

# 300,000 HOUSES ARE BURNED, TOKIO POLICE ANNOUNCE, AS REFUGEES DIE THOUSANDS IN EFFORT TO

Only 40,000 Persons Believed Saved in City of Yokohama—Eruptions Continue Following Earthquake and Tidal Wave-Efforts to Communicate With Tokio Prove Fruitless-Report Says That New Japanese Premier Has Been Attacked—8,000 Operatives Believed Dead in One City-Huge Earth Swells at Los Angeles Follow Big Catas-

#### BULLETIN RECEIVED AT-2 P. M.

Shanghai. Sept. 4.—Tokio still in flames, loss of life there alone at least 50,000: damage perhaps half a billion yen (about \$250,000,000).

These were the latest estimates received here this afternoon in a special message by the Eastern News Agency from Osaka.

Restoration of telegraphic communication between Osaka and Tokio brought the capital a flood of delayed messages of condolence from the rulers and executives of the world powers. San Francisco, Sept. 4.—Casualties from the earthquake and fire total 500,000 and 300,000 houses have been burned, it is estimated by the me tropolitan police of Tokio, according to a courier from Oyoma, who reported today at Tomioka to the Radio Cor-

ONLY 40,000 PERSONS ARE LEFT

Peking, Sept. 4.—There are but 40,000 persons left in the city of Yokohama, all the rest being dead or having fled to places of safety, according to a landing party from the steamer Korea Maru, whose report on conditions was received here today. Yokohama's

population as given by the last enumeration was approximately 423,000.

The landing party, it is asserted, obtained evidence in support of the earlier story that an attack had been made on the new Premier, Count Yamamoto.

The story as relayed through them was that the Count was attacked while attending the session of the naval club at which the new cabinet was outlined and which the earth-

quake interrupted. The attackers aim, it was said, was frustrated by others present.

The landing party sought to proceed from Yokohama toward Tokio, but were prevented from doing so by the police, who blocked the road and denied passage to all who were not carrying their own food supplies or could not prove the urgency of their mission in the stricken capital.

#### INSURANCE MARKET RECEIVES BLOW.

London, Sept. 4—Probably the heaviest insurance loss by the Japanese disaster will fall on the London Marine Insurance market. The earthquake risk in Japan is so great that it is excluded from ordinary fire policies, and only where special earthquake insurance has been arranged for will the owners of damaged prop-Stricken Cities Tokio, which has a population of three and a half millions, is the capital of Japan. Its business section is composed of the most modern buildings, reinforced concrete being used in their construction, but in the outlying sections the houses are poorly built of inflammable material, many of the sliding doors to the houses being made of paper. The main street in Tokio is much like that of any large American city and possesses many large departmental stores.

FOOD SUPPLIES SENT TO SUFFERERS

Pekin, Sept. 4—Six U. S. destroyers left the port of Dairen for Yokohama yesterday, carrying a number of doctors and large quantities of food supplies to aid the earthquake victims in the stricken city. The flagship Huron, of the Asiatic fleet, picked up Admiral Anderson at Chefoo and is proceeding to Japan.

The Japanese legation here issued a statement to the effect that the foreign office at Tokio had burned. No other authentic news has been received from the stricken area although it is rumored there are ten thousand deaths in Yokohama.

BODIES ARE PILED HELTER SKELTER.

Osaka, Sept. 4—A terrible tragedy was enacted in and around the Ueno railway sation in Tokio Saturday afternoon. Thousands of refugees, unable to find shelter inside the great station building, were massed in Unop Park while inside, it is estimated, 8,000 ing.

An outbreak of fire from a break in a gas main nearly threw the entire mass into a panic, which became worse when the fire attacked the station buildings themselves.

No estimate of the casualties which ensued has been made, but

those viewing the place said these were "staggering in number. Bodies are piled helter skelter around the station, men, women and children mingled indiscriminately as they fell and were trampled in the mad rush to escape from the fire."

TIDAL WAVE RACES UP RIVER.

The tidal wave which followed the earthquake raced up the Sumida River, destroyed houses on both sides and drowned many

damage and some were destroyed.

Though virtually all railroads on the island of Hondo (principal island of Japan), were damaged heavily, the Tokaido line, running from Tokio to Kobe suffered worse. Representatives of 18 middle western states are to be invited to attend the Conference of Motor Vehicle Administrators, representing state automobile licensing bureaus, to be held here early in September, at which plans will be made for working out safety-first laws for automobilists and pedestrians. The movement is being fostered by the National Safety Council. The convention is to be called by Fred M. Rosseland, chief of the public safety divisions of the National Safety Council.
