





LONDON, June 2. — The Daily Mail published the New York Times interview with Andrew Carnegie proposing an International conference with the object of checking the increase of arnaments. Editorially it says: "The doctrine Mr. Carnegie preaches is attractive, and we would wish to be the last to discourage any efforts to translate it into action, but the obstacles to the realization of his dream increase rather than diminish as they are approached. We see in monstrous growth suspicion and in naval activity disastrous results. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's offer to negotiate with Germany for the limitation of naval construction at the peace conference at The Hague set the seal to the refusal of Germany. These failures were more than discouraging; they were dangerous, inasmuch as they brought in train new suspicions

IS FREER DIVORCE

EVIL OR NECESSITY ?

Six American Educators Declare Difficult Marriage, But for EasySeparation

CHICAGO, June 1. — Is free divorce an evil? No, a necessity. At least that is the conclusion reached by six educators in the current Journal of Sociology. All the writers are scathing in the denunciation of the lax manner of entering wedlock, and declare that legal quibbles make matters doubly bad by imposing restriction on those who have been mismated.

Prof. E. A. Ross, the sociologist of the University of Wisconsin, lays down seven propositions which he advocates as the surest preventives of the divorce evil. These are:

"1. Instruction of girls in domestic science, housekeepirg, etc.
"2. Systematic instruction of the youth of both sexes in the ethics and ideals of the marriage relation.

"3. Safeguards in custom, perhaps in law, against the marriage of pure women to tainted men.

"4. Marriage only at place of residence of one of the parties.
"5. Repudiation of the 'common law marriage.'
"6. A filling of declaration of inten-

tion to marry not less than (say) six weeks before the issuance or a marriage license. (Statistics show that the success of a marriage is in direct relation to the length of time the parties have been acquainted before marriage.)

"7. Where the volume of business warrants it, the creation of special divorce tribunals, on which women shall sit as well as men."
