch or understand but those in whom it was born. How numberless the rooms in the strange house of human life!—how many closed doors—how impossible to reach the inhabitant within unless one has the golden key—the knowledge of the mother-tongue!

The second reflection is that of *the world-wide unrest of thought and faith*. It is among ourselves,—that profound insecurity of conviction—in the West: wrought partly by the new science, partly by the new literature, partly, perhaps, by the very fixity of posture we have long had in traditional beliefs: even more by the working of that great silent law of change which all human things obey. Even in the East,—the still home of an everlasting yesterday, in India, in China, those who know them best mark portentous changes in the historic systems of faith which had lived millenniums before Christianity was born,—point out seams of cleavage in the great masses—assure us, not so confidently, that they will soon fall suddenly as overturned towers, but quite assuredly that they are already crumbling to their end,—that the fatal day has reached them,—that the places which know them now shall soon know them no more for ever.

These two reflections very naturally arise. And as they impress themselves on the mind, may they not awaken a third—and with it a strange sense of Divine purpose in human affairs—a reflection as to the *position in which, in this polyglot transition time, the Society finds itself, half unconsciously, placed*.

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For, from the first, translation became the most necessary of all its duties, a duty which has continued and grown more necessary ever since; until now the Bible has become itself polyglot—a wonder of translation—has learned to speak in new tongues—and instead of being an incomprehensible book in this myriad-languaged world, is fast becoming intelligible in them all. And this many-languaged Book is in the Society's hands.

Also, this Book *alone*. Not a Creed, nor a Theology, nor any system of elaborated thought, but the Divine Book only, without comment,—the original source to which perplexed thought must return; from which new Reformations have started; out of which living influences have flown like rivers; the expression of that divine truth which everywhere finds out the heart, which explains man to himself and reveals God,—which will exist and be new and vital when the old idolatries, when the new philosophies, have passed away.

Let us be steadfast, let us be hopeful, let us rejoice in that possession, let us envy no other. How blessed we are to have received it!—but let us give it to others, to every language, to every nation. It is more blessed to give than to receive!

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REPORTS OF AGENTS.

REV. ALFRED ANDREWS, *Manitoba*.—At Gladstone, Oct. 26th, we held our annual meeting in the beautiful new Methodist Church, whose pastor as well as the ministers of the Presbyterian and Episcopalian Churches also aided us very cordially. The attendance was fair, and the interest in the congregation hearty. Little has been done in sales, the stock being quite too limited to allow of much choice of books. This will be remedied at once. The new depository, Mr. A. T. Andrews, druggist, seems much interested in pushing the sale of Bibles.

Shoal Lake, Nov. 7th.—Meeting was not large, but the plate collection \$8.35, proved the interest felt in the cause. Rev. Mr. Ross, Baptist, ably assisted in making the services profitable.

Hamiota, Nov. 8th.—A new town on the G. N. W. C. gave us a good congregation. Rev. T. B. Beynon took an active part in the meeting, but it was thought inopportune to commence a Branch Society this year.

Newdale, Nov. 9th.—Meeting fair in attendance and interest. Margin for sale of books is limited here. Rev. Mr. Crookshanks, Methodist, and Mr. McKay, student Presbyterian, ably supported the agent in the meeting.

Birtle, Jan. 5th.—Meeting in Methodist Church, Rev. W. G. Wilson, pastor, presiding. Rev. Mr. Frew, Presbyterian, also assisted with a neat address.

Yorkton.—From the train on Sunday morning at 2 o'clock we did our best to prepare for public Bible meeting in the Methodist Church. The resident ministers were unable to attend, excepting Rev. Mr. Taylor, Methodist.

Saltcoats.—We had an excellent meeting in the evening in the Presbyterian Church.

Russell.—Where we had a fine meeting. In the congregation and on the platform we had no less than seven ministers.

Neepawa.—The meeting was held on Feb. 7th, in Presbyterian School-room; congregation very small, not over 35. Rev. J. J. Leach occupied the chair. Here we found no depository. But it was decided to open up at once, and a very suitable place was found for sale of our Bibles, and a stock was ordered forthwith.

Minnedosa.—Meeting held on the 9th Feb. in the Church of England. Rev. Mr. Gill, president, in the chair. The Presbyterian pastor, Rev. Mr. Paradis, was also present and gave a short address. Contributions, including \$9.95 sales are this year \$40.05.

Rapid City.—We had to make several attempts to get a meeting. Storm (snow drifts), cancelled trains, etc., necessitated two postponements. We had about forty in attendance in the Baptist Church. Rev. A. O. Garrioch, Church of England, president, in the chair. Here we found some difficulty in getting at the real state of the stock and receipts, as the late depository has removed, and seemed to overlook the necessity of leaving a statement of sales and receipts. We found the people willing to aid in advancing our important work. Yet the unusual depression in the Province operates against us very seriously. Port Rowan, Feb. 9th.—A stormy night, thunder and lightning; a small, but excellent meeting. Rev. A. Shore, the minister of the church, conducted the religious devotions. There are quite a number in this branch who stand loyally to its interests.

Courtright (New Branch), Oct. 24th.—I had the pleasure of inaugurating a branch in this flourishing little town, and the beginnings are very auspicious. There are four different and well attended congregations here, and good results may be fairly hoped for. The collectors named entered willingly into the work. Your agent spoke, as usual, about three quarters of an hour. The names of the officers appointed will be found in the list.

Corunna, Oct. 25th.—A successful meeting and a favorable report presented by the secretary, Mr. L. W. Maguire. This branch is doing well.

Watford, Oct. 26th.—The officers and collectors of this branch are to be congratulated on their work for the past year, and the interest and energy displayed on behalf of the Society. The meeting was one of the best your agent has attended this season. The branch is fortunate in having a good secretary, Mr. Haigle. The Rev. J. Downie, Rev. H. G. Harris, and Rev. J. H. Graham were present and assisted ably in the proceedings.

Forest, Nov. 1st.—I am happy to be able to speak in terms of the highest commendation of this branch. The management is excellent, and the officers are of the best. An indebtedness of about \$35, which weighed detrimentally on the branch, was cleared off at a stroke, by the liberality of a friend of the Society, who did not wish the name to be made public. Besides Dr. Hutton, in the chair, Revs. R. A. Sims, Jas. Pritchard, A. P. McDonald and Dr. Hindley were also present, with Mr. H. L. Morphy, and others. The meeting was of a very gratifying character.

On taking a review-glance at the district visited by your agent, there is abundant reason to "thank God and take courage." If the agents could accomplish the visitation of all the branches connected with the Upper Canada Bible Society within the three months of October, November and December, it would prevent the embarrassment consequent on sometimes having two meetings within one year. However, no absolute rule could perhaps be laid down in this matter.

REV. B. BRYAN—Copetown.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. C. R. Morrow, president of the branch, occupied the chair. Attendance was not large. A good choir assisted in the service. After the agent's address, the president made some appropriate remarks, commending the good work of the Society.

Waterdown.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Dr. McLaren, president, in the chair. About forty present. Night stormy. Revs. J. H. Collins, J. Yors-ton and P. M. McEachern took part in the proceedings. A very encouraging spiritual feeling was present. The work is evidently well managed. The secretary's work is very satisfactorily performed.

Burlington.—Meeting held in Wesley Hall. Rev. John Histon, president, and a very old friend of the Society, in the chair. Rev. R. H. Abraham was present, and took a hearty part in the work. Rev. Everton.—Meeting held in Disciples' Church. Rev. D. Strachan, president, in the chair. Mr. J. R. Harris, the very efficient secretary, read the reports. Mr. Harris has been secretary of this branch for over twenty-five years, and is a well tried friend of the Society. Rev. Mr. Baker and Mr. Hugh Black took part in the meeting, commending the good work of the Society, and acknowledging the help of the agent. Work well managed and field well worked.

Rockwood.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Rev. D. Strachan, president, in the chair. Rockwood and Everton form one branch. The reports read and officers chosen, therefore, at Everton were simply announced here. A good choir were present and assisted in the service. About fifty present. After the agent's address, Rev. Mr. Strachan made some remarks, commending heartily the work of the Society. In the hands of good officers the work of this branch will be encouraging.

Eden Mills.—Meeting held in Methodist Church. Wm. Geddes, Esq., president, in the chair. Pastor of church absent through illness. Stormy night prevented large attendance. Reports read and officers chosen. Agent's help well received and acknowledged. Rev. D. Strachan, of Rockwood, was present, and said a few words.

Malton.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Mr. J. McMullen, president, in the chair. Much sickness in the neighbourhood made the attendance small. Pastor of the church was absent through illness. The chairman, a good friend of the Society, made a few excellent remarks. Reports were read and officers chosen. Agent's address well received and help acknowledged. Interest apparently good and work well managed.

Guelph.—The meeting was held in Norfolk St. Methodist Church. Rev. Dr. Torrance, president in the chair. This was a very large meeting, the best for many years. The body of the large church was completely filled. Every Protestant denomination was represented in the clergy present. Revs. Dr. Henderson, W. Hartley, R. J. M. Glassford, J. Hough, Jas. Harris, and Messrs. E. R. Bollert, W. Watson and John A. Davidson, took part in the meeting. A good choir assisted in the service. The president, a very old friend of the Society, made an excellent chairman, and commended the work most heartily. The third resolution, moved by the agent, enabled him to set forth the great work done by the Bible Society, and its claims upon our continued support.

Help of agent well received. Rev. J. H. Oliver made a few remarks, commending the work of the Society. The treasurer reported the collections larger this year than last. Agent answered several questions about the work of the Upper Canada Bible Society asked at end of meeting.

REV. R. BURNS, Ph.B.—*Glanford*, Jan. 22nd.—This branch is in a good healthy state. The Society was organized about thirty-three years ago with Gideon Smith, Esq., as president, and continues to be a warm friend of the Society, although unable by infirmities to attend as formerly. The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church, at Mount Hope. The Rev. J. H. Kennedy occupied the chair and conducted the devotional service. Dr. Cyrus Smith, the honored treasurer for thirty-three years, and Joel Smith, Esq., the faithful secretary, gave interesting reports. Owing to the bad state of the roads and counter attractions the meeting was only fairly attended, there being about thirty present. The agent addressed the meeting on the "Work of the Bible Society and Influence of the Bible." The officers and collectors were appointed, and although the meeting was held late in the year, yet the prospects are good because of the zeal and faithfulness of the officers and collectors.

York, Jan. 23rd.—The annual meeting of this Society was held in the Methodist Church, and the venerable president, Wm. Clarke, Esq., presided. The attendance was very fair. A lively interest is taken in the Bible Society by the people of this village and surrounding country. The Rev. D. W. Ecker led in prayer, and gave a short address. Miss Mabel Ecker presided at the organ. The Sec.-Treasurer read the reports, which were adopted. The agent addressed the meeting on the subject, "The Field and the Laborers." The collectors were appointed, and the field marked out for immediate work.

Caledonia.—Church anniversaries interfered with the holding of a public gathering. The Committee decided not to call in the services of the agent this year. The Committee arranged the work to be done at once by the collectors at different sections in the village and vicinity. I believe Caledonia will give a good report.

The books of the depository were found in a back room where they could not be seen, and a change to a more favourable position was arranged.

Teviotdale.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Corcoran, pastor of the church, conducting the opening services. A fair number present. It was thought best to organize a new branch to include this village and Cotswold village, about two miles distant. The annual meetings to be held alternately. Next year the meeting to be held in the Presbyterian Church, Cotswold. By thus uniting, all the country unoccupied will be reached. After your agent had explained the object of the Society, a branch was duly organized, with fair prospects of success.

Garafraxa.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Bellwood. Night wet and disagreeable, somewhat interfering with the success of the meeting. The officers of the branch were all present. Rev. Mr. McLaren, president, in the chair. After your agent had delivered an address on the work of the Society, each officer in turn confessed his shortcomings and lack of zeal in the past, and resolved that the coming year should witness greater things. We expect a large increase here.

Mimosa.—Through some strange neglect on the part of the postmaster, the "Pulpit notices" remained in the office for a week before delivered to the secretary. On this account no Sabbath notices were given. We waited on the secretary and went to the church at the time appointed, but failed to hold a meeting. I arranged a meeting of the officers of the branch, and made provision for the work which I have since learned has been done.

Moorefield.—The meeting in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Lounds, Methodist, was the only minister present. The night was stormy. The president had removed. Here we find a nice little village, good country all round. Four churches, we ought to have better results. The new president is an earnest worker (we have known him for years), and his sympathies are with the Bible Society. If it is possible he will make it a success. Look out for a large increase here.

Drayton.—A large village, a magnificent country, and yet no returns have been made for two years. Why? It is difficult to say why. The president and secretary have removed, so the notices of meeting were not received in time. We fixed another night. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. It was small. Rev. Mr. Stafford, pastor of the church, presided, and spoke helpful, kindly words. The branch was re-organized, and with the present officers will succeed.

Palmerston.—Unfortunately the first evening appointed for the meeting here a political meeting was held. We withdrew, "not willingly, but by constraint." Another meeting was appointed, and held in the "Town Hall." A fair attendance and good meeting. Revs Auld, Presbyterian, and Nugent, Methodist, were present, and spoke kindly words of the Society. This branch is alive, and will render a good account.

Port Elgin.—This branch was not allotted to me, but it is my home, and I am interested. We looked forward to the annual meeting with pleasure. The officers, the ministers, and the people take an interest in the work. Last year the collections increased from \$47 the previous year to \$77. We have asked for and expect \$100 this year. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The evening was the first and greatest storm of the season, and yet 100 people came out to the meeting. Meeting was addressed by resident ministers.

REV. G. H. COBBLEDICK, M.A., B.D., *Molesworth.*—A pleasant drive of thirteen miles brought your agent to the hospitable home of the Secretary, Mr. W. C. Watson. The depository he found in excellent condition, with a well-selected stock. The meeting was in the Methodist Church and was well attended. In the absence of the aged president, the chair was filled by Mr. Watson, whose genial and efficient work in the interests of Society has resulted in the lively interest evidenced.

Bluevale.—Here the officers had exerted themselves to secure a good attendance, resulting in the largest audience ever present at a meeting of this branch. Rev. Mr. Pring, Methodist minister and pastor of the church, conducted the opening service and occupied the chair. The presence of a union choir added much to the interest of the evening. Your agent found the depository in need of new stock, this will be secured by the directors.

Trowbridge.—The meeting was in the Methodist Church. Notwithstanding a disagreeable night there was a fair audience who evinced deep interest

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in the work of the Society. The President, Mr. J. R. Code, occupied the chair. Reports submitted showed the officers to be efficient and they were re-elected. Appropriate selections were rendered by the choir and brief addresses given by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Amy. The depository, Mr. Cosens, has in hand a well selected stock of wide variety.

Atwood.—Your agent called on the different officers and pastors. Meeting in Presbyterian Church. Chair by Rev. A. Henderson, M.A., pastor, who has been president of the branch ever since its organization and to whose unremitting efforts its continued prosperity is largely due. The financial returns from sales of Scriptures and free contributions are gratifying.

St. Helens.—The night was dark and the roads not good. The audience exhibited a deep interest in the work of the Society. The meeting was in the English Church and the chair was occupied by the genial and efficient president, the Rev. R. G. S. Anderson, M.A., B.D., who gave a brief practical address. Rev. R. C. Burton, of Whitechurch, accompanied your agent and assisted in the devotional exercises. The secretary's report was full and accurate. In Mr. Millar we found an old friend, whose reports as treasurer and depository were, as we would expect, ready and duly presented.

Langside.—This has been a weak branch and no returns were made last year. We were, however, favoured with a beautiful evening and a fine audience composed largely of young people, all of whom showed the deepest interest in the meeting throughout. The president, Mr. A. D. McKenzie, though a young man, ably filled the chair. The collectors were all appointed and a vigorous effort is to be made to retrieve the fortunes of this branch. A very pleasant feature of the evening was a number of selections kindly rendered by some of the young folk who had formed themselves into a choir for the occasion.

Kinlough.—Here your agent found in Mr. Alton and his estimable wife old time friends. He is the public school teacher and secretary of this branch. Mr. Steel the depository is a tried and true friend of the Society. The President, Mr. John Lane, after serving the Society faithfully for the past five years thought the office should go to another. His counsel is to be still available as a director, while Mr. Thos. Atkinson succeeds him in the chair. Notwithstanding an unfavourable evening, the Presbyterian Church was fully half filled. Rev. Mr. Grey, the pastor, opened the meeting and also gave a brief address.

Walton.—Here we were favoured with a fine night and good audience. Rev. Mr. Forrest, of the Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was held, and the Rev. Mr. Cosens, of the Methodist Church, each gave a few practical remarks before your agent was called upon. As the field covered by this branch is large, we spent a Sunday on it in compliance with the wishes of the officers, and reached several of the outlying points. This branch is capable of large returns.

Whitechurch.—The meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church, was not large owing to local causes. The president, Rev. W. H. Geddes having removed, the Rev. R. C. Burton, of the Methodist Church, conducted the opening exercises, occupied the chair and was elected president for the coming year. The sec.-treas. gave a full report and was re-elected along with the executive. The depository has a large and varied stock. This branch is of somewhat recent formation and has a limited territory, but is determined to work it well.

Brussels.—The meeting which was held in the English Church was said to be the best held here for many years, the audience filling the church. The chair was taken by the president, Mr. Strachan, who gave an introductory address. The secretary-treasurer's report showed this to be a banner branch, having raised in the past fifteen years \$1,760 or an average per year of \$118. A thoughtful address was given by Rev. W. G. Reilly, incumbent, dealing with

the inspiration and validity of the Bible and indicating the threefold pathway which it shows, viz., the *path of Life*, of *holiness*, and of *our duty to others*. Your agent spoke on the aim and work of the Society and gave a bird's-eye view of its operations in several fields of Europe and Asia. A union choir rendered a number of appropriate selections in excellent manner. A characteristic of this branch is the way in which it extends its work to surrounding centres. At the request of the executive we visited two of these, Ethel and Cranbrook, each five miles from Brussels, where successful and stimulating meetings were held.

REV. J. DOWNIE, B.D., *Harrington*.—Rev. Mr. McLachlan, the president, had just recovered from a severe illness. I was kindly welcomed to his home. Immediately on my arrival I visited both departments of the public school and delivered short addresses on the work of the Bible Society. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church and was well attended. A most attentive hearing was given your agent. The choir sang suitable hymns and anthems. The meeting was an enthusiastic one. The president is a warm friend of the Society and the secretary-treasurer, Mr. McComb, is a very efficient one.

Kintore.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church and was fairly well attended. The president, Rev. Mr. Munro, in the chair. The Society is making satisfactory progress here. A meeting of the officers and committee was held after the regular meeting was over. Collectors were appointed, and their districts and collecting books assigned them.

Thamesford.—I preached Sunday morning at the Presbyterian Church to a congregation of over 450 people, and in the Methodist church in the evening to a congregation of about 200 and fully brought before most interested hearers the work and claims of the Society. Sermons will, I am strongly convinced, do much better than a meeting in this branch. The Rev. L. Cameron, the president, has held that office for more than twenty-five years. Nineteen years in Thamesford and over six at Acton, where he resided before he came to Thamesford.

Beachville.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. Rev. Mr. Robinson, the pastor, was present and delivered a suitable address. The chair was ably filled by the president Mr. Shann. The meeting was not as largely attended as was expected on account of a meeting of Good Templars in the next village. The old officers were re-elected and collectors appointed. The friends of the Society here are practical and take deep interest in its welfare. Your agent was hospitably entertained by Mrs. Nelles.

Burgessville.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church and was poorly attended. The night was fine, but a meeting of Good Templars in the Methodist Church in the village seriously interfered with the attendance. Your agent addressed the few friends present very fully on the work of the Society as well as its pressing needs. Steps were taken to make a fuller canvass of the branch and increase the contributions. Mr. S. R. Wallace, the worthy and efficient secretary-treasurer kept your agent over night.

Tilsonburg.—Visited the depository and inspected the stock and called on some friends of the Society. The meeting was held in the English Church, and was well attended. The Rev. F. Ryan, B.D., the rector, was present and conducted the opening services and delivered a short address. Rev. Mr. McGregor, M.A., the president, ably filled the chair. Appropriate hymns were sung. Short and earnest practical addresses were delivered by the secretary and Mr. Dean, a former colporteur of the Society. The meeting was most successful and a *lively interest in the work* of the Society manifested.

Dereham.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Brownsville, and was fairly well attended. In the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Veale ably presided. Mr. Allison, the Treasurer, gave a short, pointed address, new collectors were ap-

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pointed, and it is hoped greater interest was aroused in the Society's operations. The Rev. Mr. McGregor, of Tilsonburg, was present and gave a helpful address. Mr. Wood, the depository, hospitably entertained your agent.

Corinth.—On my arrival here, by the cordial invitation of the secretary, Mr. James Amos, I put up at his house. I then repaired to the depository and inspected the stock. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; the attendance was better than last year. In the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Brown, Methodist, occupied the chair, and delivered a short address. It is hoped a fresh impetus was given to the work. Your agent very fully here, as at every branch visited, brought before those present the wonderful work of the Bible Society, and commended it to the prayers, influence and support of its friends.

REV. CHAS. DUFF—Avening.—My first station which I reached at noon. After a moment's inquiry and a few minutes' walk, I came to the door of our worthy president, Mr. W. J. Honeyford, whom I met before entrance and who warmly offered me the kind hospitality of his home and family, to both of which I was made heartily welcome as the agent of your Society. In the afternoon we visited the depository, which was found in good shape. The meeting was in the Methodist Church, but the minister could not be with us on account of revival services in another place. The attendance was only moderate, but the attention was good and we believe the result will be to the gain of the Society. The business was duly transacted and the work of the year duly inaugurated. The next morning the president drove me over to the sub-branch at

Banda, a mile distant, where I examined the other depository now in the hands of a new but capable man. We thence made our way to

Creemore.—Here I was ably assisted by the Revs. Henry and Owen, the one Presbyterian and the other Episcopal ministers. Here I found the depository in good order and the general business well in hand, a vigorous president and a large, encouraging meeting, the best they said that this branch had ever had. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church.

Dunedin was my next place of meeting, five miles distant up the Mad River valley. Here diphtheria had broken up the public school and otherwise interfered with the general work of the community. Notwithstanding, the meeting was very good and the interest taken in the account of the work by the agent very creditable on the part of the young people. Rev. Mr. Henry gave me valuable assistance.

Maple Valley was visited the next day. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church at Badjeros. The church was well filled and we had a good meeting, after which I accompanied the Rev. Mr. Long eight miles to

Singhampton, where the annual brand meeting of that place was held on the following evening. Here the attendance was small and I was left alone, the Rev. Mr. Long having to attend revival services at the place of our last meeting. The business of the meeting was transacted and a good deal of sorrow expressed at there being such a slim attendance.

The next day being Saturday I proceeded to *Collingwood* where I spent the Sabbath and preached in the morning to a good congregation in the Opera House which the Methodist congregation is using while their own building is undergoing repairs. On Monday evening the annual meeting of the branch Society was held in the Baptist Church. The attendance was not what it should have been, announcements having been made in all the churches. I visited the Presbyterian Y. P. S. C. E., which met early and dismissed, that any who desired might attend the Bible Society meeting. A number did attend. We had the valuable help of all the residential clergy and of the Rev. Dr. Sexton who put off one of his lectures until another evening on account of our meeting. Officers were re-appointed and I doubt not the work of the Society will be performed in its accustomed business-like manner.

Duntroon was reached on Tuesday evening and the meeting held. The attendance was small but intelligent, appreciative and hearty. The Rev. A. McDonald, our president, is a true friend of the Society, and I have no doubt good work will be done.

Churchill.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church and the Rev. Mr. Ross, its urbane and excellent pastor, gave the Society his heartiest support. The gathering was not large, possibly because the time of the meeting had been changed since its first announcement. The attention was intelligent and appreciative and the great work of the Bible Society is highly valued.

Lefroy and Belle Ewart.—The following evening I found myself in this place, only two miles distant from the former one. There are a number of people here who join heartily and very intelligently in the support of the work of the Bible Society.

Craigvale and Stroud.—Here, only seven miles from the former branch, the Bible Society has genuine friends. The aged and veteran president, who for many years has served the Society in this capacity, I had not the pleasure of meeting. This was to me a personal disappointment, though this was made up by the very hearty manner in which the other officers of the Society took hold and endeavoured to make the meeting successful. Dr. Gould occupied the chair; he has a good and highly appreciative knowledge of the general work of the Bible Society and made a brief but excellent speech in behalf of the work. A peculiar feature of this branch is that it has been able to secure the support of most of the Societies and Sabbath Schools in the locality.

Painswick.—The attendance at the meeting was small, but quite as good, the president assured me, as usual. Those present were both attentive and appreciative hearers, and the pres. and sec. are very warm and intelligent friends of the Society.

Angus.—This place has somewhat gone down owing to the removal of the mills that formerly gave employment to a good many hands in the manufacture of lumber, yet the surrounding country which has good agricultural resources, has not yet been cultivated for the Bible Society, and there is really no reason that these congregations of farmers should not do something in this direction as well as those, say, at Churchill or Stroud, where the principal stimulus is in the spirit and enterprise of friends in its behalf. I trust that the friends who love the cause in Angus will show that the surrounding community is not barren desert for so noble and world-wide a work.

Thornbury and Clarksburg.—I had made arrangements to preach at Thornbury on Sabbath morning. I was met at the station by my friend and parishioner of over thirty years ago, Mr. Thomas Andrews, whose family and friends royally entertained me during my stay in that place. On Tuesday night the annual meeting of the Thornbury and Clarksburg branch was held in the basement of the Methodist Church. The attendance was very good and the interest and attention unabated from beginning to end. The Rev. J. M. Simpson was made president. Both he and the Rev. J. L. Simpson rendered good service at the meeting. This branch has done good service in former years and it is believed will not recede but make advances upon those records.

Meaford.—The annual meeting of the Meaford branch was held in the Baptist Church. The gathering was again small but exceedingly interested. Through some mistake with reference to the pulpit notices the meeting had not had sufficient publicity. Here occurred, however, what I had not had the pleasure of enjoying before in my work this year, the meeting on the Society's platform of six ministers, including the agent, all of different Protestant denominations; Anglican, Presbyterian, Congregational, Baptist, Disciple, and last but not least, Methodist. All were hearty in their support of the Bible Society and it may be confidently expected that the forthcoming will not be the barren year that the previous one was.

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REV. J. MCD. DUNCAN, *Clifford*, Nov. 7th.—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Mr. Hazlewood, the venerable president, occupied the chair. Assistance was rendered by the Rev. Messrs. Young and Potter. This is a healthy, well officered branch.

Harriston, Nov. 8th.—A week full of meetings of local interest interfered somewhat with the annual meeting of the Bible Society. Those present manifested earnest interest in the Society's operations.

Holstein, Nov. 9th.—Seldom has your agent addressed a more interested and sympathetic audience than that assembled in the Presbyterian Church here. Good returns may be looked for from this branch.

Durham, Nov. 10th.—A fair number of people attended the meeting here and listened attentively to the address of your agent. The Rev. W. J. Connor was elected president and Mr. Wm. Gorsline, secretary for the ensuing year.

Mount Forest, Nov. 11th, 12th and 13th.—Here it was arranged that your agent should preach in the Methodist and Baptist churches in the morning and evening respectively and address a mass meeting in the afternoon. This arrangement was carried out with gratifying results. On Monday evening the annual meeting for business was held in the Presbyterian Church, addresses being delivered by Rev. Messrs. Ramsay, Bevan and MacMillan and by the agents. Total collections, \$12.26.

Cedarville, Nov. 14th.—In spite of a snow-storm, which made travelling very unpleasant, a good audience was found in the Presbyterian Church here when your agent arrived. The Rev. Messrs. Morrison, McKellar and Honey took part in the exercises and the address of the agent was attentively listened to. I cannot refrain from mentioning the kindness of Mrs. Morrison, who drove eleven miles in the face of a snow-storm to meet me at Mount Forest and take me to Cedarville. It is gratifying to know that the Rev. John Morrison, an old and tried friend of the Society, though almost totally blind, is still discharging his duties as pastor and was able to assist in the meeting of the Bible Society. A good report may be looked for from Cedarville this year.

Arthur, Nov. 15th.—The weather was very inclement. A fair sized audience, however, assembled in the Presbyterian Church. The work of the Bible Society in this thriving village is in good hands. The free contributions last year were \$105. At least an equal amount may be expected this year.

Grand Valley, Nov. 16th.—A good meeting in the Presbyterian Church. In the absence of the president the chair was taken by the Rev. H. Crozier. A series of special services was being held in the Methodist Church, but the meeting for this evening was given up to allow the people to attend the Bible Society meeting. The Rev. Mr. Isaac, of the Methodist Church, assisted in the exercises of the evening.

Waldemar, Nov. 17th.—A good meeting here. The president elect is a young man of energy and will do good work for the Society.

Your agent encloses his report by expressing gratitude for much kindness received from friends of the Bible Society and giving my testimony to the hold of the Society upon the sympathies of the Christian public.

REV. J. DYKE—*Manitoba and N. W. T., Elkhorn*.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. A very fair audience greeted your agent. Dr. Ralston, the president, occupied the chair. Rev. Messrs. Fortune and Stevenson took part in the meeting which was deeply interesting and full of promise for future good.

Virdeu.—A series of unfavorable circumstances combined to make the attendance small at this point. Two other meetings the same evening, one of the resident pastors out of town, another unavoidably engaged and the other in poor health, left the agent without clerical help. J. W. Higginbotham, J. P., occupied the chair and made an excellent address. The agent presented the claims of

the Society. Collectors and officers were appointed whom, we trust, will faithfully look after the interests of the Society.

Alexander.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church in which evangelistic services were being held. It was agreed that the agent should address the audience in behalf of the Bible Society and then preach a short sermon. The attendance was large and very appreciative. A deep spiritual feeling prevailed all through the service and the agent was glad of the opportunity of addressing so many earnest workers for Christ. Collection, \$6.60, was devoted to the Bible Society. At a business meeting held before the public service officers and collectors were duly appointed.

Griswold.—Your agent was driven eleven miles to this meeting in a blinding snow-storm and though the storm abated before evening, yet the weather turned so cold that the audience was small. The Rev. J. C. Walker (Methodist) and the Rev. A. Thompson (Presbyterian), rendered the agent valuable service in the meeting. Officers and Collectors were appointed after the address by the agent.

Oak Lake.—This meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The agent regretted that the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist ministers were unavoidably absent, two of them being out of town. The Episcopalian clergyman, the Rev. C. Quinney, rendered excellent aid in the devotional exercises. Six lady collectors were appointed whose districts would extend to some of the country settlements adjacent to the town.

Grenfell.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. The president and secretary, with the local officers, took great interest in the meeting. After the agent's address, Miss Mills sang a sweet solo and a collection of \$4.95 was taken. Officers and collectors for next year were appointed.

Broadview.—The night was intensely cold which prevented the audience being as large as it would have been. Mr. R. Beale, the president, and the Rev. W. Jones, with the agent, addressed the meeting. The Rev. Mr. Ferry, Presbyterian minister, was out of town.

Moosomin.—A large audience greeted the agent at this point. The Rev. J. A. Reddon, B.A., Presbyterian minister, and Mr. R. Kinley, a colporteur for the Bible Society, addressed the meeting. The agent spoke at length on the need of Bible work. The choir rendered good music and a vigorous staff of officers were appointed for the ensuing year.

Qu'Appelle.—Your agent arrived in this town about two o'clock a.m. After a short sleep and breakfast the morning was spent in calling upon the officers of the branch. In the afternoon he waited upon the leading citizens inviting them to the evening meeting and inspected the stock in the depository. The Rev. T. E. Carter (Methodist) and the Rev. Mr. McAllister (Presbyterian) took part with the agent in the meeting. The choir sang several pieces with good effect. The usual number of officers and collectors were appointed, and all present pledged themselves to do all in their power to further the good work.

Indian Head.—Your agent drove to this town from Qu'Appelle. After arrival he inspected the stock in the depository and found it well kept. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. J. K. Welsh, occupied the chair. The Revs. McCulloch and Kinley took part in the meeting. At the close of the agent's address a collection of \$7.40 was taken up and officers and collectors appointed.

Wolseley.—This meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. A. Campbell, who is also president of the branch was very unwell with influenza. The vice-president, Mr. A. B. Bompas, cousin of Bishop Bompas, ably filled the chair. The agent presented the work and claims of the Society, after which the collection was taken up and energetic officers appointed for the ensuing year.

REV. J. G. FALLIS.—*Pelee Island* is fifteen miles from land in the County of Essex, has a population of about seven hundred souls, nearly all protestants. The

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meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church. The evening was dark and rain fell fast, preventing a good attendance. Rev. J. Gander is a very warm friend of the Society. After a profitable conversation about the aims of the Society the officers and collectors were duly appointed.

Gesto.—We had a very successful meeting here. There was a good audience. The Rev. Mr. Clark, pastor of the church, presided, giving a very neat address. The choir did good service. Your agent gave an address on "The Bible, God's own Book, for God's own world." The usual collection was taken up. The collectors will do their work this year in good time.

Tilbury Centre.—The meeting was held in the Presbyteriau Church. There was a large turn-out. Rev. Mr. Hodges, the pastor of the church, opened the meeting and gave a fine address, after which your agent explained the origin and work of the Society. The audience then, by a show of hands, declared their willingness to organize a branch and do all they could to make it a success. Arrangements were also made to establish a depository.

Comber.—This branch is doing well. Your agent found all the officers in their places. The meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church, the Rev. Mr. Elliott, the president, presiding. Mr. Roy Ainslie gave his report of the depository, which was very satisfactory. The officers will do their duty and the collectors their work as soon as possible.

Lambeth.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. A severe snow storm prevented many from coming out to the meeting, but enough were present to make it interesting. The officers were all duly elected and a good report will be forthcoming.

East Westminster.—Meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church by request. The night was stormy and roads filled with snow, which kept many back. However, the officers were re-elected. This is a very vigorous branch.

Fingal.—A large audience assembled in the Methodist Church. Mr. McPherson, who has been president for many years, was on hand promptly and gave words of cheer for the Society. Addresses were given by Rev. Messrs. Sutherland and McAllister. Your agent presented the aim and work of the Society. The meeting was very successful.

West Lorne.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. All the officers were on hand. Rev. Mr. Sinclair, the pastor, opened the meeting. He also gave a short but pointed address. The choir rendered good service. This branch is doing well.

Aldboro.—Rev. Mr. Scott, a firm friend to the Society, opened the meeting and spoke for some length. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Here your agent again had an opportunity of showing the work of the Society, and the people responded with a liberal collection.

Rodney.—In this place we had one of the best meetings. It was held in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Messrs. Scott, Fancher and Bean were present and spoke good words for the Society. The depository is in good working order and in safe hands. All new officers (except one) were elected.

Kintyre.—Here is an old branch still bearing much fruit. The meeting was in the Presbyterian Church; a good spirit prevailed all through. The Rev. Mr. Barnett opened the meeting with singing, prayer and reading a portion of the Scripture. Here your agent spoke to an intelligent people on the subject of Bible Society work. A good collection was given.

Duart and Oxford.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. W. M. Kay, opened with devotional exercises. The Rev. Mr. Currie was present and gave a very fine address. He has been president of the Society for many years. We had a very profitable meeting. A good liberal collection was given.

Buxton.—A meeting had been held by the officers in this place some weeks

prior to my visit, and all the officers were elected in said meeting. When your agent reached the Presbyterian Church, where the meeting was held, he found the people had collected together for the purpose of holding a tea-meeting and a Bible Society meeting the same evening. We had an opportunity of speaking for an hour on the workings and worth of the Society. This branch I presume will do its duty.

Amherstburg.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; had a fair audience. The president, Mr. McGee, was on hand and presided. The Rev. S. J. Allen, the pastor, opened with prayer. Rev. Mr. Wye read the seventy-second Psalm. Your agent then was called on to address the Society, after which the other ministers present gave short and pointed addresses. All the officers were elected. This branch is all alive.

Quinn.—Your agent has visited this place and held a meeting, and after a careful investigation it was thought by all the people best to drop this branch out, for the following reasons: (1) The Western Society has a branch in *Valetta*, a short distance from *Quinn*. (2) A new branch has been formed under the auspices of the Upper Canada Bible Society in the flourishing town of *Tilbury Centre*. The people of *Quinn* thought that these two branches could cover all the ground. However, *Quinn* will do its work this year; collectors are at work now.

REV. J. B. FRASER—*Gorrie.*—A pleasant evening and a pleasant meeting in the Episcopal Church. Good, hearty singing, well led by the organist and choir. Officers efficient and business in good shape. The president, Mr. James Perkins, in the chair. Devotional exercises conducted by the rector, Rev. Mr. Brownlee. Collectors of last year, who had all done their work well, re-appointed. Not much room for growth as the area is small and surrounded on all sides by other branches—six in the township.

Wroxeter.—First snowstorm of the season thinned the attendance. Meeting held in Methodist Church. Thos. Gibson, Esq., M.P.P., the president, conducted the meeting in his genial happy manner. Rev. Mr. Brownlee (Epis.), Rev. Mr. Shaw (Meth.) and Rev. Mr. Davidson (Pres.) spoke briefly and very appropriately. The report of the able secretary, Mr. W. M. Robinson, was very interesting. The interest in the branch seems to be on the increase.

Teeswater.—A blizzard all afternoon and evening prevented even hearty friends from attending the meeting in the Reformed Presbyterian Church. About 60 or 70, however, braved the storm and listened with close attention to the address. All the local ministers, except the Episcopal, were present, and signified their deep interest in the work. The branch is fortunate in having very efficient officers and collectors, and will doubtless maintain its reputation for liberality. Since 1876 the annual contribution has increased from \$39 to \$148. The service of praise was appropriate and hearty.

McIntosh and Belmore.—Good sleighing and a good meeting in the Belmore Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Shaw, and the Presbyterian minister, Rev. Mr. Stewart, were present and commended the work of the Society. The officers had their reports ready and the business of the meeting was transacted most expeditiously. Growth may be hoped for in this vigorous branch.

Lakelet.—The sleighing turned in one day into deep slush. Evening cloudy and threatening, meeting small. Mostly young people from the little village, in which the Methodist Church, where the meeting was held, is the only one. The minister was unable to be present. The officers are efficient and interested, the secretary specially so. The attention was good.

Dromore.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church; well attended. The vice-president, Dr. McKenzie, a staunch friend of the Society, in the chair. Officers and collectors efficient. Business in good shape and expeditiously transacted. Contributions larger year by year. Rev. D. McVicar, pastor of the church, cordially advocated the claims of the cause.

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Newbridge.—A fine evening and good sleighing. Meeting in the Methodist Church. Attendance small. Excellent and appropriate service of song by choir. The work of the Society warmly commended by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Edmunds. Room for and promise of growth. District populous and prosperous.

Fordwich.—A cold, blustering evening. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church some way out of the village and without a pastor; attendance rather small. Interest fair. The president absent through illness. Chair ably filled by Rev. Mr. Edmunds (Methodist). In addition to the agent's address the work and claims of the Society were pressed by the chairman and Rev. Mr. Kiernan (Congregational) and appropriate selections rendered by the church choir. The secretary is specially enthusiastic and will arrange for meetings in the outlying districts.

REV. W. JNO. GARTON—*Manitoba, Emerson.*—A meeting of this branch was held in the Episcopal Church, at 8 p.m. The president, Rev. H. H. Hall having left the town, the chair was taken by the Rev. H. Kenner. In the report, which was read by treasurer Mr. Scott, it was learned that some progress had been made over last year in the matter of subscriptions, but no Bibles had been sold. It was subsequently reported that the subscriptions would have been considerably larger, but for an agent of the American Bible Society, who had conducted evangelistic meetings in the town, and had consequently received subscriptions for that Society. The Rev. H. Kenner very ably filled the chair and with Mr. Camp, Presbyterian student, gave very nice addresses. Officers were elected, etc. Collection, \$5.30.

Morris, Oct. 31st.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, a beautiful building, which is a credit to Morris, and a standing memorial of the late pastor. After the opening religious exercises, the acting president, Rev. J. R. T. Henwood, Episcopalian, briefly introduced the agent, who spoke for about forty-five minutes to a most attentive audience. The reports which were read were more encouraging than last year, and reflected great credit on the energetic lady officers. Miss Davies, the former secy.-treas. having removed from the town, Miss Agnes Stewart was elected to fill her place. As the branch has made progress during the past year under the management of the ladies, it is confidently expected to make still further strides during the coming year. The agent visited the depository, as his custom is wherever he goes, and was delighted to find the Bibles so nicely kept. Collection at meeting, \$2.50.

Killarney, November 2nd.—A nice meeting was held in the English Church, the president, Mr. Bate, in the chair, who gave an excellent address. Great regret was expressed at the past neglect of duty towards the noble Bible Society, and if promises of amendment count for anything, Killarney will make great strides this year. At the conclusion of the agent's address, the Revs. Hy. Lewis and W. R. Johnson spoke. I am sure this branch is to be congratulated in having elected Mr. T. A. Scholes as secy.-treas. Collection, \$2.05.

Crystal City, Nov. 4th.—Meeting in the Methodist Church. Rev. J. H. L. Joslyn, presiding. It was to be regretted that the Society's meeting and annual services of the Presbyterian Church opening came together, as the former suffered a great deal in consequence. The president, with his usual ability, ably filled the chair. Rev. Mr. Campbell, special preacher for the Presbyterian services, led in prayer and after the agent's address the usual collection was taken up, \$3.85. Officers remain the same as last year.

Pilot Mound, Nov. 5th.—As last year, a mass meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. A splendid attendance, Rev. J. Farquharson, as before, occupying the presidential chair. Reports were read, which showed great progress. It is to be regretted that Mr. A. McDougall resigned the treasurership, as he had so very ably filled the position, but it is confidently expected that Mr. James Rankin will prove a worthy successor. It being Sunday evening, and the meeting being held at the close of the other services your agent had the entire speaking platform to himself, the resident ministers being amongst his worthy listeners. Pilot Mound is to be

congratulated in possessing such an earnest Bible Society worker as Mr. Farquharson, its able president. Collection, \$4.50.

Morden.—A meeting was held in the Baptist Church, Rev. M. C. Rumball in the chair. After the usual exercises and business routine were performed, addresses were delivered by Revs. Messrs. T. H. Walton, H. J. Borthwick, and McLatchey. Rev. T. H. Walton, Episcopalian, was elected president for the ensuing year. The attendance was small, owing, it is supposed, to a tea-meeting which was held on the previous evening. Collection, \$4.65.

Cartwright, Nov. 7th.—On my way from Morden to Cartwright the Rev. A. W. Wood, of Clearwater, joined me, and assisted at the meeting. This was the initial meeting at Cartwright; last year circumstances prevented the holding of a meeting here. The Presbyterian Church was lent for the occasion, and the student in charge, Mr. I. N. Guthrie, presided. After my address, the Revs. C. H. Houghton, and A. W. Wood very ably and energetically followed, enforcing what had been said. As a result it was decided to resuscitate the branch. Morris Watts, president; Fred Brooks, secy.-treas; A. Laughlin, depository. A collection was taken up which amounted to \$3.20. Thanks are due to Revs. Messrs Wood and Houghton and Mr. I. N. Manitou, Nov. 8th.—A business meeting was held prior to the general meeting, when the programme and other preliminaries were prepared. The Baptist Church was placed at the disposal of the committee, and in it we met. The Rev. W. Cavan, president, gave an admirable opening address; the agent followed and spoke at length. The reports were fairly encouraging; Revs. N. Hewitt, and Spence also spoke and urged upon the meeting the great necessity of taking a greater interest in the work of the Society; officers were elected. The president thought it advisable to elect someone to succeed him, and in accordance with his wish, the Rev. N. Hewitt, Episcopalian, was elected as his successor. A Committee meeting was held at the close, and various school districts were mapped out, and collectors appointed to canvass them for subscriptions. The committee was most enthusiastic, and expect to largely augment the amount usually sent to the Society by the united effort of all the churches. Collection at public meeting, \$3.30.

Boissevain, Nov. 9th.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church; a fairly representative gathering, though not large. Rev. G. C. Hill, rector of Boissevain, in the chair, who, with the Rev. Mr. Fisher, ably supported the agent. It appears that Bossevain has been unable to support the Society this last year to the same extent as in former times, but this is no criterion that the interest has fallen off. As with many parts of the Province, so with this point, the crops have not been up to the average, and as prices for grain have been so low, it is with the greatest difficulty that the farmers have given what they have. With better times a larger subscription will be sent to support the work of the Bible Society. Collection, \$4.85. Rev. P. Fisher succeeds Rev. G. C. Hill as president.

Gretna, Nov. 13th.—A meeting was arranged at this point for Oct. 23rd, but on both occasions that the secretary was corresponded with, he failed to receive the messages sent. However, it was finally arranged to hold a meeting in the Presbyterian Church on Nov. 13th. On this occasion the Rev. H. H. Evert occupied the chair. Gretna is one of our best branches in Manitoba. The Mennonites have a great love for the Bible and purchase a large number. Preceding the collection (\$5 80) officers were elected, two ladies were elected to fill the positions of treasurer and secretary. Mr. C. Soper, the former energetic treasurer, who made it his special study to get funds for the Society, has unfortunately left the town. Mr. W. Rempel, although he has resigned the office of secretary, will not cease to take an interest in the work.

REV. JAMES GRANT—*Caistor*.—This branch was visited by me on Thursday, Dec. 14th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. In spite of a stormy

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Caistorville, Friday, 15th.—The evening was one of the stormiest of the winter. Not many present, but the president assured me that the receipts would not be less than last year.

Beamsville, 16th and 17th.—I reached Beamsville on Saturday, and spent the whole day in visiting the resident ministers and prominent people in the town to enkindle new enthusiasm in Bible Society work. Preached in the Presbyterian Church on Sunday morning, and in the Baptist Church in the evening. Had the opportunity of reaching hundreds, more than I would have at ordinary meetings. The testimony was that a new birth was coming to the Society's work in Beamsville.

Campden, 18th.—The branch in this place is in a most vigorous state. The president, Mr. J. Hipple, is the right man, and has a good staff around him. Receipts are larger than last year.

Winona.—Visited here on Tuesday, 19th. The interest keeps up, and the branch has a perfect host in Mr. J. G. Whittaker, who, in addition to increasing interest in the good work is the largest contributor to the Society's funds. The meeting was held at Stoney Creek.

REV. W. G. HANNA—*Etobicoke, South*.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Lambton. The change of place was not an advantage, as owing to local causes the meeting was small. The president, Mr. A. McPherson, occupied the chair. The reports presented showed the Society to be in a flourishing condition. The collectors had completed their work and the money was in the treasurer's hands for allocation at the annual meeting.

Weston.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Walter Reid, the president, occupied the chair. Addresses were delivered by Rev. J. Loede, and the agent. Owing to the fact that Weston is so near Toronto, and consequently sales at the depository were small, it was arranged to close the depository.

Humber Summit.—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Emery. The attendance was fairly good. There was much interest taken in the agent's account of the work of the Society the past year. This branch is in a flourishing condition and promises well.

Woodbridge and Pine Grove.—The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Dr. Thom, ex-president, occupied the chair. The claims of the Society were pleaded by the agent. Rev. T. Fenwick, secretary of the branch, and Rev. Mr. Brown, pastor of the Methodist Church, also contributed to the success of the meeting. Very efficient service was rendered by the choir of the church. The work of this branch is not so prosperous as might be desired, but it is hoped a new era of prosperity is before it.

Etobicoke, North.—Attendance of the annual meeting small, because of a severe storm and snow blockade. Those present were interested in the record of the Society's work and claims, and it is expected that this branch will not fall behind its good record of past years.

Bolton.—Annual meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Attendance good. This branch is well managed. The depository is well kept, and the community interested in the work. Revs. Mr. McLaren, Presbyterian, and Mr. Wood, Methodist ministers, assisted the agent in making the meeting useful in disseminating information about the important work of the Society.

Caledon, East, and Mono Road.—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The pastors in the community, owing to sickness demanding their attention, were not present. The agent addressed the meeting.

Mono Mills.—The attendance at the annual meeting was not large, but the people were interested. The pastors of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches took part with the agent in the meeting. This branch has an interesting record, and it is believed that it will make considerable advance.

Charleston.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was quite small owing to a severe rain storm, and thaw had set in during the day, the severest of the winter. The pastor of the church and the secretary of the Society took active part in the meeting. The agent gave an account of the work of the Society, and arrangements were made for the vigorous prosecution of the work of this branch during the current year.

Barrie.—Owing to the fact that other meetings were being held the same evening, the meeting of this branch held in the Reformed Episcopal Church was not large. Judge Ardagh presided. The claims of the Society were presented by the agent and resident clergymen. The reports show this branch to be in a strong and flourishing condition.

Uxbridge.—A fair congregation assembled in the Methodist Church at the annual meeting. The pastor of the church, Rev. J. Anderson, conducted the devotional exercises. Addresses were delivered by Rev. J. W. Silcox, of the Baptist Church, and the agent of the Society. The depository is in good condition. Arrangements were made to canvass the town more thoroughly this year than heretofore, for subscriptions.

Claremont.—Notwithstanding the bad state of the roads a good congregation was assembled in the Baptist Church at the annual meeting. Addresses were delivered by the agent and resident pastors, and a good interest awakened. As no contribution was sent from this branch last year, arrangements were made for a thorough canvass of this community in the interest of the Bible Society this year.

REV. DR. HARPER—*Rugby.*—On Sabbath, the 15th October, at Edgar, in the Methodist Church a.m., and at Rugby, in the Congregational Church p.m., in the interests of the Bible Society. On Monday evening, the 16th, the annual meeting was held. President Horne, in the chair. The secretary and depository with us. The Rev. Mr. Dobson, Presbyterian, gave us a good speech, and the agent followed in an address of forty-five minutes. The branch is living and prosperous, although the sales for the year were not numerous, owing to the nearness to Orillia (six miles). Officers and collectors were appointed, and it was promised that a faithful and early canvass of the surrounding country would be made.

Edgar.—The meeting at Edgar was held on Tuesday evening, the 17th. The attendance was an average one. The Rev. Mr. Goffin, president, was unable to be with us. Rev. D. D. Franks, Methodist, came four miles to attend the anniversary, and gave us a good and practical address. The agent spoke forty minutes, and received good attention. The report of sales was satisfactory. The depository is well and carefully kept. Mr. Miller is a loyal servant of the Society, and looks carefully after its interests as entrusted to him. The customary appointment of officers, collectors, etc., was made, and it was urged on all concerned to make a full and early canvass of the field.

Gravenhurst.—This branch was organized last year. The agent's visit was made on the 30th October. The sales were good, and the free contributions liberal. The Presbyterian Church is at present without a pastor, which is not to the advantage of the Bible cause; but the Rev. R. P. Bowles, B.D., Methodist, in whose church the meeting was held, gave every needed help in hospitality, address, etc. The agent did his best, and we had what is usually styled "a good meeting." Officers and collectors were re-appointed. Strong hopes are indulged that this branch will bring forth "much good fruit."

Bracebridge was visited on the 31st October. The attentions, hospitality, etc., of Sheriff Bettes, the president, were as "aforetime." The Rev. Dr. Clark, Presbyterian, Rev. E. S. Rowe, Methodist, and Rev. J. Blatherwick, Baptist, gave hearty support in every possible way. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and the audience was appreciated. The burden of speech fell to the agent, who spoke fifty minutes, and had fine attention. The appointment of officers and collectors followed. The depository is well supplied and is properly kept.

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Huntsville.—Meeting was held on the 1st Nov. The W. C. T. A. had a festival that evening, which affected the attendance at ours. The Revs Messrs. Sieveright, Presbyterian, and Richard, Methodist, attended, and gave acceptable help. Mr. Wright, president, and Mr. Silverwood, secretary, are true friends of the Bible cause. Good financial returns for the year.

Coldwater and Waubaushene.—The agent's visit was made on 13th Nov. The Rev. Mr. Kemp, Methodist, kindly met me, entertained me, and went with me to each officer of the Society, and urged them personally in the interests of the Society. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, with an average attendance. Assisted by the Revs. Kemp and Sheppard. The agent addressed them with earnestness. Officers and collectors were appointed in the usual way. By a spontaneous act, and a unanimous vote, these two places are to become independent branches. The ministers promised that for the present year the canvass of each place would be faithfully made for free contributions.

Elmwale.—On Sabbath, 19th Nov., had the services of the agent in two Presbyterian Churches and in the Methodist Church. The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church (still without a pastor), on Monday evening, 20th, and was fairly attended. The agent had no ministerial help, but Mr. McTaggart, an elder of the Collingwood Presbyterian Church, gave valuable aid in conducting the devotional exercises, and in presiding. The agent spoke fifty minutes, and received good attention. The collection, \$7.63, was large for the number present. The officers of the branch are all exceptionally well fitted for their positions. The depository is well kept—at present needing additional supplies.

Penetanguishene.—Meeting was held on 21st Nov., and was a decided advance on last year. Mr. Charles A. Nettleton, the depository, hospitably entertained me. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, recently supplied with a pastor, Rev. Mr. Johnston. Attendance fair. Rev. Peter Campbell, president, in the chair. The agent did his best, assisted by ministers Campbell and Johnston. Results gratifying in collection, promised contributions. The depository is well supplied—the books are kept in view, and are well preserved.

Midland.—Meeting, through failure of notice to reach the officers, was postponed from the 14th October to the 22nd November. It is always a pleasure to hold a Bible meeting in Midland. Its very competent and enthusiastic president, and other equally excellent officers, supply an inspiration to an agent. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; but its location is not so central as to supply an advantage on that point. Its pastor, too, was disabled by a hurt, which kept him and his family at home. The Rev. D. James, president, ably filled the chair, and gave us a good speech. The collection was the largest we had this season thus far. The depository, well supplied, and well kept, now passes into quarters which, it is hoped, will command a wider observation, and secure more sales. The agent was hospitably entertained by J. H. Parkhill, Esq.

Minesing was visited on the 23rd Nov. Rev. Isaac Baker met me at the station, and conveyed me to Mr. Orchard's, president of this branch, whose kindness in every way was ample. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was the largest that I saw this season. The agent had to give more than the usual time to speaking, as he had no helper here. The collection was respectable, \$4.21. The depository was examined and found in good condition. Officers and collectors appointed in the customary way.

Hawkestone, on the Northern and North-Western Railway, fourteen miles from Barrie, eight from Orillia, and about nine from Rugby, is a new branch. On the 30th Nov. the agent held a meeting here, and addressed the public gathering, ably assisted by the Rev. A. T. Ingram, Methodist, after which the branch was duly organized. A suitable person for depository was found; other officers were appointed. Much hope is indulged in reference to the prosperity of this branch.

Orillia.—Meeting held on Tuesday evening, 3rd April, in the Methodist Church. Attendance larger than for several years past. The Rev. Dr. Gray, president, took the chair at 8 o'clock, and presided with ability and kindness. The Rev. Canon Green opened the meeting with prayer, and afterwards gave a brief, but sympathetic speech. So did also the Rev. W. R. Barker, pastor of the church, and Rev. Dean Jones. Mr. Armstrong, a colporteur of the Society, gave a practical and appropriate address. The agent gave an outline view of the present position of the Parent Society, and of the claims of its great Canadian Auxiliary, the Upper Canada Bible Society. The secretary, treasurer, and depository reported favourably, touching the financial condition and prospects of this branch.

REV. S. G. LIVINGSTON, B.A.—*New Hamburg.*—The meeting here was held in the Methodist Church with a fairly good attendance. A union choir had been arranged; Rev. Mr. Beilby, the pastor of the church, was present. A good staff of officers was appointed, and the collectors to do the work of the coming year. The depository is in good condition and well kept.

Preston, November 29th.—Revs. H. F. Thomas (Presbyterian), J. Edmonds (Anglican) and P. Weller, were present, and proved good friends to the Society. It was the verdict of all that a better meeting was never held in Preston, and a good set of officers was appointed who will be sure to succeed. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was small on account of rain, and many persons ill.

Hespeler, November 30th.—Rev. Mr. Freed, the president, took charge of the meeting in his own (Baptist) Church. There was a good staff of ministers present, all in sympathy with the work. Rev. Mr. Harvey (Methodist) was appointed president for the coming year. Revs. Strachan (Presbyterian) and Gager (Evangelical) gave assistance. This is a strong branch. Last year they raised over \$90. A good representative committee was appointed to assist the officers in the work. The collectors will be able to make a good report.

East Puslinch.—The weather was stormy, and roads full of snow. A fair attendance was present in the Methodist Church. Rev. W. Robinson, the president, took charge of the meeting. There was good interest shown, and a determination to do good work for the cause. Your agent spent Saturday and Sunday on this field, preaching three times in the interest of the Society.

Bloomington, Dec. 4th.—There was no minister present, but the president, Mr. George Carr, conducted the meeting with success. The address of your agent was listened to with rapt attention, and two young men were appointed to take the place of secretary and treasurer, and their sisters volunteered to do the collecting. They will surely succeed.

Winterbourne, Dec. 5th.—Rev. A. M. Hamilton, M.A., is the guardian of this branch, and secures its success. The secretary, Mr. Durrant, who had not missed a meeting for seventeen years, was absent on account of sickness. The attendance was reduced by the prevailing epidemic. We had excellent music at this meeting. This branch is doing well.

Elmira, Dec. 6th.—The agent last year said, "It is a pleasure to visit this branch," so we found it. The officers are full of energy, and had all their reports in good order. Here is a very strong board of directors of the best men in this prosperous town. Revs. Hall and Thomas were present. The depository is doing well, having sold last year \$38.47 worth of Bibles. If all branches were like this our cause would prosper.

Hawkesville, Dec. 7th.—The meeting was held in the United Brethren Church on a typical winter evening. Revs. Armstrong and Showers were present, and gave your agent able assistance. This branch is not strong, but is doing good work. In this village the folly of too many Protestant churches is apparent. If all were closed but one, the work could be as well done.

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Linwood, Dec. 8th.—The main pillar of this branch is the president, Mr. A. Bonner, who was ill and unable to attend. Rev. F. Crowle, B.A., presided. This branch will need care and attention or it will lose its usefulness. Your agent was through a district in which he was a stranger, meeting only three former acquaintances in two weeks; but the kindness of the people and their readiness to help your agent makes him acknowledge a debt of gratitude to all,

REV. J. F. McLAREN, B.D.—*Kimberley* was visited on the 23rd of October, when I was the guest of Rev. Mr. Waddell. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and notwithstanding religious services being held in the town hall, there was a good attendance. After addresses from Mr. Waddell and myself, the meeting with perfect unanimity resolved to organize as a branch. A very efficient and enthusiastic set of officers were elected, from whom successful service may be expected. Doubtless the new branch will have a good record.

Flesherton.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, but although the weather was highly favourable, the attendance was small. All the resident ministers were present with one unavoidable exception. No meetings had been held by the officers during the year, and no collecting done and consequently no report to be made. All present felt keenly this state of affairs, and entered into solemn obligations to see that the stigma should be removed during next year. I am confident the new officers will leave nothing undone to make this branch more prosperous. I did some visiting in the village on Saturday, and preached on Sunday in the Presbyterian Church in the village and at Eugenia.

Priceville.—On reaching this place I ascertained that, from oversight, the meeting had not been announced in the Methodist Church, but by visiting many of the people in the village and getting the teachers to announce it in the public school, probably the largest meeting of the branch ever held took place in the Presbyterian Church. That warm-hearted friend of the Bible Society, Rev. Mr. McLeod, presided. The reports presented clearly indicated that the branch here is alive and flourishing. Officers for ensuing year were elected and after addresses by your agent and others, the interesting meeting was brought to a close.

Maxwell.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Hudson, presiding, none of the other resident ministers being present. Affairs here were in a somewhat similar condition to *Flesherton*, the meeting having the same result, viz.: a determination by earnest effort to advance the cause of the Bible Society. Mr. Hudson is the right man for the place.

McIntyre.—The Rev. Mr. Hudson kindly drove your agent to McIntyre, where the meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The meeting was large and enthusiastic. After your agent gave an address on "The Bible as the Word of God," and making a lengthened explanation of the aims, operations and results of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it was decided to organize as a branch. There is a large district here for which the depository will be very helpful, and in which good work may be done for the Society. This branch starts well and a bright future is before it. Their enthusiasm is not to be measured by the small amount of collection, for unfortunately it was not announced on Sunday when meeting was intimated, and so many came unprovided.

Markdale.—The meeting was held in the English Church, Rev. Mr. Hind, in absence of Rev. Mr. Forrest, through illness, presiding. It was perhaps the best attended meeting of the branch ever held in this place. The business reports indicated faithful and prosperous work during the past year. Mr. Hind was elected president for ensuing year, and as far as I can judge next year will be one of the most prosperous in the history of this branch. The collection amounted to \$4.60. The branch loses a faithful servant by the removal of Mr. Moffat from this place.

Holland Centre.—The day appointed for the meeting was very stormy, a heavy fall of snow having taken place, and to make matters worse two other meetings were

being held the same evening in the village. However, Mr. McLeish, Evangelist, kindly postponed his services, and came with his audience to our meeting in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Husband, presiding. The reports indicated that satisfactory work had been done during the past year. After your agent addressed the meeting, Mr. McLeish gave a very interesting address, which brought the meeting to a close. Mr. Norton, the new treasurer, will look well after the finances.

Desboro.—When I left Holland Centre for Desboro there was a blinding snow-storm from the west. What with missing the road, and the heaviness of wheeling, it took us four hours to travel the twelve miles. It was quite dark when I reached the village and as none had seen me drive in, they thought I had not come and so there would be no meeting. When I reached the town hall there was no one present but myself. Shortly afterwards, Mr. Palmer, the depository, put in an appearance with Mr. Pike, secretary. These gentlemen soon gathered quite a few of the villagers into the hall, when the business was proceeded with. The reports were satisfactory.

Chatsworth.—When your agent reached this place he found that the night appointed for the meeting was unsuitable on account of an entertainment in connection with the Forester's Society. The secretary had written me to that effect, but unfortunately the card did not come into my hand in time, so there was nothing for it but to make a second visit to Chatsworth on the following Monday. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather there was a large turnout to the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. The various reports were presented and adopted—officers appointed for the ensuing year. A vote of thanks to Mr. Ferguson was tendered for his able services in the past. By his removal from the neighbourhood the branch loses a very able officer. Rev. Mr. McAlpine and your agent addressed the meeting, after which it was brought to a close.

Kilsyth.—The people of Kilsyth proved their loyalty to the Society by turning out in good numbers to the meeting in the Disciple's Church, though the night was wet and stormy, Rev. Mr. McNabb, presided in the absence of Rev. Mr. Ledyard. This branch makes satisfactory reports, which is not surprising, as it has the right sort of officers at its head. Their purpose is to do even better next year.

Walter's Falls.—Meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Meyer presiding. On account of the wild and stormy night only a few persons were present yet the business was proceeded with in a very satisfactory way. The depository is now in charge of Mr. Bonnell, and is in good shape. After appointing of officers and hearing the agent's address the meeting was brought to a close.

Rocklyn was visited on the 14th Nov. with a view to organizing, but owing to various causes no meeting was held. On account of the storm the Sunday before very few heard of the meeting, and the few who had heard were kept back by wrong information that the hall had been secured for a meeting of the United Workmen's Society. Perhaps a second effort would be successful.

Kemble was reached on the 20th, both the president and secretary had done everything possible to secure a large meeting. It took place in the Presbyterian Church, but owing to a fierce storm many were hindered from coming out; still the meeting was large and successful. Mr. Jas. Shaw, leader of the choir, furnished excellent music. Reports were read indicating the branch to be in a healthy and prosperous condition. The officers were re-elected, after which addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Savage and your agent. This brought a very pleasant meeting to a close.

North Sydenham—Your agent was invited by the branch officers to make it a visit. The evening, the 22nd, was very wet and disagreeable, yet a goodly number met in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, Annan. Dr. Fraser, presided. The financial report was read, indicating good work during past year. All the office-bearers were re-elected. The president then made a few excellent remarks, followed by an address from your agent, when the meeting was brought to a close. I came away with the impression that this branch is a model of thoroughness and efficiency.

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REV. J. G. MANLY.—No year of work for the Bible Society since 1870 has been pleasanter to myself than the last. The winter was less severe than the year before—January peculiarly fine. The attendance was generally good; the friends of the Society were everywhere helpful and kind. The uses of the Bible and the Bible Society were found to be interesting and attractive themes; and despite any agricultural, commercial or financial stringency, the service and necessity of the Bible Society in the work of the world's evangelization were heartily recognized.

Alliston, Thornton, Mara, Beaverton, as before. *Rosemont* meeting was held for the first time out of the village and in the Presbyterian Church. Sundry changes in the *West Essa* Society appear to require a change of centre.

The third visitation of *Flinton*, on the way to Kingston, unlike the storminess of the previous visitations, was specially interesting and promising. *Cataraqui* audience improved. *Odessa* large. In picturesque and peaceful *Wilton* the meeting was well attended. *Bath* depository renewed and well kept. *Amherst Island* much the same.

Sydenham committee attended by Episcopal and Methodist ministers, preparatory to the Sabbath services of next day, and for the following action of a Society now well organized and recognized. *Harrowsmith, Garden Island and Battersea* visited as usual. *Sunbury* Presbyterian church well filled by all denominations; appointing five collectors. From *Inverary* meeting, in a very stormy day, to *Wolfe Island* for next day's Sabbath services, rendered impracticable at the "Foot" by the storm, that did not however prevent a good union meeting at the village in the evening.

Cookstown served again this year by the collecting work of Mr. Manning, who has so often proved his attachment and efficiency. *Beeton* well reporting. From *Frankford and Trenton to Cherry Valley, Milford, Bloomfield, Wellington, Brighton.*

Colborne doing well under its excellent presidency—much better than for a long time. *Castleton* better than last year. Three good meetings in the *Percy* branch. Better than year before at *Vernonville*, followed by *Grafton*. Sunday services desired next year for these two branches.

Roseneath and Harwood are doing better apart than together. Good meeting for *Coldsprings and Camborne*, after the Harwood meeting amid the almost matchless scenery of *Gore's Landing*.

Campbellford is doing well. Good meeting at *Stirling*, though in the deep shadow of the decease of Dr. Boulter, so well known and so deservedly esteemed, and who had so long and faithfully served the Bible cause.

From a good meeting at *Moir* to the anniversary of *Roslin and Thomasburg* for the first time in Bethel Church, where Mr. Newton gave ten dollars yearly to the Society while he lived. Mrs. Newton is like-minded. The branch is now reorganized for the better development of *Roslin*.

Two good congregations and services at *Deseronto*, and good meetings at *Shannonville, Melrose, Pickering, Dumbarton and Highland Creek* to be revisited for three Sunday services on account of obstructive storm. *Ashburn* to be revisited on Sunday. A stormy Sunday for *Greenwood, Kinsale and Brougham*: second service impracticable; improved attendance at the third.

Best meeting for years at *Bond Head*, with two ministers and good report. *Unionville* deferred; *Goodwood* held; *Greenbank* disadvantaged by weather and roads, "but not destroyed."

Three Sunday services at *Cannington*. *Sandford* (at Quaker Hill) reached through a great storm, but necessarily postponed. *Manilla*, stormy but the meeting good. *Port Perry*, postponed in a storm. Good meetings at *Prince Albert* and *Sonya*.

Best meeting for many years at *Port Perry* as postponed. *Newmarket* meeting, though never numerically large, was earnest and interesting. Satisfactory arrangements at *Keswick* for collecting. Good attendance and report as usual at *Laskey*.

Capital meeting at *Woodville*. Weather at *Eldon* ungenial, but meeting held and collectors appointed; and kindly conveyed by the minister next day through the storm to *Glenarm*, which turned out like *Eldon*. Not disappointed at *Cambray*; *Bobcaygeon*, excellent. *Fenelon Falls*, without its excellent Secretary (sometime deceased) and not well notified in consequence, was, for the time being, below its antecedents.

Two union discourses and a presidential address at *Keene*, well attended, with \$15.39 collections and with fair Scripture sales, gave evidence of unabated sympathy and service.

Warsaw, of local necessity, postponed. *Tamworth* subscribing and providing for collecting; *Newburgh* doing likewise and attending well in stormy weather. Both *Tweed* and *Norwood* good. *Hastings*, with two union services and good report, better than before. *Baltimore* reached, but stormstayed.

From a good meeting at *Downsview*, equally helping the Quebec Auxiliary and this, to well-officered *Aurora*; thence to *Scarboro'*, *Highland Creek* and *Dunbarton* for three Sabbath services and discourses; and thence to *Richmond Hill*, *Thornhill* and *Unionville*. Three Sabbath services in the field of *West Darlington*. Totally hindered at *Hampton* for a public meeting by a fierce blizzard; and diminished at *Enniskillen* by drifted roads. A good season in *Hope* and at *Newtonville* and *Kendal*. Encouraging services on Sunday at *Bethany* with about \$40 of receipts.

Very successful meeting at *Berlin*, after a day on the road from 6.55 a.m. at *Bethany*. The postponed meeting at *Quaker Hill* (in *Sandford* branch) turned out well, as did the meetings for *Omeme* and for *Springville* at *Fraserville*.

After 16 miles to *Warsaw* by stage (the coldest journey of the winter), good congregations together with free contributions of \$34.10, and arrangements for northward enlargement of the field next year (D.V). *Garden Hill* visited but meeting hindered by other arrangements. The good branch of *South Monaghan* and *Cavan* gave both a good report and a good meeting, followed by a good meeting at *Millbrook* in the Anglo Episcopal schoolroom.

Sabbath services at *Queensville* and renewal of a Society there. *Temperanceville* visited for inspection of stock at *Springhill* and for annual meeting at *Eversley*, one of the three anniversary localities. Good meeting at *Markham* notwithstanding a political gathering. Three Sunday services in the *Ashburn* field, besides Saturday inspection of depository. Thence to *Pontypool* for the best week-day attendance as yet, and for inspecting and listing the well-kept stock. The *Mt. Pleasant* meeting to be followed by collecting. *Cavanville* re organized. *Oakwood* and *Little Britain* visited as usual. *Eglinton* audience, "fit though few," concluding the work of the year, in which I am thankful, as oft before, for over-ruling love and guardianship, for exemption from sickness and accidents and from any disappointing. "Thou crownest the year with Thy goodness, and Thy paths drop fatness."

REV. ARTHUR MURPHY visited *Botany* on November the 21st. Held the meeting in the Presbyterian Church, which was very well attended. The Rev. Mr. Becket, the minister in charge, was present and gave a short address, urging his people and other denominations to take a greater interest in the work of the Society. The agent then addressed the meeting, which was brought to a close by singing and prayer.

Chatham Township.—This place was visited by the agent on Tuesday, Oct. 26th. The meeting was held in *Chalmers' Church*. The chair was occupied by Mr. Croll, as his father, the president of the branch, was unable to be present. The only address was that given by the agent.

Dover.—The meeting here was held in the Methodist Church, on the last of October. Mr. Owen was appointed chairman for the meeting. The business and election of officers being completed the agent then addressed the meeting. The attendance was very good, though the ministers of the place and several others were prevented from being present by unavoidable circumstances.

Mr. Freeborne read a portion of the first chapter of 1st Peter. The business was then transacted, after which addresses were given by the Rev. Canon Hincks, Rev. Mr. Henderson and the agent. The attendance was not as good as might be expected.

Dawn Mills was visited on Tuesday, Nov. 21st. The night was very wet, which caused the audience to be small. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Addresses were given by the Incumbent (the Rev. Mr. Jones) and the agent.

The annual meeting of the Chatham branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held in the First Presbyterian Church on Monday evening, Jan 8th, 1894. Rev. Dr. Battisby occupied the chair. After the election of officers, appointment of collectors and other business in connection with the branch were disposed of, addresses were delivered by Mr. H. Macaulay, Rev. Mr. McIntyre, Rev. Mr. Sowerley and the agent. The Revs. R. McCosh and W. G. Larken were also present. The attendance was good and the collection a liberal one.

REV. CHARLES R. MORROW—*Nanticoke*, Oct. 9th.—A good audience assembled in the English Church. Mr. Lew, the president, occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Garden, of the English Church, gave an interesting address. Officers were elected and collectors appointed. I hope for better returns this year.

Cheapside.—A fair audience in the Methodist Church. Dr. Sherk presided with his usual ability. Rev. W. L. Sheridan (Methodist), took part in the meeting. Your agent received an attentive hearing. Mr. Silverthorn, a good friend of the Society, who had dropped out of the secretaryship for a year was again elected secretary. The depository is well kept.

Selkirk.—Rev. A. R. Best, in the absence of the president, was appointed chairman of the meeting. David Duff, public school teacher, was elected president. The choir led in the singing. Mr. Derby is a good secretary. I found the depository well kept. The County Sabbath School Association was in session at a village not far away, which interfered with the attendance at our meeting. Selkirk will do well.

South Cayuga.—The (fortieth) anniversary of the South Cayuga branch was held in the Evangelical Association Church. The president, Mr. V. Honsberger, in the chair. Excellent singing by united choirs. Good addresses by Revs. Messrs. Taylor and Haush. The depository is kept in first class order by Mr. A. Bilger. Mr. C. A. Drake makes a good secretary. The people in this section take a great interest in the Society. I was much pleased with what I saw and heard.

Cayuga.—It was pouring rain at the time the people should gather, which made the audience small. The president, Hon. Dr. Baxter, was in his place. The Rev. D. Chalmers the pastor of the church, conducted the opening exercises. The officers were re-elected and collectors appointed. Dr. Baxter and Rev. D. Chalmers gave addresses, that showed the Society had a warm place in their hearts. The officers are all men of good standing in the community.

Dunville.—Saturday, Sunday and Monday I spent here. I preached in the Presbyterian Church in the morning, and in the Methodist Church at night, in the interests of the Society. We had a fair audience at the annual meeting, in the

Methodist Church, on Monday night. Rev. T. Albert Moore, pastor of the church, conducted the opening exercises. In the absence of the president he was appointed chairman. Mr. Moore, who, by the way, is an old agent of the Society, conducted the meeting with his usual push and ability. The secretary gave an able report. Rev. T. A. Moore was elected president, and the other officers were elected; collectors were chosen. The Presbyterian minister, Mr. McKnight, and Mr. Moore gave excellent addresses. A hearty vote of thanks with an invitation to return next year was tendered your agent. Mr. Harrison is a model depository. The choir of the church furnished music.

Caulfield.—Small audience here. Mr. R. Harvey, agent of the Grand Trunk Railway, in the chair. Mr. Mills, the secretary, gave his report. Rev. D. Chalmers, who is pastor of the Methodist Church here, where the meeting was held, was unable to be present. The people in this neighborhood do not seem to appreciate the Bible Society as they ought. The depository told me he had found several homes without a copy of the Scriptures, and this among a church-going people.

Port Colborne.—Arrived on the noon train to find no meeting announced. By the aid of the public school, and a notice in the post-office, we got a small audience in the Methodist Church. Rev. A. Hamilton, B.A., and Rev. Mr. Bonny, were present. Rev. Mr. Bonny (English Church), was elected president. Mrs. S. McCoppin, secretary, Mr. John Young, treasurer, and Mr. H. Stanley, depository, I am persuaded these officers will do the work the Society expects of them.

Ridgeway.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. In the absence of the president the pastor, the Rev. J. E. S. Baillie, took the chair. This branch did nothing last year. I think the work will be done this year. Officers elected and collectors appointed.

Fort Erie and Victoria.—This branch did well last year. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. J. E. Ruse (Methodist), was present and gave a short address. Officers re-elected. The secretary's post-office address is International Bridge. A temperance meeting held a short distance away interfered with the attendance. I believe this branch will do well.

REV. H. McQUARRIE—*Ashfield.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. Hugh McIntosh, president, in the chair. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Rose, gave a short and interesting address. This is a good branch, and although the meeting was not large, the people give evidence, by their contributions, that a deep interest is taken in the work of the Bible Society.

Pine River and Amberley.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. J. McFarlane, who is also president, occupied the chair. He is an earnest advocate of the Society. The night was wet and exceedingly dark, consequently there was a small attendance. This is a weak branch, but the people in proportion to their number contribute fairly well.

Ripley.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. A. Sutherland, pastor and president, in the chair, gave an interesting and practical address. Your agent's remarks were listened to with close attention, and he will be very much surprised if the contributions for the year will not be clear evidence of deep interest in the work of the Society. The people of this section revere the word, and it is natural to expect that their love will be shown in a tangible way.

Bervie.—Meeting was held in the Episcopal Church. The Rev. J. Gilpin, (Methodist), occupied the chair, and the pastor conducted the devotional exercises, and gave a short and earnest address. Under the direction of their efficient secretary, Mr. W. Henderson, the officers had everything in readiness, and a good meeting followed. Close attention was given and an excellent spirit pervaded the audience. The choir greatly added to the interest of the meeting by rendering several pieces of music.

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Armow.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. F. Robertson, president, in the chair. The pastor, Rev. Dr. McKay, conducted the opening exercises. He is a warm friend of the Society. Though the night was wet, there was a pretty good attendance, and all gave close attention to the agent's address.

Underwood.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. In the absence of the pastor the Rev. Mr. Fitzpatrick (Presbyterian), conducted the devotional exercises. We had a fair attendance and a good meeting. Mr. W. Hunter ably filled the chair, and is a warm friend of the Society.

North Bruce.—The meeting was held in the Church of the United Brethren. The place was not central and the attendance not large, but we had a good meeting. All the officers take an active interest in the work of the Society.

Southampton.—We met in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Mr. Tolmie, pastor, and the Rev. Mr. Wass (Methodist), both earnest workers in every good, were present, and aided in making the meeting a success. The attendance was not large, but all showed, by their close attention, that they were interested in the addresses given. Mr. Rusk, president, occupied the chair with much acceptance, and it was with regret that his resignation was accepted, which, owing to ill-health, he pressed and asked as a favor that he might be relieved.

REV. W. A. J. MARTIN—*Streetsville*.—Meeting of this branch held Dec. 4th, 1893, in the Methodist Church. Owing to lack of announcement by the local officers, and the prevalence of La Grippe, the meeting was very small. Revs. Tibb and Keam were present, and expressed themselves willing to hold some extra meeting in order that the work of this branch may not fall behind.

Georgetown, Dec. 5th.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. La Grippe again received the blame for small attendance. The local clergy were present and took part in the meeting.

Cheltenham, Dec. 7th.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Campbell is working hard in this branch, and the young people seem interested. Meeting small.

Milton, Dec. 12th.—Owing to the energetic work of Rev. Mr. Haddow, one of the largest audiences ever seen at a Bible Society in Milton, assembled in the town hall. Your agent was listened to with attentiveness throughout, and much interest was manifested. This is one of the best branches in the district.

Derry West, Dec. 13th.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Was fairly well attended. A good spirit seems to prevail, and the younger men are being trained to carry on the good work when their elders have done.

Cooksville, Dec. 14th.—Meeting held this year in the Presbyterian Church, at Port Credit. Attendance was very small owing to a number of local causes. Better things are hoped for next year.

Norval, Dec. 18th, 19th.—This year, as last, an extra meeting was held at Glenwilliams, which was specially interesting from the number of young people who were present. Revs. Argo and Gow were present and took part. At Norval the meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Attendance was small, owing to prevailing illness. This branch is healthy and doing vigorous work.

Hillsburgh, Jan. 22nd, 1894.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Attendance very good. Revs. Elliot and Ballah took part in the proceedings. This branch promises well.

Mansewood, March 7th.—Muddy roads interfered with the attendance here, but seldom has your agent addressed a meeting when a better spirit prevailed. This branch failed to do anything last year, but the prospects are good for this year.

Erin, March 8th.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Revs. Reed, Fow-
lie, and Strongman gave addresses. This branch has sustained a great loss in the

death of Mr. Tyler, who had acted as secretary for nearly fifty years. There is a good prospect for vigorous work being done however.

REV. J. H. MOOREHOUSE—*Hanover*.—Meeting was held in the Episcopal Church. There was a fair attendance. Three of the local ministers were present. In the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Goldberg (Episcopalian), was appointed chairman. The meeting was warm and hearty—pronounced "One of the best ever held here." Business of branch duly attended to. Address about forty-five minutes. Collection, \$4.

Tara and Invermay.—A stormy evening made the attendance rather slight—twenty-four—but the interest on the part of those present appeared very good. Two ministers were present and commended the good work. The officers here are efficient, and the branch can be relied on.

Arkwright.—The storm of previous evening continued more or less all day. The drive to Arkwright was cold and disagreeable. Worse still, when evening came the inclement weather still continuing destroyed our chance of a meeting. I went to the church, but there were only three persons out. However, I gave them an outline of the Society's work, and after engaging in prayer, we dispersed. The officers agreed to continue for the present year, and I urged upon them to see that the collecting in their territory was thoroughly done.

Burgoyne.—The weather having cleared we were here favored with a fair audience—sixty-three. The various reports were found satisfactory. As to the depository, I suggested that a case should be provided, in which to keep the books. All the officers were re-elected. The choir was present and gave kindly aid. Rev Mr. Stewart (Presbyterian), conducted the devotional exercises, and also commended the work of the Bible Society. On the whole, we felt that this meeting was successful, helping to compensate for the storm and failure of Arkwright. Collection, \$4.

Allenford.—A drive of ten miles brought me next day to Tara, where I took train to Allenford. Meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Two resident ministers were present. The meeting was opened with singing, reading Rom. x. and prayer. Here, as to all the branches, I had previously written the president, suggesting that he would hold a preliminary meeting of officers and committee to arrange reports and nominate officers and collectors for coming year. If branches would only act on this suggestion much valuable time would be saved at the annual meeting, and audiences would not be tired out with tedious details. In the address I emphasized the importance of the work of the Bible Society in assisting Bible-women in the East, pointing out that women there, as in other lands without the Scriptures, are degraded and miserable, hence the duty of Christian leaders to assist all in their power, as collectors or otherwise, to further the Society's work. The attendance at this meeting was good—sixty-six. We have reason to hope Allenford will make progress this year. The agent's work is sometimes heavy and monotonous, but that may be cheerfully borne if good results follow.

Wiaraton.—I reached this point on Saturday afternoon, and after conferring with the president and secretary decided to let the annual meeting take the form of a mass meeting on Sunday afternoon in the hall. Wiaraton is a brisk town of over 2,000 inhabitants, but for some reason the branch did not do well last year. I drew the attention of the president and secretary to this fact. We thought the mass meeting on Sunday would best reach the public. Also by spending Sunday here I had further opportunity to stir up the people. In the morning I preached in the Methodist Church, and in the evening in the Episcopal Church, advocating the work of the Society at both services. The meeting in the hall was held at 4 p.m. The president of the branch efficiently occupied the chair. Three ministers were on the platform. A choir kindly led the singing. The audience numbered 183. The address—giving details of last year's income and issues, and presenting

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the great leading principles and features of the Society's work—received good attention, and endorsed by the president's remarks. Collection, \$5.84. The mass meeting was successful, and we expect the Warton branch to take a decided step forward this year.

Hepworth.—At the Allenford meeting this point was recommended for a new branch, and I was therefore anxious to see it. Rev. Mr. Henderson, Warton, on whom I called on Sunday morning, kindly consented to give out notice in his church at Hepworth, and convey notices also to the other two churches there. On Monday I arrived in time to call on the two resident ministers before tea, both of whom kindly said they would attend the meeting. The audience, though small, was hearty. Meeting opened with prayer. After the address both resident ministers expressed themselves in favor of organizing a branch, and on putting it to a vote the meeting decided to do so. This was successfully accomplished, and heartily singing the doxology. The proceedings were brought to a close with the benediction. With a population of some 450, the nearest branch about seven miles away, and much wider territory on one side, Hepworth ought to become a useful branch. Besides, the depository will doubtless be of real practical benefit to the village.

Paisley.—A considerable round to reach the other railway line brought me next day to Paisley. Meeting in Methodist Church. The attendance was very good. Two resident ministers were present. The choir kindly led the singing, and after prayer, reports were read and officers appointed. This branch adopted the plan last year of taking up collections in the various churches. As will be seen by the report, the amount contributed is much below what might have been expected. It was decided to send out collectors this year, and at the meeting the work of appointing was thoroughly entered into. We may hope for improved returns from this branch.

Pinkerton.—Here I was kindly met at the train by the president of the branch and driven to his house, instead of being left to put up at the hotel. Found Pinkerton depository a model; books kept in neat case, stock already taken, and depository's account accurate to a cent. I am led specially to mention this because the depositories on the whole need toning up. The evening was stormy, attendance not large. The reports showed business of branch well managed, and in good order. A previous business meeting had so arranged everything that a very few minutes at the annual meeting sufficed to put all in order, including the appointment of the collectors. The officers here are excellent. Rev. Mr. Berry (Methodist), was present, and gave kindly assistance during the meeting.

Riversdale.—A drive of eleven miles, chiefly through a storm brought me to Riversdale. Though the evening was comparatively fine, the stormy afternoon had probably discouraged the people from making up their minds to attend, the number present being only twenty-nine. Rev. Mr. Grey (Presbyterian), conducted the devotional exercises, and in the absence of the president, also kindly occupied the chair. Business of branch received proper attention. The stock at the depository might, with advantage, be much increased, especially as the neighborhood is at a distance from any place where Bibles are on sale. Riversdale is not a strong branch, but will, no doubt, do its duty.

Walkerton.—The return drive to Walkerton next morning was also through a storm, which, continuing all day, lessened the attendance in the evening. Meeting in the Anglican Church. The officers here are reliable. This branch adopts the plan of holding its annual meeting at a date appointed by its own officers and committee, when the business of the branch is attended to. Before leaving next day I called at the residence of the German minister, with a view to enlisting co-operation in the work of the Bible Society. Not finding him at home, I left some literature bearing on the work. As to the depository, I suggested a case will be provided, and books brought out to front of store. Next day (Saturday), I started for home, arriving there about 6.30 p.m. So ended a tour, which I was thankful to Providence

for enabling me to complete without accident, or any hindrance beyond occasional stormy weather. May He who has permitted the performance of the work be graciously pleased to accept and bless it to the advancement of His kingdom.

REV. JOS. PHILP, B.D., Auburn.—This meeting was held on the 29th of September in the Episcopal Church. The president, the Rev. Mr. Henderson (Presbyterian), occupied the chair and Revs. Baugh (Methodist), and Quigly (Church of England), assisted. A union choir conducted the service of song, and live officers had secured a crowded house. The meeting was most enthusiastic. Your agent spoke on Bible Society work along the lines of his recent oriental tour and the audience followed him with the closest attention. On Sunday, Oct. 1st, he preached three times at Westfield, a part of the Auburn branch, where he discoursed on the "Preciousness of the Book of God" and the "Blessedness of Christian giving." It was a most delightful day spent with friends of former years.

Brucefield.—This meeting was held in one of the Presbyterian Churches. Rev. J. H. Simpson (Presbyterian), the president of the branch, and for years an agent of the Society was unable to be present through illness that has since resulted in his death. The chair was filled by Mr. Forest, a faithful friend of the U. C. Bible Society. The attendance was average and the interest well sustained. There was no change made in the officers. Collection \$5.53.

Kippen.—Here we met in the Methodist Church on the 4th of Oct. Revs. Acheson and Walker, the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers of the village, were with us and their prayers and addresses were earnest and inspiring. The music by the choir was very choice and helpful. Our address was on Bible work in Palestine and Syria and was well received by the people. The collection was \$2.70 and the prospects for the year encouraging.

Blyth.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. In the absence of the president, the Rev. Geo. Buggin, the pastor, occupied the chair. Rev. A. McLean (Presbyterian), gave us a brief address. Your agent by request spoke on the work in Palestine and Syria, recently visited by him. The attendance was good, music excellent, stock in depository in good condition, and the collection at the meeting \$4.75.

Londesbro.—We met in the Presbyterian Church. The Presbyterian and Methodist ministers, Revs. Ramsay and Fair, were with us and assisted nobly. No changes were made in the officers. Sales \$7.25. Collection at the public meeting \$7.42.

Varna.—The Episcopal Church was well filled and all seemed deeply interested. We had fine music. Brief addresses were given by Revs. McDonald, Leach and Kerrin, and a more lengthy one was given by your agent, who spoke on the work in Palestine and Syria. Rev. J. A. McDonald was elected president. Collection \$2.90.

Bayfield.—We held the meeting here in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was the best known for years. The chair was filled by the Rev. Mr. Oliphant, the Methodist minister; Revs. McLean (Presbyterian), and Kerrin (Church of England), spoke very helpful words. Very kind references were made to the Rev. J. H. Simpson, who for years had charge of the branches of this district. Rev. J. T. Kerrin was elected president. Collection at meeting \$3.00.

Blake.—We had a charming evening for this meeting on Oct. 19th. The audience was large and manifested a great deal of enthusiasm. Collection at meeting \$2.62. A small stock is carried at the depository.

Holmesville.—Our meeting at this village was held on the 9th of November, in Methodist Church. The room was well filled and your agent enjoyed the visit among parishioners and friends of other years. The sales had amounted to \$10.91, and the collection at the annual meeting was \$2.69.

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Goderich.—In this town we had an interesting meeting in the Victoria Avenue Methodist Church. Revs. Howell, Irvine (Methodists), and Anderson (Presbyterian), showed a deep interest and gave valuable assistance. A very suitable resolution was passed in memory of the Rev. J. H. Simpson, of Brucefield, former agent for this district, who had just passed to his eternal rest. Sales for the year \$30 11. Collection at the annual meeting \$4.58.

Dungannon.—The night of Nov. 21st was cold. One of the first snowstorms of the season was prevailing. A fair audience gathered in the Methodist Church. Revs. Jeans (Episcopalian), and Rogers (Methodist), cheered us all by their earnest prayers and words and deeds of love. Close attention was given to your agent's address. Good results are sure to follow.

Nile.—The storm of the previous evening had not ceased but the Methodist Church contained a very fair audience and the meeting throughout was full of inspiration and promise.

Egmondville.—The meeting of this branch was held on the 14th of December, in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, the Rev. Neil Shaw, B.A., showed us great kindness and manifested a deep interest in the welfare of the Society. This branch has lost none of its oldtime interest and strength. Collection \$4.41.

Seaforth.—This meeting was held in the Methodist Church, on February 22nd. The president, the Rev. Dr. McDonald, was absent through illness and the chair was occupied by the pastor of the church, the Rev. Jos. Galloway. The attendance and interest were the largest for years, but greater things could easily be accomplished by Seaforth. Your agent gave an illustrated lecture on Bible work in Palestine, and \$14.38 was taken in the collection.

Constance.—Arrangements had been made to hold this meeting on the 15th of December, but a severe storm of rain and snow interfered. We therefore returned on the 23rd of Feb. The night was very cold and stormy, nevertheless the Methodist Church was well filled with an attentive audience. The people seemed deeply interested in the illustrated lecture on our work in Palestine. The hearts of the friends here are warm towards to Bible Society.

Ingersoll.—This branch is not included in our district, but by special request of the committee we consented to give them our illustrated lecture on the work in Palestine, on the evening of March 27th. As usual we met the committee half an hour before the public meeting. We found that they had carefully looked after the interests of the work. The subscriptions were somewhat behind because of the financial stringency of the times, but an effort was made at once to bring up the amount. The public meeting was held in the King street Methodist Church, where a large audience assembled. Revs. J. H. Moorehouse, E. R. Hutt, J. S. Williamson, J. H. Hazlewood, Geo. Lawrence and J. F. Barker, the Episcopalian, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist ministers of the town, were all present. The sales of the depository had amounted to \$23.95, the collection was \$11.47, and the free contributions for the year will be nearly \$150.00.

REV. W. W. SMITH, *Niagara Falls and Queenston*.—Hospitably entertained by Cannon Houston, president of the branch. Meeting in Methodist Church, Niagara Falls. The president (Anglican), with Rev. Mr. Crawford (Presbyterian), and Rev. Mr. Burns (Methodist), gave us good assistance. Collectors were appointed, and to go to work at once—two from each church. A beautiful spirit of harmony seemed to prevail. Depository well kept in a large general store.

Fonthill.—A lovely village, in a lovely neighborhood. Called at the residences of the resident clergymen. Invited to remain at house of Rev. Mr. Taylor (Meth.), who was president of the branch. The meeting in the Baptist Church was not large. We had two ministers with us. The president pleaded well and warmly for the Society. Collectors of last year were re-appointed. They hope to do better this time. Stock in good order, but ought to be in a glass case.

Thorold.—A good meeting in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Wakefield, (Methodist), in the chair, as vice-president. Rev. Mr. Irvine (Baptist), spoke well, Rev. Mr. Spencer (Anglican), spoke very earnestly, especially on the point of the B. & F. B. Society, supplying the Bibles for all the great missionary societies. At this, and all the other meetings, your agent was heard with much interest on the extent and incidents of the work during the year. Ten collectors were appointed—some in each ward. Stock well kept in a large drug store. Sales somewhat large. Stayed with Mr. Munro, treasurer, who for a generation has kept a "Prophet's Chamber" for the agents of the Bible Society.

North Pelham.—Meeting in Presbyterian Church. In the temporary absence of the president, Mr. Thomas presided. \$30.00 collected last year. Officers re-elected and instructed to secure a staff of collectors at once. Your agent spoke of the work throughout the world. This is an entirely rural branch. No resident clergymen; and we were without platform assistance at the meeting. Audience not large, but interested.

Niagara Falls South and Stamford.—Meeting this year at Stamford, in Presbyterian Church. This is one of the most successful and vigorous branches in the Province. Secret (as everywhere else)—active and wide-awake officers. They collected \$158 last year and will do as well this year. A good choir present. Rev. Mr. McCormick (Presbyterian), spoke; as also Rev. Mr. Wilson (Presbyterian), from Drummondville (Niagara Falls South). The president, Dr. Dee, gave a history of the inception of the Bible Society, and exhibited a copy of John's Gospel in *Mohawk*, printed by the B. & F. Bible Society in 1805, only a year after its establishment—one of the first, if not the very first issued by that Society.

Smithville.—A very small meeting, but thankful for a meeting at all. The worst storm of all the winter. I had not seen even one sleigh out all day. Rev. Mr. Cruickshank, who helped us so well last year was sick. Dr. McMurchie, the new president, advocated the cause warmly. Some of the collectors did moderately well last year; six appointed this year. This branch has an interested, painstaking secretary. Much always depends on the officers.

St. Anns.—Was unable to fill my appointment on account of storm, but plunged three miles through the drifts afterwards and consulted with the officers who promised to get collectors, and do as well, at least, as last year. Found the depository in new hands and well taken care of.

Wellandport.—A fair meeting, considering all the circumstances. Rev. Mr. Mundy, (Disciples of Christ) helped us well in the meeting; also Rev. Mr. Ockley, (Methodist). Those who were present seemed interested. Six collectors appointed. I hope this branch may now get into good working order.

South Saltfleet.—This branch has its headquarters at the small village of Tapleystown. The energetic secretary, Mr. Ptolemy, came after me to Stoney Creek, when he found the mail-carrier had refused to take me through the drifts. A small meeting, but a cheerful feeling with the officers. Depository in better shape. New case for the books; collectors appointed. Rev. Mr. Bowlby, (Methodist) helped us much. This has always been a weak branch, but we hope it will wake up. No one could have foreseen the snow-storms and drifts of the whole week; nor would the meetings have been in February, could the original arrangements have been carried out, but I was taking up an unfinished route. Meetings in these small country places are better in the early autumn.

REV. J. M. SMITH, *East Williams*, Sept. 26th.—The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Beechwood. (Meetings held alternately in Nairn and Beechwood). The weather was good and the meeting the largest for years. The pastor of the church, the Rev. Mr. Elliot, officiated at the opening exercises and gave a short address. An especial feature of the annual report was its elaborate-

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ness, one of the details being the fact that there are 251 contributors to the Society's funds, 64 of whom contributed one dollar and upwards, realizing \$84, while 187 contributed less than one dollar, realizing only \$56.00. I know of no branch where the work is done so thoroughly, and the officers deserve our highest praise.

Lobo, Sept. 29.—The annual meeting this year was held in the Ivan Presbyterian Church. The pastor of the church was elected president and gave a short address. The Rev. Mr. Markwick, of Lobo, also gave a short encouraging address. This new branch is capable of great expansion and we hope for a continually increasing remittance from this vigorous and wealthy district. There was a good attendance and the outlook is encouraging.

Princeton, Jan. 9, 1894.—A larger meeting than usual at the annual visit of the agent of the Bible Society. This was no doubt owing to the fine evening and the active interest of the Revs. Bowers and Lee, resident clergymen of the village. The spirit was inspiring and encouraging and the remittance from this well-managed branch will be up to the usual standard. My visit was an enjoyable one.

Drumbo, Jan. 10.—The annual meeting in this village was an improvement on recent years. The pastor of the church, the Rev. Mr. Shearer, took the opening exercises and gave a short address. This branch is in good hands and I hope for a continuance of the interest in the work which this Society has shown in the past.

Plattsville, Jan. 11.—The meeting here was seriously reduced in numbers on account of a severe storm and the fact that there were special meetings in progress in the Baptist and German Methodist churches. Nevertheless the outlook this year is more hopeful than last year. The officers are warm hearted and energetic and they will do their part in the good work.

St. George, Jan. 12.—Notwithstanding a fine evening the gathering to the annual meeting in the Methodist Church was smaller than it ought to be. The clergymen and officers all are interested and energetic and it seems to me that a Sabbath would be well spent here in the interests of the Society. The Rev. Mr. Colling occupied the chair and the Rev. Mr. McTavish gave a good address on systematic giving with special reference to the Bible Society. We expect to hear well from this branch in the way of a larger contribution than usual.

Scotland, Jan. 13, 15.—Spent Sabbath and Monday with the churches and Christian people of this village. They united all the churches in union meetings which were characterized by the greatest enthusiasm. Sabbaths spent in the churches are the most effective way of reaching the people and swelling the treasury of the Bible Society. The ministers entertained your agent very cordially.

Mount Pleasant, Jan. 16.—This branch held its annual meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Revs. Sinclair and Mooney, with the president, resident ministers of the village, were all present and gave encouraging addresses. This branch would be much benefited by a Sabbath spent amongst them by the agent, we expect they will do well this year financially. The congregation was composed of the best people of the village. I enjoyed my visit with them.

Burford, Jan. 17.—This branch, like East Williams is managed by a committee of active Christian workers from the different churches, who arrange for annual visits to the four divisions of this field assisted by the local clergymen. The result always is a large remittance to Toronto. The annual meeting was held in the Anglican Church and was very interesting. The pastor and choir ably assisted in making the meeting a success.

New Durham, Jan. 18.—It rained all day and the roads were almost impassable, but those who attended the annual meeting of this branch were ardent friends of the Society. Your agent was very warmly entertained by the officers, and the income from this branch will equal former years.

REV. F. B. STACEY, *Maple Creek, Alta., N. W. T.*—Our meeting was held on Nov. 13th, Mr. Wm. Dixon, president, in the chair. Owing to the absence from town of the secretary, the meeting was not properly announced. The agent's

arrival however, was soon generally known and in the evening quite a number gathered in the Methodist Church when considerable interest was manifested in the work of the Society and a determination evinced to make the local branch more successful. The Bibles are in the most suitable place in town, excellently kept and a further stock ordered.

Lethbridge was next visited. The town is large and prosperous. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and brief addresses were given by the resident Presbyterian and Methodist ministers. Your agent was given a most cordial welcome, and a collection of ten dollars given by less than forty people.

Macleod was next reached after two days journey through a biting storm. A small audience gathered in the Presbyterian Church, but a most enthusiastic meeting was held. An excellent staff of officers was elected and the books will be well cared for in the most desirable location in the town. This branch lost all its former stock through fire about a year ago, but a new supply was ordered and everything looks hopeful. The town is small, so that the financial results will not be very large. The Presbyterian and Methodist ministers were present and addressed the meeting.

Calgary.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist ministers were present and rendered valuable assistance. The local interest had flagged considerably owing to the fact of there having been no meeting held last year. The same remark applies to all the branches visited west of Moosejaw. A suitable case for books was ordered and it was deemed advisable by the committee to have a colporteur sent if possible into Alberta. The attendance was small.

Canmore.—The meeting was announced for the Presbyterian Church, but owing doubtless to the illness and absence of the pastor, only three or four were present. We adjourned to the R.L.O.L. Council then in session, where your agent was permitted to address the members at length in the interests of the Bible Society. No collection was taken, but it was evident that some good was done besides opening the way for the collector. An efficient sec.-treas. was secured, an energetic lady collector appointed, and the Bible depository is in a good situation, so that fair results may be expected.

Banff.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The resident Presbyterian minister, Rev. J. A. Jaffray, was absent through illness. Another small audience greeted your agent. Banff is nearly depopulated in the winter months, which may account partially for the meagre attendance. Great interest was manifested by those present, and efficient officers were appointed. Nearly all the Bibles had been sold. A new stock was ordered, also a suitable case for the books, which will be kept in a desirable location.

Medicine Hat.—The president occupied the chair, and your agent was given a splendid hearing. Revs. Locke and Sturns also addressed the meeting, and a liberal collection was given. A better stock for the depository was ordered, and the officers were determined to push the work during the year.

Moose Jaw.—Sales good at this point during the year. An interesting meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, whose pastor was out of town. Rev. W. Bunt gave an excellent address, and in the absence of the president, the chair was taken by Mr. S. Cameron, president-elect. Free contributions are good for the year, which is a very hard one financially in this district.

Saskatoon.—A very satisfactory meeting was held here considering the size of the place, and condition of the people. The chair was taken by the president, S. Copeland, Esq., and your agent was given a good hearing. A new stock for the depository was ordered, and the officers are determined to push the work of the Society as earnestly as possible.

Prince Albert.—Good work had been done here by the collectors, and the annual meeting was also very successful. Excellent addresses were delivered by Revs. Dr. McKay (Episcopalian), Woodsworth and Cooke (Methodist), and

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Rochester (Presbyterian), after which your agent gave some information concerning the Society's operations. The meeting was held in the beautiful new Presbyterian Church, and was presided over by the president, J. McTaggart, who, with the efficient sec.-treas., was re-elected for the ensuing year. The depository changed hands, and is now in a most desirable situation, and the books will be well cared for and sold.

Regina.—Meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The chair was ably filled by the president, Mr. J. Dobbin, and addresses were delivered by the ex-president, Mr. McCaul, and Revs. Brown and Carmichael, after which your agent was given a very cordial hearing. A fair sized but representative audience was present, and the collections were good. The usual business was transacted, and a very interesting and enthusiastic meeting was brought to a close, thus completing the series held by your agent, who was able to meet all his engagements, involving a journey of over eighteen hundred miles.

REV. L. H. WAGNER, *Tavistock*, Oct. 23, '93.—Began the work on the district allotted to me at this flourishing branch. Found everything in good shape. The sales of Scriptures are a little more than last year. The public meeting was held in the new Presbyterian Church. Rev. L. Wildfang, the veteran president, in the chair. Addresses were given by Revs. Pyke and Elliott and your agent. The audience contributed in cash and subscriptions \$28.35, which gives the collectors a good start.

Breslau, Nov. 6.—This small but active band of workers shows signs of life. A goodly number gathered in the new Mennonite Church; elected Rev. A. Eby president, and made all necessary arrangements to thoroughly canvass the neighborhood in the interests of the Word of God. Good work may be expected to be done.

Morrison, Nov. 7.—Had a mixed audience here which I addressed in both English and German. The retiring president, Rev. C. S. Finkbeiner in the chair. \$11.75 were raised at the meeting and prospects bid fair to exceed former contributions. Two other branches are in the near vicinity and this one depends almost entirely on the Mission church of the Evangelical Association.

Crediton.—The meeting was held in the Evangelical Church. Addresses were delivered by the Revs. Baker and Schwartz and myself. The old officers were re-elected and a good report given of the work. Secured \$20.21 to give the appointed collectors a start.

Dashwood, Nov. 15.—I was asked here again to speak in both languages, which I am always pleased to be able to do. Rev. S. Krupp ably presided, the meeting being held in his church. On account of the stormy weather not so many were present and only \$8.00 were secured, which will however be supplemented by the energetic company of collectors appointed.

Zurich, Nov. 16.—Called on the several pastors of the village. Weather was quite favorable, inducing many to come to the meeting which was presided over by the efficient president, Mr. Fred. Hess and addressed by Revs. Krupp and Brandt, and myself. This community is largely German. Secured \$11.00. The depository is in good hands and well kept. Former officers re-elected. One encouraging feature of this branch is that the Evangelical Lutherans, who at many places stand aloof, take an active part in the work here.

Ayton, Nov. 21.—Another snowstorm met me here, also a good number of earnest workers in the cause of the Bible. Two resident ministers, Revs. Grenzenbach and Gallicher were present and gave short addressess. The venerable president, Mr. Wm. Langdale, occupied, as he stated in his opening remarks, the honorable position of chairman for the 24th time. If God spares him another year his name can be added to the honor roll in the Annual Report of the U.C.B.S. A very efficient officer has he proved himself to be. At the close of the meeting \$10.22 were secured for the cause.

Elmwood, Nov. 22.—The meeting was held in the new Mennonite Church. The president, Rev. F. M. Smith, in an ab'e address introduced the following

speakers namely, Revs. M. Weber, Jacob Walker and your agent. The work is looking up at this place. Collection \$13.01, to which much will no doubt be added shortly. The work will be pushed.

Mildmay, Nov. 24.—Came to this place the day after Thanksgiving, in the midst of one of the worst storms of the season. This did not hinder the earnest workers of the place to come out to the Evangelical Church in the evening. Mr. Moore, agent of the G.T.R., was re-elected to the chair and ably conducted the meeting. After your agent had spoken the Revs. Thos. Hauch, of Hanover, and Haist of this place also added a few words. The sum of \$12.16 was raised as a beginning for the collectors, who will no doubt swell the amount creditably in the near future.

Sebringville, Nov. 30.—Another snow storm met us here, yet here too the interest of the people of God in His Word urges them to come out even in the face of something like a western blizzard. We had an inspiring meeting, speeches being delivered by Revs. Meyer, Becker and myself. Secured \$17.17 to start with. All over the district much regret was expressed that so earnest a Christian worker as my beloved brother and predecessor, the Rev. S. N. Moyer, who was a life member of the U.C.B.S., had been so unexpectedly called away to his rest, and here at his home where his bereaved family still reside, the friends saw fit to put a very suitable resolution of condolence on record.

Milverton, Feb. 27.—We have a very flourishing branch at this place, under the able presidency of Rev. J. Kay. More were in attendance than usual. The officers were all re-elected and the old plan of each church taking up special collections among its own congregations was again adopted. The depository is well kept and does a good business. Sales aggregate very well.

Milbank, Feb. 28.—A good work is being done here. The Revs. Gunn and Yonge and myself gave addresses.

Shakespeare, March 8.—The meeting was held in the hall, and owing to the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Pyke on account of illness the secretary acted as chairman. Quite a large company had assembled to listen to the address. The depository is well kept. A good contribution had been forwarded to headquarters at Toronto.

REV. P. WRIGHT, *Souris, Manitoba*.—On the 13th of November. Our meeting was in the Methodist Church. Only about forty people were present. Mr. Driscoll, Presbyterian minister, occupied the chair, and the Methodist minister gave a helpful address. I received a most attentive hearing as I set before the people the Society's claims upon their sympathy and support. The reports of the secretary and treasurer were read and these showed that the work had not been neglected during the year. Officers were elected and also collectors who were urged to do their work at the earliest possible date. The depository is in a healthy state.

Hartney.—We had quite an interesting meeting in the Presbyterian Church with fully fifty people present who listened eagerly to all that was said. Rev. Mr. Polson occupied the chair. The depository is kept in a suitable place, and though the sales have not been large they are likely to increase. The usual election of officers took place, as also collectors for the ensuing year. The branch is in a thriving condition, and will give a good account of itself next year.

Melita.—I found on reaching here that no branch had been organized. Hence there were no reports of work done. After I addressed the meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church, it was cordially agreed that a branch be formed. Officers and collectors were then appointed. Mr. A. F. Kemp was appointed depository. His place of business is central and suitable and he will expect a consignment of assorted Bibles and Testaments at an early date.

Glenboro.—We held our meeting in Y.M.C.A. rooms. The gathering was not large but spirited. The genial president, Mr. R. S. Thompson, was in the chair. The claims of the work were faithfully set forth both by Rev. Mr. Haig and by

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Rev. Mr. Cheeny, as well as by your agent. Dr. Gunne was elected president and Mr. A. W. Clerk, barrister, sec.-treasurer, and better officers would not be found anywhere. I feel certain that 1894 will be a year of great progress in the branch.

Nesbitt.—I preached three times on Sabbath and drove twenty-seven miles. The evening service was at Nesbitt, and as there was no other service this included all denominations. The Methodist minister, Mr. Bruce, was present. I explained fully the aims and claims of the Society. It was cordially agreed to form a branch there and then, which we did. Officers were appointed and a depository will be opened under the charge of Mr. John Watson, merchant.

Stockton.—The work here has been dragging along rather drearily. No attempt has been made to collect funds, and but few know that there is a depository in the place. The meeting, which was in the Methodist Church, was, I believe, helpful in kindling a little interest. Collectors were appointed and I urged them to set about their duties at once. The officers promised to see that the Bible Society work would be attended to this year.

Cypress River.—There was no east-bound train, and I had to drive the twenty miles. Meeting in Presbyterian Church. Municipal election injured the attendance. Mr. Lawson, Methodist minister and I addressed the meeting. All the routine business was duly done, good officers and collectors were appointed, and I feel certain the next year will be more prosperous than any previous one.

Treherne.—Here I had the best meeting of the series. It was in the Methodist Church. About a hundred people were present. Both Methodist and Presbyterian minister gave valuable assistance. The Church of England minister was unavoidably absent. The choir furnished excellent music. The work is in a prosperous condition. The newly elected president, Mr. J. K. McLennan, will see that the depository is properly supplied and made more efficient and satisfactory.

Holland.—A very enjoyable meeting was held here and considerable interest manifested. All the local ministers, Presbyterian, Methodist and Church of England were present and rendered efficient help. The energetic president, Mr. Ross, occupied the chair. All the officers were re-elected. A Sabbath was fixed on for taking up collections by envelope in the churches, and collectors appointed to call on those who did not respond to this method. Hard as the times are, I feel sure that the free contributions soon to be forwarded will outstrip anything this branch has yet achieved. The depository is carefully kept.

Carman.—Here we have a fairly thriving branch. The weather was perfect, but the time (Nov. 23) was too near Christmas. A combination of bazaar, concert, and Christmas-tree in a hall on behalf of the English Church reduced our meeting to a mere skeleton. Still the quality was first-class. Business-like reports were read. The meeting was in the Baptist Church. The Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian ministers rendered efficient aid. Nothing was left undone to stimulate interest. Officers were chosen for the year and a large staff of collectors appointed, whose operations will cover a large territory. The depository has been well and carefully kept and no commission charged. I am confident that a prosperous future awaits this interesting branch.

After singing the hymn, "The Heavens Declare Thy Glory, Lord," Rev. Dr. Thomas, pastor of the church, read part of Psalm 119, and led the congregation in prayer. The Chairman then said:—

MY CHRISTIAN FRIENDS,—

It is my privilege as President of the Upper Canada Bible Society, to bid you all a hearty welcome here to our fifty-fourth annual meeting. I trust that this gathering this evening will be both interesting and profitable, and that fresh and active interest will be awakened in the work, both of our own Society and of that of the great parent Society—the British and Foreign Bible Society—which has just held its annual meeting at the termination of the ninetieth year of its existence. I shall not take up any time in dwelling upon the work of our Society during the past year, because there is a gentleman here—the Rev. Mr. Mutch—to whom you will have the pleasure of listening in giving, as he will, a brief summary of the work that has been done by the Society during the past year. I would rather allude very briefly to the work of the great parent Society, because we have the privilege of bearing our share, by our free contributions which we send each year—and in this respect I trust we are warranted in using the language of the report, that the Upper Canada Bible Society is the strongest and the most useful auxiliary which the parent Society has. (Applause.) If we

were only sufficiently impressed with the very far-reaching influence of the Bible Society's work, and of the incalculable benefits which year by year the Bible Society is conferring upon the nations, in the translation of the Scriptures and in sending them forth into every quarter of the globe, we would, I am sure, be more generous in our support, and more earnest in our advocacy of its claims upon all who love the word of God or are concerned for the welfare of their fellow-creatures. Now, figures alone give but a very faint idea of all that is involved in the wonderful work of the Bible Society; but they may help in some degree and to some extent, and I may therefore tell you that the abstract of the Society's report for the year which has just closed gives the number of languages into which the Bible has now been translated, more or less in its entirety, as nearly 320, and that four million of copies have been supplied to the Churches and the Missionary Societies, or circulated by the Society's own agencies; that in almost all the countries of the old world, and some of the new, colporteurs have been employed to the number of 600; and that Bible women have been steadily at work in the Zenanas in India and other countries. I have mentioned Missionary Societies as among those who share in these copies of the Scriptures. I incline to think that not a few of us who are interested in and gladly support the Mission work of our several Churches are perhaps almost entirely unaware of the full extent of our obligations to the Bible Society. May I quote a few words from a speech delivered by a prelate of my own Church—the Archbishop of Canterbury—at a meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society about three years ago? They are these:—"The Church ought to work for the Bible Society with her whole heart and soul. Why? The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts and the Church Missionary Society alone use some seventy languages in their Missions; and of these seventy languages for sixty they are entirely dependent upon the Bible Society. Here are two great Missionary Societies which have to go to the Bible Society, and do go, I am rejoiced to say, with thankful hearts, for six-sevenths of the Scriptures of God which they are communicating to mankind. Well, the Church of England Missions could not exist without the Bible Society." I think this is very strong testimony to what the Bible Society is doing for the great work of Missions; and I think that in that light perhaps it has hardly struck very many of us who have been interested in Missions and Mission work—the very great obligations we are under to the British and Foreign Bible Society. Now, as to the work of Bible translation, there is another thing which I think many of us have hardly thought of, or hardly realised—the zeal and devotion and self-sacrifice displayed by those who have been carrying on this all important work; the mental toil and labor involved in mastering the idioms and peculiarities of many languages, and new languages—many of them, remember, not written languages, but only spoken—and all this carried on not only by scholars and philologists in quiet, peaceful homes, but the translator is often carrying on his work amongst savage tribes, in unhealthy climes, subjected to all the diseases arising from the much-dreaded miasma and other peculiarities of the climate; often carrying his life in his hand, and exposed

at all times to cruel treatment—very often beaten to death. Nor shall we find that this self-sacrifice and devotion are confined only to the translators of the Bible, but what we may say of them equally applies to those who are occupied as agents and colporteurs of the Society, engaged in the work of carrying the Scriptures to every part of the world. Now, no better example could be given, I think, of what the colporteurs regard as their special mission, and to which in every land, in the face of a thousand dangers and obstacles he still keeps true, than a little anecdote which I may quote from the abstract of the Parent Society's last report. It was in France. "These are English books," said a French postman, while his face darkened at the thought of foreign interference; that was the obstacle which suddenly barred the colporteur's way. "But do not you faithfully deliver English letters when they are entrusted to you?" he replied, and the postman assented and waited for the application; that was the skilful turning of the obstacle into a stepping stone of advance. "And I," he proceeded—and we can notice the graver look, and hear the softening of the voice—"I am entrusted with this Gospel of Peace—I am bound to carry it to its address, and it is addressed to every living creature." It is in this spirit that the colporteurs of this Society have gone forth year after year to their work in France, in Spain, in Italy, in Russia, in Austria, in Hungary, in the Turkish Provinces, in Greece, in Palestine, in India, in Africa, in Persia, in Japan, in New Zealand, in Australia, in Central America—for it is a world-wide work; but if we would form anything like an idea of what it really is, of the dangers which they have to encounter, and the hardships which they have to endure, like the first bearers of the Gospel message, counting not their lives dear unto themselves, we must have something more than the mere list of countries; and I would earnestly recommend all who desire to know what the work really is, and the blessed results which flow from it, to obtain a little book published by the Parent Society called "A Year of Bible Work." In this book there are the reports from the different agencies, which give more insight into the far-reaching work of the Society than could possibly otherwise be had. You will learn there how the word of God has found its way where no missionary can go as yet; you will read there how that Book, through the blessing of God's Holy Spirit, has brought light and comfort to many a weary soul, and how literally have been fulfilled those words: "To them that sit in darkness and the shadow of death light has sprung up." Now, surely, my friends, this is a work, and this is a Society, worthy of the help of every Christian man and woman. There are many other points of interest which one might touch upon in connection with the general work of the Bible Society, but it has been my privilege now to fill this chair at the annual meeting—with but very few intermissions—for over thirty years—(applause)—and I think, therefore, that my face has become a very familiar one, and that I should do better, instead of taking up your time, to give more time to those who are to follow me, and especially to one whom we have the pleasure of welcoming—an old and eloquent and able advocate of the Bible cause—(Bishop Baldwin)—(applause); and therefore I

shall not detain you longer, but make way for the other speakers, and for His Lordship the Bishop of Huron. But before I sit down there is one thing I should like to mention. Before I left Ottawa I was requested by the Board of the Society to tender their request to His Excellency the Governor-General that he would be pleased to allow his name to appear as the patron of the Society. His Excellency has consented to do that, in very pleasant and very cordial terms—(applause); and as he himself has been a vice-president of the great Parent Society for many years, I think we shall have one as our patron who will not be such merely in name, but will always feel a deep and abiding interest in the work of the Society. (Applause.) I shall now call upon His Worship the Mayor to move the first resolution.

WARRING KENNEDY, Esq., Mayor of the City of Toronto, was received with applause. He said: On behalf of the Society my duty is a very easy one. My speech has been prepared for me, and printed, and I have been requested not to extend my remarks one word beyond what is given me to deliver here now; and I shall be obedient to the command of my superiors. The motion which I have pleasure in moving is:—"That the report as printed be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be officers and directors for the ensuing year, 1894-5:" This I do with pleasure. These lists of names being printed in the programmes you hold in your hand (see list elsewhere), we shall take them as read, and in doing so I have much pleasure in moving the adoption of the report.

REV. J. MUTCH, M.A., said: Mr. President and Christian friends, I have pleasure in seconding this motion. I wish very much that this work had fallen to some other friend of the Society. I am one of the junior members of the Board, and have consented just to say a very few words in connection with the work that has been carried on by our Society during the past year. It is almost unnecessary to say anything about it, as you have a great deal of information in the report which has been printed and placed in your hands this evening. I have nothing more to do than to call attention to two or three leading features of our work. You all know, as it has been already said by our worthy President, that the great work, in fact the great aim of the British and Foreign Bible Society, of which the Upper Canada Bible Society is an auxiliary, is the circulation of the word of God in all lands and in every tongue. This work, as you know, began about ninety years ago. You are all familiar with the story of its origin. Since that time a great work has been done, under the blessing of God. The presses of the British and Foreign Bible Society are issuing now, I think something like 13,000 copies of the word of God every day. Of the four hundred languages into which the Bible has been translated, 320 have been issued by the parent Society. But the Society has not only done a great deal in helping to send the word of God to those nations that had it not, and put it into print in the native or mother-tongue of all those peoples, but it has done a great deal to bring the Bible within the reach of the very

poorest of the English-speaking people. But I am asked to speak of the work in our own country, and I would speak first of all of the work that is carried on by the branches and depositories. Of these we have 581 in Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia. In these centres we have depositories in which Scriptures are kept for sale. Some think that this is a very small matter. Now, it does not mean so very much to us who are living here in Toronto. We can purchase Bibles in many places. But it means a great deal in some parts of our country, where almost the only place where the Bible can be conveniently obtained is at some of these depositories. Then, every one of these depositories is a centre of Christian influence; and I can assure you, having had some experience in the more sparsely settled parts of our own country that these depositories are welcomed by the ministers of the gospel in connection with all our churches. Then the next feature I would mention is the special distribution of the Scriptures. These Scriptures are distributed by different agencies—in steamboats, in hotels—last year no less than 400 copies of the Scriptures were placed in hotels in this city. We have them placed in the freight-conductor's caboose cars of our railways for the use of the train-men and in railway centres where there are a great many men employed. We have them placed in our hospitals and our jails, our reformatories, our industrial schools, and from time to time grants are made to mission schools, especially to mission schools among the Indians and Foreigners. I would like to have given one or two instances of the work that has been accomplished, of good that has been done in this connection. I will only mention one. In the far west, in a little place—in fact a mere village, scarcely worthy of the name of a village, a man who was a lawyer, and one who took part in politics, and was on some political mission at the time, had missed his connections with the train he intended to take and had to remain all Sabbath in a little hotel, and the only book he could find was a copy of the Scriptures that had been placed there by one of our colporteurs. He was forced to read the Bible that day, or do nothing. It was a rainy Sabbath, very much like the one we had a while ago. He was a man who heretofore had been hostile to religion. He spent the forenoon in reading Paul's Epistle to the Romans, and he laid the sacred book on the table, and he said: "The like of that I never read," and it was the means not only of leading him to become a Christian, but an active worker in the church. (Applause). That alone is worth the money we have spent during the past year. The third and most difficult feature of our work is that of our colportage. Nine men have been employed as colporteurs for different periods during the past year, visiting and distributing Bibles and Testaments in Muskoka, in Parry Sound, in Algoma, in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, not in centres, but away out in the thinly-peopled districts; and these nine men have distributed during the year 5,766 copies of the Scriptures. But this, after all, is only one part of their work. I will give you an illustration by quoting from one of the colporteur's reports

that was placed in my hand by the kindness of your Secretary. This colporteur reports having travelled during the year 4,584 miles, and a good deal of that on foot, or by boat, when he had to row the boat. He has visited 3,187 families. He has distributed 1,475 copies of the Scriptures. He has preached 34 times, addressed 28 Sabbath Schools and two temperance meetings. You can easily see from this single report that a great work has been done, and is all the more important that a great deal of the work has been carried on in places where none of the churches have any stationed clergymen. I remember in my student days having to labor two summers in Muskoka, and again and again I entered homes in that district where they confessed that the only service they had ever attended—and they had been three and five and six years in the vicinity—had been a service conducted by some of our colporteurs, and the only Bibles they had were Bibles that had been placed in their homes by some of these men. Another feature of our work that I would like to speak more fully on, but time forbids, is our assistance given to the Quebec Auxiliary Bible Society. This year we contributed \$2,000 to that Society—not as much by any means as we would like to do, but still that which was very much appreciated by the officers of the Society there, as it enabled them to maintain a good staff of colporteurs and Bible-women. Now, in conclusion, I would just like to say that it is of the utmost importance that we should assist this work by our sympathy, by our prayers, and by our countenance. It is indeed strange to me, I cannot very well understand why it is, that we have not far larger sums flowing into the treasury of our Bible Society. We have a colossal country; we have a country that is washed on the east by the Atlantic and the west by the Pacific, stretching from the chain of great lakes to the north pole. We have a country that has lakes which are great inland seas; rivers that abound in fish; we have mines of whose wealth we can hardly dream; then our great timber-limits, and our great grain-growing areas; and we have a people, although small in number, second to none upon the face of the earth. (Applause.) The possibilities of this country are very great; but if our country is to be truly great—if we are to have a civilization that is true and pure and lasting, it will only be that which is permeated and governed by the great principles that are taught in the sacred Scriptures. The redemption of our country will not be in mere legal enactments, though these have their place; it will not be by the churches joining associations or in unions, it is not in that thing, but it is in having the lives of our people governed by the teachings of the Word of God—the great principles of this Book guiding our people in their recreation, in their amusement, in their family life, in commercial life, in political life. I have stated very briefly and very imperfectly, merely by way of emphasizing, the chief features of our work, and you will find the statistics in this printed report that has been prepared by our Secretary. I have great pleasure in seconding the adoption of this report. (Applause.)

The report was adopted unanimously.

After singing "How precious is the Book Divine,"

THE CHAIRMAN: I have now great pleasure, indeed, in calling upon the Bishop of Huron to move the next resolution.

HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP BALDWIN, who was received most heartily, said: Mr. Chairman, Christian friends, the resolution I have been asked to move is as follows:

"That this meeting devoutly recognizes the good hand of God in the ever-growing success which attends the efforts of the British and Foreign Bible Society, through its Auxiliaries, to give the Holy Scriptures a world-wide circulation; and desires to express the hope that Christians of all denominations will continue to meet the responsibility of adequately supporting this noble institution."

We are told that a general of Frederick the Great was once asked by his master why he kept continually reading his Bible. Frederick the Great thought much of war. He did not see, perhaps, the place that the Bible had. But the general replied that he studied it for two reasons: one was because it told him how his soul could obtain peace, and secondly, about that world to which he was hastening. Now, there is no book that we ought to support with the earnestness and self-sacrifice with which we support the Bible. And the reason of this is that the Bible is not anonymous; it is not even the work of the world; it is written by the finger of God and I recognize it as the Book of God, and that it is not a matter of whim, caprice, or any fortuitous circumstance, but that as the Book of God we are bound to do all within our power to advance its interests and to circulate it throughout the wide, wide world. (Applause.) Go where we may, we find that it gives light, as this resolution says. "The entrance of Thy Word," saith the sweet singer of Israel. "giveth light." I am aware that there are many people who claim that they are agnostics, who say that all is dark, but sometimes it is dark to those who will not see the light, and therefore they themselves are to blame. An old owl sat upon the utmost branch of a great dry tree. The sun was blazing over its head, it had reached the zenith; and on another tree hard by sat another owl on another branch and the first owl hooted to the other owl, "Brother, it's very dark!" and the other owl hooted back, "Yes, it's very dark!" and the great sun was in its zenith, pouring down its world of golden beams on all creation save those two blind owls who thought it was very dark. (Laughter and applause.) Yes, dear friends, there are many owls that think it is very dark and choose to say so, but we that live in the bright, placid light of God's eternal truth—we that have been emancipated by its doctrines—ought to stand in the power of its truth, look upon it as that great sun that shines not merely to illuminate our path over the dark, troubled road of life, but on to that blessed eternity to which we are fast hastening. And let us remember that look where we may in the past, look into what land you please, and you find that wherever that Bible has gone light has followed it, and that it has been identified with the cause of the living Christ. Wherever Christ is honored the Bible is honored; wherever Christ is dishonored, the Bible is treated in the same way. To remove the Bible—to take it from our

midst, to take it out of our schools, to banish it from our education, to do that is just to climb up and put back the clock of the ages, to make it strike the mediæval dark time of the weary, weary past. Let us understand, as the previous speaker has said, that just as our people have the truth will they be free. A free Bible means a free nation; a free religion a free and happy people. (Hear, hear.) Abolish it, and you will find that the dark shadows of a long eclipse will steal over our land, and whilst we may grow in engineering skill, in scientific departments, in the promotion of a thousand avenues of usefulness, the soul, that should be bathed in light, will be growing darker and darker as the path goes onward to the grave. We are therefore here to-night to advocate the claims of the Bible Society, and I would therefore propose a few reasons why we should support it. And the first reason that I would give is this: Because its centre is the personal, living Christ. That is the first reason. I have lately been travelling in Mohammedan lands, and I have noticed that wherever I saw a Mohammedan at his prayers, he was always praying towards Mecca. If you go into their mosques you see that in the mosque is a particular place which indicates the direction in which Mecca lies, and therefore all kneel towards that point. See the Mohammedans away up by the sources of the Nile; see them on the roads as you advance into the country; they kneel, but it is always towards Mecca. Now, when you reach Mecca—not that I have ever been there, because only two Europeans that we know of ever reached Mecca, but those two tell us that when you have reached Mecca you find a large square, which square is the medium of their holy worship; there is the most sacred spot they have; but having reached the square there is something more holy still, and that is the black stone of the Caâba. Now, that black stone is invested by the Mohammedan world with a kind of sacred awe. It is looked upon as being a god. It is the black stone of the Caâba, and I could not but think, and therefore could not but say that I thought, that it was all in keeping, and that the heart of Mohammedanism was nothing but a hard, black stone, and I could not but contrast that with the religion which we in creed practice and life adopt, and that the centre of the Christian religion is not a black stone but the warm, beating, loving heart of the Lord Jesus Christ; and it is just that fact that makes it live; it is just that power that keeps it for ever living—the power and the grace of the eternal God. Now, let us look for one moment, and let us see that the religion of Jesus Christ is built upon that revelation that we have in the Word of God. Yes, Israel attacked our Lord Jesus Christ and put him to death, but God raised him from the dead, and it has been pointed out that just as Christ was raised from the dead, so the Book of God has been raised from the dead. It has been buried, and God has raised it from its tomb. It has been burned, says someone, and God has brought it, like a phoenix, from its ashes. It has been put in prison, but God has sent His angel and brought it out of prison. It has been buried in libraries and supposed to be removed, but it

has been brought forward ; so that to-day the press is scarcely able to meet the demands which are made upon it to circulate it far and wide amongst the peoples and languages of the earth. Yes, dear friends, we see that there is the closest resemblance between the personal Word, which is the Lord Jesus Christ, and the written Word which we are here to-night to advocate and to advance in every possible way. It is that correspondence, that unity of action, that perfect symmetry between the two, which constitutes its divine and wonderful power, so that whilst infidels are raging, whilst adverse winds are blowing against it, God is silently working—yes, working all the while. You remember that Paine said that in a hundred years there would scarcely be found a person that would read the Bible. He said that the world was advancing with such rapid strides that the Bible was worn out and effete—that it was altogether left behind—that mankind had shot into the clear and ambient air of liberty, and that in one hundred years not one would be found to read the Bible. Yes, he thought so ; and after nearly a hundred years have rolled away the question is not, who reads the Bible ? but, who reads Tom Paine ? (Applause and laughter.) His book is relegated to the rats and bats, I know not where, but the press is reproducing something like five millions of copies of this glorious work every year. (Applause). Yes, and as Adolph Saphir has said, look at the phenomenon of that wonderful circulation : Go to the people of England, the rural districts of Scotland, of Ireland—go away amongst the German peoples, or into Scandinavia amidst the snow and ice of the north, and hear the psalmody that they sing ; listen to their songs ; who are they singing about, and where come their songs from ? Are they singing the popular melodies of the day ? No. Are they singing something from the classics of the Roman and Greek world ? No ; but they are singing the songs of the sweet singer of Israel ; they are reproducing in their own tongues the psalmody of David, trilling into the pure air the blessed words, the inspired verses, of that glorious Bible which had been dictated and written ages before they ever were born. Yes, and this shows us how God is working on ; and the scientist sits there to-day in his study, and the professors in some colleges are going to work to dissect the Bible, to attack it here and to attack it there ; but that word is just as quiet, just as calm, it heeds them as much as the low sand-hill on the eastern plain will hinder the rising of to-morrow's sun. (Applause.) But people say, " Stop here with your Bible stop here ; we don't believe it ; " and I say, humbly, Why ? Well, the ethnologist says, " Sir, it does not square with the ethnology of the day ; " and then the poor geologist picks up a few stones and he says, " Sir, it doesn't square with the geology of the day ; " and then a little wee man says he does not agree with it because biology and histology and all the range of " ologies " that he has learned are all opposed to Genesis. I know not what all, indeed. Well, dear friends, let us observe this : these people admit that geology and anatomy and ethnology and biology and all the circle of the sciences are all in their infantile stage ; they are all beginning their course ; they are all just entering upon their

own life ; they are only thinking as a child, speaking as a child, understanding as a child ; and as the great Dean of Canterbury said, if the Bible to-day, with its full-grown manhood, were in harmony with all the sciences as they are to-day, in fifty years it would be in hopeless contradiction to them all. (Applause.) If you agree with the boy you cannot agree with the man. If your thoughts harmonize with the undeveloped, they cannot be in sympathy with that which has attained manhood ; and if that glorious book were to harmonize with all the crude, undigested, wild vagaries of modern thought, it would not be a book upon which we poor sinners were to lean, and which is to shed its bright light on the troubled, weary way of man. (Applause.) Cheer up, dear friends, and let us remember that because that book contains the living Christ it has a power which man cannot overthrow. It is in its teaching, in its pages, in its wonderful revelation that Christ sits, Christ is in it, and because Christ lives, therefore it will live also. (Applause.) Now, the second truth that I would like to emphasize is that it is a book which all peoples of the earth are deeply wrapped up in. You see a book come out from the modern press, and a great many people say, "Oh, don't read it," "You ought to read it!" Well, perhaps you ought, and perhaps you ought not ; it matters little ; it is not of very great importance. But I would like to say this ; if you look at the Bible you will find that all nations are wrapped up in that one book. There are three histories, three histories only, in the Bible. There is the history of Israel, the Bible shows us the history of God's ancient people. Secondly, there is the history of the church of Christ ; thirdly, there is the history of the nations of the earth. Now, those three histories revolve around one common centre, and that common centre is the living stone, Christ Jesus. Now, looking at this, you find that Israel stumbles upon the stone Christ Jesus. You go to the synagogues in Montreal, Toronto or New York, and you will find that the Jew says Christ has not come. You point him to the fact that Christ was born in Bethlehem ; he says "No" ; he stumbles on that stone. Then I look at the Church of Christ ; and on that stone on which the Jews stumbled the church is built ; and we sing, "The Church's one foundation is Jesus Christ, her Lord." And thirdly, in regard to the governments of the earth, that blessed book tells us that sovereignty will slip from every human hand ; that all crowns, potentialities and powers of this earth shall be done away with, and on one Head shall be the crown of universal authority ; one hand shall grasp the rod that will govern all. Therefore, if we have seen kings jealous because some person has arisen to dispute their authority, all nations must be interested in Him who will take the kingdom and authority from all the nations of Europe, Asia, Africa and America. The Jew that rehearses the Thorah, and says that he is the son of Abraham, is wrapped up in this book which tells him that he has stumbled upon the stone, Christ Jesus ; and the church that is built upon it must wait and watch and pray, and, kneeling down, cry through the dark night, "O Lord, Thy kingdom come : " We are waiting for that stone. Is it a little thing that we help on the Bible Society ? Is it a matter of no moment ? No, dear friends ; let us pray for it, let us work for it, and

let us cry, "O Lord, may Thy bright beams rest upon this work, and do Thou grant that Thy blessed word may have free access and be glorified throughout all the nations of the earth : " We are to advance the work of the Bible Society because of its glorious reality. Wherever we go we find that it is the path that is to guide us home. I do not know what others think ; but I for one believe in the absolute plenary inspiration of God's eternal truth, and I look upon that Bible as absolutely, verbally inspired by God the Holy Ghost ; and as regarded in this light I consider that we are to learn many lessons from it. I have no sympathy with that wretched school that would bring down man's greatest blessing to the level of the human and the worldly, the transient and the ephemeral. Now, dear friends, let us look at the blessed Lord, and with this reflection I will close. I would direct you to look at our blessed Redeemer, and ask you to notice how in his daily life the one controlling power with Him was the awful sanctity of the word of God. When he came under the power of his enemies, when he was tempted and tried, he never deflected from the path, because he said, "How then can the Scriptures be fulfilled ? " On one occasion he said, " If it be possible let this cup pass from me, nevertheless not my will but Thine be done." He saw his whole pathway, from the cradle of Bethlehem to Calvary, and from Calvary to glory, marked out in that blessed book. It was the itinerary by which He trod the whole weary way ; and I ask you to contrast the awful, sublime respect which the Lord Jesus Christ ever placed upon the Word of God, with the cold, impudent, blasphemous assertions that are made both by clergymen, professors and others belonging to the higher criticism. I ask you to notice how they differ from His awful words, who was Himself the way, the truth and the life ; and after I have sat at the feet of Christ and heard His estimation of His own word, this arm will lose its cunning, and this voice its power to speak, before I will give up one hundredth part of an inch to all the schools in Christendom from Dan to Beersheba. (Applause and laughter.) Dear friends, we live in troublous times. The clouds are mantling round about us ; and I would say to you, " Be earnest about the best "—that is, in fostering the study of God's Holy Word. Bring it into your schools ; teach it to your children ; teach it to the young ; tell it to the old ; scatter its truth everywhere ; build up your people upon this revelation ; and remember that if this be forgotten—if you substitute for the Bible the doctrines and the maxims of men—the end will show the awful irremediable mistake that you have made ; but with this resolution before us I would conclude as follows :—If you go to Scotland you will find, as a general rule, people that are strong in their faith, and why ? Because, perhaps, in Scotland more than anywhere else the Bible is taught to the young from their earliest infancy—(Hear, hear, and applause)—and you meet a strong, free, splendid people, not built up by statute and law, not built up so much by the power of man, but strong in the liberty wherewith Christ has made them free, in the blessed heritage of the inspired Book of God. With this address I beg to move, however humbly I may have done it, this resolution which asks our continuous joy in the progress that is being made in the circulation of the inspired Book of God. (Applause.)

J. G. SCOTT Esq., Q.C., said : When the duty of seconding this resolution was assigned to me, it was accompanied by a request similar to that made to the Mayor, that I should make no remarks. I was sorry that this request was made to the Mayor, because I, as well as the rest that are here present, are always glad to hear him speak, and would have been glad to listen to an eloquent speech from his lips to-night. (Applause.) I am, however, extremely glad that the request was made to me, because I am persuaded that any remarks I would make would simply detract from the eloquent and inspired address to which we have listened. Besides, I desire that we proceed to the collection with the full effect of this address upon our hearts. I, therefore, without any speech, have much pleasure in seconding the resolution which has been moved in such eloquent terms by the Bishop of Huron.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

The collection was then taken up.

REV. DR. GREGG moved the following resolution .

"That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Rev. Dr. Thomas and Trustees of Jarvis St. Baptist Church for the use of the building on the present occasion ; also to the organist and choir for valuable services."

ELIAS ROGERS, Esq., seconded the resolution, which was carried,

The doxology was then sung, and the benediction pronounced by His Lordship the Bishop of Huron.

The meeting then dispersed.
