Special Meeting  
Newcastle Town Council

Refuses to Touch the Scott Act Even to Propose Amendments That Would Make It Workable.—Delegates Appointed to Immigration Convention But None to Further Taxation Reform.—Proposal to License Outsiders Withdrawn by the Mover.

Newcastle Town Council met in special session for general business on the 22nd, Mayor Pedolin in the chair. A. G. Gorman, president, T. W. Butler, John Clark, J. G. Kethro, S. A. Russell, Charles Sargeant and B. H. Stuart.

Communications were read from the promoters of the Immigration Convention to be held in Fredericton on the 8th March. Invitations were extended to the Council to suggest additional topics for discussion at the Convention, and to send the Mayor and one alderman as delegates to the said convention.

MAYOR PEDOLIN heartily endorsed the idea of holding such a convention. If the eastern provinces had a good show they should go ahead as fast as the West.

ALD. BUTLER said that, if our own boys were encouraged to remain at home and assisted in settling upon land to the extent of as much money as is now spent on immigration, it would be better for this province. Quebec took no interest in attracting immigrants but took pains to look after her own young people, helped them to obtain farms, and gave a bonus to the heads of large families. He would like to see New Brunswick follow Quebec's example in this regard.

ALD. CLARK, seconded by Ald. Kethro, moved that the Mayor and Ald. Butler be delegates to attend the convention. ALD. KETHRO in endorsing that topic of the convention concerning the re-creation of settlements, spoke of a block of crown land between Newcastle, Chapin Island Road, and Protectionville, which should be opened up to settlement. Only a road was needed. The lumber and wood was being rapidly stripped off the land.

ALD. CLARK said that there was a prejudice in the country against both farming and the bringing in of immigrants, by people who professed to think that the country needed only new industries in the towns. But this was a mistake. Farming was the basis of industrial development. More people on the land would create a demand for more manufacturing in the towns.

The Mayor and Ald. Butler were unanimously accepted as delegates to the convention, and instructed to bring in bills for their expenses in attending.

ALD. STUART said that, as the officials of the coming convention had requested the Council to suggest additional topics for discussion thereat, it would be well to suggest to them the discussion of the much-talked-of taxation problem. This question bore directly on the colonization of new and old settlements. It would make a great difference to intending settlers to know whether they would be taxed on the land value only or have to pay additional taxes on every bit of improvement they might put upon their land. He moved.

That the Immigration Convention be asked, in considering the question of taxation of land values, exemption in whole or in part of improvements, etc.

the convention executive might not adopt the suggestion, the recommendation was certainly in order and would do no harm.

ALD. CLARK thought that this matter was foreign to the idea of the convention. The question of taxation was being looked

after by the Union of N. B. Municipalities. He would oppose the motion.

ALD. KETHRO had no use for the land tax. He thought it was revolutionary and would take all ambition out of the man on the land and out of the man who wanted to get land.

The motion was lost on the following vote:

Yes—Ald. Stuart and Butler.

May—Ald. Clark, Kethro, Russell and Sargeant.

ALD. BUTLER moved that the convention be asked to consider some energetic policy in regard to encouraging and assisting settlement of our native-born citizens.

This was seconded by Ald. Stuart, and carried without division.

ALD. STUART, in accordance with notice given at previous meeting, moved the following resolution:

That this Council appoint a committee to consider and recommend any changes in legislation necessary to enable municipalities to effectively cope with the liquor and kindred evils.

In response to questions by Ald. Clark and Butler, Ald. Stuart explained that the evils referred to in the motion as kindred to the liquor traffic were the sale and use of opium, cocaine and any other harmful substance used as a substitute for alcohol.

MAYOR PEDOLIN here remarked that the amount of opium and cocaine used was surprisingly large.

ALD. STUART urged the adoption of the resolution. He said that the Canada Temperance Act was so full of loopholes as to make its effective enforcement very difficult. It was evidently intended, while keeping quiet a section of the temperance people, to be as harmless as possible to the liquor interests. The government's allowing intoxicants to be manufactured upon payment of an excise duty or imported from foreign countries upon payment of customs duty, virtually guaranteed an opportunity of sale to those who so manufactured or imported it. The freedom of importing liquor for personal use from other parts of Canada into districts under the C. T. A., the absence of a provision compelling men arrested for drunkenness to tell from whom they got their liquor, the ease with which "first offences" follow each other instead of "second" and "third" having to follow in regular order, and the throwing of the responsibility of enforcing the act upon the local authorities instead of it being carried out by Dominion or Provincial officers were among the weak points of the C. T. A. that needed strengthening. Similar objections might be urged against the provincial license laws. It was the right and the duty of this Council, several of whose members had publicly declared that the C. T. A. could not be enforced, to seek a remedy and recommend it to the government concerned. The Council were

of the town's welfare, and they should move that they realized and were striving to live up to the responsibility they had assumed.

ALD. CLARK said he would like to see greater restriction of the liquor traffic, but he did not think the town Council should take hold of the matter in the way the resolution proposed. It was a matter for the Temperance bodies, rather than for the Council.

It would cost the town too much.

ALD. BUTLER seconded the resolution, but explained that he did so, merely to make the discussion in order. He did not believe we could ever make sober men with law or angels with whip handles. Any moral reform would never be accomplished with any show of success with the whip. When we got rid of whiskey, men would fly to cocaine, etc. Education, Christian spirit, moral disposition, desire to get rid of the liquor appetite, would be effective.

As to appointing a committee, he had some time ago made suggestions which, if applied to the C. T. A., would have made it more effective. His ideas had, through Ald. Stuart, been adopted by several temperance bodies, and sent up by them to Dominion and Provincial governments and had been laughed at by both.

These suggestions had been sufficient, and he did not see why the Council should take action, unless to endorse what the temperance societies had already recommended to both governments in the way of amending liquor laws.

ALD. CLARK said that Ald. Butler's ideas of not punishing people to make them good was somewhat out of harmony with views he had expressed on other subjects. He (Clark) would like to lay the whip on hard to the man who sells liquor. While we feel certain that the liquor traffic is an evil the question is how to get at it. There's a disposition on the part of our people not to punish liquor sellers. But for the Council to memorialize the Dominion government would be only to make a laughing stock of themselves.

ALD. BUTLER said that Ald. Clark had let eight of the fact that some things were crimes in themselves while others were only crimes by law. He presumed that in Canada today 80 per cent. of the people did not think it a crime to drink liquor, yet the law in many places made it a crime, while, on the other hand, fornication—a crime in itself and probably as frequently committed as selling liquor—is not punishable by law.

MAYOR PEDOLIN said that modern science looked upon drunkenness now as a disease.

ALD. STUART said that the adoption of the resolution and the report that would follow need entail no expense whatever upon the town. Any recommendation adopted could be forwarded to the proper authorities by mail. It was the duty of the Council to take all possible means to prevent the citizens being poisoned by alcohol or any other harmful drugs. As to the possibility of being laughed at by the government, all good measures were laughed at first. He was willing to be laughed at while helping along anything for the public good. Recommendations from this Council might be rejected at first by the government, but would have an effect upon the public mind and would ultimately bear fruit.

The resolution was lost on the following vote:

Yes—Ald. Stuart.

May—Ald. Clark, Kethro, Russell and Sargeant.

Not voting—Ald. Butler.

ALD. KETHRO when the time came for considering his motion at the previous meeting to ask the legislature to grant Newcastle the right to levy a license

fee upon residents of the rest of the county, said that, as he had since been assured that the legislature would not grant the permission

requested, he would drop the motion.

ALD. STUART moved for the appointment of a committee to go to Fredericton to support before the legislature the Bill being prepared by the Union of N. B. municipalities to embody the resolution passed by the Union on Oct. 12th last and unanimously by Newcastle Council some time previously, requesting the legislature to pass at its next session a bill providing that any County, City or Town in the Province of New Brunswick shall, upon a majority vote of its qualified ratepayers voting, have the power to reduce or abolish within its jurisdiction, taxes on polls, improvements, personal property and income; or any one or more of these, and raise its revenue by means of a land tax with or without a system of business licenses.

ALD. CLARK opposed the motion, saying that the Union of N. B. municipalities would look after the Bill.

MAYOR PEDOLIN opposed the motion, saying that it would cost too much to send a delegation. The town needed every cent it had.

After some further discussion on the subject, the resolution not being seconded, Council adjourned.

## THINK IT OVER

The scarcity and high price of potatoes both in Canada and the United States, which are telling so heavily this season upon consumers in both countries, is actually furnishing a most striking object lesson of the suicidal folly of all food taxes and of the fatal blunder which Canadians committed last September when they threw out in reciprocity a measure that would have tended to the obliteration or the alleviation of such overtures. In order to relieve the tension of the situation in the matter on this side of the Atlantic large quantities of Irish potatoes have been imported this winter from the other side, but, owing to the protective duties the cost of these has been largely and unduly enhanced upon the buyers, both Canada and American. Instead of paying 80 cents a bushel at wholesale, as Canadian importers have had to pay for them, they would have been able to buy for the duty to land them here from Ireland Scotland and Denmark at less than 50 cents. This is what the insane flag flapping of September last has cost our people. And, owing to a like cause, our American neighbors are no better off. New York city alone had up to a week ago, paid over \$900,000 duty on imported potatoes, and the consumers there will have to pay a profit to the importers on the duty as well as on the price. Surely the public are not mad enough to put up with such an intolerable state of things as this much longer.

## TOWN COUNCIL

### Deputation to Ottawa Report.

The Town Council met in session on Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor MacDonald presiding. There were also present Councillors Pinaut, Miller, Mowat, Alexander, White, Moores and Lunam. The minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed. A communication was read from the Secretary of the Old Age Pension Committee at Ottawa, asking the opinion of the council on the desirability of the scheme, and how many persons would be affected by it in Campbellton. Letter was laid on table.

Communication read from F. E. Blackhall, Town Auditor, submitting report of audit for the past year which was accepted.

Communication received from H. M. Clark of National Highways Association enclosing resolution relative to a national highway from the Atlantic to the Pacific. On motion this resolution was adopted.

Communication from the Secretary of L. O. L. No. 64 asking refund of taxes for property on Gerard Street. Referred to assessment and appeals committee.

Communication read from Chief of Amherst Fire Brigade relative to a test of a 50 H. P. Rambler Motor Chemical Engine to take place at an early date, and extending an invitation to the council to be present. Letter filed and Town Clerk instructed to get further particulars.

Petition was received from George Letourneau for a license to conduct tailoring and clothes pressing establishment on Gerard St. Referred to Police and License Committee.

### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

The following reports recommending payment of accounts were received and accepted:

Councillor Pinaut, Public Property and Streets \$510.45.

Councillor Miller, Finance \$1270.74.

Councillor Alexander, Water & Sewerage \$303.10.

Councillor White, Public Property \$108.00.

The Electric Light Committee were authorized to sell the steam engine and plant in the old Power

House to the best advantage. On motion the following names were placed on the pay roll of the Electric Light Department, Frank Gorman, \$85 per month, James Robinson \$60 per month, John Nelson \$60 per month.

The subject of the concrete was then brought up. The matter of employing expert advice as to the construction of the dam had been mooted, and councillor Alexander submitted letters from three firms who had been asked to state their fees for this work. These letters asked for fuller details and plans of the work which the Town Clerk was instructed to send through the committee.

Councillor White submitted prices for a Fire Alarm Bell for the new alarm system. This burning "question" was responsible for a great deal of fiery eloquence, but the bell although it had a tongue of its own was talked out, and the matter of purchase left where it was.

Councillor Lunam brought up the question of purchasing a dock for the chief of Police, and after discussion the clerk was instructed to write Ex-Mayor Murray regarding an official desk.

His Worship Mayor McDonald presented the report of the Ottawa delegation. This was a voluminous and exhaustive report and quite a historical document. The following are the items in brief which will interest the community:

At the present time the outlet for Sugarloaf Street, and the Subway at Victoria Street. Crossing would not be done.

Water Street is to be extended from Victoria Street along past McLennan's Foundry to the proposed new bridge.

A siding for freight will be placed at Dalhousie Street but no passenger platform would be put there.

A piece of land was granted the Town on the south side of the Rock Cup for a fire alarm tower, and the department will arrange to install fire alarm boxes on the railway property. In the matter of shunting and a request for an extra shunting engine, this would be taken up with the officials at Campbellton and the delays remedied.

The necessary dredging was considered favorably and the work was promised to be done.

The privilege of attaching a fire alarm striker to the bell in the town clock was granted.

These were the essential points in the report which was received and adopted, after which council adjourned.

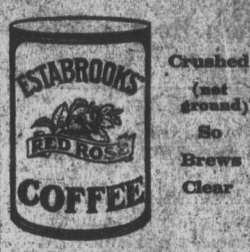

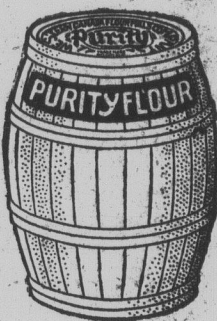

THE PROVINCIAL DAIRY SCHOOL

The next session of the New Brunswick Dairy School will open at Sussex on March 19th next, when there will first be a ten days course in butter making both for creamery and home butter makers, with a full course of lectures upon the production and care of milk and cream, covering the selection, testing, care and feeding of dairy cattle as well as the prevention of and remedies for common ailments. Instruction will be given on the care and operation of hand and factory separators and for those who desire it, there will be training in soft cheese making for home dairies.

During this course, to which ladies are especially invited, lectures upon the production and marketing of poultry and eggs will be given by Seth Jones, Provincial Poultry Superintendent. Lectures upon animal and field husbandry will be given by Prof. E. S. Archibald and on Veterinary Science by Prof. John Standish, both of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. This course will close on the 28th March, and on the 2nd April a course in cheese making will begin continuing till April 12th. During both courses instruction in milk testing will be given. It is expected that all those who are intending to operate creameries or cheese factories will attend one or both of these courses. Tuition is free and board can be obtained at reasonable rates.

The staff in addition to the special lecturers at once mentioned, will consist of C. W. McDougall, Superintendent and Lecturer; L. C. Daigle, instructor in milk testing and cheese making; George Rauson, instructor on Hand Separators; Albert Conrad, instructor in butter making. Applications stating which course the applicant desires to take, should be sent to C. W. McDougall, Esq., Sussex, N. B. from whom all information may be obtained.

Hebert Marriage Declared Legal

Montreal, Feb. 22.—In a carefully prepared fifty-two page document, Mr. Justice Charbonneau this morning rendered his judgment in the famous Hebert marriage case. His Lordship's findings are in short as follows:

1. That the marriage ceremony performed by Rev. Wm. Timberlake, Methodist clergyman, between Emma Marie Cloutier and Eugene Hebert on July 14, 1908, is valid and their children legitimate.
2. That annulment of marriage by the Catholic church authorities on November 12, 1909, is null and void.
3. That Mr. Justice Laurin, who, on March 23, 1911, gave civil sanction to the decree of the church, annulling the marriage.
4. That the Notary's decree of no force as far as the civil law of Quebec with reference to marriage is concerned.

FARM AND FIELD

CITY DAIRYING  
Dairymen Who Carry On Their Business in a Scientific Way Always Succeed.

Probably an inquirer would find it difficult to find in the agricultural world in the west a more profitable branch than retail dairying for the cities. At the same time many and great though the reforms in that industry are, there is room for a rule for more. No trade exists where more numerous precautions to ensure the cleanliness of the food produced ought to be taken, or where neglect or carelessness offers more opportunities for the spread of disease and even death, than in the dairy business. In fact, one keeper of a dairy carried on a large and scientific scale, declared that the omission of even one of his many minor precautions (such as the wearing of clean white linen overalls by his milkers during milking), always resulted in an increased number of bacteria being found in the milk when tested.

The utmost care taken in the handling of the dairy produce they buy is highly appreciated in these days by the public, who are aware now to the dangers of impure milk and cream, and a retail dairy carried on accordingly, judiciously advertised as such, and open to the public for inspection any time during the day, is certain of a highly prosperous career.

**Alfalfa of the Year's Seeding**  
Some growers of alfalfa have cut the stand the first fall and have secured from one-half to one ton and more as well without untoward results, so far as the future usefulness of the stand was concerned. It is a decided risk, however, to cut the alfalfa after this, since the plants make but little growth after the coming of hard freezing nights.

The main difficulty experienced by growers with alfalfa is to get the plants through the first winter. At the top that your alfalfa has made in all probability, worth more as a protection to your plants than it will be for hay. It will hold the snow and of itself will afford much protection should the snow go off early next spring and there be a period of alternate freezing and thawing, which is so hard on all clovers. We would not have the stand in question cut or pastured since it is desirable to have all of the protection, both from the alfalfa top and the grain stubble, that can be secured to insure it coming safely through the winter.

**The Moon's Influence**  
In recent years discussions of the influence of the stages of the moon at which animals are killed, seeds sown or other operations performed seemed almost to have died out; but every now and again one hears some sage remark from some unapologetic farmer about the evil or beneficial influence that has been exerted upon his crop by the particular phase of the moon when his seed was sown or the idea hatched in his brain that it would be well to grow said crop.

Careful experimenters repeated year after year by observant farmers and also by experiment stations have demonstrated beyond cavil, as might have been expected by anyone examining the least mystery of common sense, that the moon's particular phase at the time of the performance of any agricultural operation has not the least influence upon the success or failure of the crop being dealt with.

**Regularly Always Pays**  
Regularity of hours is an important thing to aim at in working draft horses, for it pays. This applies not only to hours of work but to times of feeding. Horses brought in and fed at six one night, at half past five the next, and at seven the next, and so on, are certain to suffer from the irregularity sooner or later, if it is continued. 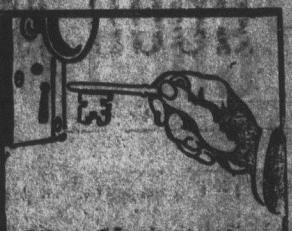

## Tea Lords Philanthropic, or seem To Be So.

Signs in the East Herald Rise in the Price of Tea.

London, Feb. 4.—The tea world knows no famine, at least, not now, yet, signs in the east assuredly indicate a rise in the price of the national beverage. Cheerfully we have sipped our favorite blends of Ceylon and Indian teas without giving a moment's thought to the inevitable rise in price these times were bound to bring. Tea-drinkers have been exceedingly lucky up till now, because tea is about the only article of everyday diet that has remained within the reach of the average housekeeper's buying power. Perhaps a word of praise for the far-sighted policy of the tea lords is in keeping. The growing tide of the higher cost of living has swept against the fundamental policy of their business in vain. That policy has been immense sales with a low margin of profit. However, the time is at hand when they will be compelled to revise the retail price of their different blends. Indeed, some merchants have already done so.

Numerous conditions contribute towards a higher price for tea. First in order, comes the universal tendency that makes for more of the comfort and luxuries of life—a tendency which is largely responsible for the higher cost of living. Second, the world is hungry for more rubber, and tea lands can be readily and profitably turned into rubber plantations. Thousands of acres of these lands are acquired by rubber planters year after year, so that even now the decrease in the world's tea area is quite perceptible. Thirdly, while the tea area of India and Ceylon especially is decreasing, the market for tea is constantly widening. Moscow tea buyers now compete with the representatives of the New York and London Tea Lords, and it is certainly that, if the market continues to widen, while the world's tea area decreases, the housewife will have to pay more for her favorite beverage.

## UNSINKABLE SHIPS

New Invention For Forcing Water Out of a Ship by Compressed Air, Preventing Flooding and Being Repaired from Within.

If all that is claimed for the idea proves correct there will be a revolution in the work of ship-saving in the near future. Indeed, it promises to revolutionize naval warfare, for it is claimed for this new invention that ships can be kept afloat even after being rammed. In fact, they can be made practically unsinkable. The invention is the outcome of an idea for forcing water out of a ship by compressed air, thus permitting the holes to be repaired from within. The idea is a very simple one, and was suggested to Commander Marsh, of the battleship North Carolina, lying off New York, by Mr. Witherpoon, the engineer engaged in the construction of the New York railway tubes under the Hudson River.

All the experiments tried proved entirely successful. The sea-cocks were opened on the Carolina and water was permitted to fill one of the watertight compartments. Compressed air at a pressure of twelve pounds to the square inch was then forced into the compartment through a small opening. In ten minutes all the water was driven back into the river. Simultaneously with the twelve-pound pressure into the watertight compartment compressed air at seven pounds pressure was driven into all the surrounding compartments and a three-pound pressure into the next series of compartments, this being necessary to prevent the pressure on the original compartment buckling the sides and the deck.

Commander Marsh is most enthusiastic regarding the idea. He points out that the invention now enables them to do repairs to the hull below waterline from the inside, either after collision or during a naval battle. "Ships," he says, "are now for the first time practically unsinkable, for the water-tight compartments close will keep a ship afloat indefinitely. There is always a leak somewhere. All that is necessary," he continues, "is to install a system of pipes and gauges and attach them to the watertight compartments. Every warship already has such a plant for the purpose of blowing off poisonous and explosive gases, which can be utilized for driving out the water. The whole cost of a battleship is about \$400. How is that for a low insurance premium against the sinking of a battleship worth \$10,000,000?"

## QUICK MASTERS

Bobbie Burns Composed His Masterpiece "Tam o' Shanter" In One Day and Byron His, Mac-cr-piece In One Night.

Dr. John Brown, one of Ruskin's greatest friends, made an immortal name by one short story, "Rab and His Friends." Rab is a dog, and his history, full of a natural pathos and simplicity, is read, and will continue to be read, by old and young as long as the language lasts. Yet it was written in the first four hours of a midsummer morning. The author was then a young doctor, and he sat down to write his masterpiece at twelve o'clock midnight and finished at four o'clock in the morning. He was unaware that he had written anything exceptionally good, but the moment it appeared in print he found himself famous.

Dr. Samuel Johnson wrote his only novel in a week. This is the celebrated "Rasselas, Prince of Abyssinia." His mother died at Lichfield in her nineteenth year, and in order to defray the funeral expenses, and to discharge some debts which she had left, he sat down to write a book. It took him seven days to complete, and he sent the check to the press without looking them over. He was paid \$500 for the copyright, which was probably ten times more than he ever earned in the same space of time during any other period of his life. The book was an instant success and immediately became the talk of the town.

## A Good Day's Work

Robert Burns composed his masterpiece, "Tam o' Shanter," in one day, in the open air. Burns went out of the house in the morning and, not returning, his wife looked for him in the afternoon with her two children. Seeing that he was "crooning to himself," she sent the dog to interrupt him, but stayed in the fields at a distance, where she could see him. She observed him wildly gesticulating, and at times fairly leaping with joy. She said to Allan Cunningham, the poet, after her husband's death, "I wish ye had seen him, he was in such ecstacy that the tears were leaping down his cheeks. He committed the poem to writing by the riverside, and went into the house and read it to his wife at the fireside with great triumph. One of the most notable days' work ever done in Scotland!"

"The Diverting History of John Gypin," a ballad which contains upwards of sixty verses, was composed by Cowper in bed during the hours of one night. Lady Austen, Cowper's friend, told him the story one evening to cheer him up, and he said next morning not only that convulsions of laughter at his recollections of its incidents had kept him awake during the greater part of the night, but also that he had made a ballad of it. As soon as it appeared in print it was noticed on the stage and became a popular song, a popularity which it retains to this day.

Byron, delayed by bad weather at his villa at Grassy for a couple of days, wrote his famous poem, "The Progress of Children," perhaps the best known of all his works. He wrote it almost as it stands, in one night, sitting up late, in a perfect frenzy of inspiration, and completing it before he retired to rest. The whole history of literature does not contain a more unique instance of rapid composition.
