Lucien Romier, who declined an offer by former Premier Herriot of M. Caillaux's present hazardous post, while he admires the finance minister's truth telling, warns in Figaro that the preliminary battle has just begun, and that the fate of the cabinet depends, after all, on the vote of the moderate members of the Chamber.

ASKS FULL POWERS

M. Caillaux yesterday asked the Chamber to give the cabinet power to offset governmental economies or arrange other details for stabilization of the franc by decree of the cabinet. If the "full powers" are granted it will be the first time in the history of the "third republic" although M. Poincare asked for such powers in 1924 in order to obtain \$100,000,000 credit from J. P. Morgan and Company..

With the exception of irreconcilable radicals and conservative extremists, the House cheered M. Caillaux loudly yesterday when he presented his program.



If You Never Invite Yourself for a Visit, if You Never Make a Free Roadhouse of Your Friends' Country Homes, if You Can Fall in With the Food and the Plans of Your Hostess, You'll be One of Those Rare Birds, a Truly Welcome Guest.

HERE are a few don'ts for the summer visitor: Don't be a self-invited guest. Chief among the social pests upon whom we would like to use some peculiarly potent and fatal insecticide are those who write us that they are pining for a breath of sea air, or longing to rest and relax in the country, and would like to come and spend a few days with us.

All normal means of communication are still open. The postoffice, the telegraph and the telephone are functioning as usual, and you may be very sure that if any of your relatives or friends pine for your society and desire a visit from you they would have no difficulty in communicating the fact to you.

DON'T surprise even your nearest and dearest by dropping in upon them without warning. A surprise is always a boomerang that anni-hilates the perpetrator by insuring her a frosty

Nobody in the world loves anybody else enough to want to have all of their plans and arrangements upset by the sudden descent upon them of an un-

DOROTHY DIX THERE are a thousand domestic contingencies that make us loathe the sight of the person who comes at an inopportune moment, whom we would be glad to see on some auspicious occasion. No amount of affection enables us to greet Aunt Sally or Cousin Sue with anything but a sickly smile when they pop in on us when the cook has just left in a huff, or the baby has the measles, or the house is jammed to the roof.

Don't forget when you are asked to pay a visit that an invita-tion is nontransferable, and is intended only for the use of the individual to whom it is issued. It does not include the other members of your family, and it most particularly doesn't include your children. Neither does it include your pet poodle.

POSSIBLY there are good Samaritans who are heroic enough to invite a mother with children, or a woman with her pets, to pay them a visit. But creatures of this high, heroic mold, martyrs craving suffering, are as scarce as hen's teeth, and are not to be taken for granted. Most people would rather have a spell of sickness than a week-end visit from a mother with children, or a woman who talks baby talk to a Pekinese, so don't take along your encumbrances unless it is so stated in the bond.

Don't, when you are making a motor trip, arrange your schedule so to spend the night, or arrive at luncheon, with friends. Of course, this materially lightens the cost of your outing by saving the hotel bills, but it is rough on your involuntary hosts. If you could even dimly apprehend what the Jones' are thinking when they see you drive up to their door just at dusk with a car full of people, half of whom they have probably never seen before, you would push on to the next town if it took your last gallon of gasoline, for they are despising you as you deserve for the cheap grafter that you are.

IF YOU will observe, you will see that the first year that people own a country place they are wildly enthusiastic about it. The second year they are non-committal, and the third year it is for sale. The reason for this decline and fall off in love for the great free spaces is because every one who lives along a motor road is forced to keep a free roadhouse. There is no other way in which you can endear yourself to your friends as by passing them by, unless they have specifically invited you to park in their guestroom at a certain specified time.

Don't visit at all, if you are a food faddist, or are on a diet. If you have to have your cereals cooked in some peculiar way, or some special bread that is unattainable at the village bakery, or you can't eat fish or meat or vegetables that haven't been steamed for nine hours and forty-five seconds, then, for pity's sake, stay at home where you can humor your stomach, or go to a hotel where you can pay for the trouble you cause.

SERVANTS are never so temperamental anywhere else as they are in the country. Food is far more difficult to get than it is in the city, where there is a butcher shop and a fancy grocery around every corner, so don't make the poor, overworked housekeeper's lot any harder by forcing her to cater to your dietetic whims.

Don't visit unless you are adaptable and able and willing to fall in with all the plans your hostess has made for your entertainment. She is spending time and money and effort trying to give you pleasure, so whether you enjoy things or not, give a lifelike imitation of having the time of your life.

NO OTHER people on earth are so exasperating as are those guests who accept an invitation to the seashore, yet refuse to go in the water, or to fish, or even to eat fish, or who come to visit you in the mountains and will neither walk nor look at a view; who will not play cards in a bridge fiend's house, or picnic with one who loves getting back to nature, and whose sole function is to wet-blanket every occasion and take all of the person out of it.

All of us know the idiosyncrasies of our friends, and about what will be expected of us when we go to their houses. It is only decent to play their game their way when we are eating their bread.

DON'T blame your hostess if it rains, or the weather is too hot or too cold. She can't do a thing about it, and she feels worse about it than you do. Don't criticize her friends, or tell her how to raise her children or manage her house. She didn't call you in as an efficiency expert.

Don't fiirt with your hostess' husband or her son or her brother. It isn't playing the game. During a visit is a closed season for affairs with the male members of a household.

DON'T stay too long. Don't wear out your welcome. When your hostess begs you to prolong your visit, she is merely acting up to the proprieties. Don't take her seriously. She is keeping her fingers crossed for fear you will take her at her word.







Jones turned in marvellous golf in his greatest triumph. He had a 72 for his first two rounds, then a 73, followed by a 74 for a total of 291. 


