SEEKING A RARE FISH. Golden Trout Found in Wildest Part of Sierras-Inhabits Volcanic Creek.

Prof. B. W. Everman, of the United states Fish Commission, has just re-urned from California, where he we me two months ago at the request of Pres. Roosevelt, to locate a new spe-cies of game fish. In the early spring of the present year Pres. Roosevelt received a letter from Stewart Edward White, authon of "The Blazed Trail," telling of a wondrous golden trout that inhabited he cold waters of an isolated stream in the wildest part of the high Sierras. Mr. White wrote to the president to say that the remarkable fish ought to be cultivated by the United States Fish Commission, and that if it could be propagated, and introduced into the waters of the east it would make valuable addition to the finny tribes

of this region. President Roosevelt is: a thorough portsman, and Mr. White's letter served to rouse his enthusiasm and interest in the golden trout of the Sierras. He determined to learn more about the fish and accordingly sent for Professor Everman. He explained to him what he had heard from Mr. White and asked that an expedition be despatched to study the trout with a view to transplanting it in eastern streams. A party was accordingly or-ganized and about ten weeks ago set out for the west. On arriving in Callfornia it was learned that the golden trout was located in one of the streams

in the vicinity of Mt. Whitney. There are no railroads within reaching distance of the place, and the exing distance of the place, and the ex-pedition had to approach the moun-tain by use of pack horses. As much ground would be covered in the day-time as possible, and then camp would be made for the night. In this fash-ion the scientists journeyed ahead for more than a week, getting higher and higher into the mountain range. After 0. foot the quarry was struck. In a remarkable little stream the golden trout was located. It inhas bits Volcano Creek, which itself has an unusual interest. In recent geolog times there were three volcances is that territory, and the present creeks is thought to have been in existence prior to the volcanic period. While the volcances were active the lava from one flowed across the creek, form-ing three falls of considerable height the lower half of the stream. These obstructions have served eves since as effectual barriers against fish since as effectual barriers against fish coming up from Kern river, into which Volcano Creek flows some distance be-low. The lava formation was such as to make prisoners of the golden trout in the upper half of the stream. In this interesting creek Prof. Ever-man and his associates found the gol-den trout. Prof. Everman has studied the fibes of nearly every water of the den trout. Prof. Everman has studied the fishes of nearly every water of the world, and only recently concluded a report on the fishes of Porto Rico, which are of every hue of the rain-bow. But the product of the icy stream in the Sierras eclipsed them all in rich coloring, gameness and beauty, of form. The party spent five days on the banks of Volcano Creek, angling for the handsome trout. They took the hook freely and some rare sport was had. was had. It was impracticable to bring away any live golden trout, owing to the dif-ficulties of travel and transportation.
