Found On Voyage  
Of The Scandanavian

Voyage Rog't—Affidavits as to Conditions Drawn up—Saint John Soldiers Return—Notable Men Among The Home-Comers

The C. P. O. S. liner Scandanavian arrived in port this morning from Liverpool after one of the most eventful voyages of the last few years. She brought 108 officers, 166 other ranks and 146 civilians, the latter chiefly women and children. During the voyage exceptionally rough weather was encountered and it is reported that nearly every one was sick. Spanish influenza broke out and four passengers fell victims and were buried at sea. A child was born at sea.

A list of complaints was compiled on the ship by representatives of every military district representing the various regiments. The list of complaints was made on the other side as to their health, that the sleeping accommodations were unsatisfactory, that there were no arrangements for carrying for the men and babies on board, that one attendant was drunk and acted disorderly and used profane language, also there were complaints about the food.

The four, who died on the passage were Sergeant Wilcox of Sydney, N. S., on January 21; Edwin Gillies of Vancouver; Harriet Roberts of Sydney, N. S., and Edith Dingley, Kesteven, P. E. I. The child was born a few days after the steamer sailed, to Florence and Robert Young of Sydney, N. S.

The case of Sergeant Wilcox is a sad one. He was attached to the imperial force and was discharged in England and was on his way home to meet his wife and five children. As he was not in a position to receive his baggage from the government and the passengers took up a collection for his family, which amounted to \$20.

The soldiers, who have compiled the list of complaints, speaking in a Times interview, said that they intended to have their case before proper authorities and have it investigated. They said that women with children had to climb three flights of stairs to get to the lavatory, that they had only two warm and comfortable blankets, that the women and children were sold in the canteens for three cents each.

Women when asked about their children, that the food was not sufficient for them, and that the sleeping arrangements were not fit for anyone.

Notables on Board.  
Included in the list of officers and men on board who won decorations were: Brigadier-General Harold L. McDonald, of Winnipeg, who won a D. S. O., C. M. G. and D. S. O.; Major John Howard L. Bodwell of Vancouver, who has a D. S. O. and D. S. O.; Major John Victor Brown of Montreal, D. S. O.; Lieutenant Kenneth G. Blackader of Montreal, M. C.; Private William Howard of Lunenburg, S. S., D. C. M.; Private John Battler of Halifax, D. C. M.; Private Philbert Drouin of Quebec, M. C.; Private J. Yarré of Ottawa, M. C.; Gunner T. E. Jones of Montreal, M. C.; Captain R. F. Inch of Hamilton, M. C.

Brigadier-General McDonald of Winnipeg crossed overseas as a lieutenant with the 16th battalion, but won rapid promotion. Soon after arriving in France he was promoted to the staff of the 3rd brigade. While commanding a section of the Canadian troops during the second battle at Ypres in 1915 he fell seriously wounded and for a time his life was despaired of. Having a rugged constitution, however, he pulled through and returned to France in September of 1915 and joined the staff of the second division as brigade major of the 1st brigade.

During the big drive on the Somme, a shell burst close to him and he lost his left arm. He was sent to England and after convalescing was given charge of training Canadian soldiers. In June, 1917, he was made a Commander of St. Michael and St. George, and soon afterwards a commander in the Order of St. Anne of Russia. He was also given a D. S. O. for his great work on the Somme.

CITY ENGINEER  
SAYS \$70,000  
WILL GO IT

Big Drop From Figures of Deputy Marine Minister

MATTER OF OUR WHARVES

Estimates as to Repairs During Year in Connection With Negotiations For Transfer to Commission

The sum of \$70,000 is the amount which the city engineer estimates is required for repairs for the city wharves during the current year, instead of the \$100,000 stated by the deputy minister of marine and fisheries in connection with the negotiations for the transfer of the facilities to a dominion harbor commission.

When Mr. Johnston made this statement the mayor wrote asking how the figure was made up and the deputy minister in a dispatch to dominion harbor commission.

The reference made in my letter to the expenditures which would be necessary to place the wharves, etc., in efficient repair, was approximate, and did not, to any very great extent, take any account of details. Your officers are doubtless in a position to estimate more accurately just what will be required to place these wharves in efficient repair, and their knowledge of the several properties will enable them to estimate more accurately in detail what amount will be required. If it turns out that the amount mentioned is approximately what would be required to place the several structures in efficient repair, it is desirable, so far as the city is concerned, that you should suggest what will be required for this purpose. Should it turn out that there is any marked difference between your estimate and that made by this department the matter can be further inquired into.

In a dispatch to the city engineer, G. G. Hare, has prepared and submitted to the dominion harbor commission, the following report:

"With reference to the attached letter from the dominion harbor commission, I have given you an estimate of the repairs to the wharves for the present year, and the repairs for the next year. The work outlined in the repairing of the decayed or worn decking on the wharves, the replacement of broken or decayed beams, the replacement of the floors, or the strengthening of the foundations of the sheds, the painting of the sheds, the replacement of broken or decayed hangers, and in general such maintenance as will preserve the wharves in a condition to handle the traffic.

"This contemplates no improvements in the facilities, but merely the maintenance of the properties in an efficient condition. It is possible, of course, to spend a large amount to improve the facilities, but this is not the standard of maintenance and to raise the factor of safety and make the wharves more secure for operating low speed traffic that passes over them, and it, as may occur in the near future, the city will have to consider the cost of the work of repairing the wharves and sheds with permanent structures, which would be a waste.

"I fall to see just where the deputy minister can have got \$100,000 on maintenance, that is in such maintenance as will preserve the structures in their present state. Seven hundred thousand dollars, however, would be a small sum if the deputy minister is considering some of the present wharves with permanent structures."

THE SKATING RINKS.  
The cold snap has provided soil for skating on this morning and the South End rink was cleared of snow preparation for a big day's amusement for the young folk. A committee of the South End Association is planning to canvass their section of the city for funds to meet the expenses of preparing and maintaining the rink. A member of this association suggested this morning that it should be quite easy to provide skating on the North and West Ends if the residents would form an association and go to it, judging from their experience in the South End.

Success For Clemenceau  
And Lloyd George on The  
Freedom of Seas Question

London, Jan. 9.—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuters' Limited)—Messages from Paris indicate that Premier Clemenceau and Premier Lloyd George have scored a great success on the question of the freedom of the seas, and that very little is likely to be said thereon when the actual peace conference assembles. The Spanish-Morocco question has also been settled to the satisfaction of Great Britain and France.

Paris, Jan. 9.—It is probable that there will be eighty delegates at the peace conference. There will, in addition, be extra delegates from most of the nations represented. These will be called in when special subjects arise which they are experts in under consideration.

They will go out on the regular St. John train leaving Halifax this evening.

CONDENSED NEWS

The ex-Kaiser is better and able to be out doors again. The Allies have notified Turkey that unless the Turkish fleet at Medina lays down its arms immediately the forts at the Dardanelles will be destroyed. A strike of the Swedish seamen's union has spread to virtually all ports and is endangering the supply of food stuffs and raw materials. Germany has fallen behind in turning over material required under the armistice. The United States, Great Britain and Italy have agreed upon a plan for taking over German passenger tonnage. The British steamer Merita reported stranded at Le Touquet, on the French coast December 30, has parted amidships and will be a total loss. The government forces were reported in complete control of that section of the intensity of Berlin between the Brandenburg gate and Friedrichstrasse yesterday. The British steamer Northumbria, 1,215 tons, struck a mine off Middleborough, Thursday afternoon and it is believed that most of the crew was lost. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be in Toronto on January 21, when the new Central Ontario Liberal Association will be organized. Dr. William B. Van Lennep, homeopathic surgeon, and dean of Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia, died yesterday. TO ENGLAND FOR OPERATION. A letter has been received from L. Cory, E. A. Belding of the Dumbell Concert Party of the 3rd Canadian Division, which was in Mons when the armistice was signed and went later to Brussels. He says that he arrived at Eberles Hospital on Christmas Eve and received to go at once to England to undergo a minor operation. On Christmas night he sang to the patients in three wards in the hospital. They had a great Christmas dinner with turkey and all the trimmings.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 10.—Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley this afternoon presented to Mrs. E. H. Clarkson a Military Cross won by her son, the late temporary Captain David William Clarkson, 16th Battalion, E. F. STATEMENT BY DR. MELVIN

In addition to what the Minister of Health has said in this morning's edition of the Daily Telegraph with respect to the precautions relative to the introduction of smallpox into this province from Halifax the chief medical officer here wishes to say that on November 28 he asked the authorities at Halifax for a statement of the number of cases of smallpox then present in that city, and for the number that had been reported during September and October last. In reply to this request he has received the following information: The health board of Halifax that twenty-one cases had been reported in that city for September, that twenty-nine cases had been reported for October and that on November 12 there were fifteen cases in the city.

On December 12 he was informed by the same authority that twenty cases of smallpox existed in Halifax. On December 26 cases of smallpox were reported in the weekly bulletin issued by the department of health for Nova Scotia, for the week previous in Digby, Marshall's Town, Amherst and Halifax and in the three last mentioned towns it was stated that all of the cases so reported had been reported in Halifax according to the weekly bulletin of the Department of Health. The information which the chief medical officer understands has been made that these precautions were undertaken from some motive other than protection of public health he considers quite unworthy of refutation.

FUEL CONSERVATION ORDERS WITHDRAWN

Washington, Jan. 10.—All orders and regulations as to fuel conservation, except one relating to natural gas, were withdrawn yesterday. Regulations as to zones and prices and how others remain in effect, but the question of fuel saving is now more a matter for individual determination.

RE-ORGANIZATION OF THE BOSTON AND MAINE

Boston, Jan. 10.—Stockholders of the Boston & Maine railroad voted by a large majority yesterday to adopt the plan for re-organization of the system previously endorsed by the company directors and by Director-General McAdoo of the federal railroad administration.

HIGHER CARTAGE CHARGES.

The Dominion Coal Co. Ltd., of Sydney, through the local representatives, notify customers in a circular letter that on and after today and until further notice the rate for carting will be 70c a ton of 2,000 pounds. This is an increase of ten cents.

NEWARK INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION PROJECT

The Newark, N. J., Technical School is to be expanded and reorganized into an industrial college or university having a four-year course, immediately following the war. Dr. Daniel R. Hodgdon has been the director of the school since June. The programme as it is being developed under Dr. Hodgdon's direction covers the records of the evening class for shops attending the school for two weeks and then returning to the shops for three, after which they will come back to the school again, and so on through the four-year course.

### A HEALTHY INDICATION.

Even the casual reader of the St. John papers must be impressed by the amount of spade work that is being done in preparation for definite reforms and the number of different organizations that are showing an interest in these matters. Housing, vocational training, child-welfare, labor bureaus, the welfare of the returning soldiers, mothers' pensions—these and other matters relating to the public welfare are receiving a great deal of attention, and a healthy public sentiment is being aroused. There must of course be concerted action to get results. Discussion and the adoption of resolutions are useful and necessary, but they must be followed by definite co-operation in a practical way. What the people as a body want they will get when their case is clearly and strongly presented to those having authority. It is only the apathy of the people that permits undesirable conditions to exist. Now that the strain of the war is over, and the call to service in the direction of making democracy safe for the world has come, it would be most unfortunate if the people failed to respond. There are great needs and great opportunities. Men and women never had so strong a challenge to link themselves up with worthy causes.

### IN GERMANY.

Berlin is the centre of disturbance in Germany. The rest of the country appears to be fairly quiet, except that small outbreaks occur here and there in sympathy with the Spartac group in Berlin. A member of the Bavarian government has declared that the rest of the country is tired of the present situation, and that unless peace is restored in Berlin a Bavarian army may be sent to perform that task. Yesterday's reports seemed to indicate that the Spartacans have overthrown the Ebert government in Berlin, but it now appears that with the aid of troops brought into the city the government is holding on and is determined to establish order. The wiser heads are able to see that continued turmoil means greater disaster. They realize that the country should settle down and meet the demands of the Allies, in order that a beginning may be made in paying the debt and repairing the ravages of the war. Germany today has no market for her wares, and will be a long time getting one after peace is established. Delay in settling down means further disaster to industry and commerce. Of course the Bolsheviks are not concerned about industry or commerce. Their ideal apparently is a country where there is no incentive for the citizen except the desire to mob somebody else. Until they are overcome Germany must continue to suffer. Her state will probably never be as bad as that of Russia, whose curse is the ignorance of the great mass of the people; but unless the government uses the strong hand and is backed up by the majority of the people the conditions will grow worse than they are today.

### BRITAIN'S EXAMPLE.

The new education laws of England and Scotland not only provide for continuation classes for pupils of the public schools until they are eighteen years of age, but they also provide that nursery schools for children from two to five years old may be established by local authorities with government aid. The following comment by the Christian Science Monitor on what England and Scotland have done will interest readers of the Times-Star, in view of the fact that education is a very live issue in St. John at present.

"It is clear that during the past year Great Britain has been in the van of educational progress. Consequently her achievements in this direction deserve close attention. Both for England and Scotland the measures enacted will transform the general outlook of the people upon the connection between the home and the school and between both and the place of employment. Nursery schools for children between two and five years of age, though they are not yet received within the fold of the public elementary system of education, may be established by local authorities and aided with moneys provided by parliament. That brings the school very close to the home. Then as to the provision in the English act which requires employers to suspend the work of 'young persons' not only for the time actually needed for continuation classes, but also for a further period, not exceeding two hours, in order that these older boys and girls may be in a fit condition to receive full benefit from attendance at school; is not this a section that, if properly administered, will bring employers, workmen, and education authorities into close touch with one another? The Scottish act says, in so many words, that these three groups are to co-operate in the working of schemes for continuation classes. There is here a genuine opportunity for the closer approach of capital and labor. Again, in both countries efforts have been made by their education departments to raise the salaries of teachers' salaries, but, since the school staffs are not directly in the service of the state, such efforts can be only indirect. The present insufficiency of the remuneration of teachers, and the protests that are being made in consequence, are conditions that

seem almost world-wide. War prices have soared far beyond any augmentations of salary. Nevertheless, England has done much in the closing months of the year to raise teaching as a profession, and to make such a career attractive to young men and young women of parts; for parliament has, during that time, passed into law a school teachers' superannuation bill which places them on much the same footing as civil servants in regard to pension. This act is undoubtedly the handiwork of a president of the board of education who has himself definite professional experience as well as civic and general training of the highest order. When other countries have provided themselves with a minister of education on the pattern of Herbert Fisher, they will have taken a long step forward to the attainment of their school ideals."

From the text: "There was no room for them in the inn." Canon Vernon in Toronto on Sunday discussed social conditions. He showed that every child has a right to be well born, of clean, healthy parentage, in healthful environment. Every child has a right to some enjoyment of life, the right to an opportunity of usefulness and service. Continuing, he said: "But there is not room for the child of the slums to have these things, there is no opportunity for the boy forced into blind-alley occupations to grow into a healthy citizenship; no room for their physical development or growth. There are two great solutions of the fact that there is no room in the inn, being offered to us today. One is to tear down the inns, to smash up the furniture, to slaughter the inmates and to let those who remain enjoy themselves in the ruins, which is the answer of Bolshevism. The second is the solution of the Christian Social Service, which is to enlarge and build more inns to lift up the fallen and create and enlarge opportunities, which is following the teaching of Christ."

At least one Canadian journal joined in the hue and cry against Lord and Lady Aberdeen in connection with their activities in the United States last year. The cast and countless have been completely exonerated from charges made against them. The money they were instrumental in collecting was not misappropriated. Their friends in Canada were convinced the charges made were malicious and false.

Premier Hughes of Australia sees no evidence of a change of heart in Germany, but only a desire to escape from the penalty of her crimes. He warns the Allies against being deluded by empty phrases and pledges that would quickly be broken if that would serve the interests of the German leaders. In the meantime a British commission is preparing a formidable indictment of the ex-Kaiser.

War restrictions on trade are being gradually removed and there is an approach to normal conditions, although the demands upon tonnage for transportation of troops and supplies will affect conditions for many months to come.

It will take three years to repair the damage done by the Germans to French coal mines. Germany should be made to pay the bill. France today is running short of coal.

The provincial government will be asked to consider the question of child-welfare and several others of similar character. That the members will be sympathetic is certain. The difficult thing will be to convince them that they can find the money, but the money should be found.

The Sinn Feiners want an Irish republic. The situation in Ireland is serious, but that is not a novel condition. When the peace conference is over this problem will tax the wisdom of British statesmanship.

Premiers Borden, Hughes and Botha will have part in some of the discussions at the peace conference, and they will be at hand for consultation concerning matters affecting the Dominions.

Bolshevism will not disturb Baden, where in the elections to the national assembly the socialists polled less than one-third of the possible vote.

The Bolsheviks captured Vilna, and we read: "A massacre of civilians began at once." That is Bolshevism as it exists in Russia.

New York is near the hunger point as a result of the marine workers' strike. A general strike has been proclaimed in the Argentine Republic.

An improved West India service will be of great benefit to the port of St. John as well as to Canada.







EXTRACTS FROM "THE SAINT JOHN CITY ASSESSMENT ACT 1918"  
30. (1) Every person liable to taxation under this Act, shall make the following returns:  
(a) A return of his personal property located in the City of Saint John and taxable under section 5 of this Act.  
(b) Income taxable under section 6, and the particulars thereof, except when the total taxable income is included in the return of an employer as provided in sub-section 5 of this section.  
(c) Earnings or receipts taxable under section 8 and the particulars thereof.  
(2) Every person employing the services or labor of another person or of other persons shall make a statement giving the name and address of every person employed by him and the amount of wages, salaries, or other compensation paid to such employee or employees. Every firm, co-partnership, or corporation shall make a statement of the salaries, allowances, or other compensation of partners or officers.  
(3) The return or statement required by this section shall be made on or before the tenth day of February in each year, in such form as the assessors shall from time to time prescribe, and shall be made under oath which may be sworn to before any assessor, or any Justice of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, or any Notary Public; and for the purposes of this Act, and of all other laws relating to the levying, assessing and collecting of rates and taxes in the City of Saint John, any assessor and any Justice of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, and any Notary Public, Assessor, and administrator shall make a statement of the rates, taxes and assessments in the City of Saint John.



Disorders were reported yesterday from virtually every part of the city, but the most serious fighting was at the Vasena Iron Works, where troops and strikers clashed.

Among the party were fourteen officers who belonged to Australian units, and are now enroute home. Among them were Major G. R. Shirwad and Captain N. M. Morris. The latter was one of the first men to join the colors at the time of the outbreak of hostilities and was with the Australian troops at Gallipoli during their attempt to break through the Dardanelles.


In Germany Three Weeks Ago.


### EXEMPTION FOR PULP MILL



## stitution of Irish Republic

Jan. 9.—What purports to be the constitution for Ireland today in the Globe. It sets out the people of Ireland under the name of the Irish Republic. The article then sets forth the Sinn Féin constitution for Ireland, and having achieved that status, Irish people by a referendum to choose their own form of government. It says that the Sinn Féin shall, "in the name of the Irish people, deny the right of the will of British parliament to legislate for Ireland."

"make use of any and every means available to render impotent the power of England to hold Ireland in subjection, by military force or otherwise." The purported constitution declares that a constituent assembly shall be convened to formulate measures for the welfare of the people. The measures specified are the introduction of a protective system for industries and commerce by the combined action of the county and urban councils, the poor law board, the harbor boards and other bodies directly responsible to the Irish people; the establishment of a consular service and of a mercantile marine for direct trading with foreign countries; the development of mineral resources; the establishment of a national stock exchange, national civil service and Sinn Féin courts of arbitration; the development of transit facilities; the form of education on a national and industrial basis; the abolition of the poor law system, with relief for the infirm and aged, and the employment of idle able-bodied persons on public works.



**ARRANGE TO HAVE NIGHT CLERK TO FILL PRESCRIPTIONS**

Suggestion of Subsidy for Some St. John Druggist

**WELL WORTH CONSIDERING**  
Thought Born of Experience of Few Nights Ago When Medicine Was Greatly Needed and it Could Not be Obtained

A suggestion that contains the elements of common sense and reason has been made to the Times by a thoughtful citizen and it would seem that the materialization of it is by no means a difficult matter. It is along the lines of a night dispensary for quick aid to very sick people.

The citizen talking with the Times on this subject said he was roused from his sleep at 4:30 a. m. and when he could find the druggist who conducted a store nearby. The caller—a well known resident on a helpful errand explained that two young lady occupants of the same dwelling block in which his family lived were almost dying and that an emergency prescription had to be filled. It was not a liquor prescription either.

The man had already made a tour of the up-town drug stores in the hope of finding a night clerk on duty and was continuing his rounds as the cases of illness were most serious. The doctor's prescription had been written long after midnight as a result of a hurry call. The aroused householder and the caller used the telephone in the hope of finding somebody to fill the prescription, but no answers were forthcoming.

Early the next forenoon the doctor's order was filled but the patients were much worse as a result of the delayed treatment and their recovery is yet a matter of doubt.

So therefore the suggestion mentioned at the outset is that the city or provincial health departments subsidize some centrally located druggist, or more than one druggist roundabout the city, to have a special night clerk capable of filling prescriptions and rendering other first aid. It seems highly inconsistent in troublous health times like the influenza epidemics of late in a city of close to 60,000 souls, that all medicinal aid be shut off at the usual shop hours.

It is not always possible to have prescriptions filled before the closing time for drug stores and it is said the health authorities have shown an added protection around the people through the agency of a night dispensary.
