London, Jan. 14.—The correspondence between the American and British governments in reference to the Sackville incident is being given to the public in daily instalments.

THE LATEST APPOINTMENT. The Emperor GERMANY Hopes of Peace.

By TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 14.—The Emperor's speech at the opening of the session declared that all the foreign relations of the country were friendly.

He said that during his recent visit to the Reichstag he had been struck by the conviction that Germany might confidently cherish the hope of peace.

Continued blessings of peace are shown in a gratifying manner by the Emperor's speech at the opening of the session.

An increase of 200 million marks in the revenue has been secured, and the Emperor has declared that the government will further reduce taxation.

It is stated that the Emperor's speech was a masterpiece of diplomacy, and that it has done much to allay the fears of the people.

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PORTLAND SCANDAL. A Report to the Police and Civil Courts to be Presented Tomorrow.

Winnipeg, Jan. 9.—Some interesting historical and statistical information for 1888 have been prepared by Mr. C. J. Byrnes, land commissioner of the Hudson Bay Company.

The quantity of land taken up for actual settlement in Manitoba during the year was very considerable, and in excess of any year since 1882.

The Government have had taken up for homesteads at pre-emption and sales 30,000 acres, almost the whole of which was gone into actual settlement.

The different land companies have sold about 180,000 acres, almost the whole of which has been taken up by actual settlers.

This makes a total of 210,000 acres. In addition to this, the companies, who have become possessed of considerable quantities of land through foreclosure of mortgages, have disposed of a considerable quantity of land through foreclosure.

Between land companies and private individuals who have been selling, land not far short of 100,000 acres has been disposed of. This makes a total of 310,000 acres.

There is every reason to believe that the estimate is within rather than beyond the mark. The great bulk of these lands has been taken up in quarter sections, and very much larger lots than 100 acres of land. This means that not far short of 100 farmers, in addition to those who were previously in the country, have settled upon land during the past year.

It is estimated that the population of the province has increased during the past year by 10,000 people. Government Agent McCall has estimated that there are 100,000 immigrants in the country last year.

A good many of these immigrants have been taken up in various ways and have not yet taken up land, and a considerable number of them will do so in the near future.

This is a satisfactory showing, and it is believed that the year will close with a population of 1,000,000 people.
