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LAWs AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
British and Foreign Bible Society.

- I. The designation of this Society shall be, **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the Languages of the United Kingdom, to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorised Version.
- II. This Society shall add its endeavors to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominions; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries; whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan.
- III. Each subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a Member.
- IV. Each Subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for life.
- V. Each Subscriber of Five Guineas annually shall be a Governor.
- VI. Each Subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.
- VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.
- VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.
- IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of Thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.
The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society, suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.
- X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.
- XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the Accounts presented, and the Proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or Dissenting Minister, who is a Member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and at Meetings of the Committee, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either MEMBERS FOR LIFE, or GOVERNORS FOR LIFE.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating HONORARY MEMBERS from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

ADOPTED AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY
IN 1826 AND 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, shall be made to any Society, the books be issued bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of the Scriptures to Societies which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sales of any such copies of the Scriptures be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Nova Scotia Bible Society.

- I. This Society shall be called **THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES**; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz.: to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary and Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this Institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually Ten Shillings at one time, or a donation of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a Member of the Society.
- V. A General Meeting of the Members of this Society will be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every Member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their numbers as occasion may require.

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FIFTY-THIRD ANNIVERSARY
OF THE
Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN TEMPERANCE HALL,
ON TUESDAY, 13TH NOV., 1866.

The Chair was taken by the REV. R. F. UNIACKE, President.

The Chairman then called upon the REV. DR. PRYOR to give out a hymn and engage in prayer.

The PRESIDENT addressed the meeting.

The SECRETARY read the Thirty-eighth Report of the Committee.

It was, on motion of the REV. F. ALMON, seconded by the REV. C. GRANT—

RESOLVED,—That the Report now read be received and adopted as the Thirty-eighth Report of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society; and that the same be printed for circulation, under the direction of the Committee.

On motion of the REV. R. A. TEMPLE, seconded by the REV. G. W. Hill, A.M.—

RESOLVED,—That this meeting desires to record its thankfulness to the Great Author of the Scriptures, and present position of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and would call upon all who love the Lord Jesus to pray more earnestly and labour more energetically for the full accomplishment of the great end the Society has in view,—a universal diffusion of the Word of God.

On motion of MR. A. RUSSELL, seconded by the REV. CANON COCHRAN—

RESOLVED,—That this meeting desires to record its thanks to the various Ladies' Associations and Branch Societies throughout the

Province, for their active co-operations during the past; and would call for yet more extensive efforts for the diffusion of a knowledge of the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and other kindred institutions, and above all for a more extended circulation of the Word of Life.

After singing the Doxology, the President pronounced the benediction, and the meeting adjourned.

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REPORT.

The Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society beg leave to submit to their patrons and friends their usual Annual Report for the past year.

They have to report that the operation of their Auxiliary, since last they met their friends at their Anniversary, have been progressive and satisfactory. They have not met with any extraordinary marks of success which they can bring prominently forward, but they can truly say that the results of their efforts have been of a most cheering character. The good work of Bible distribution has been going on throughout the bounds of their Auxiliary with undiminished success; their friends in the city and among the various branches have well sustained them; their agent has taken his varied tours and aided in disseminating the life-giving Word, encouraging those connected with the several branches to renewed energy and perseverance, and losing no opportunity of speaking words of comfort and of recommending the perusal of the Scriptures to those whom he met by the way,—and, best of all, a blessing from on High has attended their efforts. Their Society has prospered, and has been able in some small degree to strengthen the hands of those who, in the Mother Country and in different parts of the world, are engaged in extending the sphere of action of that noble Institution—the British and Foreign Bible Society.

To the operations of this Society your Committee would first direct your attention. The last Annual Report details

the labors of the past year, and comes to us more richly laden than ever with the interesting narratives of the toils and efforts of their devoted agents in circulating the Scriptures. It gives us an insight into the religious state of the principal countries of the world, and leading us into many a quiet scene, and many a busy mart, shows us everywhere the wonders which God has wrought and is still accomplishing by the agency of His own most precious Book.

In turning to the operations detailed in the Report, your Committee would commence, as usual, with the proceedings in France.

The Parent Committee, in referring to this great country, say, that there is but one thing needed to render France truly great, and her people really happy, and that is, the reception of the Truth in its fullness and power. They lament the bondage of superstition under which they have been so long oppressed; and now, they state, a fearful reaction is setting in on the side of infidelity. Having been required to believe everything their spiritual leaders affirmed, however childish and absurd, multitudes are now bent upon repudiating all belief, however clear in proof, and have become not only open infidels, but avowed atheists. In referring to this new phase of French thought, M. de Pressinsé, their indefatigable agent, says, "that the religious circumstances of France are at the present moment invested with a great amount of interest from several points of view. The evil as well as the good appears to have acquired a truly extraordinary degree of strength, so much so, that the present period is increasingly assuming the characteristics of as great a religious crisis as has ever been witnessed in this country. In the first place, that which strikes the attention is the extension, or rather the unheard of unloosening of the principles of infidelity. Assuredly the denial of Christianity is

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not a new fact, so far as France is concerned, but that which has not been previously witnessed is the daring manner in which the claims of Atheism are asserted. During the last few months, this dire crusade has assumed a much more thorough and combined organization than it ever previously possessed. The point in question here, is not so much an estimate more or less correct of the state of men's minds, but rather a proof of what it is only too easy to ground on precise and positive facts. During the last few years, traces of the revival of Atheism could be observed both in Schools of Philosophy and Literature. Pure atheism, theoretic and philosophic, as exhibited in the works of Taine and Renan, has become popular, it has full sway both in the towns and villages of the land, and is more especially possessing the minds of the rising generation.

"Since the eighteenth century," M. de Pressinsé continues, "since the days of Voltaire and Diderot, nothing like so great an outburst of irreligion has been witnessed in this country," but the Committee do not forget to add, that however widespread this moral pestilence may be, the balm of the Gospel, which of late years has been so largely diffused in France, has healed the wounds of many a bleeding heart, and that thousands have been by its mercy brought to the knowledge of the Saviour, whose blood alone can cleanse from all moral pollution.

The Society, by its agency, by the formation of dépôts of Bibles in all the leading cities, and most of all by the persevering and self-denying efforts of their Colporteurs, are doing their utmost to stem the tide of iniquity now overspreading the land.

The dépôts are of great service. Persons of all ranks and positions in society, are frequent visitors at them, and by their enquiry and observations evidence the interest which they

feel in the Society's work, and their desire to purchase and possess the Word of God.

But colportage is still the mainstay of the work in France. Through this agency, 67,360 copies of the scriptures have been distributed during the past year, almost exclusively among the Roman Catholic population. Various most interesting incidents are given of the labours of the colporteurs; but your Committee can only refer their friends to the Report itself, as the necessary brevity of this report prevents their insertion.

In the French army and navy there are hopeful signs of the reality of a work of grace—upwards of 1,000 Bibles and 7,000 New Testaments have been again disposed of among the men of both these services. In the camps the agents have been deeply astonished and gladdened by the assistance, and what is still more, by the amount of friendship, which they have received from the members of the corps of officers, who for the most part have been the actual purchasers of nearly all the thousand Bibles above referred to. All these gentlemen have been very much in favor of holding the evening Bible readings for the benefit of the soldiers of their respective regiments, and although some of them have not possessed enough of religious decision to be personally present at these meetings, several of them have not feared to enter into conversation with the Bible men, for the purpose of questioning them and receiving their explanations, and of testifying to them their approbation of their efforts, so evidently undertaken for a useful and laudable object.

Another token for good is the good will of the government authorities, who no longer throw impediments in the way of the colporteurs, as was formerly the case.

Thus on all sides, notwithstanding the evil prevailing in French society, there is every encouragement to proceed, and

the distribution of 93,479 copies of the scriptures in France during the past year, shows that the labours of the Parent Society have not been in vain in this country.

Of BELGIUM, it is remarked, that the last thirty years have witnessed great changes in the condition of the country, both religious and political; and it is a mournful fact that in this kingdom, as in France, the tendency of events is manifestly in the direction of infidelity. Girl's schools are being established, in which no religious instruction is to be given, and a free university has been founded in Brussels, in which the teaching is decidedly anti-christian. But there are not wanting instances of the good seed having fallen on prepared ground, and wherever this has been the case, fruit has eventually been gathered, to the praise of Divine grace. The distribution of the scriptures in this country has been 11,473 copies during the year.

In HOLLAND much good has been done by the establishment of depôts, from which the total issues during the past year have been 28,267 copies. The labors of the colporteurs in this country have also been largely blessed. A pleasing incident in connection with this work is thus related by one of these devoted men. He says—

“ We cannot wonder that so many should oppose the Bible and its circulation; but is it not the most powerful bulwark in existence against infidelity and superstition? And this makes me all the more pleased when I meet with friends who love it, and desire to see it widely diffused, because they have themselves experienced how precious it is. Such persons I find mostly among the middle classes, though occasionally I meet with some among the higher classes too, and only the other day I fell in with such an one. He began conversing with me about the blessings which accompany our work. He was of opinion that even a single word of the Bible might

prove useful, and in consequence he was desirous that I should place an open Bible in my window, and that at night I should place a candle by its side, so that the passers by might be able to read it. He added that if I would agree to carry out his suggestion, he would bear all the cost. I consented, and ever since, both by day and by night, there are persons standing at my window reading the open Bible. This was a source of great joy to the gentleman referred to, and he proposed that I should try and repeat the experiment in some other parts of the city. At my request, a friend of mine, a bookseller, agreed to do so; and now in two parts of the city, at some distance from each other, a large open Bible lies exposed to the view of all passers by throughout the day. One of our principal booksellers, being informed of this, followed the example thus set by us, and now he always exhibits an open copy of the large Staten Bible in his window."

Of GERMANY the parent Committee speak as a field which they have long regarded with the deepest interest, and on the cultivation of which they have expended large sums of money, and bestowed much time and labor. Nor has their labor been in vain in the Lord. The good seed of God's word, which has been sown in faith and watered with the dew of the Holy Spirit, has rendered fruitful many a previously barren spot, and with the same culture and with the same blessing, each moral wilderness, whether of infidelity or materialism, shall yet rejoice and blossom as the rose.

In the Frankfort Agency the statistics show that though there is a slight falling off in the number of Testaments issued, this decrease is more accidental than real, the total for the past year being 214,181.

Many of the colporteurs employed have been eminently successful, and the details of their efforts exceedingly interesting. None of their efforts are more striking than the determination to bring the Bible in contact with the pleasure seekers of the noted Baden-Baden. A stall was erected in

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this fashionable watering place, and although attended with some difficulty at first, the way was soon made plain, and one hundred copies of the scriptures have been sold on an average every week during the season. It is a fact not unworthy of notice, that the place assigned for the Bible stall by the Town Director is exactly opposite the Kurhaus, thus bearing constant witness against the iniquity which prevails there, and seeming to invite all who enter it to the choice of a more excellent way. The rich and poor of many lands visited this stall, and encouraged the colporteur, Weiser, by their presence and counsel. The Queen of Prussia came in person, and others of high rank sent to testify their interest in and approbation of his work. During the four months that he remained at Baden-Baden he sold no fewer than 1852 copies of the scriptures. Mr. Davis, the agent, in referring to this effort, says,—

“Very beautiful editions of the Bible, in modest and elegant bindings, are on sale on the Promenade, and find ready purchasers. What a life of contrasts and contradictions is compressed into the narrow frame-work of our Baden doings! At seven in the morning the Promenades are opened by playing a chorale in front of the gambling house, at eleven the gambling begins, and continues often till past midnight, while just opposite is a stall for the sale of Holy Bibles!”

The number of copies circulated by Mr. Millard during the past year, within the limits of his agency, which includes Austria, Hungary and part of Prussia, have amounted to a total of 201,384 volumes, being an increase of 36,543 copies over the issues of the previous year. The various languages in which these Scriptures and portions of Scriptures have been circulated, include, English, French, German, Polish, Hebrew, Bohemian, Hungarian, Servian, Lithuanian, Italian and Russ.

In reference to Austria and Hungary the Parent Committee say ; that the record of the work which Mr. Millard has been enabled, through God's mercy, to accomplish in this part of his district, must ever constitute one of the most interesting chapters of the history of your Society. Such would have been the case had the difficulties to be encountered been far greater than have yet been experienced, and had the issues betokened no great anxiety on the part of the people to possess the word of God. But when God has been pleased to remove all hindrances which have yet arisen, only allowing them apparently to continue for such a period as might awaken prayer and give scope to the exercise of faith ; and when the Scriptures have been circulated with a rapidity far beyond what the most sanguine could have expected, it is impossible to avoid the conviction, that the guidance which the Committee have been following has been of heavenly origin, or refrain from exclaiming, "This is the Lord's doing and it is marvellous in our eyes." The work may be said to be as yet in its infancy, and yet so manifestly has the blessing of God rested upon it, that during the past year the circulation has risen from 25,298 to 58,091 copies of the sacred Scriptures. Mr. Millard, the indefatigable agent, says :

"When I look back at a series of twenty years, during which we were compelled to hide our faces like criminals, and when I consider that I am now permitted without molestation to take the Holy Book from house to house, I feel constrained to break forth in praises toward our faithful God, who is thus in mercy visiting our poor fatherland. It is true I look at many streets and houses where I am not allowed to enter, but God is still mighty, and I will now only add, that the humble instruments greatly need the prayers of their brethren."

In the Scandinavian Kingdoms the good work is progressing, and the Committee report with great satisfaction the study

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Of **RUSSIA** the Committee say that it is a country which, during the last few years, has made rapid progress along the highway of civilization. The emancipation of the Serfs, and the translation and publication of the New Testament in modern Russ by the Synod of the Greek Church, are alone sufficient to prove this. A nation, to be really great, must be free, and the only safe foundation on which to erect the superstructure of civil and religious liberty, is the Word of God. That the Scriptures are being circulated in large and growing numbers, is a most hopeful feature in the present history of this nation, and the eagerness with which they are sought by all classes, and the high value which is put upon them by those who possess them, would seem to warrant the conclusion that the provision of this heavenly manna and the hunger for it are alike from God. The Committee regard it as a special ground for thankfulness, that they have been permitted to be in any degree instrumental in supplying a demand for the Scriptures, which has been as distinct in its expression as it has been rapid in its growth. A new depôt has been opened in the Capital during the past year, and, under wise counsel and careful supervision, the work is developing itself with an expansive power, which bids fair to overtake the neglect of ages, and to make itself felt in many a heart and many a home, hitherto cheerless for want of spiritual light. The issues from the depôt last year amounted to 50,875 copies being largely in excess of the previous year.

PORTUGAL, the Committee report, as beginning to exhibit the bright day of promise. An agent and six colporteurs have been employed with much success, the difficulty being now not, as heretofore, how to sell the Scriptures, but how to

keep the agents provided with a sufficient supply to meet the demand. One very satisfactory result of colportage in this country, has been, that in several parts of the country the priests have had the opportunity of purchasing the Bible, and that they did so with the intention not of burning but of reading the book.

As regards SPAIN, the Committee have nothing new to communicate. The way is not yet open for the occupation of that country by any special agency, and their present duty seems to be to watch and pray.

In reference to ITALY, the Committee say that there is no country to which, of late, the hopes and expectations of the Christian Church have been turned with such longing desire and trembling anxiety, as Italy. A problem is being worked out there, not difficult of solution if studied by the light of Revelation, but very likely to mislead and perplex, if viewed only by the light of nature. The yoke of superstition and ignorance, which has so long bound the people, has been broken, and the oppressed have been set free; we cannot wonder that there should be some danger lest political and religious liberty should be regarded as the goal, and no effort be made to press towards a higher mark, and to gain a nobler end. That this is to a large extent the case with the population of Italy has been proved by facts, and though it is disappointing, yet it should be stated.

The agent complains that the work of evangelization is making little progress, and he speaks of the novelty connected with the Gospel's joyful sound as wearing off. Throughout the whole land, he states, that the means of grace are attended, almost exclusively, by the working classes, and that the Gospel has as yet made no impression upon the more intelligent portion of the community. The Committee say, that

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they cannot but bow before the sovereignty of Him whom it hath pleased to hide His Truth from the wise and prudent, and reveal it unto babes, but such facts furnish no reason why they should relax their efforts, or discontinue any portion of their work.—Far from it, faith gathers strength amid surrounding difficulties, and presses on notwithstanding all discouragements. If Italy is still dark, there is but one light that can dispel its gloom, and if her sons are dead, there is but one voice that can penetrate their tombs, and bid the dead come forth.

Under this conviction, the Committee have continued to circulate the Scriptures wherever they could obtain an entrance for them. The total distribution has amounted to 28,152 copies, a result most satisfactory when it is remembered that in the South of Italy the cholera prevailed to such a fearful extent as to produce a complete panic.

In referring to TURKEY, the Committee allude to the great ravages of the cholera during the past year in this country, and state that under such circumstances a diminution of the issues was to have been expected. The total issues of the year, have, however, amounted to 16,153 copies, or only 1,295 copies less than the preceding year.

The issues from the depôt in Constantinople exhibit an increase of 234 copies. Many of these have been purchased for the use of schools, and were in the Greek language. The Greeks are very reserved among strangers, especially on religious subjects, but careful observers have for some time been impressed with the conviction that a great change is being wrought, chiefly through the instrumentality of the scriptures among the more intelligent of their people.

The Government is still the great obstacle in the way of any general advance towards the Truth among the Mahom-

medan enquirers. Not that any overt act of persecution can be pointed out, but there is the same hostile influence exercised, and great grace is needed to seek and confess Christ in the face of His enemies, and to hold fast by Him, notwithstanding the scorn of the ignorant and the opposition of the mighty.

The following incident, mentioned by Dr. Thompson, the agent, is very encouraging, as showing how secretly yet powerfully the written Word sometimes works in the hearts of those who read it. Speaking of one whom he describes as an occasional Colporteur, he says :—

“ One day as he was prosecuting his vocation, he offered a Turkish Testament to an artillery officer. The latter seemed greatly delighted to meet him, and entered into a long and friendly conversation, inquiring his address and promising to call upon him. This he accordingly did, when the Colporteur conducted him to the house of a Missionary, when I had an opportunity of speaking to him. He assured me he had read nearly the whole of the Turkish Bible, some parts of it frequently ; and indeed I found him exceedingly well acquainted with the facts of the Gospel History, the whole of which he professed to believe, and to rely on the Lord Jesus for salvation. He further informed me that he had studied the scriptures for about two years ; and being firmly convinced of their truth, had come to the capital on furlough, in order to get further information and direction from Christian teachers, but that his search had been fruitless till he incidentally met with our Colporteur. I need only add that he was soon introduced to other missionaries and to native converts, who all enjoyed his society and regarded him as really a christian, and farther, that his wife, whom he had consulted and taught to read in the course of his religious enquiries, seemed to be quite as far advanced as he in her knowledge and appreciation of the Truth. May we not hope that this case is not a singular one ; and that among the many Moslems, who of late years have heard or read the scriptures, there may be not a few who are secretly seeking after the Lord, if haply

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they may find Him, though he is not far from every one of them."

The spiritual welfare of INDIA still continues to occupy the attention of the Parent Committee. The empire is so vast, it embraces within its scope so many millions of human beings tracing their origin to various races, which again differ from each other in character, language and superstition, that the mind is almost overwhelmed with the thought that its destinies have been entrusted to British rule. The responsibility is indeed great, and none but the Christian can understand *how* great. The vision of politicians and of men of commerce may be bounded only by time, but he who has been taught of God regards these millions and all that concerns them by the light of eternity. The Committee refer to the past history of India, and show that its present possession by England is a talent for the right use of which it is responsible. It is well that civilization should do its best for the advancement of the people's interests and the expansion of their material resources. It is well that British enterprise and intelligence should be brought to bear upon the fertile fields of India, and that the voice of commerce, and the busy sounds of engineering activity should summon her people to awaken from the deep sleep of indolence by which for ages they have been oppressed. But the Gospel is the only lever which can raise any people from the low depth of moral degradation in which by nature they are sunk; and Christian principle derived from the spiritual instruction which the Bible contains, is the only salt which can season a nation's morals, or preserve her people from corruption and her institutions from decay.

In this view, the Committee deeply regret the exclusion of the Bible from the schools of India, and charge England with educating the people but not instructing them in righteous-

ness. They feel, therefore, the greater necessity of using every practicable agency for disseminating the Word of God among the people; at the same time they are beginning to feel that the course hitherto adopted by the Missionaries of giving away the Word of God to all who would receive it, has rendered distribution by sale, which they consider to be the true method, doubly difficult.

By their agents, however, as well as through their auxiliaries, the true work of distribution has been going on during the past year with great success. As an instance, the issues of the Madras auxiliary have been 97,000, and the other auxiliaries have been equally active.

Of CHINA, the Committee report, that it is with deep gratitude to God they acknowledge the success which has attended their efforts for the diffusion of His Word throughout this vast and interesting country. The total distribution of the year, by Mr. Wylie, the agent, and his colporteurs, has amounted to 48,197 volumes, and so rapidly is the stock in hand being exhausted that Mr. Wylie has applied for permission, and received authority, to print two editions of the New Testament 50,000 each. Very interesting accounts are given by the various agents employed in the circulation of the Scriptures, but this brief report will not permit us to do more than thus slightly to refer to them.

We now turn to the home operations of the Parent Society, from whose report we learn that the receipts for last year amounted to the sum of £171,375 10s. 2d., and the expenditure to be £182,402 3s. 5d.—being £12,658 9s. 7d. more than the previous year.

The issues for the year from the depôt in Earl street amounted to 1,471,044, and from the various depôts abroad 825,086, making a total of 2,296,130 copies.

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The total issues of the Society, now amount to 50,285,709 copies.

The Committee gratefully refer to the arrangements which have been successfully made for the purchase of a new site on which their new building is now in the course of erection, and they trust that the removal to their new premises will inaugurate an era in which still greater efforts for usefulness will be made.

Your Committee will now briefly refer to the operations of our own Auxiliary during the year.

The agent, Mr. Alexander Russell, has continued his labors throughout the past year in visiting the different Branch Societies of our Auxiliary. By all he has been well received, and his quarterly reports to the Committee not only contain matter of much interest in connection with Bible distribution in the Province, but also show how essential his services are in quickening and directing the efforts of our friends throughout the country.

The City work progresses as usual with but little variation in its details.

The Ladies' Bible Associations have energetically assisted the Committee, and deserve the thanks of friends of the Bible.

The Treasurer's report will show the receipts and disbursements of the Society during the past year. The following is a brief abstract of the receipts:—

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EIGHTEENTH REPORT

OF THE

Halifax Ladies' Bible Association.

The Committee of the Ladies' Bible Association announce with great satisfaction, that though they were disappointed in losing the services of their valued Bible women, the Misses Swan, who, (from the state of their health, consequent principally upon their exertion in the Bible cause,) were obliged to relinquish the employment, they had been able to retain Mrs. Patterson as a very efficient and useful agent in the work. Some extracts from her reports will be found appended, which it is trusted may be interesting to subscribers.

After many attempts to obtain a second agent, and conversing with several who were either ineligible, or upon hearing the nature of the work, considered it too laborious, they received an offer of service from Mrs. Rutherford, of St. John's, Newfoundland, who was well recommended, and whom they engaged from 1st January last, at a salary of £50 per annum. Having been so short a time engaged, she has little to report, which little, however, is given for the satisfaction of the friends of this Association. They congratulate themselves, as the field is large, and the duty arduous, that another Bible woman has been engaged by the young men of the Poplar Grove Church, who, while not under their superintendence, will do much to lighten the labours of their women by taking an important sphere of labour, viz., the centre of the city, while Mrs. P. confines herself to the north, and Mrs. R. to the south, thus avoiding, they trust, some of

the labour which proved injurious to the Misses Swan, very much from their having too large a sphere to work in. Report of Mr. Alexander Russell, still acting as Colporteur for the Ladies' Association, in addition to his employment as agent to N. S. Society, accompanies this report as usual. Dartmouth and the North West Arm have again been liberal in the cause. Mrs. Patterson, being engaged only part of her time receives but £15 per annum. To Mrs. Rutherford the Committee have allowed £50, deeming a smaller sum insufficient to defray the increased expense of living since the Misses Swan were engaged. They record with sorrow the loss by death of one of their number, who, during the short period she was connected with the Association, was an active and zealous co-worker.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE
HALIFAX LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION :—

The close of another year brings with it the duty of presenting the Annual Report of the labor performed in 1865.

During the past year there has not been so much time spent in directly circulating the word of God, as had been in some of the past years. The regular visitation of the different Branch Societies has occupied the larger portion of my time. These societies have increased. Almost every quarter a new one, sometimes more than one, is formed. There have been upwards of twenty new branches organized during the past three and one half years. Nearly all, old and new, are visited annually. Besides, during these two years past, the Pictou branches, about thirty in all have been also visited. Hence there is less time to spend in the direct circulation of the Scriptures. But all the time that could be devoted to this duty has been given to it.

And with the formation of new branches, and consequent establishment of new depôts where large supplies of the word of God are always on hand, the work of *Bible circulation* is *really* carried out. It is of great importance to have in every

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town and village, and as far as practicable in every settlement depots where the Scriptures may be constantly obtained as cheaply as in this city.

With the exception of the two counties of Digby and Annapolis, I have the last year travelled over, and held meetings in every county of Nova Scotia proper. Meetings also have been held in every county of Cape Breton with the exception of Richmond county, where I have not yet found it practicable to form a branch.

Only, however, in parts of the counties of Kings, Yarmouth, Cape Breton, Guysboro and Pictou, has the work of Bible circulation been carried on. In the first quarter some weeks were spent in certain back settlements in Kings. In various parts of Argyle, and Pubnico, during the summer, the work of Bible circulation was prosecuted. At the mines in Cow Bay and Mira Bay in Cape Breton county, during the fall some time was spent at the same duty; and quite recently along the Gulf shore in Pictou county I was similarly employed.

In the quarterly Reports I have particularly specified the work which has been done. I need only add, that during the past year. I have travelled by rail, coach, or private conveyance, 2788 miles, sailed 117 miles, walked 781 miles. Visited with the Scriptures 556 families. Supplied families who had none, or but part of a Bible, 22. Addressed 154 different meetings. Disposed of 317 Bibles and 26 Testaments—in all 578 copies of the Scriptures.

Roman Catholic, as well as Protestant families have been visited with the word of God. In some cases the book was refused, in other cases it was purchased. Among those of French origin, I have rarely been able to dispose of a copy of the Scriptures. In Roman Catholic families, I particularly restrict myself to disposing of the word of God. All controversial discussion I avoid as much as possible, and *never* introduce it. I say nothing about their Church, but try to speak about the Bible, and about the Saviour it reveals. One result has been that in no single instance have I been unkindly treated, and in some cases I have seen more respect shown for the word of God among Roman Catholics than I have witnessed among those calling themselves Protestants,

but who were so only in name. Among one of the latter, an old woman whom I one day visited worked himself into a terrible passion, and stormed furiously because her daughter wished to buy a ninepence Bible. "There was," the mother said, "an old one in the house, and she did not know what more was wanted."

Not unfrequently I came to poor looking houses where only children (at the time of my visit) are present. In some instances, when not quite satisfied with the answers made to my question, "Have you a Bible?" I have, though somewhat hesitatingly, given one. And I have subsequently learned that no Bible had previously been in the house.

One day I came to—though I was not aware till I had entered—an almshouse. Here I found a poor young woman far gone in consumption, she had no Bible. Very thankfully she accepted the one I gave her, promising daily to read and study it.

During the period of six years now has the work of Bible circulation been carried on under your auspices. Out of the eighteen counties of the Province, in portions of fourteen of them have I, more or less, widely circulated the book of God. It is satisfactory to know that every year, nay, almost every quarter, families who before had not a Bible, have through your efforts obtained one. There are fewer families unsupplied than before; but the cases of destitution have not all been met. There are yet, and occasionally too in places where such a state of matters would not be suspected, families without Bibles. Let us still do what we can to "hold forth the word of life," accompanying our efforts with our prayers, and whether we be permitted to see or learn the results or not, in this we may rest confident, "Our labours shall not be in vain in the Lord."

It is quite pleasant to visit in Albro street. The colored people are invariably kind. I have several interesting sick people, whom I visit on Sabbath afternoon, when I have abundance of time to read

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to them. I have been endeavouring to sow the good seed, but God alone can send the increase.

A poor colored woman recently bereaved was so much comforted by the 12th chapter of Hebrews, which I read to her, that when we rose from our knees, she got her children to turn it up to read over again.

The rain was dripping heavily down the dirty walls. I was seated in a dry corner, on the only piece of furniture in the apartment—an old dirty stool—while the poor people squatted round me, with their large dark eyes gazing in my face. I felt it was quite a scene for a picture, but much more a scene to touch my heart with pity for my poor benighted sisters, whose minds were as cheerless and uncultivated as their persons.

One poor colored woman told me this week that she had succeeded in teaching her husband to read, owing to the largeness of the type; and she was so much pleased about it. He said she could not have had the book at all at full price.

On Sabbath afternoons I read in the houses of the sick, where I have occasionally ten or a dozen of an audience, one visitor after another dropping in, when, instead of the usual gossip they take their seats quietly and listen. A young lady assisted me in gathering up some of the stray Arabs in my neighbourhood, who are too ragged to go to Sabbath school, and she kindly instructs them in my parlour on Sabbaths while I am visiting. They are as ignorant as heathens. I would be glad of any contribution in the way of boys' clothing, so that they might be induced to go to a regular Sabbath school.

*Report of Mrs. Rutherford, Bible Woman—from January
17th to March 23rd.*

Made about 700 visits, Protestants and Roman Catholics, about as many of one as the other. Visited a portion of Albermale street, from Duke street ending at Jacob street. In these places I am happy to say, at present, sickness and destitution is not so prevalent as might be expected at this inclement season. Represented a few cases of destitution and sickness, as directed, to the clergymen that each belonged. One poor woman cared for, far advanced in consumption, unable in consequence to do for herself, with one little man; husband, intemperate and negligent; another cared for and deserving, taken to the poor-house.

The colored people were glad to see me; two amongst them bought two copies of the Word of God, Bible and Testament;—desired by all to come again.

MR. RUSSELL'S REPORTS.

QUARTER ENDING JANUARY, 1866.

*To the Committees of the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association,
and the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society.*

During the time I was resting at home, after last Quarterly Meeting of Committee, I addressed *two* meetings in Truro, and *one* in Clifton. The attendance at the meetings in Truro was smaller than expected, but the interest was well sustained. Rev. Dr. Forrester, together with Rev. Messrs. Phillips, Jordan, Black and McCurdy, ably advocated the cause of the Bible Society. As formerly, several Lady Collectors were appointed to go round, and upwards of \$90 were received. Rev. Mr. McCurdy kindly accompanied me to Clifton. A good meeting was obtained. He, and the Rev. James Bayers, (President of the Clifton Branch,) warmly commended the cause I was advocating. Above \$30 has been received from the Branch.

On Wednesday, November 1st, left Truro for Gay's River. On the evening of that day addressed a large meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Messrs. McLean and Annand contributed largely to the interest of the meeting. Received from the Treasurer of the Branch \$9.25. Took the coach next morning for Middle Musquodoboit. Then walked down to Little River, and in the evening addressed a small meeting in the School-house there. It was the first time that the claims of the Bible Society had been presented in this locality, and the result was encouraging. \$3 were paid. Collectors were appointed to go round and solicit more: and I am in

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hopes a Branch Society will yet be formed. Next day walked up over very muddy roads to Middle Settlement, and at night addressed another small meeting in the School-house, Francis Layton, Esq., presiding. Rev. Mr. Gatez lent his valued aid, and was elected Secretary of the Branch. Collectors were appointed to gather in subscriptions as heretofore, and upwards of \$33 have been remitted. Next day, walked up the River about five miles. In the evening addressed a crowded meeting in the School-house in the "Flat," Rev. Mr. Sedgwick presiding. This was a most pleasant evening. The closest attention was given to the statements and appeals made. At the close, when a subscription was taken up, almost every one gave something, and gave so cheerfully that it was real pleasure to receive it. Faster than I could pencil down the names and amounts, names and subscriptions were handed in, and (with a subscription of one or two received afterwards) \$16 was obtained.

Next evening was taken by Mr. Archibald across the River, to the School-house at Higgins Settlement. It was the first Bible Society meeting held here. Collectors were appointed to go round, and the results will appear bye and bye.

Went afterwards to Upper Musquodoboit, and in the upper School-house addressed a small meeting. An excellent spirit was evinced. The evening was unfavourable and the roads very bad, else, I doubt not, the building would have been crowded. Above \$14 were handed to me by the respected Treasurer, S. Henry, Esq.

Next day went to Middle Stewiacke. The day was wet, the roads bad, and a mistake about the meeting caused a thin attendance. The venerable Dr. Smith presided, warmly advocating (as he ever has done) the claims of the Bible Society.

Returned to Halifax to attend the Annual Meeting, after which was employed about a week preparing Reports, Subscription Lists, &c., for the forthcoming Annual Report. Then went on to Economy. Here on the evening of Tuesday, 21st November, addressed a meeting in Temperance Hall. Owing to the unfavourable night the attendance was not so large, but the subscriptions partly taken up then, and partly afterwards, were fully equal to, if not greater, than on former occasions. Kindly taken by Rev. Mr. McKay to Five Islands, next evening addressed a large meeting in the Presbyterian Church there. Some subscriptions were paid, and more will be obtained and forwarded. Next day went to Parrsboro'. Through the kindness of James Thompson, Esq., I was forwarded part of the way until Moose River was crossed. Walked the remainder of the distance. The evening of the following day addressed a meeting in the Wesleyan Church Parrsboro'. Rev. Messrs. Read, McKinnon, and Colpits took part in the proceedings of the evening. Nearly \$8 were realized, and more will be obtained.

Next day kindly taken by Rev. Mr. Read to River Hebert, in which place, and also at Lower Maccan, I had opportunities of bringing before large audiences, the claims of God's word. These were the first attempts made at both places to plead the cause of the Bible Society. Of the results at River Hebert I cannot yet speak. At Lower Maccan a Branch Society was formed. Above \$30 have been obtained, and arrangements were made to have a Depot opened. Through the kindness of William Patrick, Esq., (who in every possible way helped on my work) I was forwarded to Amherst. Here, owing to other meetings, it was found impracticable to get a large gathering. A few friends

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assembled. The Treasurer, C. Ratchford, Esq., handed me \$45. I promised to return if possible in a few weeks.

This season, as formerly, I had been requested to visit the Branches connected with one of the Pictou Auxiliary Bible Societies, so from Amherst I went to New Glasgow and spent a fortnight visiting the different Branches connected with this Auxiliary. This work done, I spent some time circulating the Scriptures in the Eastern part of Pictou County on the Gulf Shore. Borrowing all the suitable Bibles and Testaments I could procure at the New Glasgow Depot. I visited with the Scripture, Lower Merigomish, Robertson Island, Bailey's Brook, &c. The bitter cold weather made the travelling difficult, and the limited supply of books prevented my prosecuting the work as extensively as I wished. I purpose, (D. V.,) resuming it at a future day—beginning where I left off.

During the last quarter, in prosecution of my work, I have rode 621 miles, sailed 10, walked 130. Visited with the Scriptures 71 families. Supplied 4 families with the Scriptures who had none. Addressed 36 meetings. Disposed of 16 Bibles and 48 Testaments, in all 64 copies of the Scriptures. Obtained of subscriptions, &c., \$217.94, besides what had been forwarded to Halifax as the result of meetings held during the quarter.

There is nothing unusual to report in the proceedings of the past quarter. As heretofore the work of the Bible Society is progressing. May its progress be greatly accelerated, throughout every town, village and settlement of our Province, —and through the wide world, until the predicted period come, "when the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea."

QUARTER ENDING APRIL, 1866.

*To the Committees of the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association,
and the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society.*

I left Truro on Wednesday, January 17th, for Amherst, taking with me a box of Bibles and Testaments to circulate in the North Western part of the country. A meeting had been appointed in Amherst for Thursday night, but the burning of Sackville Academy on the previous evening occasioned the absence of some, and personal sickness prevented the attendance of others, who, but for this cause would have been present. The meeting was small; about \$7 were subscribed, part of which was paid. Next day was taken to Tidnish, where along the shore, up and down both sides of the river, and in the back settlement, I went round with the Scriptures, until all the copies that I had brought with me were disposed of. Then returned to Amherst. I had appointed a meeting in *Napan*, but a very severe snow storm prevented it being held. On my way back held meetings in Great Village, and in Portapique, connected with the Lower Londonderry Branch, and in Masstown, DeBert, and Folly, connected with the Upper Londonderry Branch. The interest manifested in all these places was highly encouraging. The respected Pastors of the Congregations gave me (as they had ever done) every encouragement and assistance. In Lower Londonderry some sums were received, and in all the places collectors were, as formerly, appointed to gather up subscriptions.

Next meeting was held at Brookfield. Here, about a twelve-month ago, I had endeavoured to excite an interest in the Bible Society. What the result will be time will tell. Next day, accompanied by Rev. Mr. McGillivray, (who had assisted at the Brookfield meeting) went to Middle Stewiacke. Owing to a misunderstanding about the hour of meeting, not

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many assembled. To those present I presented the claims of the Society, and I have no doubt but when the time arrives for making the annual subscriptions, Middle Stewiacke, as heretofore, will *not* be found *lacking*.

The following evening addressed a good meeting in Lower Stewiacke. The Rev. Messrs. McLean and Hare rendered valuable assistance. Arrangements were made for collecting the amounts signed at the meeting, and also for obtaining additional subscriptions. Next evening addressed a large meeting in Shubenacadie, and urged the importance of aiding in this great and good work. I have hopes that something will be received here.

Next meeting was in Hantsport. On two evenings in the Baptist Church I brought before the people there the claims of the Bible Society. I received above \$8, and arranged to have a Depot opened. In Lower Horton the next meeting was held in the Wesleyan Church. Not very many attended, nor was so much interest manifested as I could have wished. The following evening a meeting was held in Wolfville, pretty well attended. The President, Dr. Cramp, in the Chair. He, and the Rev. Messrs. DeBlois and Somerville, took part in the proceedings. Regrets were expressed that during the past year, the claims of the Society were overlooked. It was resolved that each minister should preach once a quarter (alternately) on the subject, and collections should be taken up.

In connection with the East Cornwallis Branch I endeavoured to obtain two meetings, one in Canard, the other in Canning. The meeting in the former place proved a failure. In Canning a good many assembled. Rev. Messrs. Hennigar and Kean took part in the proceedings. Some subscriptions were received, and more will be obtained.

Next meeting was in Kentville, and it was a very pleasing one. This very efficient Branch had just forwarded a subscription. Rev. Mr. Ruggles warmly supported the Society. Henry B. Webster, the respected President, assisted me much.

The day following took the coach for Berwick, West Cornwallis. I had arranged for meetings in Berwick and Somerset. The delay of the coach hours behind its regular time, prevented one meeting. At Somerset a good meeting was obtained. Next meeting was held in Aylesford. In the Baptist Church a large number of people listened to an appeal in behalf of the Bible Society. Above \$5 was taken up in a collection, and collectors will soon go round to gather up more.

Kindly taken by Rev. Mr. Crane, well on to Wilmot, my next meeting was held there. It was a failure. The place of meeting was unsuitable. Not a dozen persons assembled, and nothing was done.

Next day walked over to Nictaux Falls, and addressed a pretty good meeting. A few subscriptions were obtained, and also something on purchase account. Returned to Wilmot and was taken by Mr. Dodge to Laurencetown. Here a good meeting was secured. Rev. Messrs. Waddall and Bent assisting. The Society which had been dormant for years was revived. Some subscriptions were obtained, and collectors were appointed to secure more.

Took the coach next day to Bridgetown. In the evening a meeting, not large, but very interesting, was held. Rev. Messrs. Daniel, Gordan and other gentlemen took part. Next evening addressed a good meeting in Annapolis; Rev. Mr. Ritchie presiding, who earnestly commended the claims of the Bible Society to the increased liberality of those present.

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From Annapolis walked on to Clements, Hillsburg and Digby, and held meetings in each place. The one in Clements was a failure. The meetings in Hillsburg and Digby were good. The Rev. Mr. Coffin at the former, and the Rev. Mr. Yewens at the latter place, helped me much. The results of these meetings will appear bye and bye.

From Digby took the coach to Weymouth, where a small meeting was held. Returning to Laurencetown—on the way addressed a meeting at Granville Ferry; a collection was taken, and it is expected a Branch will be formed here.

From Laurencetown took the mail to New Germany, which place I reached within an hour of the time of meeting. Addressed a very small audience in the Wesleyan Church. The evening was unfavourable, still some subscriptions were obtained. Next day went to Bridgewater, where on the following evening I addressed a meeting in the Baptist Church. Next day, assisted by Mr. Gow, collected in all above \$51—a larger sum than was ever obtained before, although at each annual visit to this rapidly rising village, I have obtained a larger subscription, than had been received the previous year.

The next meeting was in Lunenburg town. A severe storm prevented its being held on the evening first appointed, but the following evening a very large gathering was obtained. Next forenoon, assisted by James Eisenhear, Esq., I gathered about \$40, and something additional has since been received.

The same afternoon was kindly forwarded to the ferry by Rev. Mr. Duff. Crossing which I walked on to Petite Riviere, which place I reached within an hour of the time for meeting. Addressed, with the assistance of Rev. Messrs. Spike and Lockhart, a large number in the School House. Above \$13 were subscribed, about half of which was paid. Next day

taken by Rev. Mr. Lockhart, to Upper Dublin, went from thence to Lower LaHave, from which place Dr. McGregor, conveyed me, the same evening, over very bad roads to Kinsburg. Here a pretty good meeting was held, and some subscriptions were obtained. Next evening spoke to the other part of the LaHave Branch Society in the Wesleyan Church, Ritzes' Cove, Rev. Mr. McMillan presiding. Above \$20 were paid me of old subscriptions, and something in the way of new subscriptions.

Returned to Lunenburg, from which place went to Mahone Bay, where I addressed a small meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Some subscriptions were obtained, and more will, I trust, be secured.

Took the coach next day to Chester town, in which place, as also in Chester Basin—assisted by Rev. Messrs. Shreve and Skinner—addressed in the former place, a small, and in the latter place a large meeting. Returned the day following, (5th April,) to Halifax.

During the past quarter in prosecution of my work, I have rode 760 miles, walked 252, sailed 4; addressed 57 meetings; visited about 30 distinct Branches; Received from sales of books, subscriptions, and payments on purchase accounts, \$395. Visited with the Scriptures, 79 families; supplied 11 families with Bibles—some of whom had no part of the Word of God; others had a Testament, or fragment of a Bible. Disposed of 62 Bibles, and 66 Testaments, in all 128 copies of the Word of God.

I have already stated that in Tidnish and its vicinity, I circulated all the copies of the Scriptures I had taken with me. Besides the eleven families partially or wholly destitute of the Word of God, there were other families supplied, who, I fear, were formerly without a Bible. I would not have learned that *all* the eleven had been destitute, if the confes-

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sion had not been freely made. The man who drove me down to Tidnish, after purchasing a Bible, said to me, "This is a thing I had not in my house before." In another house, after I had sold a Bible, the woman who had purchased, turning to a neighbor, who was in, said, "There was neither Bible nor Testament in this house, I was determined to buy one—the first that came along—if I had any money to buy it with." The same day in another family—a colored one—after I had sold a Bible, and given a Testament to the children, the mother observed to her children, "Now father can get *his one* home." I enquired what she meant, and learned that her father, knowing they had no Bible, had lent them his, which now she would return.

Other circumstances might be related, but it would extend this Report too much. The work still goes on. There is nothing to discourage, but much to encourage us in it. The *Book* which not merely contains the Word of God, but which is the Word of God, is being more and more extensively circulated in our Province, and a greater and greater interest is being awakened in its behalf. Notwithstanding some drawbacks, there are many and great encouragements. "Let us not be weary in well doing." We are endeavouring now to sow the incorruptible seed of the Word. "In due season we shall reap if we faint not."

QUARTER ENDING JULY, 1866.

*To the Committees of the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association,
and the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society.*

On Saturday, April 28th, I left Truro for Antigonishe, in which county I spent some time circulating the Scriptures. Two boxes of Bibles and Testaments had been forwarded

thither last fall. Nearly all the Bibles ; all the Testaments, besides some more procured there, were disposed of.

I left Antigonishe, came to Halifax, took the steamer to Liverpool, and the coach to Shelburne. Had arranged for meetings from Shelburne to Yarmouth. The first was held in Shelburne in the Presbyterian Church. It was quite successful. Rev. Messrs. Clarke and Smith lent their valued aid. Next day accompanied by Mr. Clarke, collected, (including something paid before) upwards of \$52. This was the more encouraging as there had been recently many appeals to the liberality of the people. Yet every *contributor* seemed to "give *willingly*." Some not waiting to be called on, sent forward their subscription.

Next day, (June 13th,) went on to Clyde River, and in the evening addressed the small Society there. A collection was made of \$4.58, and handed to me. The following evening addressed a good meeting in the Court House, Head of Barrington. Several subscriptions were received, and these were increased next evening in Barrington Passage. The meeting in the Passage was very interesting. Rev. Mr. Jordan presided, and (as formerly) warmly supported and enforced the claims of the Bible Society.

Next day, through the kindness of Gabriel Robertson, Esq., was forwarded to Shag Harbour, where I had in the Baptist church, an opportunity of pleading, for the first time, the claims of the Bible Society. Some interest was manifested, a collection of \$3.90 was taken and handed me. The following morning having employed a man to take me to Pubnico, from thence took the coach to Yarmouth, where meetings were held both in the Presbyterian and Wesleyan churches. Assisted by the friends who had at previous visits accompanied me while collecting, obtained from the subscribers to the Bible Society, in the course of the two days I spent

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in Yarmouth, upwards of \$106. Many of the contributors were from home, but such will be waited on when they return. From Yarmouth took the steamer to Liverpool. Arranged about meetings there and in Milton, and proceeded to Mill Village. Here good meetings were obtained, and upwards of \$17 were obtained, besides something on purchase account. From Mills Village, visited Port Medway, and held two meetings. The audiences were large, but no one seemed inclined to help. There is not another village of its size in the Province, but has its Branch, and where at least something is done for the Bible Society.

Returned to Liverpool, and addressed a very small meeting in Temperance Hall. The heavy losses sustained through the fires last season in Liverpool, have taxed the energies of the people very much. Little had been done for the Bible Society. Some contributions were in the Treasurers' hands, and these will be forwarded. Some Ladies were appointed to go round and solicit more subscriptions. Next day went to Milton, where a good meeting was obtained in the Baptist church. The day following the meeting, accompanied by Rev. Mr. Black, collected upwards of \$22. I had written to North District Queens County, appointing meetings there, but the Postman, (who only carries one Passenger at a time,) had a passenger engaged, and could not take me. I waited some time in Milton, trying to get by private conveyance, but I was disappointed. Reluctantly I had to give up the thought of visiting North District at this time. Taking the coach to Bridgewater, I went on to Lunenburg, and from thence by steamer to Halifax.

In circulating the Scriptures in Antigonishe County, the success was on the whole very encouraging. The long rainy weather and the scarcity of hay had (in some of the places visited) rendered many of the people, so far as ready money

was considered, literally penniless. But there was a desire manifested to receive the word of God. And where I witnessed this I never hesitated to give a book.

I visited also the coloured settlement of Tracadie, partly in Antigonishe partly in Guysboro' Counties, I found many of these poor people unsufficiently supplied, or almost destitute of the word of God. In most cases the book had to be given. One day I supplied *eight* such families with the Scriptures who had none. In each family (almost) some, either old or young, could at least read a little. All thankfully received the word of life.

During the last quarter I have, in prosecution of my work, travelled, by Railway, Coach or private conveyance, 571 miles; walked on foot 182 miles; sailed upwards of 300; addressed 30 meetings; visited with the Scriptures 198 families; supplied 16 families with Bibles, who had none; disposed of 90 Bibles and 107 Testaments—in all 197 copies of the word of God; received of subscriptions, payment on purchase accounts, and sales of Scriptures \$400.21½.

As stated in former Reports, I may again say that the work is progressing. Slowly, but surely, is the cause of the Bible advancing, and the *book* itself circulating more and more widely. O! for the life-giving influences of the Holy Spirit that the Book inspired by *Him*, may be indeed spirit and life to those who become possessors of it. And that from love to the Book, and love to the Saviour which the *book* reveals, aid may be still more liberally given, by all who possess the precious record, till *that* record finds its way to the hands of every human being.

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QUARTER ENDING OCTOBER, 1866.

*To the Committees of the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association,
and the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society.*

The past quarter, (with the exception of one week spent in Halifax arranging the accounts connected with the various depôts throughout the Province,) has been devoted to the visitation of Branch Societies, chiefly in Cape Breton.

I had arranged that on my return from that Island, a week or two should have been spent in circulating the Scriptures in a destitute locality which had been named to me; and for this purpose, I had arranged with the depository in New Glasgow to have a *box* of Bibles forwarded. But while I was in Cape Breton, a Colporteur went with the Scriptures to the place, and supplied those who were destitute. I received a note from New Glasgow telling me it was unnecessary for me to proceed to the place I had intended to visit.—Of course I did not go.

Early in August I left Truro for Cape Breton. The first place visited was Hawkesbury, where I had appointed to be on Thursday evening, August 9th. But a lecture which had been appointed weeks previously, prevented my meeting being held. I had, however, an opportunity of saying a few words on behalf of the Bible Society. And on my return, weeks after, a meeting of the Hawkesbury Branch was obtained.

From Hawkesbury went to Hillsburg, (Mabou,) at which place, and also, at Port Hood, had opportunities of bringing before pretty large audiences, the claims of God's Word. The new President, Rev. Wm. Sinclair, the Treasurer, John Murray, Esq., with other friends, helped me much. Received of subscriptions, \$37.54.

There had been a Branch in Port Hood years ago. It had gone down. At my former visit in 1863, chiefly owing to very rainy weather, it was impossible to get a meeting or

revive the Branch. A meeting was *now* secured, \$5.53 were collected, and the following morning I obtained \$9.29 of subscriptions. Arranged to have a Depôt opened at the mines, and at my next visit I hope to see the Branch reorganized. Proceeded next to Margaree. Meetings had been arranged for North East, (the place where we formerly assembled,) for Big Intervale, and the Harbour.—Places I had never visited, nor had Bible Society meetings been held. The meeting in the Baptist church, North East, was highly encouraging. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Kempton, and Rev. Mr. McKenzie, Middle River, were present, and took part in the proceedings. The season was a busy one. The evening was fine. There had been much broken weather. There were large quantities of hay cut down to be attended to, and yet many spared an hour to listen to an account of the doings of the Bible Society; and shewed their interest by contributing above \$18. The meeting at the Big Intervale was small, but not uninteresting. It will pave the way for further operations.

From Margaree was kindly taken by Mr. Ross, Merchant, to Baddeck. A small meeting was held in Greenwood Church, Rev. Mr. McKenzie, presiding. Notice had been forgotten to be given of the meeting, the previous *Sunday*. Hence the small attendance. But I do not think there is any abatement in the interest taken in the work itself.

Next day, D. McCurdy, Esq., took me to St. Ann's, (and back,) where on the evening of 22nd Aug., addressed a small meeting in the school house, Rev. Mr. McIntosh, presiding. Many years ago, this place distinguished itself by its liberal contributions to the Bible Society. I trust that as the result of the meetings, small as it was, something will be secured for the cause so well supplied of old.

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Next day, took the steamer to North Sydney. That evening a small meeting was held in the Bethel. Rev. Wm. Meek, President of the Society, in the Chair. Some subscriptions were taken—partly paid, and arrangements were made to obtain more. The day following, went to South Sydney, where a pretty good meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church. \$24.62½ were received, besides \$8.53½ on purchase account.

Next morning took the steamer for Little Glace Bay. Here, as well as in Cow Bay and Mira Bay, meetings were held, on the whole very encouraging. It was the first time the claims of the Society had been presented in Glace Bay, and at the close of my address \$8.73 were collected. Arranged to have a Depôt opened, and forwarded books from Cow Bay. In Cow Bay, collectors will go round as last year. In Mira Bay, after my address, a subscription was taken and partly paid. More will be obtained and forwarded.

Taken back to Sydney by the kindness of Mr. Isaac Archibald; the day following, took the steamer to Whycomah. I had never visited this place, but I had resolved if possible to introduce the claims of the Bible Society. Writing a notice which I stuck up at the Post Office, and going to the school house, where I gave the children notice of a meeting that evening. Some twenty or so assembled, to whom I gave a sketch of the past history, and present doings of the Bible Society, and urged them to assist in the work. The response, all things considered, was encouraging. Above \$3 were received. A committee was appointed to secure more, and forward it. Arrangements were also made here to have a Depôt opened. I have little doubt should I have it in my power to return, and due notice given of a meeting, a larger audience, and an increased subscription will be obtained.

Returned to Hillsburg (Mabou) in which place, as also at Port Hood, meetings were held while passing. In Plaister Cove, addressed a few who assembled (on a very short notice) in the School house. No response was made to my appeal, but afterward James G. McKeen, Esq., handed me \$5 as *his* subscription. Addressed the Hawkesbury Branch in the Baptist Church, the respected Secretary and Treasurer presiding. About \$8 were subscribed of which \$2 were paid. Crossing to Port Mulgrave, was sorry to find no trace whatever of the Branch which had been formed there. One office bearer had died, another had removed from the place. Proceeded to Guysboro and Cape Canso.—Good meetings in both places. In Canso, assisted by the respected President and by Rev. Mr. Steele, above \$26 were subscribed, of which about half was paid. From the Ladies Bible Society in Guysboro I received \$22.25, besides a small sum on purchase account. This efficient Branch has not wearied in well doing. It has now existed 47 years; and I felt interested in glancing over the old book of the Society to find that as the result of the “work of faith and labour of love” of its members, upwards of £387 has been remitted as free contributions to Halifax. The other Branch in Guysboro’ is also in an efficient state. A remittance had been made about the New Year, and soon another will be forwarded.

The meeting in Guysboro’ was very interesting. The President, C. Jost, Esq., was in the Chair, and the work of the Society was warmly commended by Stewart Campbell, Esq., Rev. Messrs. Hart and Burns, and would have been, had time permitted, by other ministers present.

A severe rain storm prevented a meeting in Manchester. Taking the coach to Glenelg, St. Mary’s, I addressed two meetings there. The collectors of the Ladies’ Bible Society will go around shortly, and their contributions will be for-

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warded. From Glenelg went to Sherbrooke. Here, and at Goldenville, meetings were held. Two meetings were held in Goldenville, both well attended. It was pleasing to see those labouring so hard, and generally successfully, to extract the gold from the hard rocks, manifest a warm interest in the circulation of that *book* whose contents "cannot be valued with the gold of Ophir, with the precious onyx, or the sapphire." This interest was shewn by collecting, at the close of my address, \$14.70. The meeting in the Presbyterian Church, Sherbrooke, was very excellent. The Pastor, Rev. Mr. Campbell, and H. McDonald, Esq., spoke, and spoke well, on the duty and privilege of helping on God's work. At the the close—the largest collection I ever received at one meeting was taken, \$41.12½. From Sherbrooke went to Caledonia, where, as formerly, meetings were held in School-rooms, several miles apart. Above \$20 was received, and more will be obtained. From Caledonia went to Goshen, where an interesting meeting was held, Rev. Mr. Forbes from Canada, and Rev. Mr. McDonald from Scotland, both rendered efficient help. A remittance had been forwarded to Halifax a week or two before, in addition to which I obtained above \$17 additional, and collectors were appointed to secure more. From Goshen—holding a meeting in Glenelg and another in West River, St. Mary's—returned to Truro, where I arranged for holding the annual meeting, which came off in the Wesleyan Church last Wednesday evening. The attendance was not large, but the interest manifested was good. The President, Dr. Forrester, Rev. Messrs. Stuart, Gordan, and Morton addressed the meeting to good effect. Lady collectors were appointed to go round as before to solicit subscriptions.

During the past quarter, I have, in prosecution, of my work, travelled by rail, coach, or private conveyance, 798

miles ; sailed 137 ; walked 128 ; addressed 41 meetings ; obtained of subscriptions, &c., \$335,27½.

The very rainy weather during the past weeks, hindered, to some extent, the work in which I am engaged. It was often necessary to meet appointments, to travel under very heavy showers ; but I have been mercifully preserved from any injurious results. Some meetings were altogether prevented by the rain, others were rendered smaller than otherwise they would have been. It seemed a pity when evening after evening the rain poured down, and empty seats were visible where otherwise there would have been several hearers. I tried not to feel discouraged. The God of the Bible is the God of Nature and of Providence. The Saviour, whose book we seek to circulate, is *He* into whose hands all things—the elements of nature not excepted—have been given. Without his knowledge and permission “a sparrow cannot fall to the ground.” “Vapours and stormy wind fulfil *His* will.” The Bible Society, which we firmly believe is *His* cause, will most assuredly prevail, whatever seeming hindrances may be in the way. And notwithstanding the seeming drawbacks, to which reference has been made, there is nothing, so far as I know, to show any abatement in the interest formerly taken in the cause of the circulation of God’s Holy Word.
