

The various in dustrial and equipment issues, which recently became the centre of unrestrained trading, were again prominent, with further gains of three to seven points, although American Locomotive and New York Air Brake closed with net losses.

United States Steel was the foremost feature, dealings exceeding 165,000 shares, or almost 25 per cent of the two hours business. It advanced to sixty, its best price of the current rise, and about ten points above its quotation of the latter part of last January, when adverse trade conditions and poor earnings impelled the directors to suspend the dividend.

Trading in Steel was on a scale like that which made the stock conspicuous in by gone years. Lots of one thousand, two thousand, three thousand and an even four thousand shares were absorbed with a freedom begotten of confidence or extreme bear ed on call for the week.







Scrub floors, hallways and all unvarnished woodwork thoroughly. Use plenty of soap and hot water.


Clean all windows and keep them open to fresh air and sunlight.

Ventilate damp cellars.

Report all neighborhood nuisance, such as stagnant pools and ill-smelling refuse piles, to the health department.

Ask your landlord to repair all leaky roofs and plumbing, and not to repair dirty, broken walls and ceilings and paint up where necessary. If there is a vacant lot near your house, see that it is cleaned of all decaying matter and rubbish. The cleanings can be placed in barrels beside the vacant lots and will be removed by the city teams.

And remember that cheerful compliance with these suggestions and with efforts of the Boston clean-up committee, will help to make Boston a more healthy and pleasing city in which to live."
