For the Constitution and Government of the

## Diocesan Church Society of Nova-Scotia.

I. His Excellency THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF NOVA-SCOTIA for the time being, and THE SOCIETIES FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, and FOR PROMOTING CHRISTIAN KNOWLEDGE, shall be respectfully requested to be the Patrons of this Society.

II. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, with a control over all their proceedings. His approval shall be necessary for the completion of all important acts of the Society, and especially for the revocation or alteration of any of the standing rules, and for making any addition to them.

III. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of Nova-Scotia shall be the first; a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary when necessary, and a Treasurer.

IV. There shall be a Standing Committee, consisting of the Officers, all the Clergy, and as many Laymen as it shall be thought convenient to choose at the Annual Meeting of the Society. The Lay Members shall continue in the Committee for a year, or until other Lay Members be chosen in their place; and any or all of them may be re-elected. Seven of the Committee shall be a quorum, provided four of them be Laymen.

V. The Society shall be open to all the Members of the Church, all of whom shall be invited to unite with it. Ten pounds paid at any one time shall qualify a person to be a Member during his life, and the payment in advance of any sum, however small, shall qualify a person to be a Member for a year.

VI. The Members of the Church in every part of the Province shall be invited to co-operate with the Diocesan Society, by joining Committees of it which shall be formed, under the direction of their respective Clergymen, either in each mission or parish, or in more than one mission or parish united, as shall be deemed most convenient, and in strict accordance with the design and rules of the Diocesan Society; and it is recommended to the Committees to forward their funds, as they may be collected, to the General Committee, who will faithfully apply them to the general objects of the Society; but when the Local Committees desire it, they shall receive books at cost and charges to the amount of one fourth of their remittances.

VII. There shall be one General Meeting of the whole Society, including any Members of the Local Committees who can conveniently attend, on such day and at such place as the President may name, of which due notice will be given, with an invitation to every Committee to send at least one Clergyman and two Laymen to represent such Committee, and with a recommendation that each Committee shall meet at some convenient time immediately before the General Meeting of the Society, that any necessary suggestions may be offered to the representatives of the Committees for their guidance at the General Meeting. And a Special General Meeting may be called at any time and in any place, when the President, or, in his absense, two or more Vice-Presidents, shall consider it desirable to appoint such Special General Meeting.

VIII. The objects to which the attention of the Society shall be directed shall be, generally, those which have engaged the two great Church Societies in England for the Propagation of the Gospel, and for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

IX. The following objects shall more particularly engage the attention of the Society, as soon as their means may enable them to afford such attention:

- 1. Supplies of Books and Tracts from the stores of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other, except in cases where other Books or Tracts, in strict conformity with the principles of the Established Church, and particularly adapted to local circumstances, shall first be carefully examined and approved by a Committee of revision, to be appointed by the General Committee, the approval of which General Committee shall be necessary in the next place, after which the books must likewise receive the written approbation of the Bishop.
- 2. Missionary visits to neglected and destitute places, under the direction of the Bishop.
- 3. Uphalding by all possible and proper means, the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.

 Assistance to deserving young men, desirous of being qualified for the Ministry of the Church, but requiring aid in pursuing their studies at the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.

5. Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.

6. Encouragement to the instruction and training of respectable Teachers for Sunday and Daily Schools.

7. Assistance to the erection or enlargement of Churches and Chapels belonging to the Established Religion, in peculiar or extreme cases.

To these objects, generally, the general contributions will be applied; while contributors who desire it may have their individual contributions scrupulously confined to any one or more of these objects. And as some Members of the Church, who are not unmindful of the great spiritual wants in their own neighbourhood, still feel constrained, in pious gratitude for the blessings they enjoy, to allot something, however small, from the means with which a gracious Providence has blessed them, towards the spread of the glorious Gospel among the nations which still sit in darkness:-

X. This Society will gladly receive and forward to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, whatever sums may be given for the conversion and instruction of the Heathen, to which object such sums will be strictly confined by the East India Committee of that Society.

XI. Books and Tracts will generally be on sale at cost and charges; and whenever in particular cases a deviation from this rule is desired, it must be considered by the Standing Committee, and only permitted when recommended by them and approved by the President, or, in his absence, by two or more of the Vice Presidents.

The Members of the Society, resident in the City, rejoice NOVA-SCOTIA. The alembers of the Society, resident in the City, resident in being permitted to greet their friends and fellow-labourers from the different districts of the Country, and trust to hearing from their mouths the gladdening testimony, that the blessing of the Lord has prospered them in the work, in which they are engaged for His glory and the advancement of his Church upon Earth.

It is a matter of regret to the Members of this Society, resident in Town, that they are not permitted to welcome a larger number of Clerical and Lay Delegates at this Anniversary. Yet it is a matter of rejoicing, that there now remains scarcely an exception to the existence of Local Committees throughout the Province; and that the whole body of the Church in this Diocese may now be regarded as engaged in the same work, and doing what they can to promote, by united operation, the great cause which is committed to the Church's care.

From GRANVILLE, the Rev. J. M. Campbell has sent forward the sum of £7 7s. 10d.

The LIVERPOOL Committee, whose contributions last year were diminished by local claims, has resumed its place among our largest contribu-tors; and has remitted the sum of £18 10s of which 10s are to be applied

in aid of the Society for Promoting Christianity among the Jews.

LUNENBURG maintains its position as one of the largest and most regular contributors to our Society's funds, and has remitted the sum of £22.

The aggregate of these contributions and subscriptions makes up the income of the Society, for the year now closed, to the amount of £431 18s. 14d.

#### EXPENDITURE.

The Committee have been happy to be enabled to contribute from the funds thus placed at their disposal, to the furtherance of the usual purposes of usefulness in the Church of Christ.

LAY READERS. -In accordance with the Resolution of the Committee of March 1st, 1844, published in the last Annual Report, the gratuities which had been previously voted to Lay Readers, were continued during the present year. By the terms of that Resolution they were to have ceased with the present Anniversary; but as that decision did not seem quite satisfactory to some members of the Committee, the whole question has been reserved for the opinion and experience of the Clergy of the Province, when they shall be next assembled in visitation. The usual grants to Lay Readers have been continued until such decision shall have been made, as will lead either to the continuance or cessation of that portion of the

The Rev. Mr. Cochran, of Lunenburg, and the Rev. R. Jamison, of the Eastern Shore, have testified in the warmest terms to the value of the services of the Lay Readers respectively at New Germany, and Tancook, and at the three Harbors on the shore.

Books .- The Local Committees have, generally, received back the fourth part of their contributions in books during the past year, drawing upon the Depository of the Society for this purpose to the amount of £66 5s. 3d.

It may be well again to remind the Members of the Society that the Grants which have been made to the Rectors of St. Paul's and St. George's parishes, in Haliax, are made in consequence of their claim having been waved so far a regarded one fourth of the remittances of their respective parishes. Without such grants those Rev. Gentlemen had no means of giving a Bible or Prayer Book to a poor person, except from their own private funds.

In returning the fourth part of remittances, in making up such of the above grants as have been called for, and in daily sales at the Depository of the Scciety, there have been distributed during the past year, 93 Bibles, 182 New Testaments, 467 Prayer Books, 4268 Tracts, and 149 other

The Committee have deemed the constant attendance of the Depositary, or one of his family, for the sale of books, a matter of so much importance, that they have continued his salary at the rate of £25 per annum.

CHURCHES .- The Committee have always readily responded to the calls of Reverend Gentlemen throughout the Province, for aid in the erection

of new Churches in their respective missions.

During the past year, the applications in this behalf have not been as numerous as at some former periods. Grants have been made, however, on their several applications,

STUDENTS AT WINDSOR.—The grants which have been made during the last two years to two young men, studying for Holy Orders at King College, Windsor, have been renewed for the current year. These grants will involve an expenditure of £45; which it is our hope and prayer may be as seed cast upon the waters, which shall be found after many days in a rich harvest of souls gathered, through the instrumentality of those thus training for the ministry, into the garner of the Lord.

Miscellaneous.—During the past year, the sum of £5.8s. 1½d. has been paid for defraying expences incurred in the visits of a Deputytion from the Society, which had been sent forth by the direction of the Right Rev. the President during the preceding year.

The disbursements then, for the past year, appear to have amounted to

the sum of £307 8s. 41d.

In casting our view somewhat beyond the limits of our own Society's operations, your Committee are rejoiced at perceiving the extensive support, and the harmonious operation of the Sister Church Societies of Montreal and Toronto, both of which have been incorporated by an Act of the Canadian Legislature. The expression of friendly regard and sympathy, which was communicated from this Society to them after our last Annual Meeting, has been most warmly responded. At the Anniversaries of those Societies, votes of thanks were unanimously passed for the expression of affectionate interest which had been tendered to them by us. We may humbly trust, that, by the blessing of our Gracious Head, these Societies in the different Colonial Dioceses will grow up into important instruments of good to the Colonial Church, and be enabled in some measure to supply that service, which the extending operations of the Venerable Church Societies in England may compel them gradually to withhold from these long favored portions of their Missionary field.

## APPENDIX II.

For the information of Local Committees applying to the Depository of this Society for Books and Tracts, it is thought desirable to publish the following extract from the minutes of the General Committee, under date of May 7, 1841.

"The Chairman of the Sub-Committee, to whom the concerns of the Depository were entrusted, reported several resolutions which had been agreed to by the Sub-Committe, and are as follows:-

"I. Resolved,-That whereas the Diocesan Church Society can receive no books from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge except to the amount of the sum remitted with the order, no books can be supplied from the Depository of the Diocesan Church Society, unless the orders be accompanied with a remittance to the full amount.

"II. That all outstanding debts due the Depository be immediately called for, and, until they be satisfactorily arranged, no further supply of

books shall be issued to those who are in arrears.

"III. That Mr. Maxwell be requested to forward their accounts without delay to the several persons indebted to the Depository, together with a copy of these resolutions.

"Whereupon it was resolved-

"That whereas the importation of books to the Depository must, by the present arrangement of the Book Fund, depend entirely upon the returns made for books supplied from the Depository, the Committee feel bound to approve of and adopt the resolutions of the Sub-Committee."

From Rev. Ernest Hawkins, Secretary of the Society for Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, dated, 79, Pall Mall, April 3, 1844.

"I owe you an apology for not writing to acknowledge the contribution of the Church Society of Nova Scotia, by the last mail. It will be a pleasing mark of sympathy on the part of the Members of the Church in the West, to those who are labouring to propagate the Gospel in Heathen

From Rev. R. J. Uniacke, dated, Newport, August 13, 1844.

"I feel some encouragement in making my present application, because it is to solicit aid towards an object, which I know the Committee are particularly desirous of promoting. Applications for assistance towards the building and enlargement of Churches have always been hitherto favourably received by this Committee, and I trust that my present call upon the liberality of the Society will also be successful.

The building, which I am seeking aid to complete, was not originally intended for a Church; it was previously erected for a dissenting place of worship, and has lately been offered to us under circumstances which ought not to lessen the readiness of the Committee to contribute their aid. It is situated in the settlement of Walton, about 17 miles from the Newport Church. The population of this place consists of upwards of 500 souls, within two miles of the building which we propose converting into a Church. About three years ago this settlement was much neglected, seldom receiving visits from ministers of any denomination; but since that time I was enabled, through the aid of this Society, to employ the services of Mr. Wilson, a respectable schoolmaster, who officiated there as Lay Reader once a fortnight to a congregation averaging about a hundred. His services, I have no doubt, have been instrumental in doing much good, and may perhaps have contributed to bring about a disposition amongst the inhabitants, which has opened the way for the regular ministrations of the Church. Many of the inhabitants of that settlement have lately expressed a strong wish to enjoy the benefit of more frequent services from a Clergy-man, than they have hitherto received, and have subscribed as much as

£15 towards his salary, on the condition of having service performed in their settlement every fourth Sunday in the year. In addition to this the proprietor of the Meeting House, who is one of the leading inhabitants of the place, has offered at once to make it the property of the Church, by a deed to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, together with an acre of ground for a burial place. I have made several visits to this place under this arrangement, and have reason to rejoice in the prospect which is now opened of seeing the services of the Church regularly established in a settlement which hitherto has stood so much in need of them.

It is for aid to complete this building that I now apply to the funds of this Society. The people are not able to do much themselves, although

### From Rev. W. Bullock, dated, Digby, Ft. St. Matthew, 1844.

"I now forward the required certificate from the building Committee of the South Range Church, and hope it will be satisfactory—and I again repeat the grateful feeling I entertain to the General Committee for their care and liberality to this destitute part of my Parish. I have no doubt that the effect produced upon the country by the building of these additional Churches will be immediate and conspicuous; and although they will tax the powers of the Clergyman to a much greater degree than ever, they will not disappoint him of his hope. The demand for Church room and Church services is by no means diminished—it is increased by this fresh supply, and I trust the manifest good already effected by the Church Society will so influence the minds of Churchmen throughout the Province, that her future operations may not be cramped for want of means. At all events I shall proceed upon the word "the Lord will provide." In every place to which I can stretch out my labours, I encourage the building of Churches, and I am quite sure that God will help us to finish and fill them."

### From Rev. W. Y. Porter, dated, Sydney, 12th Novr. 1844.

"Mr. Ingles has sat down to write to you on the subject of an application, made some time ago by him, to the Diocesan Church Society, for aid in behalf of a Church now in progress at Cow Bay. I cannot permit his letter to go without adding a few lines also.

I have just returned from a very pleasant and encouraging visit to that settlement, where I am always gratified by meeting a congregation of, I believe, real Churchmen and Christians, and, concientiously, I do not know of any place which deserves or needs more help in the, to them, arduous undertaking.

The building is small, and built of wood, very well and substantially done, and if finished as begun it will have a very neat and churchlike appearance, and what is far better, it will be I trust (under God) a means of gathering and preserving a little flock, and of leading them onward to the Kingdom of Heaven. The people of our communion are few, and only poor fishermen, struggling against the depression of the times, but their efforts compared with their means have been really great, and such as well deserve every encouragement. \* \* \* Our Church Society's Committee during the last few years has been enabled to remit a larger sum, if I mistake

not, than any other country mission, Dartmouth excepted. Of the sum thus annually remitted, Cow Bay has contributed it's full proportion, and will I am peruaded continue to vie with more favoured places in offering of it's substance to God. As, therefore, the Society I believe has never yet refused aid to any Church which has been applied for, so I feel assured that it will not be withheld from this deserving and indigent people."

From Rev. Edwin Gilpin, dated, Annapolis, Jany. 24, 1845.

"Enclosed are the minutes of the last Meeting of our D. C. Society, held on the 1st Novr. 1844, with a list of the Subscribers; I trust our interest on the whole has increased. The meeting was better attended, and the contributions greater than on the preceding year,"

From Rev. W. M. Godfrey, dated, Clements, Jany. 1845.

"I am happy to say there is an increase of members and of subscriptions for the coming year, and that many hitherto careless about others' welfare, have begun to feel that it is their duty to contribute to so good and useful a Society. The number enrolled is 183—and amount of subscriptions nearly £10. \* \* The one fourth of the last remittance of £4, I wish you to return immediately by Coach, by remitting to me that amount in Bibles, of which we have at present great need; the remainder I wish appropriated, if within the power of the Society, to forming a fund for the Clergy's Widows; and if this be not one of the objects of the Society, then let the remittance be appropriated to the general purposes. It would be a good suggestion that at the next General Meeting steps should be taken to Incorporate the Society, for the sooner we give it stability, the sooner will it develope the means and interest of the people at large."

From S. L. Morse, Esq. Secy. Bridgetown Local Committee, dated, Bridgetown, 27th Jany. 1845.

"I have the pleasure to inform you that the District Branch of the Diocesan Church Society of Nova Scotia has been re-organised in this Parish, and that S. S. Thorne, Esq. M. P. P. for the Township of Granville, our Treasurer, is the bearer of our first little gatherings to be "cast into the treasury" for the support of the sacred objects of the Society. The sum is not large, but, the circumstances of our Parish taken into consideration, it appears to us respectable, and a great many such small sums would do much good."

From Rev. Dr. Shreve, dated, Chester, Feby. 10, 1845.

"I have now to acknowledge with many thanks the receipt of £7 10s, granted last year in aid of some necessary repairs to the Church at Sherbrooke. I am happy to say that the roof has been shingled and painted—the members of the Church performing the work and supplying the greater part of the shingles. Arrangements have also been made, to have the ground upon which the Building stands, enclosed by a neat fence; hitter it has been open and exposed. Thus the small grant from your Committee has been productive of much good. Without it, the people would not have been able to accomplish what has been done, indeed could not have undertaken it.

tion."

From Rev. L. M. W. Hill, dated, Digby, Feby. 12, 1845.

"The Society will be pleased to hear, that of the four Churches to which they have lent their liberal assistance, two have been consecrated, and that the other two are now ready for that solemnity. It will be gratifying to learn that the services are constantly performed in these Churches, and are well attended by respectable congregations. We have commenced a fifth Church at Rossway, a thickly settled and destitute place, about nine miles from Digby, and which we hope with the assistance of the Society to finish before the end of the year."

From Rev. J. M. Campbell, dated, Granville, Feby. 12, 1845.

"Circumstances I need not now explain, have hindered me from extending the field of the Society's Branch here to the lower part of Granville; but should I be spared until another return of this season, I trust I shall be enabled to forward you a larger sum than I now have it in my power to do."

From Rev. C. J. Shreve, dated, Guysboro', 8th Feby. 1845.

" For the first time since the formation of our Local Committee, we are unable to make any remittance to the general fund of the Diocesan Church Society. I regret this much, because I am unwilling that, having begun a good work, there should be a seeming abatement of our zeal. call made upon my parishioners to provide a Parsonage, to which they very cheerfully responded, has, in a measure, drained their resources. can bear testimony to some, that they have contributed to the utmost of their ability—yea, and beyond their means, for the furtherance of a work

I take this opportunity, in behalf of my parishioners, most sincerely to so desirable. thank the General Committee for the grant of £20 made for the Church at Manchester. Without the assistance which was so generously afforded us, it would have been in vain for the members of the Church to have attempted a work, the accomplishment of which they now look forward to with

pleasure."

From Rev. J. C. Cochran, dated, Lunenburg, 8th Feby. 1845.

"I am happy to say that a lively interest continues to be felt in this Parish generally in behalf of the Society, although the pressure of the times may prevent our contributions from being as large as in former

Our list of members has been considerably increased since the meeting. but as the District of Mahone Bay has been assigned to the more special care of the Rev. Mr. Filleul, the members of our Committee in that quarter will henceforth be attached to the Mahone Bay Committee under his superintendence.

Mr. Turner, Schoolmaster and Lay Reader on Tancook Island, in this Parish, has continued during the past year to discharge his duties with exemplary diligence, and as I hope with profit to many souls, who, from their insular position, would otherwise have been destitute, for the greater part of the time, of the means of grace. His Sunday School consists of 45 scholars. Mr. Jost has also been doing good service in other parts of the Parish, and has enabled numbers to enjoy the comforts of public worship on the Lord's Day, who must otherwise have been solitary as the wilderness in which they dwell. He has gone once a month to New Germany, 20 miles from his residence, besides frequent visits to other settle-

The Church at New Germany, to which the Church Society granted the sum of £25, has been finished, and was consecrated by the Bishop during the last summer. I had the satisfaction of administering the Lord's Supper in it to 22 communicants-a number which I expect on the next occasion to see considerably increased.

This humble but sacred edifice, I trust, will prove a blessing to the rapidly increasing population among whom it is reared. Their delight is great in the possession of it, and whenever it is open for Divine service, it is well filled not only by our own people, but also by other denominations, who before were strangers to our service."

From Rev. P. J. Filleul, dated, Mahone Bay, Feby. 13, 1845.

"Owing to disappointment on a previous occasion, we were compelled to postpone our Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society to Sunday the 9th inst. A considerable attendance met me, when I preached in behalf of the Society-explained the reasons why it had been establishedthe feelings of gratitude which were due to those magnificent Institutions in the mother country, that had for so long a period fostered the Infant Church in these Colonies. I then urged the claims of the Diocesan Church Society upon every individual member of the Church-that it was their duty to supply the aid which the Parent Society could no longer extend to them ," by doing good, as they had opportunity, unto all men, especially unto them who were of the household of faith.

The members of the Church at New Germany are desirous of testifying their gratitude to the Society, from which they have derived important aid in completing their little Church, by contributing, in many instances out of their penury, £1 15s. towards its objects."

From Rev. T. H. White, dated, Shelburne, Feby, 6, 1845.

"I send you an order for £10 10s, being the sum raised in my mission in aid of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society. I would with all my heart that it was ten fold more. But when I consider how difficult it is to make people understand the nature of such collections, and their duty and privilege in contributing to the spiritual wants of others, I am not surprised, though grieved, to find that our collection has not amounted to a larger sum; God grant that for the time to come "we may both perceive and know what things we ought to do, and also have grace faithfully to fulfill the same." You see that we, as most other parishes, have made no specific appropriation of our aid. How would it answer if the General Committee were to set apart a portion, say a tenth, of the income of the Society, for Foreign Missions? I think such an application of their funds would be well received, and exercise a beneficial influence upon our peo-

Extract from the Report, presented to the St. George's (Sydney, C. B.) Local Committee, at their meeting on Ash Wednesday, 1845.

"A restrospect of the humble efforts of this Committee shews that in the last five years they have remitted to the Society in Halifax the sum of £93 currency, in aid of its plans. Of this sum, one quarter, or about £23 currency, has been returned in Bibles, Testaments, Prayer Books, and Tracts of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, which have been received in various ways, by the Clergy of this Mission, acting under the directions of this Committee. It is hoped the truths thus widely spread, will redound to the good of the community at large, and bring a blessing on those whose pious contributions have enabled the good seed to be thus widely sown throughout the length and breadth of the land. In the same period, the Diocesan Society has granted the sum of £20 currency towards the erection respectively of Churches at Sydney Mines, Cow Bay, and Louisburg; the whole of this grant has been drawn at the Mines, and one half at Cow Bay; it is expected the rest will be called for during the present year. In furtherance of each of these Churches, the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge has granted the sum of £25 sterling; except at Sydney Mines where the grant was £50 sterling; they have also within the same period granted the sum of £10 sterling towards completing St. John's Chapel at the North West Arm. These and similar acts of the Society in various ways throughout the Diocese, for promoting God's glory, and the spread of true religion, shew how the divine blessing has been made to rest upon the gathering together of contributions, individually of small amount. For all this we would earnestly thank God, and may we all take courage therefrom, and go onward with fresh energy, knowing that in due season we shall reap if we faint not.

The Churches at Cow Bay and Louisburg, which have been mentioned in former reports, are proceeding, especially the former, surely though slowly to completion. No delays or difficulties seem in the way beyond what were expected; we trust on our next anniversary to report the former as finished, and the latter as considerably advanced.
