It is proposed to start night schools in Charlottetown, Port Borden, at Georgetown and other parts. Captain Reid, commander of the car ferry, will have charge at Borden. The Navy League Institute will also be a sailors' home where seamen who come to this port can make their headquarters and where games, reading matter, &c., will be provided. The Imperial Daughters of the Empire, which have been doing good work as an auxiliary branch of the Navy League, will have permanent headquarters for this province in the same building.

The league also proposes to co-operate with the vocational training scheme of the federal government and especially with regard to providing technical education for fishermen. The fishing industry is one of the island's important sources of wealth and the need of such a training has long been felt. It is expected that the provincial government will also work in conjunction with the bodies named. The people of Prince Edward Island are peculiarly, a maritime people, and now that wooden ship-building has also been started here, it may reasonably be expected that the scenes of old time days when marine activities were flourishing will be revived.

### ROBBED GERMAN **GOVERNMENT OF** MANY MILLIONS

Enemy Agents in America Squan-Exchange-Let Fatherland Go

Berne, Sept. 12—Assistant Attorney-General Brown and Harold Harper, assistant attorney for the southern district of New York, have now concluded the inquiry into the charges against Rumely, Kaufmann and Lindheim before Consul Stewart in Berne. The last witness examined was Professor Gerhard von Schultzer Gaevernitz, a member of the German parliament, and formerly on the German general staff.

Gaevernitz admitted that Rumely wrote him about the financial situation of the New York Evening Mail. Gaevernitz then wrote to Hermann Seicken, a wealthy American citizen, originally German, and a long resident of Germany, for financial aid, but Siecken gave no definite answer, merely saying he would think the matter over.

Rumely's counsel declared that Siecken died a year ago. ### COMMERCIAL, AIR

SCHEME PLANNED IN GREAT BRITAIN

Government Will Render All Possible Assitance, Gen. Seely Anmounces-Filip To The Industry

London, Sept. 12—At a meeting of those interested in commercial aircraft held to discuss with representatives of the Air Ministry the ultimate disposal of government airships, Major-General Seely, Under Secretary for Air, who presided, said that when the political situation had cleared, says in a month's time, the Admiralty would be able to give a definite reply as to the number of airships and aerodromes it would require in case of emergency. The Air Ministry and Admiralty would then offer existing machines and those in various stages of construction to those who would undertake the formation of commercial air schemes.

The government's assistance would include the use of wireless stations. In the case of any sound scheme, airships would be sold at a very cheap rate. Business people would also have advantage of the government's sheds and trained personnel. 



# NO ASSURANCE THAT COMMITTEE WILL DEAL WITH WAR GRATUITIES

Committee "Determines Own Procedure" Reply When Cabinet Members Are Pressed For Definite Statement-Present Scale of Gratuities and of Pensions Most Generous of Any Country in the World, Mr. Rowell Holds.

Ottawa, Sept. 12-Announcement was made in the House of Commons by Ion N. W. Rowell this afternoon that the government intends to appoint a petul committee of the house to consider a bill dealing with the re-establishnent of soldiers in civil life. This came after the president of the privy council ad read the demand of the Great War Veterans for a further gratuity and 'remier Borden's refusal to support a parliamentary committee or a royal com-nission to investigate the matter. The result was that the impression got broad that the government was receding from its former position and surrendring to the agitation of the veterans for a parliamentary committee.

Your correspondent, however, asked a member of the cabinet point blank i the special committee would consider the soldiers' demand for a \$2,000 gratu-

He rather dodged the question, his answer being: "The committee will deermine its own procedure."

Mr. Rowell, in the course of his remarks in the house, stated the commitee would be similar to the special committee on pensions which sat during the ast two sessions of parliament. It will consider a bill to consolidate the various orders in council and other measures already in existence relating to the civil e-establishment of soldiers. Some of these orders in council were passed under he war measures act and with the coming of peace it is necessary, Mr. Rowell said, to make certain legislative provisions in order that the civil re-establishnent work may be carried on. .

# **GUELPH INQUIRY** IS COMPLETED

Hon. Hugh Guthrie and Rector of Novitiate on the Witness Stand

FINDINGS TO BE ANNOUNCED SOON

Hon. Mr. Guthrie Denies Discussing the Guelph Matter With Minister of Justice Prior to Three Weeks Ago -Rev. Henry Bourque Explains Stand He Took.


Ottawa, Sept. 12—When the inquiry into the Gueipin novitiate charges resumed this morning Hon. Hugh Guthrie, solicitor general, was called and examined by E. L. Newcombe.

Mr. Guthrie said he had known Captain Burroughs all his life. He met him on the train one day returning from Gueipit. Burroughs told him the Jesuits were protecting certain men in connection with military service. Burroughs gave witness the names of Craig, Newman and Alexander, as men of that class and Mr. Guthrie handed those names to the minister of justice on his return to Ottawa. Witness had no idea this would be followed by a night raid as there had been no discussion of that phase of the case.

Mr. Guthrie did not admit that he told Rev. Kennedy Palmer that the minister of justice said the Jesuits were all right. He had no conversation with Mr. Palmer in regard to that matter.

To Mr. Ferguson, Mr. Guthrie said he had not discussed the Guelph situation with Hon. Mr. Doherty until about three weeks ago and he had no recollection of having said the Jesuits were all right.

mer thanking him for support in the union election campaign, Mr. Guthrie identified his signature but did not re-



Washington, Sept. 13—With the ratification of the Federal Woman Suffrage amendment today, sixteen states have ratified the amendment and leaders in the suffrage movement tonight expressed confidence that the amendment will be a valid part of the American Constitution in time to permit women to vote in the presidential election of 1920, in every state of the Union.

The states that have so far ratified are: Wisconsin, Michigan, Kansas, Ohio, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Texas, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, Montana, Nebraska, Minnesota, and New Hampshire. The Utah legislature will hold a special session on September 29 to ratify. This will make seventeen ratifications. Suffrage leaders pointed out tonight that legislatures will meet in January in Maryland, Rhode Island, New Jersey, and Kentucky, and said they expect to obtain ratifications of the amendment in all these states. They also asserted that they have assurances from the governors of fifteen other states that special sessions will be called in those states, if necessary, to bring about ratification in time for women to vote in the 1920 election.
