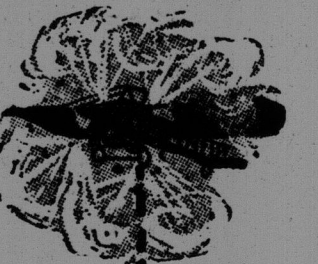
SMASHING VICTORY OVER GERMANS BY BRITISH FLEET

Two of the Enemy's Cruisers and Two Destroyers Sunk

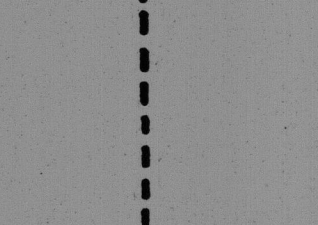

The Departure

THE WEEK'S DEATHS

Twenty-two burial permits were issued this week, death being due to the following causes: Cholera infantum, 61; meningitis, 4; scarlet fever, 2; influenza, 1; diphtheria, 1; pneumonia, 1; heart disease, 1; arterio sclerosis, cerebral hemorrhage, 1; cancer, 1; malignant disease of abdomen, carcinoma of uterus, one each.

KNOW NOTHING OF IT

The names of two well known citizens as having offered donations of \$30,000 each towards the equipment of a regiment from St. John for the front. One of them when asked about the matter this morning, said it was the first he had heard of it, while the other could not be seen. Local militia officers took little stock in the report.

SAYS ONLY 30 BRITISH LEFT OUT OF COMPANY OF 2,000

Wounded Soldier Tells of Awful Slaughter by German Artillery—Five Solid Days in the Trenches

London, Aug. 29.—(3.30 a.m.)—The Chronicle Boudogne correspondent sends the personal story of a wounded soldier, who has arrived here and who declares he was one of thirty survivors of a British company of 2,000 troops, who were practically wiped out by the German artillery. His story follows:

"We were five solid days in the trenches and moved backwards and forwards all that time, with the varying tide of battle.

"It was about two o'clock in the morning when the end came. Things had got quiet and our officers came along the line and told us to get some sleep. We found ourselves in an inferno of bullets. We could do nothing. Down upon us the shrapnel rained, and we fell by the score. Practically at the same time, the enemy's maxims opened fire. We were almost without shelter when we were caught, and we crawled along in front to find cover.

"Leave everything and retire," was the order, and we did what we could to obey. I don't know how long it lasted, but when dawn came I could see not more than thirty men left in the various sections of the field. Thirty at the most were left out of about 2,000.

"I wandered away from the others, and eventually found myself at with a single companion. That was the first time the German artillery really got at us. As a rule their gun fire was mighty poor."

(In the above story the censor has deleted the name of the soldier, from which this fighting occurred.)

Britain Must Bear The Brunt

London, Aug. 29.—A Daily Mail editorial concerning the concentration of the Germans in immense strength to crush the British expeditionary force, says: "Germany has brought the stupendous odds of 3 to 1 against the British soldiers of whom we may well feel proud, but the situation is most critical."

LOCAL NEWS

FOR FOREIGN SERVICE

At the celebration of the fourteenth anniversary of Portland Lodge, Sons of England, last evening, it was reported that twenty-one of the 197 members have left with the volunteers for foreign service. The lodge is looking after the families and has voted \$80 for the general fund as well.

FURTHER REMANDED

John H. Brennan, charged with the murder of Policeman Frank O'Leary, was taken before Magistrate Ritchie this morning and further remanded. Roy W. Fisher, charged with criminal attack, and William Cole, charged with attempted suicide, were also in court and further remanded.

TOOK MOVING PICTURES

C. Frank Waid, the motion picture operator, who has been in the city for the last week, returned to Boston this morning. Last evening he took pictures of the artillerymen's departure for Valenciennes. The pictures of the falls and harbor are still being held by the militia authorities.

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FIERCE FIGHTING AT THE FRONT DESCRIBED IN LETTERS SENT HOME

British Troops Everywhere Conduct Themselves With Honor—Germans Contrary to Laws of War, Bombard undefended Towns—Many Women and Children Killed

THE BATTLE OF TOURNAI REVEALS PROWESS OF BRITISH ARMY

London, Aug. 29.—The Daily Mail's Boudogne correspondent, writing of the battle of Tournai says:—"The battle of Tournai should go down in British history beside Rorke's Drift and Magersfontein, as a revelation of the prowess of the British army."

TELLS OF THE FIERCE FIGHTING AT MONS

London, Aug. 29.—(2.40 a.m.)—Serjeant Loftus, writing to his brother in England of the experiences of the British in the battle of Mons, says:—"It came unexpectedly at a time when we had given up hope of seeing any Germans. Just after reveille our cavalry pickets fell back, reporting the approach of the enemy in force."

WOMEN AND CHILDREN KILLED

London, Aug. 29.—A despatch to the Post from Tournai, a seaport in the Netherlands, describing the sack of Louvain from what it claims to be an authoritative source, says many civilians were killed, including women, children and the clergy. Their nationality, it is declared, did not save one English and one American clergyman. All the public buildings were destroyed. The despatch adds that there will shortly start for the United States, a commission consisting of Messrs. Vanderveide, Hyman, Soblet, and Betvies, all ministers of state, whose mission it will be to make public German atrocities.

COMMANDER SENDS THANKS

London, Aug. 29.—(1.15 a. m.)—The official press bureau makes public the following telegram sent by General Sir John French, who is in command of the British troops in France to the war secretary:—"I shall be greatly obliged if you will tell the first lord of the admiralty how very much the army appreciates the kind messages and thoughts of the navy. Our warmest sympathy also is with our comrades in the royal navy in their trying and arduous vigil."

WANTS THEM TO RETURN

London, Aug. 28.—A despatch from Berlin states that the Reichsanzeiger, the official paper of Berlin, publishes an imperial decree dated August 17, calling on all Germans in foreign military service to return to Germany. A message received in Berlin from Erling Blomson, son of the Norwegian dramatist, asserts that German refugees from East Prussia report many acts of brutality on the part of the Russians.

His services will be needed by the Associated Press with all the news associations in this country. It is reported that Palmer will have all the news of the war between Japan and Germany.

Increasing Grain Production

Many farmers, when urged to try growing fall wheat, have excused themselves on the plea that it did not pay, but it is likely that for the next year or two, there will be ready sale at good prices for every bushel of wheat grown in Canada. Every farmer should endeavor to increase his production of grain next year by putting into use every acre capable of producing it. There are hundreds of acres in Central and Eastern Canada that would successfully grow fall wheat. By preparing the land immediately, a great number of farmers could sow at least a few acres each this fall. No risk is being taken in so doing, as the extra cultivation for the fall wheat would increase the yield of a spring sown crop in the event of the heat being winter-killed. The land would need only to be disked or cultivated to prepare it for spring grain.

The grain production can also be increased by ploughing up the old unproductive meadows at once and sowing a grain in the spring. They should be ploughed shallow now and packed and liked and kept worked until autumn.

CONSERVATIVES AND RUMOR

(Toronto World, Conservative.)

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—The rumored resignation of Hon. Dr. Roche, as minister of the interior, on account of continued ill-health, coupled with S. P. Roblin's visit to the capital, has led to speculation on the reorganization of the Ottawa government, and incidentally as to changes in various provinces where the Conservatives are in power. The department of the interior is in a way the most important, as it is the most arduous in its demands upon its minister. Immigration, homesteads, pre-emptions, public lands, the timber and mineral resources of nearly all the Dominion west of Lake Superior, are in his charge; he is also the superintendent-general of Indian affairs.

Who is to succeed Dr. Roche as minister of the interior? Some think that Hon. Arthur Meighen, solicitor-general, is entitled to recognition; the rumor is revived that R. B. Bennett of Calgary is to be divided, Mr. Bennett being given Indian affairs and public lands, and immigration. Still others suggest that Hon. Robert Rogers may go back to the interior department.

The prime minister is said to oppose the plan of cutting up the department. Generally speaking he favors reducing the already large number of cabinet ministers and believes that much duplication of labor might be saved by a consolidation of several portfolios. Moreover, a big department gives an opportunity for a big man to accomplish big things for the government of the day and for the country at large. Beyond question the great boom in Canada, which began shortly after the accession of the Laurier government, was almost entirely due to Hon. Clifford Sifton's administration of the department of the interior. Sifton and his friends were subjected to severe criticism, but it must be admitted that every man who has held the portfolio of the interior since he relinquished it has followed the plans and methods by which Clifford Sifton peopled the west and gave new life to Canada. Mr. Oliver followed faithfully in the footsteps of his predecessor, Hon. Robert Rogers, and after him Dr. Roche trod the same pathway. Unfortunately...

GRAND TRUNK READY TO MOVE GRAIN FROM PRAIRIE PROVINCES

The Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific Railways are busily preparing to move their share of the big harvest from western Canada to the shipping points. Arrangements have been made for a plentiful supply of cars and in the territory served by the company's lines it is expected that there will be very little delay in the grain movement this year.

The Grand Trunk Railway system has done good work for both the grain grower and grain dealer by steadily increasing its elevator capacity at the various important elevator and lake terminals, including Montreal, Portland, Tiffin, Depot Harbor, Sarnia and Port William. The company now has in its elevators of varying size—from the small country elevator receiving grain from wagons and loading into cars to the huge terminal elevators at Port William—capacity for over twenty million bushels of grain.

The prediction has been made that within the next ten years as much Canadian grain from Saskatchewan and Alberta will find its way to Europe by way of the Pacific Coast and the Panama Canal as will get out by the Atlantic. Indeed, giant elevators are already planned for Prince Rupert. That port is the Pacific terminus of a transcontinental railway surpassing its rivals by reason of its practically level roadbed, would appear to be the natural shipping point for much of the Canadian west.

THE NEW POST OFFICE

WORK ON THE FARM

Alleviation of Conditions Being Taken by Joint Authorities

SCHEME BEING PLANNED

Central Body Appointed by Dominion and Provinces to Have Charge

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—W. K. McNaught, of Toronto has been in Ottawa again in connection with the proposal that the Dominion and provincial governments cooperate in some scheme for the distribution of employment. The Ontario government will obtain information as to the amount of farm labor which is wanted in the agricultural districts of that province in detail as to wages and living conditions generally. Other provinces will probably do similar work, and the information so furnished will be placed in the possession of a central body made up of representatives of the provinces.

It is thought that a large number of men who are out of employment in the cities would be willing to take farm work and provide themselves with a means of livelihood in the winter even if the remuneration is not great.

The plan has not been completed in all its details, but it is expected that the general scheme will be agreed upon as a result of the conferences which are now taking place. One of the questions to be dealt with will be that of transportation and the aid of the Dominion may be asked in regard to this.

LOCAL NEWS

ASKED TO ATTEND.
The secretary of the board of trade has received the official call of the International Irrigation Congress to be held in Calgary, October 5 to 9. The Hon. Board of Trade is entitled to send five delegates to this congress. It is expected that able speakers will be present from the United States to assist Canadian speakers in the discussions that are to take place.

LIVE STOCK JUDGES.
Hon. A. Forster, secretary of the exhibition, has received a wire this morning from the secretary of the live stock commission, Ottawa, announcing the following judges who have already been appointed for the live stock exhibition: Messrs. John Vipond, Brooklin, Ontario; beef cattle and sheep, Claude Bald, Causton, Ontario; Ayrshire and ewes, James Edden, Danes, P. Q.; Holsteins, A. C. Holman, Breslau, Ontario; Seth Jones of Sussex, has been named judge of poultry. Other judges will be arranged for later.

THE SCHOOLS.
Perhaps the busiest recruiting depot in the city yesterday was the office of the secretary of the school board, where a host of youthful "soldiers" were being "signed on," not for foreign service but for local training. They were there to take out permits to attend the opening of the city schools on Monday. In the opening space between applicants, the secretary, Mr. Leavitt, informed the Times man that the number of permits issued was about up to the number handed out last year and from present indications there would be no great increase in the school attendance this term. There have been no announcements yet of any change in the teaching staffs.

FOR EVERY PERSON ON THIS EARTH A STAR SHINES

For years the approximate number of stars visible to the eye, a matter of 8,000 or 4,000, according to the definition of average vision, has been known. By most persons, however, and by many scientists, the total number of stars in the heavens has been considered countless, if not limitless. The universe is now declared to be finite, yet of a magnitude of dimension and of a population far beyond all earlier conceptions. This assumption is a result of very recent investigations into the motions and distances of the stars.

The latest studies on the subject of the number as well as the light of the stars, have been made at the Royal Observatory at Greenwich, England, by the late Franklin Adams succeeded in making a set of 200 photographs covering the entire sky. After counts were made on these pictures, from which the brightness of the self-luminous bodies between specifically the twelfth and seventeenth magnitudes could be inferred, it was concluded that they recorded about 55,000,000 stars. From this formula was determined showing the change of number in passing from one magnitude to another. With these figures it was reasoned that the aggregate number of stars is not less than 1,000,000,000, probably not more than 2,000,000,000, and probably approximately 1,600,000,000, the estimated present population of the earth. In making computations it was inferred that there would be as many stars fainter than magnitude 28 or 29 as there are brighter.
