A considerable amount of routine business was trans-acted. During the evening the presi-dent warmly welcomed three new mem-bers of the board. They were Mrs. W. E. Raymond, Mrs. Leon A. Keith and George A. Henderson. The monthly report of the agent showed there are at present in the Children's Aid Home twenty-seven children and for some days twenty-eight slept on the premises. One of the babies in the Home, a foundling, died during the month and was buried from Brenan's undertaking parlors with services conducted by Rev. Hugh Miller. Eight children were committed to the care of the society since the last meeting. Five of these are in another institution at present.
