London, May 10.—A British official statement, issued tonight, quotes the German official claim that a British destroyer was badly damaged in a brief artillery engagement between five British destroyers and two German torpedo boats on May 8. The British admiralty denies the German claim. It says that a few shots were exchanged between the torpedo cratt and that the Germans then returned to their harbor.
