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MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS

OF

THE NIAGARA CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

Held in the Town of Ingersoll, June 5th to June 12th, 1889.

The Sixth Session of the Niagara Conference of the Methodist Church opened in the King Street Methodist Church, Ingersoll, on Wednesday, June 5th, 1889, at 9 am.

The Conference prayer-meeting, lasting from 9 to 10 a.m., was conducted by the President, Rev. William J. Maxwell. The Scripture lesson was read by the Secretary, Rev. Thomas W. Jackson.

At 10 a.m., the General Superintendent, Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., took the chair. The Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., General Superintendent, and Rev. Dr. Carman addressed the Conference, after which Rev. Dr. Carman proceeded to organize the Conference.

The Report of the Transfer Committee was presented and read by the Secretary, as follows:

From the Conference:—A. C. Crews, to Manitoba Conference; S. P. Rose, to Montreal Conference; W. Harris, to Montreal Conference; C. Procunier, to Manitoba Conference; W. D. Misener, to British Columbia Conference. William B. Chegwin and Edward J. Chegwin were transferred to Manitoba Conference during the year.

To the Conference:—James Awde, B.A., from Montreal Conference; J. A. Jackson, from Manitoba Conference; John Wood, from London Conference.

The Conference roll was then called, and one hundred and five ministers and seventy-four lay members answered to their names.

An appeal from Mr. W. J. Morden, of Hamilton, claiming membership in the Annual Conference, was considered, and General Superintendent Carman gave decision as follows:

NIAGARA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, METHODIST CHURCH.

Ingersoll, June 5th, 1889.

A memorial and petition from W. J. Morden claims membership for said Morden in this Annual Conference; inasmuch as he (Morden) alleges therein he was duly elected by the Hamilton District Meeting Lay Electoral College; but was debarred his privilege and rights in not being so returned on the District books, because of the contention that his membership in the Church had been interrupted by his holding over for more than two months his certificate of membership in the Church, which he alleged to have been taken out in accordance with paragraph 7, page 89, Discipline; for which reason he was held to be ineligible to this Conference, under paragraph 167, page 67, Discipline.

On behalf of Mr. Morden, D. Plewes and J. Lister, members of the Conference, appeared; and on behalf of the Disirict Record, Rev. W. J. Maxwell and

It appeared, in evidence, in open Conference, that Mr. Morden, displeased at some acts or words of others in the Church when he had his membership, asked and received a certificate of membership from his superintendent, which had no special direction to any other Church, though it was alleged the destination was well understood betwixt the parties. solicited here and there, kept in his own possession for two months, and finally, This letter, said Morden, after an intervening Annual Conference, and change in the pastorate of his own Church, from which he had received the letter, applied for membership on the certificate, and was thereon duly received as a member. It further appeared that in the relation of trustee during his holding of this letter, he had been more or less treated as a member of the Church from which he held the letter or certificate, both by the Superintendent and officials of said Church, and especially that a District Meeting and Annual Conference having intervened betwixt the time in question (1887-88) and the present, he had been without challenge or objection duly elected by said District Meeting to the Annual Conference, and had been recognized in that Annual Conference duly and properly as a member thereof.

Dr. Carman, General Superintendent, in the chair, ruled in the case:-1. To hold over a certificate of membership as given under authority of Discipline, page 89, paragraph 7, longer than a proper and reasonable time for its due transmission, is done at the responsibility and risk of the holder thereof; and after said proper and reasonable time, the holder bears it at his own risk, and by holding voids and vacates his membership. The Discipline provides that it is necessary for the holder of a certificate of membership to apply for readmission of such certificate; and so of course he has control of his own membership, as he had before he was a member of the Church at all, excepting this difference, that the certificate will, for one year, if not in any way dishonored, introduce him into full membership without the usual disciplinary probation of three months. After holding certificate one year in his own hand, both his membership and certificate are dead. The duplicate certificate, forwarded by one superintendent to another, does not carry the membership; it is simply an official intimation that the membership may be looked after. that the holder carries is the bearer of the membership, and on it application must be made by the holder, as his own voluntary act. This certificate, in the hands of the holder, is a paper given with a special intent, privilege and power, and may not be carried beyond the disciplinary intent. Wherefore said Morden did vitiate and vacate his membership, and, by his own act, was ineligible to the Annual Conference, under Div. Discipline, 167, page 67, had unclouded administration kept his relations and position clear.

2. But inasmuch as even during the ten months in question, he had been given a quasi, semi-membership, and especially, inasmuch, as at a District Meeting, unchallenged, he had been elected to an Annual Conference, and, unchallenged, had held his seat in said Annual Conference; and that under the

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same administration and administrators, in several regards, as now raise the objections to his membership; the Chair holds that the administration in Church condoned Mr. Morden's defective claim to membership in the Annual Conference, and virtually, by its own act, restored the continuity of the membership he had interrupted, wherefore, the Church, in that regard, is not entitled to claim or recover against Mr. Morden, the administration having virtually resigned its own claim, and forfeited its right to proceed against him.

3. Wherefore, it is ruled that notwithstanding Mr. Morden's failure as to the intent and purport of the certificate, or letter of membership, by the Church's own action he has been restored to the position and relation now claimed, and is entitled to his seat in this Conference. The Chair then rules that Mr. W. J. Morden is duly and properly a member of this Conference, and that the Hamilton District, and its Lay Electoral College, govern itself accordingly.

Other incidental decisions as to the intent and nature of said certificates, or of other possible letters were given, but not as determining the case.

The membership status of certain members elected to the Conference from the Simcoe District being questioned, and it being necessary that the subject should be fully considered and settled, the Rev. John Wakefield submitted to the Conference, in proper form, the point at issue, claiming that Messrs. A. J. Donly, Joshua Austin, and Joseph Henry Woolley were not duly qualified members of the Conference, they not being members of the Methodist Church at the time of their election.

The following was the ruling of general President Carman in the case.

NIAGARA CONFERENCE.

INGERSOLL, June 5th, 1889.

Rev. John Wakefield protests against the membership of A. J. Donly, Joshua Austin, Joseph H. Woolley, in this Conference, alleging on the authority of Rev. T. Colling, Superintendent of Simcoe, where the parties protested against are reputed to hold membership reside, that the Discipline of the Church had been duly enforced against them, and they had been excluded from membership.

Rev. T. Colling was heard by the Conference as to the proceedings taken in the case; Rev. T. W. Jackson, Chairman of the District, was heard as to his decision in the District Meeting, to the effect that the Discipline had not been regularly applied in these cases; and A. J. Donly was heard as to the fact he had received no notices of the proposed exclusion, had not been cited to appear before the Society, and had received no notices of complaints or charges; and Rev. J. Wakefield upon the usage of the Church formerly pertaining to said exclusion in the Society.

The whole case, as affecting all parties whose membership here is in this protest assailed, was by common consent allowed to rest on the decision that might be arrived at concerning the relation and rights of A. J. Donly. Though the matter more immediately affected the Lay Electoral College, the Conference decided to consider it at large and openly.

REV. DR. CARMAN, General Superintendent.

Superintendent, in the chair, ruled as follows:—

That while this Annual Conference may not have to do with the question of Membership in the Church, except as it may come onward in appeals; and

while the regular course of procedure where a man may be irregularly or undisciplinarily dismembered, expelled, or excluded from the Church by the Superintendent of his Circuit, would be a charge of maladministration against the Superintendent; yet as this is a case affecting membership in this Annual Conference itself, and as self-protection in the constitutional right of a body of this character, it follows as in all Parliamentary and conferential analogies that the question of membership of a particular person in the Church, as a prerequisite to membership here, can and must come before this body, in so far forth as

it affects the very membership of the Annual Conference itself, seeing that other courts are not provided to settle the membership of the Annual Conference. Inasmuch as the alleged exclusion of these brethren was done under the authority of paragraphs 100, 101, page 40, Discipline, and had been by common consent effected without written notices, citation, or charge; inasmuch as the District Book, which is our proper authority in the case, duly reports these brethren as properly elected to the Annual Conference; inasmuch as paragraphs 100, 101 aforesaid, must be interpreted under the more specific legislation of paragraph 215, page 102, Discipline; and inasmuch as the legitimacy and regularity of the act of exclusion comes before this body in the form of affecting its

That said exclusion was irregular and unjustifiable under par. 215, page 102, Discipline; that said brethren having been duly recognized in their District Meeting, and elected by it, are entitled to their seats in this Annual Conference

The Chair holds that while exclusion, in the Church, by the Superintendent, with the assent of the Society, may not require all the formalities of full trial, the notices, citations, and specifications are, in all cases, required by Discipline

The difference and the advantage of 100 and 101, as the Chair regards it, are (1) 100 and 101 are restricted to offence against order and discipline, and to one offence at that; while 215 covers moral conduct, and all offences against order and discipline. (2) In 100, 101 there needs not be the same rigid formality of trial as in 215 and following sections; but it is the consent of the Society to the recommendation of the superintendent minister in the case that is to be obtained. (3) Yet 215 makes it necessary to duly cite in proper form, by written charge, the offender or delinquent before the Society, citation, notice and distinct charge are necessary under existing law, for the procedure is an open and informal trial before the Society, which may or may not consent to exclusion, which may or may not declare itself upon the necessity of formal and explicit trial under the provisions of Discipline. The Chair is of the opinion that a member of the Methodist Church cannot be cut off from his membership merely at the will and determination of his Superintendent. There must be examination, disciplinary inquiry and procedure, and consent of the Society or verdict of a

The failure of due notice and citation in this case leaves, in the judgment of the Chair, the assailed membership in the Church unimpinged and unimpaired, and hence retains and establishes the membership in this Conference.

The election of officers resulted as follows:

The Rev. J. Sprague Williamson was elected President.

Rev. Geo. A. MITCHELL, B.A., on second ballot, was elected Secretary.

Rev. Isaac Tovell was appointed Assistant Secretary, and

Rev. J. H. Collins was appointed Journal Secretary.

Moved by Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., seconded by Rev. J. Wakefield, and Resolved,—That the hearty thanks of this Conference be extended to the Rev. W. J. Maxwell, for his efficient services as President of the

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Conference during the past year. We desire to place on record our high appreciation of the fidelity to duty and loyalty to the discipline of our Church which has characterized his administration during a year of unusual anxiety and perplexity.

Moved by Rev. T. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. C R. Morrow, and Resolved,—That the thanks of this Conference is hereby presented to the Rev J. Laycock, for his painstaking and efficient services as Journal Secretary for the year now closed.

Bro. Laycock made a brief reply.

George Clark, and Resolved,—That a Committee on Nominations be appointed, to consist of the President of the Conference and a minister and layman from each District, the same to be named by their respective Chairmen. That the following Committees be nominated:—Pastoral Address, Statistics, Educational, Contingent Fund, Memorials, Conference Relations, Temperance, Sabbath Observance, Church Property, Jesuits' Estates Bill.

REPORT OF SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

1. Your Committee, having had the Report of Rev. Dr. Withrow referred to it, would express its great satisfaction at the able manner in which the Sunday-school periodicals are managed, and commend them to

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hrow er in m to the confidence and support of our Church. And, further, we would express our gratification at the good work being done by the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund.

2. We have pleasure in reporting an increase of 1,238 in the number of scholars during the year. There is also a large increase in the circulation of our own publications, and in the Missionary Funds. We call attention to the fact that Welland District takes only 1,813 of our own publications, but that they are taking 984 other papers. We find also that neither Woodstock nor Welland Districts have supplied us with a list of the Superintendents of Schools.

3. We regret the decrease of 11 in the number of schools, and urge that the brethren will not only see that there is a Sabbath-school in connection with every appointment, but wherever possible mission schools be organized.

4. Out of 259 schools, only 52 are reported as having regular teachers' meetings. Your Committee call attention to the importance of regular meetings for the study of the lesson.

5. Your Committee regret the very small percentage of scholars learning the Catechism of our Church, though there is a slight improvement on last year. Out of a total of 25,122, we have only 2,564 learning the Catechism.

6. The Districts report only 3,643 scholars as having taken the Temperance Pledge. This is a very incomplete return, or our Sabbath-schools are neglecting what we consider a very important part of Sabbath-school work.

Geo. Clarke was recommended as Secretary and Treasurer.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg respectfully to submit the following Report :-

1. That we are unalterably opposed to the liquor traffic, and believe it cannot be licensed without sin.

2. We regret the defeat of the Scott Act in the counties of this Province, but trust that it will result in an immediate demand for a Dominion law prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

3. That we have no hope of prohibition from any political party which refuses to put the immediate abolition of the liquor traffic as a plank

4. That we believe a revenue taken from the liquor traffic has a tendency to blind the eyes of the taxpayers to the evils of the trade, and demoralize the conscience of the public generally.

5. That we believe prohibition should be made an immediate political

6. That we pledge ourselves to give our individual support to the party which will unequivocally put the plank of prohibition in its platform.

7. That we strongly condemn the present political parties for their truckling silence in their campaign documents and public addresses on the question of immediate prohibition of the liquor traffic.

8. That we urge a constant agitation and education on all lines for the fuller awakening of the public conscience and sentiment.

9. That we condemn the introduction of license in the North-West Territories in opposition to the law and public opinion of Canada.

10. That we join with the Women's Christian Temperance Union in thanking Hon. G. W. Ross for placing Temperance as an option in the list of subjects for the Christmas Entrance Examinations, and also in their earnest efforts to secure it a permanent place in the curriculum of the public schools.

11. That we appoint a committee of two, one minister and one layman, who shall be a permanent Committee on Temperance, and who shall gather information and circulate intelligence by circulars and otherwise, and collect money to defray its expenses; such Committee to report to the next Annual Conference; said Committee to consist of Rev. D. L. Brethour, Ph.B., and Mr. James Lund.

12. That the foregoing Report be read in connection with the Annual Sermon preached in all our churches.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee, on the State of the Work, beg to report :—

1. That, believing it to be the Divine plan to convert the world through the preaching of the Gospel applied to the consciences of men by the power of the Holy Ghost, we cannot too strongly emphasize the apostolic direction, "Preach the Word." Preach repentance to the sinner, faith to the penitent, and holiness to the believer. As ambassadors of the Lord Jesus Christ we should ever feel the responsibility of our position, and hence, whatever aid we might secure in the prosecution of our work, we should never forget that we are responsible for the doctrines presented, and for the instruction given.

2. The holding in each District, at least once a year, a meeting for the interchange of thought as to the best methods of promoting the work of God, we believe would be most helpful.

3. We recommend that prayer-meetings be held as often as practicable in connection with our Sabbath evening services, with the especial design of leading souls to Christ; that earnest invitations and appeals be made to the unsaved, with a continued looking for of accessions to our ranks through this instrumentality.

4. The engaging as many as possible to co-operate with the minister in the various departments of Church work.

5. That we guard against mere formality in our class-meetings. Let life and energy be infused into all our services.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE SALE OF CHURCH AND PARSONAGE PROPERTY.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report:-

NIAGARA FALLS (St. Catharines District).—With respect to the request of the trustees of the Niagara Falls Church, asking permission to sell the old church property, and apply the proceeds of sale to the building fund of the new church, we recommend that the request be granted.

JERSEYVILLE (Brantford District).—In compliance with the request from the Jerseyville Circuit, we recommend that permission be granted to the trustees of the late M. E. Church to sell the same, and apply the proceeds toward building a school-room in connection with the church now occupied.

Woodstock, Dundas Street (Woodstock District).—In regard to the request of the trustees of Dundas St. Church, Woodstock, we recommend that permission be granted them to sell their present church property, and apply the proceds toward the erection of a new church.

Townsend (Simcoe District).—In regard to the request of the Townsend Official Board, we recommend that permission be given them to sell the parsonage at Tyrrell, and apply the proceeds to secure a parsonage in a more central location.

ROCKFORD.—We also recommend that the Rockford Official Board be granted permission to sell their parsonage, and apply the proceeds to meet the present indebtedness; the balance to be used in reconstructing an unoccupied church into a parsonage.

MILLGROVE (Milton District).—Respecting the request from the Milton District, your Committee recommend that permission be given the Trustee Board of the Millgrove parsonage to sell the same, and apply proceeds toward the payment of the new parsonage already purchased.

Mountsberg parsonage to sell the old parsonage, and apply proceeds toward paying for the new parsonage at Freelton, on the same Circuit.

MOUNTSBERG.—That the Trustee Board of the Beechgrove Church be granted permission to sell the same, and apply proceeds toward paying for the new church at Freelton.

RAINHAM (Welland District).—We recommend that the Trustee Board of the Byng Church property be granted permission to sell the same, and apply the proceeds toward a parsonage on the Rainham Mission.

RAINHAM.—That the trustees of the South Cayuga Church be granted permission to sell the same, and apply the proceeds towards the building of a parsonage on the Rainham Mission.

OAKLAND (Norwich District).—We recommend that the trustees of Bealton Church be granted permission to sell the same, and apply proceeds toward the erection of a new church.

TILSONBURG.—That the trustees of the parsonage be granted permission to sell the same, and apply proceeds toward building a new one.

COURTLAND.—That the trustees of Zion Church be granted permission to move their church to a site convenient for the united congregations of Zion Church and Winter's school-house appointment.

REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have noticed with satisfaction the aggressive action of organized crusades against the evil of non-observance of Sabbath, notably those of the "Law and Order League" of Niagara Falls and of St. Catharines, and do hereby assure those aggressors of our hearty endorsation of and sympathy with their endeavors concerning railway, canal, and street-car traffic.

We have also observed with gratitude the declarations of leading railway companies of America and Canada restricting Sunday freight traffic, and do hail this as a step in the right direction, and as worthy of imitation by the minor railroads of both countries.

We do, moreover, record our rejoicing in the hold which this subject has upon the mind of the Christian Church, and are heartily glad that advance steps have been made. At the same time we deeply deplore that so many seem reconciled to the existence of this evil, and that, as compared with its alarming growth, so little effort has been put forth to bring restrictive legislation to bear upon it, and do recommend:—

- 1. That united and unceasing prayer be made to God that governments, politicians, companies, and a liberty loving people be led to feel the vital relation of this movement to our future weal or woe as a nation.
- 2. That in all our pulpits sermons be preached on this subject on the first Sabbath of October, and that in connection therewith this report be read.
- 3. That the sermon embrace wise counsel and judicious deprecation of the following specific forms of Sabbath desecration, viz., the sale of intoxicants, secular conversation, Sunday visiting, Sunday funerals, fixed gate fees on Sunday at parks and summer resorts, Sunday excursion trains, street-car and canal traffic, the hiring of liveries, and, last but not least, the publication, sale, and reading of secular newspapers.
- 4. That we deem it desirable that a Permanent Sabbath Observance Alliance be formed, and that, in accordance with an overture from the United Committees on Sabbath Observance, we do appoint delegates to attend a meeting to be held in the City of Hamilton, on the 25th day of June, for the purpose of organizing such an Alliance.

And we do further recommend that the following delegates be so appointed:—

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Annual Report of the Board for the year endiny July 31st, 1888.

I have pleasure in again presenting to the Board the Annual Exhibit of the state of the Fund.

Although the past year has been one of great stringency in money matters, the income of the Fund has been sufficient to meet the claims of the year, and to pay off the balance against the Fund, with which the year was commenced.

The amounts apportioned to the several Districts have been paid, with comparatively trifling exceptions, and the claimants have received their full allowances.

I am sorry, however, to say that quite a number of our most poorly paid ministers have been compelled to make up deficiencies which should have been paid by their Circuits; but so willingly has this been done, in obedience to the law of the Church, that in very few instances have I heard any complaint.

The estimates for the coming year have been very carefully made, and I venture, with some hesitation, to recommend that the percentage be no higher than six per cent. the same as last year, although that may leave a small deficiency against the Fund.

The coming year will be a trying one, arising from several causes. The amount of assessable income has not materially increased. The number of additional claimants is greater than usual, and their claims exceptionally heavy. There will probably be a falling off in the Interest account, as we will have to make a change in the securities of a considerable amount of our investments, and the interest has been very closely collected.

The above is the Treasurer's Report as adopted by the Board.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

In the years preceding the General Conference of 1886 the salaries of the General Superintendents were paid in part by the Missionary and Educational Funds, on the ground that the advocacy of the chief officers of the Church did very materially benefit these departments of our Church work.

According to the then existing law, the Fund paid only \$2,000 annually for the above purpose, or at the rate \$8,000 for the full quadrennium. The legislation of the General Conference of 1886 (I think unwisely) enacted that the whole amount required for the above purpose should be paid by the Fund, which amount during the quadrennium is \$18,400 an increase of \$10,400 during the four years on this one item.

The General Conference, through the Financial Committee, provided for meeting this increased claim, by apportioning to the several Annual Conferences, on what they considered an equitable basis, such sums as they deemed necessary to meet these claims, and the Conferences, through their representatives, accepted such apportionments. (See Journal, page 251.)

I consider the estimates made by the Financial Committee of the General Conference to be moderate and approximately correct, and I think the whole of these apportionments will be required to meet the claims against the Fund during the quadrennium.

The following tabulated statement will show how far the several Conferences have been successful, up till the 1st of September, 1888, in raising the amounts required from them respectively. According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, I would just say here in addition, that one-half of the quadrennium is now past, and one-half of the estimated amount should be in the Treasurer's hands.

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From the above facts and figures it will be seen that less that one-half of the amount estimated as necessary has been paid in the past two years by the Conference; \$15,080 required, say \$7,150 paid, and \$7,930 still deficient on the two years. These figures speak more eloquently than anything I could say. What is to be done? This is a question properly belonging to the several Annual Conferences. That something should be done, and done generally and promptly, I think all will admit. The next meeting of the Annual Conferences should not be allowed to pass without very decided action. All the Conferences might not be disposed to take the same action; some might be disposed to adopt an additional collection to make up the balance, while others might prefer to do it by a private subscription among the friends of the Church. The amount should be raised in some way by each of the Conferences.

To prevent misunderstandings, it may be necessary to say that as our year closes on the 31st of August, and the year in Annual Conferences closes about June, it will be in vain to expect that our figures will agree with those returned in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

Your Committee on Memorials beg to report as follows:-

1. In regard to a memorial from the trustees of Port Colborne Church, on the Humberstone Circuit, asking the Conference to order a collection to be taken up at each and every appointment on every Circuit and Mission within the bounds of this Conference.

In considering the above, the Conference ordered that the Superintendent of each Circuit be directed to raise, in any way advisable, \$2 or upwards to assist in removing said debt; said collection to be forwarded to the Superintendent of the Circuit as soon as possible.

2. In regard to the memorial on the question of Prison Reform, we recommend that this Conference express its sympathy with the movement to secure the necessary reform in the management of the prisons of this country, and would offer its co-operation in securing the object of the Prisoners' Aid Association.

3. In the matter of a respectful memorial from Bros. Richard Smith, John B. Carpenter, and other members of our Church on the Simcoe Circuit, we recommend the following: - That we gratefully recognize the great liberality of Bros. Smith and Carpenter in paying so large a sum to save our church property to the Connexion; and we further deeply sympathize with all those who have, with loyal devotion and unswerving fidelity, stood by the Discipline and constitutional usages of the Methodist Church during the past year of severe trial; and we furthermore earnestly pray that the spirit of Christian forbearance may prevail, and that great peace and prosperity may continuously abound.

4. That in the case of the memorial from Geo. Beatty, sen., of Beamsville, complaining of the action of his pastor in the severance of his connexion with the Church, having learned from Bro. Koyl that such severance is in accord with his own written request, and is so recorded

in the Circuit Registry, and considering that in cases of maladministration of Discipline, a constitutional course of procedure is prescribed, the Conference does not see its way clear to any interference.

5. That in reference to the memorial from Oakland Circuit, re distribution of funds arising from the sale of Waterford parsonage, we recommend that each of the appointments, to which has been apportioned amounts by the Committee appointed by Conference in reference to the same, viz.: Round Plains, \$49.50; Waterford, \$34.50; Rockford, \$16; be requested to appoint a committee to collect the same; this committee to be appointed by the Superintendent of the Circuit, who shall be one of said committee, and, when collected, to at once hand it over to Oakland Circuit. Waterford has, through their representatives—Rev. J. Laycock and Bro. Edward Grace—consented to this arrangement, and become responsible for the amount apportioned to Waterford by the Conference Committee.

6. In reference to a memorial from Princeton Circuit, asking that changes be made in the constitution of the Superannuation Fund, we recommend that the memorial be returned to them, as the General Conference does not meet until after the next session of this Conference.

7. In the matter of a memorial from Milton Quarterly Board, we recommend the following:—That, as the action of the Conference Special Committee is not officially called in question, and as we are not aware of any extensive or otherwise influential movement looking to the subversion of our Church property, we do not recommend that any formal action be taken at this Conference.

8. In reference to a memorial from the Diocese of Toronto, concerning the Scripture selections for reading in public schools; also, religious instruction by the ministers of the various denominations during school hours, etc., we recommend that no action be taken.

9. Re memorial from Quarterly Board of Binbrook Circuit, asking the Conference to have the arbitration award between Glanford and Binbrook Circuits respecting parsonage property settled, we recommend the President of the Conference and the Chairmen of the Districts concerned to visit the Quarterly Boards of these and all Circuits similarly situated, and endeavor to secure an amicable settlement.

REPORT OF THE JESUITS' ESTATES BILL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report the following recommendations for adoption:—

1. That this Conference views with alarm the bold and rapid agression of the Church of Rome, upon the domains of civil and religious liberty in our beloved country, and especially deprecates the subserviency of our rulers to the ecclesiastics and authorities of said Church, as witnessed in the history of the recent incorporation and endowment of the Society of Jesuits, therefore

Resolved,—That this Conference strongly condemns the incorporation and endowment of the aforesaid Society by the Quebec Legislature,

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especially its constituting a foreign and alien potentate the arbiter in matters of Canadian legislation, to the great disparagement of Her Britannic Majesty Queen Victoria, and in violation of British law; and further, that we distinctly and emphatically repudiate the action of the Governor-General in Council and that of our representatives in Parliament anent this question, and avow our hearty concurrence with the platform and aims of the Citizens' Committee of Toronto, looking to some suitable remedy, and pledge ourselves to use our influence in all reasonable and proper ways for the furtherance of such aims.

We would also record our sympathy with our co-religionists – the Protestant minority of the Province of Quebec – in view of the many humiliating conditions imposed on them through the preponderance of the aggressive ecclesiasticism, by which they are overshadowed and controlled.

THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

The Hamilton Ladies' College was instituted with the idea that neither for buildings nor current expenses should the Church be appealed to; and, although it is in part governed by the Church, it has never cost the Church a dollar.

As there are more than 240 of our graduates, and thousands of our ex students scattered throughout the country, many of you know the history of the Institution, and are conversant with the work it is doing. We are pleased to be able to say that the College was never so well prepared for thorough and advanced work, never so well equipped, as it is now. The examination papers for all its advanced classes are prepared and valued by outside examiners—graduates of other colleges. Our course runs through four years, and is a fine preparation for an intelligent life, whether that life be spent in educating and adorning the home, or devoted to pursuits of a professional character.

We are always proud of our equipment in Music and Art, and some marked improvements are in progress.

You will be pleased to see the prominence we give to Biblical Studies, Evidences of Christianity, Mental and Moral Science—and in this respect, as indeed in all others, we are workers together with you.

We have had a prosperous year educationally, and will graduate, on

the 17th, a good class of over a dozen in the different departments. We trust that we may have your active endorsation. We are sure the Institution never merited it so much.

Wishing you all the happiest results in your labor of love, we are, brethren.

THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

The Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College take pleasure in present' ing their Fifteenth Annual Report. It is gratifying to them to be able to report that, in respect of attendance, income and the value of the educational work accomplished, the past year has been one of increased prosperity and encouraging success. The number of pupils enrolled during the year has been one hundred and sixty-five, and the revenue for the

year has exceeded twenty-three thousand dollars.

The College has, during the year, been maintained by an efficient corps of accomplished Professors and Teachers. Evidence that the cause of sound learning is faithfully championed in this Institution is found in our various courses of study and in our modern methods of instruction in our class-rooms. In our College of Literature and Science, presided over by the Governor and Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., and the lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., language is thoroughly studied in English, Latin, French, German, etc.; correct habits of thought are acquired from the Masters of Literature; Mathematics receive careful attention, and in Natural Science, experiments, in the hands of the pupil, under competent direction, lead to very satisfactory results. In our School of Music, under the direction of Prof. J. W. F. Harrison and an able staff of Professors and Teachers, provision is made for advanced courses of study in piano, pipe-organ, violin and voice culture, besides taking up a large part of the theoretical work of the Leipsic Conservatory. In our School of Art, under the direction of L. R. O'Brien, Esq., President Royal Canadian Academy, and universally acknowledged to be the ablest Artist in Canada, and Miss Windeatt, of the Royal Art Canadian Academy, all the facilities of an Art School of the highest grade are provided. In our School of Elocution, under Miss Graham, Bachelor of Oratory, the work of the National School of Oratory is very successfully undertaken and accomplished. And in our Commercial School, under the direction of A. G. Henderson, Esq., who holds diplomas from two Business Colleges, instruction is given in Book-keeping, Telegraphy, Phonography, and Type-writing. The equipment of the College in these several departments is most complete, and, in our judgment, very greatly superior to that of any Ladies' College in Canada, comprising as it does a large Refracting Telescope—one of the finest in the Dominion -a compound Microscope, a complete working Laboratory for students, twenty-three new Piano-fortes, including three Grand Pianos, and a large new Orchestral Organ.

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Deportment and Social and Physical Culture, too often overlooked, receive a marked degree of attention and are special features in the College work. The Directors are pleased to be able to refer to the erection, during the year, of a very large Gymnasium, fully equipped with modern apparatus and appliances, thus offering superior advantages for physical culture and development. Our aim is not only to provide amusements for our pupils, but a judicious and scientific course of physical training.

The College was established by the Church, in 1874, for the purpose of providing for young ladies desirous to obtain a liberal education such advantages and facilities as are enjoyed in institutions of the highest grade. Each year's experience has enabled us to make improvements, to add to our facilities for imparting instruction, and to increase the sphere of usefulness of the College.

It has been our constant aim to raise the standard of the higher education of women in this country, and to place our College in the lead of the best of the Ladies' Colleges in Canada.

We refer, with pleasure and pride, to our commanding location in the town of Whitby, a town of rare healthfulness, in close proximity to Toronto; to our ample and attractive lawns and grounds, and to our large and elegant College buildings, without a rival in Canada.

The Directors desire to tender to you, the Members of the Conference, their grateful thanks for your confidence and hearty co-operation in the past, and they commend the College to your most favorable consideration and continued patronage.

ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Niagara Annual Conference of the Methodist Church:—

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN, -We are grateful to a kind Providence that has preserved the lives and blessed the labors of our teachers and students through another year. We rejoice that we are able to report a year of prosperity, both in regard to the number in attendance and the quantity and quality of the work done in the various depart-We continue to receive the patronage of all Christian denominations, and have reason to believe that there is a growing public confidence in the thoroughness and efficiency of the work done within our halls. completion and opening of McLachlin Hall marks an epoch in the history of our school. The building is not only of surpassing beauty, but most admirably adapted to the needs of collegiate work. It has so increased the capacity of the College, that at least seventy more resident students can now be received, besides giving us a chapel with seating capacity of five hundred, some six additional class-rooms and an Art Gallery, which has been pronounced the finest in the Province. We are glad to report a healthy religious interest in the school manifested by the attendance upon prayer and praise services in the College and class-meetings and other voluntary services in the churches.

Our College Missionary Society is doing a grand work in educating the minds and hearts of the young women, and inspiring them with burning interest in the world's evangelization. Three of our former students are now in China and Japan, and others are contemplating work in the mission field. Our enrolment has been 175 students-140 residents and 35 day pupils. Of the total enrolment, 15 come from the United States. Our attendance was somewhat lessened by the prevalence of a small-pox

epidemic in an adjoining community during part of the year.

Our Natural Science Department has been enlarged and more efficiently equipped. Our Music Department was never better attended or more firmly established in public favor. Our Commercial Department continues to attract and qualify young women for efficient services in business life. Our full Literary Course, with its departments of Science, Mathematics, Literature, Languages, Christian Evidences and Philosophy, is giving young women an intellectual training of a thoroughly liberal and distinctively Christian character.

Our Art Department, with its new gallery and apparatus, is attracting students from all parts of Ontario, and in the recent Departmental Examinations more than maintained its former high reputation-Alma winning 108 certificates in all, taking the only four full advanced certificates given in the Province, and winning in addition two gold medal certificates.

The response to the appeal for aid in the building of the McLachlin Hall has been encouraging. There has been subscribed nearly \$12,000— St. Thomas contributing \$5,000; over \$6,000 of the amount subscribed has been paid. The total expenditure incurred to date on new building is \$19,000. The increasing sympathy shown the College in its work furnishes good grounds for expecting that there will be forthcoming all reeded financial aid to keep the school fully equipped and thoroughly abreast of the times, and to enable it to do its share in retaining the education of Protestant girls in Protestant hands. It is a well-known fact the numerous convents with which we compete are practically endowed through the gratuitous services of their teachers, and also liberally supported through accumulated benefactions of zealous friends of convent education.

It is the undisguised aim of the convent system to control the education of women, and all Protestant Colleges for women should be in such financial condition as to offer educational advantages as inviting as the best, and at rates that will remove all temptation for extending Protest-

ant patronage to convent schools. The Ladies' Colleges should be powerful auxiliaries to the Missionary and Educational work of the Church, and should be recognized and affili-

ated in compact organization with our central university work. The fullest realization of this depends in a measure upon the support of the ministers of the Conference, who can do much to awaken interest, promote patronage and direct benefactions.

The Board highly appreciates the expressions of confidence made by the Conference, as well as the hearty co-operation of many individual members th of the Sig

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bers thereof, and has derived much benefit from the advice and counsel of the associate members appointed by the Conferences.

THE REPORT OF ALBERT COLLEGE FOR THE COLLEGE YEAR 1888-89.

To the Niagara Conference of the Methodist Church in Conference Assembled:—

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—We beg to present this our Annual Report of Albert College, Belleville, Ont., for the College year 1888-89. The attendance has numbered 152, consisting of 112 males and 40 females. During the past few months, students have been in attendance from British Columbia, Manitoba, Michigan, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire and Texas, in addition to Ontario and Quebec. All the

different departments are in a healthy and vigorous state.

The Academy of Music, Business College, Academy of Fine Arts, and School of Elocution are largely attended and doing excellent work. These departments are in charge of graduates and specialists of large experience and recognized teaching ability. The attendance embraces about the usual number of candidates for teachers certificates, for both second and third-class grade. We are able to report that in these departmental examinations the College has taken very high standing, having passed

over sixty per cent. of all its candidates during the past four years. This is a good test of the thoroughness of the work done at Albert.

We are also able to report, a class of 28 candidates for matriculation in Arts into Victoria University. This is nearly double the number of candidates prepared by any one High School or Collegiate Institute in Ontario. The next highest being that of Toronto Collegiate Institute, which last year prepared 16 candidates for the Toronto University. It will thus be seen that Albert is a very important feeder to Victoria. We also report a class of 18 candidates for the preliminary examinations of the Methodist Church. The College offers special advantages for this class of students, and the number is increasing from year to year.

During the summer vacation of 1888 the College buildings were greatly enlarged and improved, at a cost of \$7,000. The buildings are now heated throughout by steam, and are among the most comfortable

and commodious to be found in the Province.

The Y. M. C. A. in connection with the College has been especially active during the past year, and its labors have been especially blessed in the conversion of a large number of students. We are able to report a marked religious influence throughout the entire year.

Missionary societies have been organized, and have been the means of creating great missionary zeal among the students. Fourteen of the

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young men have offered themselves for missionary work, and are organized into a volunteer band, with captain and other officers. Efforts are being made to raise money to send one of their number to a foreign field. They have set apart Mr. F. J. Livingston, and have succeeded in raising more than one-half of the amount required to send him as a missionary to Africa—the "dark continent." It will thus be seen that Albert has had a year of great prosperity.

There is a great desire on the part of the officers of the College to increase the attendance to 200 during the coming year. It is fully believed that if the opportunities offered, and the high class of work done, were more generally known, that this desire could be easily accomplished. Would the ministers and lay members of the Conference kindly aid in this by sending the names of any prospective students to the Principal of the College.

OBITUARY.

REV. HENRY LANTON.

Henry Lanton was born in Sunderland, England, in 1809. He was left an orphan at a very tender age. We have no information as to the time when he gave his heart to God and became a follower of Christ, but it seems to have been when he was quite young. When but a boy he formed the resolution to obtain, if possible, a good education. Left without parental care at so early a period in life, to obtain a liberal education was a matter of great difficulty; but by energy and diligent application he finally succeeded. He attended the Theological Institution in London when one of England's greatest theologians and best educators was at its head—Rev. John Hannah, D.D. Brother Lanton possessed an active mind, well stored with knowledge, both sacred and secular. He was ordained to the work of the Christian ministry in 1837. His ordination took place in the old, historic City Road Chapel, London, a place of worship rendered sacred to Methodism because of its early associations. He offered himself for mission work in any part of the world, and was sent to the city of Quebec, which at that time was under the supervision of the British Conference. His next station was the town of Stanstead, under the superintendence of the late Rev. Dr. Cooney. While in Stanstead he was married to Miss Annie Fisher, daughter of the late John Fisher, Esq., a prominent member of the Methodist Church in the city of Quebec. Mr. Fisher formed a link in the historic chain of those instrumental in establishing Methodism on this continent, he being a grandson of the noted Philip Embury. During his active ministry he was stationed in the following places, viz., Quebec, Stanstead, Kingston, Peterborough, Hamilton, Belleville, Three Rivers, Sherbrooke, Clarenceville, Prescott, Perth, Bath and Vienna. In all his fields of ministerial toil he left a good record, and was beloved by the people to whom he ministered He was a good theologian, an able preacher, and a successful pastor. Even after his superannuation, he occasionally supplied some of our best city While stationed at Vienna, his health, which had partially failed once or twice during his active ministry, now entirely gave way, rendering it necessary for him to take a superannuated relation. This took place in 1868, when he took up his residence in the city of Hamilton, where he lived during the past twenty years. Brother Lanton was a man truly devoted to God. His piety was deep, his love for God's house and worship strong, his fidelity to and love for his ministerial brethren unwavering; while the people among whom he mingled revere his memory as a man of God. His last illness was long and painful, but was borne with Christian patience and resignation to the Divine will He fell asleep in Jesus on September 19th, 1888, in the seventy-ninth year of his age and fifty-first of his ministry, leaving a devoted wife and six daughters to mourn his departure. A memorial service was held in Centenary Church, Hamilton, to which he belonged, on Sabbath evening, September 30th, 1888, which was attended by a large congregation and several ministers of the city. An impressive and appropriate sermon was delivered by the pastor, Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., after which a paper was read by Rev. William Morton, giving a brief sketch oi the life of the deceased Affectionate and interesting addresses were given by the President of Conference, Rev. W. J. Maxwell, and Rev. Francis Coleman. 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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

NIAGARA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

Dearly Beloved Brethren, - Again through the tender mercy of our God we, your pastors and co-laborers in Conference assembled, present you our accustomed annual greetings and counsels in the name of the Lord. Receive them as a renewed assurance of the unfeigned love which we cherish for your souls, and of our earnest solicitude that you should always increase "with the increase of God." For be ye well assured that no subject has caused us more anxious and prayerful consideration than that of your religious life. Our deliberations, plans and labors will prove of little avail unless they aid in promoting your spirituality. The most precious heritage, short of Christ and Heaven, which the Church can enjoy is a holy membership, associated with a consecrated ministry, "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ye before our Lord Jesus at His coming? For ye are our glory and our joy." In an important sense, the spirituality of the Church is the fountain head of her power and prosperity. Her strength, efficiency, and success will rise no higher than the spring of her devotion to the Master. The preachers of the Gospel, in a great degree, will be crippled in their evangelistic efforts unless they can point to the Lord's people as living illustrations of Gospel power. This holy living of professed Christians is among the mightiest arguments to convince the gainsayers, and enforce the claims of the religion of Christ. "For so is the will of God, that with well-doing ye may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men."

In Conference assembled we have rejoiced in having present with us, in some of the sessions at least, both of the General Superintendents, whose visits were highly appreciated; and although Dr. Williams has been for some time in delicate health, and was unable to take a very active part in the proceedings, yet his counsels have warmed and much encouraged our hearts in this great work, and we are still hopeful that the great Head of the Church may long spare his life to his home and the Church which he has served so faithfully and well for so many years.

This has been to us a year of unusual anxiety and perplexity, but we are thankful to God for signs of returning unity and brotherly confidence. In reviewing the work of God within this Conference during the year, we devoutly return thanks to God that the baptism of the Holy Spirit has been descending in a copious measure on the hosts of the Lord, as they

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have labored for the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom and the overthrow of the hosts of sin, and grand and glorious victories have been won for Christ. We find that no less than two thousand six hundred and eighty-three have been received on trial; but, after filling up all vacancies, we are only able to report an increase of five hundred and sixty. For this, although not as great as desired, we are truly thankful to Almighty God, and would say, let us pray and labor for much greater things during the present year, convinced, we are, that the end of all our prayers and labors is the conversion of souls to God, and their upbuilding in righteousness.

You will be pleased to learn that several of our Connexional Funds are in advance of last year's returns. This advancement to us is very encouraging, as such will, no doubt, secure greater success for the Master in all departments of Church work during the year upon which we have now entered. We rejoice also in the deep interest manifested during the past year in our educational work, and although the Federation movement has been seriously interfered with, yet the contributions in behalf of the Educational Fund have not diminished but increased, and many have shown a willingness, not only within the pale of the Church but also outside, to subscribe, on patriotic grounds, toward the accomplishment of the educational policy adopted by our General Conference.

Our Sabbath school work also has been very encouraging indeed. Large numbers have been gathered into the fold of Christ from this branch of Church work, and over four thousand are meeting in class, and still this field is whitening unto the harvest. Put ye forth the sickle, as the very richest sheaves may be gathered here. In all your labor, aim steadily at gathering them into the Church, to be recognized as members, to be organized into classes under the care of suitable leaders. We earnestly advise you to provide suitable buildings and class-rooms, to furnish carefully choice libraries and periodicals, to encourage the teaching of our Catechism; in short, to take the school under your fostering care, and do all possible to increase and perpetuate its efficiency.

We would especially urge upon you to patronize our periodicals—the Christian Guardian, the Methodist Magazine, the Canadian Methodist Quarterly, and our Sunday-school papers. There is an ever-widening field in which our denominational literature is indispensable, in order that the prince of this world may be cast out and the Son of Man glorified. Brethren secure these periodical for your homes They contain exactly the ideas, lessons and information that need to be instilled into the mind of the entire Church. The work that God has given us to do, will suffer loss, so long as even one family remains without our denominational literature.

In the great field of temperance reform the voice of the Master is loudly calling for united and vigorous effort. Much has been done, but much remains to be accomplished. An important crisis in the movement has been reached. Now let no feeling of discouragement, arising from the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in so many counties, cause you to relax your strenuous efforts for the everthrow of the drink traffic in this country. The repeal has demonstrated that no half-way measure for the removal of the evils of intemperance can suffice; and that we should be recreant to our duty if ever we stopped short of total prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes.

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Another serious question has come before our Conference, viz.: the Jesuits' Estates Act of the Province of Quebec. Permit us to state that we cannot but express our deep regret that political partisanship should be allowed to manifest itself on this question, and that the great interests of our country should not be properly considered. But we earnestly hope and pray that the efforts which are now being made, and may yet be made, to prevent the march of the invading foe, may be successful, and that should the question be farther tested at the polls, you will stand loyally against the aggression of Jesuitism in this country. We solemnly call upon our people to be united and unyielding in the demand, that the candidates for parliamentary honors shall be the true friends of our country, upholding equal rights to all, but special privileges to none.

And now, beloved brethren, once more we are face to face with the toils and responsibilites of another Conference year. We are thankful that the great Head of the Church has spared the lives of the ministerial brethren in such a wonderful manner during the past year, and that only one of our number has been called to his reward, and he in a ripe old age. What resolves, questionings, hopes and fears agitate our hearts, but in the name of our God we will set up our banners. Let us hope for glorious Let us guard against mere dependence upon ecclesiastical machinery. Let us cherish unwavering faith in the power of God, and expect the baptism of the Holy Ghost. Let us not be satisfied with the mere perfunctory discharge of religious duty; but filled with holy zeal, and with hearts inspired with love let us resolve that every class-meeting, every prayer meeting, and more public services of the sanctuary, shall all be seasons of revival spiritual up-lifting, so that we may have in connection with all our congregations, not only a few weeks of special revival services, but also as Pastors and Churches we may rejoice in the constant manifestations of the working of the Spirit of God in the regeneration and sanctification of the people. Could we reach this sacred altitude of perfect self-surrender, and complete consecration, then we all shall see signs and wonders; and our glad hearts shall join in the grand old apostolic doxology to the all-conquering hosts of Jehovah-"Now thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place."
