DISTINGUISHED VISITOR IN TOWN

Archbishop Correy of Liban, Syria, Heartily Welcomed Last Week.

Campbellton was honored last week by a visit from Archbishop Correy of Liban, Syria, who is touring Canada and the United States for the purpose of raising funds for the Syrian Relief Fund.

The Synagogue of Campbellton made elaborate preparations for welcoming the distinguished visitor who arrived on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. He was met at the depot by eight automobiles.

Immediately on alighting from the train the distinguished visitor was heartily welcomed by Fathers Sivret and Lantagne and the Syrians of Campbellton, and driven to the Church of Our Lady of Snow, where a short service was held, after which the Archbishop extended his thanks to the local priests and Syrians for the hearty reception accorded him on his arrival.

At the conclusion of this service he was taken to the Presbytery where the Syrians called upon him and enjoyed a few hours conversation with him.

Thursday morning the Archbishop visited the Hotel Dieu Hospital accompanied by Father Melanson and expressed his delight at the fine institution we had in our midst. The Church at Mission Point was visited in the afternoon.

On Friday morning the Archbishop conducted High Mass in the Church of Our Lady of the Snows, when an exceptionally large congregation was present. The afternoon was spent by the Archbishop in visiting all the Syrians in their homes.

On Thursday supper was given by Mr. and Mrs. B. Hello at their home and on Friday afternoon, dinner was given by Mr. and Mrs. K. Hatt.

Friday evening supper was served at the home of Mr. Anthony Thomas in honor of the Archbishop to which all Syrians were invited, also Rev. Fathers Melanson, Sivret and Bridesau and Mr. A. T. LeBlanc. A most pleasant evening was spent by all present after which the Archbishop went to the Presbytery where he remained until the arrival of the Maritime Express, when he was driven to the depot, to take the train for Quebec where he will spend several days.—Cor.

ACCIDENT ON THE GOVERNMENT R. R.

Express Train Ran Into Cars That Overlapped At Maccan.

AMHERST, N. S., Aug. 25.—A railway accident of serious consequences was narrowly averted at an early hour this morning, when the Boston express crashed into a string of box cars that had been carelessly left overlapping a siding in the Maccan train yard. The engine and one mail car were derailed, but the rest of the train held the rails. There were no casualties. The auxiliary train from Moncton was rushed to the scene and had the track cleared by noon hour.

FIVE CARLOADS OF WAR TROPHIES

Many Valuable Souvenirs of the World War Saved From Scrap Heap.

Montreal, Aug. 23.—Among the arrivals on the steamer Melita over the week-end was Major G. Lanctot, who is assistant to the Director of War Trophies, Col. Doughty, and who had brought over five carloads of trophies for Canadian Museums. He stated that had evidently just gone over in time, as many of those which he selected were about to be scrapped. Among the trophies secured were some wonderful range-finders, fifteen feet in length, searchlights one of which was ten feet in diameter, a large variety of pompons, German bayonets, helmets and pistols, all of enemy manufacture.

TYLER'S BAKERY BADLY GUTTED



John Whitgift
is remembered in Crofton
As Founder of Hospitals

LITTLE while ago, there took place in Crofton, the saddest town some ten miles south of London, an interesting and unusual ceremony, namely, the annual festival service by which commemorated the martyrdom of Bishop Whitgift to Crofton. It is in fact, the 324th anniversary of the foundation of the Whitgift Hospital, headed by him, the boys of the Whitgift Grammar and Middle schools marched to the parish church, the Vicar of Crofton presiding, for which, under the terms of the bequest, he received a salary of eight pounds, and he took part in the festival were "Whitgift" flowers, in other words, flowers that were always there, and it is specially fitting that it should be so for John Whitgift, sometimes Bishop of Canterbury, in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, was, in all respects, the most exacting of schoolmasters. The house which I have lived in for the school master, shall be for ever employed to that use only, and no other." So ran one of his instructions. It has not been strictly obeyed, in the matter of the school house, but it shows to some extent the manner of man he was.

Now, it was on the 17th of January, 1596, that the archbishop, having obtained letters patent from Queen Elizabeth, began to build his hospital "for the relief and sustentation of certain poor people." He finished it on September 29, 1597. Never was there a more methodical and painstaking builder. Not only did he give the most minute instructions as to the work, but the records of each day's progress during the three years spent in building were most carefully and elaborately drawn up. Then, in the matter of regulations, he left nothing unprovided for. Was it a question of a broken window "or other decay by any illness or negligence" then the brother or sister responsible was to "amend it" within one month, on pain of having fourpence a week stopped out of his or her allowance. For the hospital was, as it still is, both an almshouse and a school. But, as is the way with such foundations, the lands and bequests which provided but a very modest sum, three hundred years ago, have appreciated and appreciated in value until, to-day the foundation has become a wealthy trust, carrying out the ideas of the founder on a scale which, in all probability, he never would have thought possible.

John Whitgift, however, "My white gift," as Queen Elizabeth called him, just as she called Parker, her "black husband," was a man of big ideas. True, the Archbishop of Canterbury was a veritable Prince bishop, even in the days of Queen Elizabeth, but J. Corbet Anderson has left record, in his "History of Crofton," that Archbishop Whitgift's military surroundings "were somewhat cramped at by his enemies." And indeed such an attitude was altogether without excuse, for the archbishop appears to have made no small stir when he moved officially from place to place. Thus it was his custom to visit Canterbury every third year. On these occasions, he moved from his palace at Crofton with a retinue of 200 persons, and, in addition, "he was invariably escorted by the gentry of the country, so that he sometimes entered the city of Canterbury with a procession of eight hundred to a thousand horse." The archbishop, moreover, had under his own servants a regularly trained force of 140 foot, and 50 horse which, in the days of the great Armada, he used, ready with the redoubtable archbishop at his head, "to take his share in the defence of the coast."

Nevertheless John Whitgift was no swashbuckler, no shallow lover of pomp and circumstance, he was a sturdy bulwark against any lapse from the information, a very diligent preacher, "as his exploratory reports as before," a man of middle and moderate disposition, of a free mind and a thoughtful head towards his household servants, his neighbours, but especially towards his tenants and his poor. In spite of his military retinue, he was, as Fuller described him, "far from violence, and his political patience was blessed in a high proportion."

A Scotch Expression.

Very few people who use the expression "Cat's paw" have any idea what it means, or for the matter of that, how it is pronounced. A writer in "Ways and Means" says "cat's paw" as the nearest approach to the sound of the Scotch "ca" which stands for call—in this instance having nothing to do with calling a halt, but referring to action, not speech, such for instance as turning a skipping rope or working a pump handle. Thus, if we take pumping as an illustration, the phrase "cat's paw" would mean to work cautiously, not to pump so vigorously that the water is stopped for call—and wasted; the man pumping is asked not to squander his time by doing his job badly. It is noted as a curious fact that curious phrases embodying nothing but good sound ideas should have been invented on the south side of the border to use based on an economic fallacy.

A Blind Gaffer.

An English Victoria Cross officer, who was blinded in the war, still plays golf. He goes on the course accompanied by his wife, and his blind is led for him by a caddy. His wife assists him to get his feet into exactly the right position. The caddy then rings a tiny bell over the ball so as to indicate to the player's acute hearing the exact spot to which he must aim. On the green he relies also upon touch.

One Continent Is Lost

EVIDENCE is as close to light recently that if Columbus had set forth on his great voyage a few thousand or hundred of thousands of years earlier he would have found three instead of two continents of America. That is to say, the world is shy at least one continent which existed formerly in what is now the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean Sea. Rumors of this loss were rife as long ago as the time when Greek mythology was being compiled, for there are references there to the lost continent of Atlantis; but whether the missing continent really disappeared in the Atlantic is not known. Further research may show that there has been a deduction to the extent of several continents. What seems to be established is that the present island of Jamaica was not always the centre of a far-sized continent. The larger West Indian Islands were one part of Central America.

It is not too much to assume that many readers at present are unaware that between an island and a continent there is a greater difference than in mere size. Islands are of quite different formation, for the most part. Excepting those situated along what may be called the shelf of the continents, and were once part of the mainland, islands are of volcanic origin, they come into existence as a result of coral growth or some volcanic disturbance. They are either built up by insects or are thrown up by some tremendous convulsion of the earth. Continents do not thus come into being. Continents are of the older lineage. Islands are also the younger. This is proved by the animal life found on continents and islands. Oceanic islands have rarely any large mammals. Their animal life consists largely, if not wholly, of winged creatures, and it is possible to cross large expanses of salt water from the continents to the islands. They have also the larger species of life the eggs of which happen to have been carried by hurricanes, water-mountain or other agencies.

The discovery with regard to the lost continent of Atlantis was made by Dr. H. E. Silliman, who headed an expedition sent out by the American Museum of Natural History, and who has spent several months in the Indies. The object of the search was fossils and the seekers were richly rewarded. They found fossil remains of many mammals now extinct, some of them being of varieties not elsewhere encountered. They were found in Pleistocene formations and date back probably on hundred thousand years. Most of the fossils were found in limestone caves, imbedded in a hard limestone block, and were not out after many hours hard work. Most of the specimens were brought back by the expedition in order to exterminate the rats a large importation of Indian monkeys was made. They are now in existence. There is also a great collection of bats, reptiles and birds, interesting to naturalists, but not of great value to the West Indies were once a continent or part of a continent.

At the present time, the only wild mammals in Jamaica are the coney and the mongoose. The coney was imported many years ago and flourished. Unfortunately rats flourished also. The expedition also did some checking up on Herbert Spencer's theory that in tertiary times the present bottom of the sea was from a pile and a half to two miles higher than it is now from its present configuration. "If this be so," says Capt. Anthony, as quoted in the Boston Transcript, by J. O. H. Silliman, "it gives us our continent there which our fossils all fauna seem to indicate. The ridges of the sea bottom seem to follow the general direction of the mountain ranges we find on the larger islands, and Spencer's conclusion that the ridges now under water and the mountain ranges which rear themselves above it were formerly all parts of the same system." He believes that the mountains of the lost continent were higher than any now on the American continent, but does not say that the high roads may have become eroded by this exaltation and have thus been incited to abolish a continent.

TO PREVENT FIRE WASTE.
Legislation to prevent fire waste and concerning other matters relating to insurance, will be considered by the Provincial Government following a visit to Premier Foster, on Tuesday, by G. D. Finlayson, national superintendent of the federal insurance department, according to a statement made this morning by the Premier. The latter said Superintendent Finlayson had outlined briefly the legislation and results achieved in other provinces, including Nova Scotia, and had promised to forward to the Premier copies of the legislation enacted in other provinces which have adopted progressive fire laws. When the material is available, the whole question will be considered by the Local Government. One of the proposals of the federal expert is that the province appoint a man to investigate fires and conduct a campaign of publicity against the fire waste. This system had been tried with success elsewhere. The federal authorities aim to have uniform legislation about fire waste throughout the nation.—Globe.

Calculating the returns from the average of the two plots, over a period of three years, charging the ground limestone at \$4.80 per ton, grain, straw and hay at \$0.75 per bushel, \$6.00 and \$12.00 per ton respectively, the following results were obtained. Where one ton was used the loss over the cost of limestone was \$0.38 per acre. Two tons gave a profit of \$3.56 per acre. Three tons gave a profit of \$2.71 per acre, four a loss of \$2.85 per acre and five gave a profit of \$1.69 per acre.

BIG INCREASE IN LUMBER CUT

Statement Shows That Last Winter Was a Record Breaker.

A statement of the scale of the lumber cut upon the crown lands of New Brunswick during the year 1919-20, is as follows:

Spruce	4,599,91
Fir	3,556,100
Cedar	559,142
Hemlock	72,997
Hardwood	67,363

Total number of pieces actually scaled, 2,901,278, or thirty-three per cent.

Average contents per piece: Spruce, 44.50 ft.; fir, 31.88 ft.; cedar, 43.67 ft.; hemlock, 64.70 ft.; hardwood, 52 ft.

The total scale of the cut of 1919-19 was 221,545,684 feet, making an increase of 148,295,518 for the year.

Pulpwood, railway ties and telegraph poles show a decrease, but other classes show increase. The scale for each in 1918-19 was as follows:

Let every man come out and put his shoulder to the wheel and the thing will go and before long every man, instead of providing automobiles for the rich storekeepers will be able to own one himself.

Carlisle is on the move and is awakening to new opportunities and responsibilities for their families and the town in general.

The Rev. W. Conrad who has been visiting Carlisle for some weeks, preached in the Presbyterian Church last Sunday evening and the Rev. Mr. Davidson preached in the English Church.

We have one or two men, married and grandfathers, who are frequently seen under the influence of liquor, it is high time that these men stopped. The respectful people of Carlisle will not tolerate them much longer. It is a disgrace to our fair town to see such doings continually. It would have been better had one of them remained in the U. S. A. Their language is a disgrace and when both are drunk in an automobile the sober minded public are in danger of accidents.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT BRIDGETOWN

Edward Sinclair Lumber Co. Suffer Loss on Saturday.

Newcastle, N. B., Aug. 22.—A disastrous fire which consumed property estimated to be worth \$300,000, broke out yesterday afternoon in the lumber yards of the Edward Sinclair Lumber Company about three miles from Newcastle. The fire started in a lumber pile and the strong wind blowing at the time quickly fanned it into a big conflagration.

The fire broke out about 12.30 and the wind was blowing a terrific gale from the southwest. It was not long before the blaze was beyond the control of the means at hand for fighting it. An alarm was sent in and the firemen from Newcastle and Chatham responded and also men from the various mills and villages. About four hundred men were soon on the scene and engaged in fighting the fire. Tugboats also took a hand and pumped water from the river.

About four million feet of lumber was burned, including boards, deals and laths. Four houses belonging to the Sinclair Company were also burned.

The estimated loss is about \$300,000, and is partly covered by insurance.

The fire was not under control until about ten o'clock Saturday night. The fire fighters had hard work to keep the flames from spreading to the woods.

The Sinclair mill was also in great danger and if the wind had shifted could hardly have been saved.

Sparks were carried down the road a mile and set fire to a barn owned by Alex. Isaac which was completely destroyed along with the fifteen tons of hay, including a load in the barn floor just hauled in, farming implements. No live stock was lost except a pig which escaped from the burning barn only to be run over and killed by an automobile.

It is understood Mr. Isaac had insurance and his loss will be severely felt.

LOOK FOR CUT IN PRICES.

Sugar prices still hold to their high level in St. John but there are many indications of a weakening market.

In the United States a quick and sudden drop has brought the price of lumping from twenty-eight or nine cents per pound retail to as low as seventeen cents. The prevailing wholesale rates in St. John are \$24.10 per 100 pounds, while the retail quote sugar at twenty-six cent a pound or twenty-five cents.

A BLIND MAN'S BAND.

Unique Organization Exists in City of Toronto.

If a blind musician who memorizes whole works of music without the use of his eyes in a prodigy, what is a brass band composed of twenty-six blind men?

Toronto has that band. It was organized last September and will make its first public appearance soon.

Its members, most of whom have been blind all their lives, are engaged in mastering the intricate mysteries of the various brass and wooden musical instruments.

But their mastery of their parts, which, in band music, are a technical hedge-hodge of harmonization, rests and stops, is the great miracle.

These blind men study their music with their fingers. Their music is written on long strips of brown paper with the Braille system of raised letters.

You see a band or an orchestra, no matter how expert, with its music set before its players. The Blind Men's Band must memorize every note of its music.

Mr. Joseph M. Dawson, bandmaster of the 30th Regiment, who took the band of the 24th Battalion overseas, is director of the Blind Band.

Last September, Mr. C. W. Carrothers and certain other leaders in the interests of the blind in Toronto decided that an instrumental band would be a most suitable form of interesting recreation for our blind, many of whom, as piano tuners, had a good grounding in music.

Mrs. Lionel Clarke, wife of the new Lieutenant-Governor, was asked to interest herself in the securing of the band instruments, and after a great deal of difficulty, persuaded the military authorities to let the blind men have the instruments of the 5th Battalion.

The blind men took to the band idea instantly, and the band now numbers twenty partly trained members and six beginners. There are ex-soldiers in the band, all of whom have received practical training in music at the Branford Institute for the Blind.

The players prepare their own music. Bandmaster Dawson selects a simple piece of band music and writes the Braille characters. He then reads each instrument's part to the blind player, who writes it out in the Braille characters. Each player then takes his music home, memorizes it, plays it; and at the weekly practices, which are held in the King street broom factory, the bandmaster corrects any misinterpretations and plays over any obscure passage.
