**SCHOOL MEETINGS IN DISTRICTS Nos. 8 and 9, Chatham, being the upper and lower portions of the town, were held on Tuesday last. The meeting in the upper district elected Mr. Wm. Lawler, chairman, and Mr. D. G. Smith, secretary. Messrs. Wm. T. Connors, Wm. Lawler, and L. J. Tweedie were appointed trustees. Mr. F. J. Leeson was elected auditor. The Trustees estimated that school accommodation would have to be made for 220 children. In their report they made the following estimate, which we take from the *Advocate*:**

This left \$900 to be provided for by the district, and the meeting ordered the amount to be assessed.

The meeting in the other district was presided over by Mr. T. F. Gillespie—Messrs. P. Coleman, John Ferguson, and Dr. J. B. Benson were elected Trustees. The amount ordered to be assessed was \$900.

But that aside, it is presumable he knew that his was trash, and he only inserted it because it suited his purpose.

Instead of turning round and using scolding abuse, he should accept the situation, and shoulder to shoulder help along the welfare of his fellow townsmen.

Dear Sir,—Before this reaches you, you will have heard how the different polling districts have recorded their votes in the County of Gloucester, but I will endeavor to state as plain as I can how Mr. Ryan got so large a majority in the Clifton polling district.

**It was also said that Mr. Ryan was a good, honest, easy-going man,** like his father, and there was no doubt that Mr. Burns could lead him on to do, what in his view, was best for the country.

**He was also a comical fellow,** and the French in Gloucester County, for a political meeting held at Clifton, on the 22nd January, he admitted that the French people had a right to one member if they could get a "respectable" Frenchman to represent them. **General Intelligence.**

**A Terrible Murder at Carleton, St. John.**  
On Thursday afternoon the community was shocked to hear of a brutal and deliberate murder committed in Carleton, in this city, by a man named Thomas O'Neill. The story of the crime is easily told. O'Neill, a man nearly 60 years of age, although looking much younger, had behaved so badly to his wife—daughter of John and Bridget Fothergill, an aged couple

living in Carleton—that she was forced to leave him some months ago. She occupied room in a house near Blue Rock, Carleton, and supported herself and one child she had born to O'Neill, by sewing, &c. O'Neill, who was ever a wandering, vagabond sort of character, much addicted to fishing, shooting, &c., was frequently away for months at a time, but lately he had come to Carleton, and sought to resume his old course of living on the earnings of his wife. She refused to have him in the room at the time she entered. As O'Neill entered the room he let a big oath out of him. My wife was sitting by the side of the stove mending her apron. I was sitting on a table working on a coat. O'Neill ran to where the deceased was sitting and stabbed her in the neck. My wife cried out. I looked around and said "O'Neill, for God's sake, what are you doing?" I jumped off my table to rescue her, when he stabbed me. I got three stabs. The first on the left arm, the second on the left side, and the third on the right arm. O'Neill then left my room at once. My wife ran out on the sidewalk while O'Neill was stabbing me. She fell dead on the sidewalk. I saw her fall. She lived about a minute from the time she was stabbed. I went for a policeman. A policeman brought O'Neill back to my house after he committed the act. Dr. White was dressing my wounds when he was brought back. The knife appeared to me like a dagger. It had a cross handle, was 7 or 8 inches long. The point was tapered.

**Dr. John White, who assisted by Dr. Earle, Jr., made the post mortem examination,** was examined, and testified as follows:—I made a post mortem examination of the deceased this morning. There was a slight wound on the chin, and a wound in the lower part of the neck in front. It was about two inches and a half in length, and penetrated to a depth of three inches or more, dividing the left common carotid artery and brachiocephalic vein, also wounding the apex of the left lung. The wound was mortal.—She could not have lived easily in the one or two minutes at most. The wound would produce almost instant death. It must produce death. That wound was the cause of her death. John Thomas Beamish, an intelligent-looking little boy, now arrived, and being interrogated as to his knowledge of the obnoxious man, gave satisfactory answers. He was sworn and testified as follows:—I am in my ninth year. Yesterday afternoon the prisoner came into our shop. I never saw him before in my life. My father was out. Prisoner came in. I asked him what he wanted, and he asked me to get my father was in. I told him he was not. He then said he wanted a knife to kill a pig. I told him I would not lend him a knife to kill a pig. He then said he would beat me for lending a knife to any person. He said nothing more, but took up a knife, put it in the bread pocket and disappeared. I saw him. He first felt my father's knife at the point of the blade, but put it down and took up mine, which was smaller at the point than his. He then took my father's knife, and as wide as the point as my two fingers. It was not very sharp. I am sure the prisoner is the man who took the knife.

**LONDON, Feb. 8.—Sir Henry Peck,** at the annual meeting of the Sutton Conservative Association, last night, stated that Her Majesty's Highness, the Princess Beatrice, had been engaged to Queen Victoria. Sir Henry Peck, Prince Louis of Battenburg, now in India with the Prince of Wales, and that Parliament, and the country would be shocked to grant her a dowry.

**A special telegram to the Pall Mall Gazette from Berlin contains the following details of the liberation of the Cardinal Liebovitch:—The small town of Ostrow, 7 miles southeast of Posen, where Cardinal Liebovitch was imprisoned, is filled with sympathizers gathered to testify their joy at his liberation to-day. Among those present were the Emperor's personal physician, including the Emperor's physicians, the Princes Edmond and Ferdinand of Radzivil. There will be a special thanksgiving service at the town which will be illuminated.**

**The Posen Governor's statement** that Cardinal Liebovitch will be interned at the frontier of Saxony, is believed. If it proves correct, an appeal will be made to the Emperor's clemency to the hands, and will also be taken, on the position of any further restraint upon the Cardinal, without further judgment, would be unadvisable.

**LONDON, Feb. 6.—The war in Spain** continues to show no signs of abating. The Carlists have destroyed one of their cartridges, and many have fled into France. Don Carlos among the number.

**Mr. Dureau, replying to a deputation of shipowners** promised that the Government would give its early and unbroken consideration to the Shipping Bill.

**Nearly one hundred persons** were poisoned at Eagle, near Bolton, by drinking impure milk. Some of the cases are serious.

**The Pall Mall Gazette's Berlin** dispatch contains the following: Prince Bismarck has sufficiently recovered to drive in the Emperor's carriage. His parliamentary speeches will now be resumed.
