### DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.

[From the Bermuda Royal Gazette, April 26.]  
An inquisition was held at Ely's Harbour, Somerset, on Saturday the 23d inst., before C. C. Keane, Esq., Coroner, on the body of Daniel B. J. Buren, who was drowned under circumstances the most appalling. It appears from the evidence of the son of the deceased, that the father and son had gone out on Friday morning in a small boat to some distant shoals, to haul fish pots, and that while raising one of the pots, by some accident the boat tilted over, and filled and sunk, and they were left struggling in the water. The son, who succeeded in kicking off his shoes, assisted his father on to a shoal, a spot of comparative security in the then state of the tide. This occurred between eight and nine o'clock in the morning, at which time the tide was falling. After the lapse of some hours the tide began to flow and the water to rise on these most unhappy men—the father's fortune and mind deserted him; he was calling loud on his wife and his numerous children by name, and wildly dragged his son (a lad of about seventeen or eighteen) into deep water, from which he was rescued by the son, only again and again to make the same frantic efforts, which were restrained as long as his strength lasted, by his son.  
Eight or nine most awful hours had now elapsed—the water was more than breast high—no help appeared. After an agonizing appeal to his Maker for mercy, this most unfortunate man, again got into deep water, and was drowned.

His son was now swimming about, the ledges being all covered with the rising tide. At the last moment he was seen and rescued by a young lad named Wm. Pittman, who also succeeded in raising the body of his father and conveying it to his sad home.  
More devoted filial love, more enduring heroism have never been displayed than by this brave young man in his nine hours struggle to save the life of his father.

**EMIGRATION.**—The emigration from Europe to the United States, it is said, likely to prove extraordinary within the coming six months. It is estimated that some 200,000 men, women and children will leave England and Ireland, and that this vast army will be increased to nearly half a million by Europe. A still further impulse is likely to be given to this living tide by the strikes in the United States, and the extravagant reports that are published in foreign journals, as to the demand for labor and the high rates of wages in this country.

**LIABILITIES OF SHIP OWNERS.**—The Supreme Court of the United States has recently reversed the decisions of Judge Story and the Massachusetts Supreme Court, on the question of the liabilities of ship-owners in cases of collision. The old doctrine was, that underwriters were "liable to pay to the insured damages paid by him to the owners of another vessel and cargo, suffered in a collision occasioned by the negligence of the master or mariners of the vessel insured." Judge Curtis has delivered the opinion of the Supreme Court of the United States, that underwriters are not thus liable.

**HORRIBLE MURDER.**—We are informed that one William Brennan, an American residing at Wickham, in the Eastern Townships, last Saturday, shot, with a revolver, his mother and brother. The parties all lived under the same roof, and conducted a lucrative farm, respecting the proprietorship of which several disagreeable quarrels had frequently taken place between them, the termination of which was the horrible circumstance just mentioned. The unfortunate man has fled that section of the country, and the constable in search of him, Thomas Sadler, from whom we derive our information, represents Brennan as a man of about five feet ten inches high—thin, long face, had then black whiskers, and wore green pants, black silk surtout, and black cloth cap. He also informs us that the ball entered near the lungs of the brother, and must prove mortal; the effect of the shot discharged at the mother he was unable to conjecture, as he was obliged to leave Wickham immediately, in pursuit of the murderer.

**ROMANCE IN REAL LIFE.**—John Aspden, whose sudden death on Monday was noticed in our columns, is to be buried this afternoon. Mr. Aspden was one of the English claimants of the immense estate left by Matthias Aspden. Before the case was decided by the Supreme Court in favor of the American heir, the latter proposed to the deceased to compromise the matter, and offered to pay him the sum of \$200,000 to relinquish his claim; this he refused to do, and the decision of the Court cut him off without a farthing. On Monday morning the estate was divided between the heirs at law, and almost at the same moment John Aspden fell dead, at a tavern in Carter's Alley, of disease of the heart, supposed to have been induced by dis-

appointment and mortification. At the time of death, his pocket contained a solitary cent! his entire fortune! To-day the man that might have been the possessor of a quarter of a million of dollars, will be borne to his grave from an obscure part of the district of Southwick. Truth is quite as strange as fiction. *Philadelphia Bulletin.*

### LATE FROM CALIFORNIA.

The steamer El Dorado arrived at New York Sunday 8th inst., with 300 passengers, and California dates to the 9th April. The news from California is uninteresting. The subscriptions at San Francisco for the relief of the sufferers on board the Independence had a large surplus on hand, and they declined offers from Catherine Hayes and others of further aid.

Another attempt to fire the city was made on the night of the 9th.

Advices from Sacramento state that nearly all the gardens and ranches on the river, below the city, were more or less injured by the overflow, and the crops on many of them ruined.

A report from Humboldt Bay states that 16 of the 18 men who were exploring the road from Paragon bay to Rogue river valley, had been murdered by the Indians.

News from the mining regions continue to be satisfactory.

A violent three days storm had occurred at Calaveras and Sonora, unroofing houses, and doing other damage.

**RAILWAY LABORERS.**—The party of railway labourers by the ship "Imperial," 140 in number, with their wives and children, left for St. Andrews yesterday morning in the steamer "Maid of Erin," which was specially chartered for their conveyance. These people were all engaged in England by Messrs. Sykes & Co., the contractors for the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway, and brought out at their expense. We regret to hear that attempts were made here to induce some of these "navies" to break their engagement, and accept other employment. The attempts were unsuccessful—but we trust that hereafter such base conduct will not be repeated—and if any men thus brought out should be seduced from their employment, we sincerely hope no pains or expense will be spared to punish all parties concerned. [New Brunswick.

### AGRICULTURE.

As Agriculture is one of the arts essential to the existence of society, it was cultivated in the earliest ages of human history. Cain was a tiller of the ground; Abel was a shepherd, Noah planted a vineyard. That art was carried to great perfection in ancient Egypt, is evinced by the dense population which that remarkable land must have sustained, in the age when the pyramids were in progress, and Thebes was in its glory. The poem of the Works and Days, by Hesiod, is a description of early Grecian Agriculture, and the Georgics of Virgil, the Natural History of Pliny, and the fragments of Columella, and other writers, which have come down to us, show in what high estimation this art was held in ancient Rome; where generals and dictators returned to the plough, after the triumphs of the battle field.

### FIRE ENGINE.

The Cincinnati steam fire engine was publicly tried again in that city on the 1st inst., and the best fire engine in the city was brought out strongly manned to compete with it. In ten minutes the steam was up, and the engine in operation. The firemen went to work with the ordinary engine, confident of beating the new fangled affair. The signal was given—puff! puff! went the fire engine, and away spirted the water. The firemen bore down and up in succession, and strained every nerve, but gave up exhausted. The steam engine continued unceasingly for half an hour to throw a vast body, in a solid stream of two hundred and twenty four feet. It then threw two streams of water, a section of Indian rubber hose was attached to the boiler, and steam passed off through it. It sent forth a vast volume of steam sufficient to saturate the air and penetrate into every crevice where fire could possibly lodge, completely extinguishing it. The machine ran up hill, down hill, and was perfectly manageable in every respect.

**WRECK OF THE QUEEN VICTORIA.**—The plate in the Queen Victoria's cabin has been saved a diver, but the man protests that no thing in the world should induce him to go down a second time, as the scene in the cabin was the most horrible he had ever witnessed. He thought he had entered a wax work exhibition, the corpses never having moved from their positions since the vessel went down. There were some eighteen or twenty persons in the cabin, one and all of whom seemed to be holding conversation with each other; and the general appearance of the whole scene was so life-like that he was almost inclined to believe that some were yet living.

**CALIFORNIA AMUSEMENTS.**—The following is a part of an advertisement in a California paper giving an idea of the popular amusements in the Mountain region:—

Three different fights with three different bears!—The performance will commence with a man and bear fight! Mr. Daniel Fremont, an old California bear hunter, will fight one of the fiercest kind of grizzly bears, with the same knife which killed the bear at Columbia on August 15th, 1852. The chain is to be attached to the hind foot of the bear, who is to have the full sweep of the ring; so that the man cannot escape, except by killing the bear.

The above is to be followed by a bull and dog fight! After which ten of the largest dogs in the country will be turned loose, to fight another bear, fresh for the occasion. This will be a new sport, as a dog and bear fight has never before been exhibited in this country.

The performance will close with the ascension of a large balloon, 30 feet high, which will be let loose from the Amphitheatre.
