





An inquiry has lately been in progress in Dublin to learn the facts about housing conditions in that city. It has been shown that in 1911 there were 21,133 single room tenements in the city, considered against them in connection with the

Of these, however, 3,604 tenements were occupied by only one person each, 5,310 by two persons, and 8,893 by three persons. Thus in 60 per cent of the 21,133 tenements not more than three persons occupied one room. Sir Charles Cameron, medical health officer, says that in 8,914 of the single room tenements there is at least no over-crowding, and the one room tenements are not all in one section, but are scattered all over the city. When one of the counsel asked the medical health officer if Dublin were worse than other cities in this respect, he replied:—

THE STEAMERS

The White Star Liner Canada was abeam Sable Island at five o'clock this morning.

The insurance of steamers owned and operated by the C. P. R. was completed in London last week. Altogether there are about 115 vessels concerned including liners on the Atlantic and Pacific, boats engaged on the Great Lakes and the Pacific Coast, barges, car transfers and tugs. With a view of meeting the owners, underwriters agreed to make a concession this year by which the aggregate values were reduced by 3½ per cent. The company took the benefit of the concession for steamers employed in the Atlantic trade. The values of the Empress of Britain and Empress of Ireland have been reduced by £30,000 each, bringing the new values down to £250,000 each, and there is a reduction of 10 per cent. in the values of other steamers engaged in the Atlantic trade.

The C. P. R. Empress of Russia arrived at Hong Kong on Thursday be tween six and leight o'clock in the morning.

The Bray Head, of the Head Line, will leave tomorrow for Dublin with a capacity cargo, including 88,000 bushels of grain, 200 standards of deals and 1,200 tons of flour, besides general freight.

Steamer Manchester Corporation left Hallifax today and will arrive in port tomorrow. She will load 186,000 bushels of grain and 350 standards of deals for Manchester direct.
