The other Dominions will be interested in this discussion because it may influence their future attitude towards similar appointments on their part. Hitherto, Australia has favored the appointment of a liason officer to the Foreign Office to keep Australia specially informed on foreign affairs, but Canada has never shown any enthusiasm at this departure, preferring to let the High Commissioner act as its

### **Empire Heads** Dodge Reefs

Canada Satisfied With Progress in Foreign Policy at Imperial Meeting

By C. F. CRANDALL Pres. British United Press Exclusive to The Times-Star ONDON, Oct. 26.—The good ship British Empire has lightly dodged the reefs of foreign policy and constitutional issues which threatened to wreck it in the early days of the conference and has now entered smooth and more easily navigable waters in various committee rooms at number 10 Downing street. Canada is generally satisfied at the main line of progress in the matter of British foreign policy, and the fact that Hertzog has been forced to beat a strategic retreat because Mackenzie King is the keystone of the

conference and is able to record

what amounts to a casting vote.

DREMIER HERTZOG is also embarrassed because the chief of his party, Dan Koetzo, chairman of the Nationalists of South Africa, has resigned and is joining Smuts and the South African party because he is anxious to further the interests of South Africa within the commonwealth of British nations. The British, too, have intimated, through .Sir Austen Chamberlain, that definition of the status of the Dominions, such as Hertzog demands, would be contrary to every principle of free growth upon which the Empire has been built, and that it is useless to enter into hair-splitting arguments about Locarno since Locarno is only in essence the policy which Britain has adopted in Europe for centuries, but which is guaranteed under the treaty by the League of Nations, to which all the Dominions belong.

AT YESTERDAY'S meeting of

the Conference Premier Mackenzie King read a written statement on foreign policy in which he emphasized the importance of the growth of Canada's overseas trade and the necessity for its adequate defence, telling the delegates how closely linked up it was with British foreign policy. Upon his suggestion, the conference agreed that a committee should be set up under the chairmanship of Col. Amery for studying communications other than aerial, for it is recognized that the Dominions' conception of foreign policy must be governed by these considerations. Every Premier at the conference except Bruce, of Australia, has read a written statement, but Premier Bruce says that he is not prepared to adopt such a procedure and has pointed out that little progress will be made if the conference confines its efforts to an interchange of written statements on foreign policy. It is suggested, therefore, that a committee should be formed of all Premiers to thrash out this vexed problem of foreign policy, and this course was readily agreed to.

HALIFAX, Oct. 26 .- The three masted schooner Favonian, Captain Frank Rangdale, piled ashore at Three Fathom Harbor, 15 miles east of Halifax. last night, and late this morning was rapidly breaking up. The crew of seven got ashore in the long boat shortly after dawn, and were brought to Halifax by train. The schooner left Barbados September 17, with a cargo of molasses, bound for Charlottetown.

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

### The Queen of Rumania

ALTHOUGH it is at present denied that King Ferdinand of Rumania has cabled his queen commanding her return, there cannot but be concern in Rumanian court circles on account of the lurid publicity which is being thrown on the royal family of that Balkan state. Prince Carol made himself thoroughly notorious not long ago, but many people possibly retain a sneaking sympathy for that royal scapegrace, having regard to the lack of choice legally permitted a Prince when choosing his consort. Now Prince Carol's royal nother is being advertised as thoroughly as any Hollywood star.

Recently adverse comments on the enthusiastic reception accorded to Queen Marie by the United States appeared in the English press, and at this the American press took umbrage. The latter claimed that the United States is at liberty to tender just as warm a welcome to Queen Marie as it did to the Prince of Wales, and therein it is right. The fact of the matter is that the difference lies in the recipient, not in the welcome, a point which London newspapers do not perhaps appreciate, whilst those of a republic cannot be expected to discriminate between the dignified democracy of our Heir Apparent and that of a queen who accepts free rides by steamships, free accommodation in hotels and allows publicity rights of her royal words to be acquired. Commercialism and royalty do not march together.

Queen Marie may by her Hohenzollern histrionics and temperament make herself popular in the United States. She may make money. But she is not doing good service to royalty in general, I Believe in Keepingwhilst as regards the Rumanian dynasty she seems already to have placed a weapon in the hands of a political party which, from the outset, opposed her trip across the Atlantic.

### Hudson's Bay Company

IN VIEW of the visit of the Governor and two directors of the Hudson's Bay Company to Saint John, it is interesting to note the company's change of policy in relation to Canada. There was a time when it was regarded merely as a furtrading company, but now it has much to do with the mercantile life of the West. At the last annual meeting of the Union of Canadian Municipalities Mayor Webb of Winnipeg, who was here last week to attend the Canadian Board of Trade Convention, made particular reference to the activities of the Hudson's Bay Company. He pointed out that it has great stores in Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary and Vancouver, and has in addition 218 other mercantile establishments. Mayor Webb con-

"In changing their policies they are starting out to develop Western Canada from the point of view of population. They feel that they have got to get something behind their mercantile operations and they have therefore formed a vast immigration department in conjunction with the Cunard Line. They are endeavoring, in one way and another, to make it possible that people can be brought to Canada in such a way as to make it worth while." Whoever visits the western cities mentioned by

Mayor Webb quickly learns how important a factor the Hudson's Bay Company is in their mercantile life. Now that it is giving attention to the matter of immigration, its service to Canada will be infinitely greater. Saint John extends a cordial welcome to these visitors.

### Broadening Out

FROM an economic point of view, Saint John is

But far more important will be the effect these events will have on the general outlook of our people. The Foolish Old Mother Who Forces Her Son to Wait Until After Her Death to be Married-What Makes a Girl Popular?—How Can a Fellow Find Out Whether or Not a Girl Loves Him?

DEAR MISS DIX-I am engaged to be married to a man who is 33 years old. He promised his mother, who is 75, that he would never marry as long as she lived. Now I am not selfish nor jealous of her, for I think there is nothing more beautiful than a son's love for his mother, but it is horrible to me for us just

# WIRE COMMUNICATIONS

Storm Sets in on Sunday and Continues Throughcut Night and During Monday Almost Without Let Up

HIGH WIND AND HIGH TEMPERATURE

Washouts on Branch Line and Roads Isolate Albert and Riverside Villages; Five Breaks in St. Martins Railway; 18 Telephone Circuits Temporarily Disabled

THE heavy rainstorm which deluged the western and southern portions of the province on Sunday night and during Monday was the heaviest experienced in some time and considerable damage was done in several localities. Highways were washed out in several places and a number of washouts are reported on the railways while there was considerable interruption of telephonic and telegraphic communications, due for the most part to trees being blown down across the wires. The services on the main line of railways were, for the most part, maintained without any appreciable delays and the telephone and telegraph companies were able to transmit messages by circuitous routes.

The remarkable feature of the storm was the high temperature throughout its duration.

Districts in the lower end of Albert county were cut off from the middle part of the province by rail and highway due to washouts in both instances, Riverside and Albert villages being isolated. A great part of the Sussex valley was under water last night with a highway bridge out at Waterford and other culverts and bridges in the Havelock area threatened. St. Martins branch line sustained no less than five washouts and washouts were also reported on the Gibson branch line. A bridge on the Valley line at Oromocto is also out.
