

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BY-LAWS.

I. The Society shall consist of such persons of English or Welsh birth, or descent, in the male line, as shall be elected members" thereof according, to the regulations, hereinafter made.

II. The objects of the Society are to unite Englishmen and Welshmen, and their descendants, in a social compact, for the promotion of mutual and friendly intercourse, and for affording to persons of English or Welsh birth or descent who may be in distress, their advice and counsel, and, if necessary, such pecuniary assistance as the funds of the Society will admit of.

III. In addition to the Officers named in the Act of Incorporation, six Stewards shall be elected, who shall co-operate with the Committee in all celebrations to be held by the Society; also a Marshal and Standard Bearers shall be appointed by the President.

IV. The Officers of the Society shall be elected as follows: Any member may nominate a Candidate for each office, in succession; and in the event of more than one nomination for any one office, the decision shall be by ballot.

V. The President and Vice-Presidents shall not be eligible for re-election to the offices respectively filled by them for the next succeeding year.

VI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be holden on the third Friday in January in each year. In each year there shall be holden four Quarterly General Meetings, viz.: 1st. The Annual General Meeting, and one each on the first Friday of the months of April, July, and October. Monthly Ordinary Meetings shall be held on the first Friday of

each month throughout the year, excepting in January, April, July, and October, as otherwise provided.

VII. Any gentleman desirous of joining the Society shall, at a General or Ordinary Meeting, be proposed and seconded by members, and may be elected by a majority of such meeting, on payment of the first year's subscription.

VIII. The Annual Subscription of Members shall be Two Dollars. The subscription year shall be from 1st January to 31st December. Any new Member elected between the 1st of January and 30th of September shall pay the full subscription . for the current year; any elected on or after 1st October, may be admitted on paying for the current quarter only.

IX. A subscription of \$10 shall be a life-subscription, and the same, together with all donations of \$10 and upwards, unless such donations are made for a specific purpose, shall be invested by the Managing Committee, and form a portion of the permanent fund, the interest on which shall be applied to the charitable purposes and ordinary expenditare of the Society. No ordinary member shall be eligible to life membership until he has paid all arrears of subscription as such ordinary member.

X. The Annual Meeting shall order the investment of such proportion of the surplus funds as may appear desirable, and in such manner as may be then determined, and the annual subscriptions, with the interest of investments, shall constitute the ordinary funds applicable to the charitable purposes and ordinary expenses of the Society.

XI. The Treasurer shall be authorized to advance to a distressed individual a sum not exceeding Two Dollars, upon the written recommendation of the President or either of the Vice-Presidents, or of any member of the Managing Committee by them appointed to grant such relief: provided always, that such recommendation does not involve the payment of more than Two Dolla manding more shall be referre Committee as h

In cases demanding more than the ordinary relief thus afforded, the same shall be referred for further enquiry and action to the Managing Committee as hereinafter set forth.

XII. The Managing Committee shall meet weekly, and any five members thereof shall form a quorum. It shall be their business to direct the affairs of the Society generally, under this Constitution; to determine all matters referred to them by the Society, and to prepare for each Annual Meeting a Report of the proceedings of the Society for the year, to be submitted previous to the election of Officers.

XIII. The Managing Committee may make loans (not ex. ceeding Twenty Dollars to one person or family,) from the ordinary funds of the Society, to persons in temporary distress or trouble, upon receiving such reasonable security as they may deem expedient, provided the period of such loans do not exceed six months. It shall have 'power' to grant extended relief in particular cases at discretion, the orders upon the Treasurer being in all such cases signed by two or more of the Members of the Committee.

XIV. The Committee, assisted by the Stewards, shall arrange for the Annual Celebration of St. George's Day, and report such arrangements at the Monthly' Meeting in March. No expense of any celebration or social entertainment whatever, shall be charged against the funds of the Society.

XV. The President (or in his absence, the Senior Vice-President,) shall direct the Secretary to convene *a Special General Meeting of the Society, upon requisition (stating the purpose thereof) from any five members, and the Secretary shall call a Special Meeting of the Managing Committee, either by direction of the President, (or in his absence, the Senior Vice-President,) or upon the requisition of any two members of the Committee.

XVI. The Chair shall be taken thirty minutes precisely after .

the hour appointed for meeting, and if there be not then a a quorum of at least ten members present, the meeting shall be forthwith adjourned.

XVII. Any member in arrears of subscription for two years may be considered as having withdrawn from the Society, and his name shall be erased from the list of members, after due notice being given him.

No member shall be entitled to vote at the Annual Election of Officers, or at any subsequent meeting, neither shall he be eligible for election to any office of the Society, if he shall not have paid his previous year's subscription.

XVIII. The annual subscription shall be considered due and payable in advance, on or before the 23rd day of April in every year.

XIX. The duty of the President shall be to preside and preserve order at all the meetings of the Society, and to protect and further its interests to the best of his ability. In his absence, the senior Vice-President present shall exercise the authority and duty of the President. In case of the absence of the first four officers from any meeting, the members present shall be empowered to elect a Chairman out of their number.

XX. The Secretary shall have charge of the Seal, Banners, and other Insignia of the Society. He shall keep a fair register of all proceedings, orders, rules, and regulations, and manage the correspondence. He shall, when applied to, and on payment of such fees as may be determined on by the Committee, issue certificates of admission to each member (on his having signed the Constitution,) to which he shall affix the Seal of the Society. He shall, when necessary, summon the Society to its various meetings, and shall sign such Cards of Invitation to all Celebrations as may be required of him by the Committee and Stewards. He shall also, at all meetings of the Society, and of the Managing Committee, enter into the respective minute books the names of the members present at such meetings.

The Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds. He shall countersign such certificates of admission as may be issued by the Secretary. His accounts shall be fairly kept and exhibited to the President and the Managing Committee, whenever called for, and shall also be laid before the Society at its January Meeting. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to open an account with such one of the Chartered Banks in the City as may be approved of by the President and Managing Committee of the Society, and there deposit the securities of the Society in the joint names of the President and of himself; and when directed by the Committee, all funds belonging to the Society, and paid to the Treasurer, shall be deposited in such Bank.

XXII. All vacancies in the offices of the Society, happening in the interim between two succeeding Annual Meetings, may be filled by election in the usual way at the Quarterly Meeting next after the same shall have occurred.

XXIII. To preserve order, and to expedite the business of the Society, any member who may have proposals to make, or observations to offer upon any proposition, shall rise and address the President; and no person shall interrupt another when speaking, if the speaker be in order.

XXIV. The introduction of political or religious subjects, or their discussion, shall never be allowed at any meeting of the Society.

XXV. The members of this Society shall faithfully observe and conform to all the rules and regulations that shall be made by the Society, and entered in the books thereof, on pain of being dismissed from it, and having their names erased from the list of members.

XXVI. If the majority of all the members present at any General Meeting shall vote for the expulsion of a member, his name shall be erased, and he shall never afterwards be admitted

to any meeting of the Society, unless again elected by ballot, as in the first instance: provided always, that no proposition for the expulsion of a member shall be in order, unless one month's notice has been given of an intention to submit it at the then next ensuing Quarterly Meeting.

XXVII. The Banners and Flags of the Society shall not be used except on occasions when the Society, as a body, takes part in the proceedings, or where the Society is represented by its officers.

XXVIII. At any Quarterly or Annual Meeting the members present may, on one month's notice previously given, elect any one of its members an honorary life member, in consideration of services rendered the Society, and also may elect any distinguished person eligible to become a member, in like manner for services rendered either to the Society or the country, and such honorary member shall be entitled to all the privileges of an ordinary member.

XXIX. An Obituary Record shall be kept by the Secretary of any member of this Society who may hereafter die, stating his birth and parentage, if known, date of admission as a member, his position, general character, and such other facts in regard to him as may be interesting to chronicle. Such record to be published with the Annual Reports.



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REPORT

OF THE

Managing Committee for the year 1867.

THE Managing Committee in presenting their Annual Report, have much pleasure in pointing to the continued prosperity and usefulness of the Society.

The Receipts during the year amount to \$1866.90, which, together with the balance of \$170.07 in hand at the commencement of the past year, and \$100 which had been temporarily invested in Provincial Permanent Building Society Stock, and turned into cash during the year, make a total of \$2136.97.

Your Committee during the past year have received an unusually large number of applications for relief. Of these, 418 applications were entertained, and sums amounting in the aggregate to \$665.15 bestowed in money.

It is to be remarked, however, that these 418 applications do not represent distinct persons. Many individuals have applied for and received relief on *repeated* occasions, and in many instances, where it appeared necessary, your Committee have bestowed sums varying from \$5 to \$10, and even \$15, on one person or one family.

In addition to the above, ninety-three passes by the different Railways have been granted, at a further cost of \$108.06.

The expenses attending the maintenance of five persons at the General Hospital were defrayed wholly, or in part, by the Society, the sum of \$12.30 having been applied to that mode

of relief, and \$10 have been disbursed in or towards the burial expenses of three persons. The balance remaining in the Treasurer's hands, after payment of these sums and other disbursements,—full details of which appear in his Balance sheet appended hereto,—is \$140.63.

The unusual number of demands made upon the resources of the Society has caused the balance in hand to be less than that remaining in hand for some years past. The want of employment and consequent distress which for a long period have prevailed from the stoppage of work in many of the dock-yards and iron-works in London or its vicinity, caused an extensive emigration to this Province, during the past summer, of operatives formerly engaged upon those works, 510 of whom were sent out to this Province by the East End Emigration Society of London, England, in the ships Thames and St. Lawrence, which arrived in Quebec in August last. A very large proportion of the moneys spent, as above-mentioned in pecuniary aid and in Railway fares, was disbursed in the relief and assistance of a great number of these distressed emigrants, who, having reached our shores in a condition of great destitution, afterwards found their way to Toronto.

While it is a source of satisfaction to your Committee that the Society has been thus instrumental in ministering to the necessities of our fellow-countrymen, and in assisting a useful class of emigrants to establish themselves in this Province, they cannot but express their feeling that a greater burden has been thus laid upon the Society and upon the citizens of Toronto generally, than they ought to have been called upon to bear; and they suggest the expediency and propriety of the adoption by the proper Provincial Authorities of steps more effectual for the maintenance of newly-arrived emigrants, and for their being forwarded into districts where work and wages are obtainable, than the very limited and partial measures Department in th

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COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

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The Festival of St. George was doubly gelebrated,-first, by the attendance of the Society, as represented by a small number of members, at Morning Service in St. James's Cathedral, the use of the Church having been given for the occasion by the Rector of the Parish. Prayers were said by the Rev. W. S. Darling, one of the Society's Chaplains, and an appropriate and eloquent sermon preached by the Rev. H. W. Davies, B.D. The musical portion of the service was effectively rendered by Mrs. Beard, and the other members of the Choir of St. James, under the able direction of Mr. John Carter who presided at the organ. The collection, after deducting expenses, amounted to \$25.92. A Ball, which was held in the Music Hall in the evening, formed the second part of the day's celebration. It proved a pleasant entertainment, but the attendance on the part of members was small, and the pecuniary results did not add so large a sum to the resources of the Society as might have been anticipated, the net proceeds being only \$24.05.

On the 14th of August, the Annual Pic-nic came off with great success at Mimico, and resulted in the addition of \$76.20 to the funds of the Society, after payment of expenses.

At the Quarterly Meeting held on the 5th July, in the Mechanics' Institute, several important amendments to the Constitution and By-laws of the Society were debated and adopted; and the members present afterwards partook of a collation which was a pleasant re-union. The expenses connected therewith formed no charge upon the funds of the Society.

The distribution of Christmas cheer to that portion of the poor who come within the scope of the Society's operations took place on Monday, Dec. 24th, in the store of the Ontario Buildings, on King and York Streets, the use of which was kindly granted for the occasion.

The provisions distributed consisted of the following :

besides various other donations of meat and groceries.

The Society was enabled to continue this popular mode of affording relief by the liberal contributions in money and kind collected for the purpose, full particulars of which are appended hereto.

The Society has lost, by death, the following members during the past year:

Wm. Henwood, John Jackson, Henry Roberts, W. M. Short, and J. Warwick.

In consequence of the large number in arrear, your Committee regret to report that it was found necessary to revise the list of members on the Society's Roll, for the purpose of ascertaining the names of those who, under the provisions of the 17th By-law, were entitled to the privilege of membership. This duty was committed to a sub-committee appointed at the monthly meeting held on May 3rd, and was carefully performed by them : the result being that 37 names were erased from the list of members, in pursuance of the report of the sub-committee, which was presented at the monthly meeting held on November 1st. On the other hand, 1 honorary life-member, 2 life-members, and 66 ordinary members have been added to the strength of the Society, which comprises now in all 9 honorary life-members, 60 life-members, and 293 duly qualified ordinary members, in all 363 members.

The invested funds of the Society consist of the following: City of Toronto Debenture, \$125; Yorkville, do. \$100; each bearing interest at 6 per cent. per annum; Government Debentures, "Phipps Fund," at 5 per cent., \$1000; Canada Perman \$1000; Prov dends at 8 per accumulating

nada Permanent Building Society, (dividends 10 per cent,) \$1000; Provincial Permanent Building Society, \$100 (dividends at 8 per cent.); Provincial Permanent Building Society accumulating shares, \$100.

With regard to the question of enclosing the burial lots belonging to the Society in St. James's Cemetery, a matter which has frequently come before the Society for consideration, the Committee to whom it was referred to enquire and report upon the subject presented their Report at the monthly meeting, held on 1st November. The discussion of the suggestions made in that Report was, by resolution, deferred to the Annual Meeting.

Your Committee cannot omit their warm acknowledgments of the kind and ready attention given by the medical officers to the sick who, during the past year, have been commended to their consideration and professional services.

Before concluding this Report, your Committee beg leave to make one or two suggestions upon some points which, in their judgment, concern the usefulness and efficiency of the Society.

1st—With respect to the Annual Service to commemorate the Society's Festival, the very limited number of members and of the public who attended the Service which was held in the morning of last St. George's Day, and the small sum realized by the offertory, as compared with that collected on former occasions, afford strong evidence that a week-day service in the morning conduces but little to the advancement of the cause of the Society. Your Committee regret that the results of that service did not justify the change made by the members at their monthly meeting, from the arrangements proposed by the Committee to whom the preparation of the programme of the day had been committed. Your Committee. would therefore suggest that in future the religious services to commemorate St. George's Day should be held,

either on the Sunday falling nearest the 23rd April, or, if it be thought more appropriate that they should take place on the Anniversary, then that the evening be fixed for that purpose whenever the festival occurs on a week-day, so that the large portion of members and of the public whose vocations render their attendance on the morning of a working-day inconvenient or impossible, may not be debarred from taking part in the religious services appropriate to the day. Your Committee are fortified in this view by the judicious letter addressed by Mr. Carter to the Secretary on this subject, which was read at the Quarterly Meeting held on the 5th of July last.

Another yet more important question for the consideration of the Society, is that arising from the proposal to open a House of Refuge for the destitute English poor, and more particularly for emigrants, to be called the "St. George's Home;" where shelter, and, when necessary, fuel and food could be afforded to persons of the description referred to. Your Committee received, during the past summer, a very interesting and courteous communication bearing upon this subject from Mr. J. E. Pell, formerly of Toronto, who now resides in Montreal, and is the active and highly esteemed Chairman of the Relief Committee of our sister Society in that City. From the facts stated by him, when your Committee had the pleasure of an interview with that gentleman, it appears that a home of this description is in active operation in Montreal, and has proved a most effectual and economical mode of carrying a very important branch of the benevolent work of the Society there. Your Committee trust that the exertions and liberality of Englishmen in Toronto will enable our Society, ere long, to set on foot a similar institution. Your Committee doubt not that if it should be judiciously conducted it would prove an immense boon to many who now are frequently at a loss where to procure a lodging for a night or other short period, or whom your Committee are obliged to furnish with money for this purpose, which money might be spent with greater economy to the Society, and comfort to the applicant, if a St. George's Home were available for the purpose above mentioned. A member of the Society has kindly offered to subscribe \$100 towards such an object. A Soup Kitchen would also form a most useful appendage to the proposed Home.

Your Committee cannot but feel that however appropriate and seasonable the relief may be which is afforded by means of the annual distribution of Christmas cheer, that relief is of a very temporary nature, and hardly commensurate with the expenditure of labor time and money that it involves. While they would by no means be understood to suggest the discontinuance of a custom which tends to cheer the hearts and homes of many a needy family at the festive season of Christmas, they have no doubt that if it were resolved by their successors, and announced to the public, that a considerable portion of the contributions would be applied to the support of a Home, and to the purchase of fuel to be distributed throughout the winter among the poor, this extension of the plan of relief would meet with the approval of the Society generally, and would commend itself to the judicious liberality of the benevolent. At all events, your Committee would recommend to their successors that means should in future be adopted for procuring, before the begin ning of winter, a supply of fuel for distribution among the poor. The number of applications for relief in this shape

shows, that in almost the majority of cases during the winter months, fuel is the chief desideratum amongst the destitute. From 50 to 100 cords of wood, purchased at a moderate rate. early in the season, and laid up for distribution during the severe weather of winter would, in very numerous instances, enable the Committee to dispense relief which is very urgently needed.

An organization which has for its object, not only the aid and relief of our fellow-countrymen, but which also aims at the promotion of friendly intercourse amongst Englishment and the cherishing of the ties and associations which unite u to the Mother Country, must commend itself to all who take an interest in works of benevolence and kindness to the destitute and the stranger, and who, while by no means forgetful of the love and allegiance they bear to Canada our Home, yet feel an honest pride in the recollection that they can claim the name and heritage which belong to the descendants of "Merrie England."
