Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or age male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made, at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead, \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside on each of six years or homestead entry (no time required to farm) and cultivate five (5) acres.

Who has exhausted the land cannot obtain a pre-emption. Entry must reside on the land for a year and a half.



Tenders for Station Building, Section and Tool House, between Lake Superior Junction and Winnipeg.

Sealed Tenders addressed to the undersigned, marked on the envelope "Tender for Station, etc.", will be received at the office of the Commissioners of the Transcontinental Railway at Ottawa, until 12 o'clock on the 27th day of April, 1909, for the construction and erection complete, in accordance with the plans and specifications of the Commissioners, of station buildings, section and tool house, etc., as follows, viz:—

Section No. 1—From Lake Superior Junction to Mile 1623 (near Winnipeg River), 4 No. 2 Station Buildings, 2 No. 3 Station Buildings, 3 Section Houses.

Section No. 2—From Mile 1623 to Mile 1728 (N. E. of Renou), 1 No. 1 Station Building, 2 No. 2 Station Buildings, 3 No. 3 Station Buildings, 6 Section Houses.

Section No. 3—From Mile 1728 to St. Boniface, 2 No. 1 Station Buildings, 2 No. 2 Station Buildings, 4 No. 3 Station Buildings, 3 Section Houses.

Tool houses will be required at all section houses, and at such other points as may be designated by the Engineer.

Each tender must be for all the buildings on any one section, and separate tenders must be made for each section.

The work on each section must be completed on or before October 1st, 1909.

NOT FEASIBLE

The Tribune in its recent issue advocates a new scheme to saddle the town with endless litigation, arbitration and debt.

The latest is that the I. C. R. should come in at the rear of the town, and that the town should purchase the right of way and present it to the railway department.

Has the Tribune any idea of what such a right of way would cost? Perhaps we could suggest a simple question in mathematics which the editor of that paper could work out at leisure. If the price asked for 750 square feet of right of way is say \$2,000, what would the right of way two and a half miles long be 200 feet wide cost?

The diversion of the I. C. R. would necessitate the removal of the depot here to a location at or near the later, railway station. At present the railway runs through the older section of the town and people have become accustomed to the railway. If it was changed it would detract from the residential district of the greater Campbellton, which we are even now planning. We are not building for the present, but for the future.

What is required to safeguard the lives of the citizens is one or two overhead railway crossings, so that teams could be driven under the present track. This can be quite easily done by extending Central Street to Union and we understand the delegation which is to go to Ottawa, will present this matter.

The citizens would never sanction such a change as the Tribune suggests. In Chatham the Board of Trade are using every endeavor to have the railway brought through that town.

The citizens of the lower end of Campbellton and the present depot quite far enough removed.

The plan suggested is neither feasible nor to be desired.

Ten years from now—yes, in less time—there will be such development along the line of the Transcontinental Railway, that the attacks of Tory opposition critics on this great enterprise will be strong material for some curious historian to delve into. It will make a dismal page in the political history of the country, against which development and progress along the Transcontinental will stand out in striking contrast.—Transcript.

TIMBER LICENCES TO BE MADE RENEWABLE

(Canadian Lumberman)

Frederic McBride, of British Columbia, has announced in the Legislature that the Government will bring in a measure at the next session, to make the tenure of timber licenses until the timber is removed. His announcement was made in the following words:

"I would like to make a statement of some importance and one of great interest. I refer to the question of the tenure of special timber licenses, which has been a subject of some controversy of late and the principal mission of several delegations that have waited upon the Government in the past few months in regard to the timber industry in British Columbia, and I beg to announce to the House that the Government has come to the determination that the tenure of these licenses will, at the next session of this Legislature, receive the attention of the administration in the way of some provision that will make for the perpetuity of the licenses until the timber is removed, on such terms and conditions as the Government may deem prudent in the best interests of the Province of British Columbia."

It is considered wise in our judgment to defer this matter until we shall have had the advantage of the advice of the Commission on Forestry presently to be appointed, and unless we have had the advantage of perusing the conclusions to which that commission may come. So when I make this announcement this afternoon, while the matter is to receive attention next session, it must be on such terms and conditions, as will at that time, in the opinion of the Government be wise and prudent in the interests of the province."

This announcement will be received as good news by those who have invested in British Columbia timber. It will mean that the tenure will be something which can be depended upon. There will be no necessity for lumbering hastily in order to obtain value for the price of the license. A limit holder under a permanent license will be able to take his time about the outfit. There will be no danger of fostering speculation, and the consequent delay in the cutting of timber which is ready for cutting, but it should not be difficult for the Government to devise a means for preventing this, at least to a large extent. Timber limits will be worth a great deal more under the new arrangements and the whole lumber industry will benefit by the stability which will result.

In announcing the intention to bring about this change at the next session the Government has also been wise, as it has thereby removed any doubt as to what is to be done in the future, and the effect will be almost as beneficial as if it were immediately done. The Government in the meantime will have plenty of opportunity to study the situation closely and devise the best method for obtaining the object which they have in view.

LOUIS N. FULLER TALKS OF THE POSSIBILITIES OF THE MARITIMES.

Our Natural Resources Need Development. The Maritime Exploration Propose to Achieve This End.

In an interview with Mr. Fuller, manager of the Maritime Exploration Company, The Standard secured some interesting information which will be of great interest to persons all over the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Fuller talks from a vast experience and is particularly straightforward in putting his ideas before the public.

Mr. Fuller said in connection with the development of our natural resources:—

It may be of interest to owners of property in this province, especially those who have been in the oil business, to know that the organization of a new Smelting Co. backed by Standard Oil money, has created a condition of "competing" among the oil smelting concerns, caused by narrowing the source of ore supply, compelling the oil companies to go into the open market and compete for ore, something they have never done before, as the supply previously to this condition was enough to keep them running to their full capacity.

As I have been in close touch with capitalists for the past 18 months I know this to be so. Those on the inside know that it is a fact that some

satisfactory to trust to the business sagacity of the license holder, to manage the matter to suit himself, for in doing this he would naturally cut his timber so as to get the most out of it, and not to waste it.

At present, wasteful methods exist. Some of these conditions this waste would cease. To properly conserve the forests, the Government should, while lowering the license fee, increase the royalty proportionately, while extending the term of the license. Of course the policy of high license fees and short tenure of license, meant that the license holder would get off his timber as quickly as possible.

It is now confidently expected that the Government will deal with the matter in a businesslike way, appointing a royal commission to go into the whole matter. A commission is to be appointed to regulate all questions relating to our forests, and it will be instructed to make recommendations for the regulation of lumbering operations on Crown lands.

Experts of repute from other parts of the continent will be asked to report on the commission. It is very clear that the regulations for British Columbia must be very different from those which would be satisfactory in Eastern Canada, or in the Middle States. The forest conditions are different in this province. Therefore there should be men of local knowledge and experience on this commission.



GLENER GETS THE LION'S SHARE

Was Paid \$1,854 for Printing One Report-Grimmer Introduces Amendment to Game Laws.

MANY QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

Petitions were presented by Hon. Mr. Maxwell in favor of a bill to amend the St. John's Assessment Act; by Mr. Byrne for incorporation of the Bathurst Shunting and Carling Companies; and to authorize the municipality of Gloucester to make a temporary loan of \$5,000.

Notices of inquiry were given by Mr. Lowell respecting the action of the present land department in connection with the forest fire last fall at Ladap Lake; by Hon. Q.—How much per hundred is paid for printing covers for such reports and how much for binding each report?

Ans.—Covers cost \$5 per 1000 and binding from \$25 to \$30 per 1000, excepting the agricultural report at \$50 per 1000.

Q.—Does the same basis prevail for payment of other government printing as is in force for the printing of the departmental reports? If not, upon what basis is such other printing paid?

Ans.—The same basis, as near as possible, is followed for printing in other cases.

The weather conditions, he added, were exceedingly favorable, the thermometer registering 70 degrees in the shade at Campbellton two days ago.—Telegraph.

MURDER VICTIM A QUEBEC FARMER Riddled With Buckshot in Front of Stable Door—No Clue to Assassin.

HAD NO ENEMIES.

ST. ETIENNE DE BEAUCHAMPEL, April 14—An apparently cold blooded murder was discovered here yesterday evening when the body of Donnan Pelletier was discovered lying outside the stable door with part of his head blown off, and the door splattered with buckshot. Pelletier had been dead for many hours when discovered, and it is believed the murder must have been committed early on Tuesday morning, when he had returned to his farm from a day's work in the city. He was a neighbor, Wilfred Gendron, who was supposed to be seeing one about at the place and walked over to see if anything was wrong. He found Pelletier's body lying cold and stiff beside the stable door. A further examination showed the marks of buckshot in the side of the head, and a small hole in the barn about thirty feet distant, a small hole had been freshly cut, through which it was evident the murderer had pushed the barrel of his gun. Just outside the hole was found a freshly fired shell from a shotgun.

The coroner at Val-des-Rues was notified of the crime and arrived here this evening, but so far, although he has been assisted by the provincial detectives from Montreal, the slightest clue as to the identity of the murderer has been discovered, nor any motive for the crime, as there was no evidence of robbery, and Pelletier was a very peaceful man, well liked by his neighbors, and without any known enemies.


UNKNOWN MAN KILLED BY I. C. R. TRAIN

MONCTON, April 14—The body of an unknown man was found this morning about 4:30 by the train crew of freight train No. 24, bound for Truro, between Pausan Junction and Chatham Mills. The man had evidently been struck by the early morning express. The body was badly mangled, and was in a horrible condition, the head being cut considerably, while other parts of the body showed that he had been killed instantly. The left arm was partly cut off. The name of the man is unknown, although a notebook with the name "Chas. Hayes, St. Patrick Boys' School, City," and was found in a pocket, and wherever such school is there should be information concerning the unfortunate man. The body was taken to Campbellton, and an inquest into the death will be held there tomorrow by Coroner Chapman of Dorchester, who has already been notified.


