John Whitgift Is Remembered in Croydon

As Founder of Hospitals

LITTLE while ago, there took place in Croydon, the ancient town some ten miles south of London, an interesting and unusual ceremony, namely, the annual festival service by which commemorated the munificence of Bishop Whitgift to Croydon. It was in fact, the 324th anniversary of the foundation of the Whitgift Hospital, headed by him, the boys of the Whitgift Grammar and Middle Schools marched to the parish church, the Vicar of Croydon presiding, a sermon, for which, under the name of the bequest, he received a valuable and expensive, and which took part in the festival was "Fruit-a-tives" flowers, in other words, as it always has been done, and was specially fitting that it should be so. For John Whitgift, sometime Bishop of Canterbury, in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, was, in many respects, the most exacting of his subjects. He was a very strict disciplinarian, and his house which I have visited for the school master, shall be for ever employed to that use only, and to no other. So ran one of his instructions. It has not been strictly obeyed, in the matter of the school house, but it shows to some extent the manner of man he was.

Now, it was on the 17th of January, 1596, that the archbishop, having obtained letters patent from Queen Elizabeth, began to build his hospital "for the relief and sustentation of certain poor people." He finished it on September 29, 1599. Never was there a more methodical and painstaking builder. Not only did he give the most minute instructions as to the work, but the records of each day's progress during the three years spent in building were most carefully and elaborately drawn up. Then, in the matter of regulations, he left nothing unprovided for. Was it a question of a broken window "or other decay by accident or negligence," then the brother or the sister responsible was to "amend it" within one month, on pain of having a week's stoppage out of his or her allowance. For the hospital was, as it still is, both an almshouse and a school. But, as the way with such foundations, the lands and bequests which provided but a very modest sum, three hundred years ago, have appreciated and appreciated in value until, today the foundation has become a wealthy trust, carrying out the ideas of the founder on a scale which, in all probability, he would have thought possible.

John Whitgift, however, "My white gift," as Queen Elizabeth called him, just as she called Parker, her "black husband," was a man of big ideas. True, the Archbishop of Canterbury was a veritable Prince Bishop, even in the time of Queen Elizabeth, but J. Corbet Anderson has left record, in his "History of Croydon," that Archbishop Whitgift's military surroundings "were somewhat cramped at by his enemies." And indeed such an attitude was altogether without excuse, for the archbishop appears to have made no small stir when he moved officially from place to place. Thus it was his custom to visit Canterbury every third year. On these occasions, he moved from his palace at Croydon with a retinue of 200 persons, and, in addition, "he was honourably escorted by the gentry of the country, so that he sometimes entered the city of Canterbury with a procession of eight hundred to a thousand horse." The archbishop, moreover, had under his own servants, a regular trained force of 140 foot and 50 horse which, in the days of the great Armada, held itself ready, with the redoubtable archbishop at its head, "to take its share in the defence of the realm."

Nevertheless John Whitgift was no swashbuckler, no shallow lover of pomp and circumstance. He was a sturdy bulwark against any lapse from the information, a very difficult position, "as well after his predecessors as before," a man of "middle and moderate disposition, of a free mind and a boundless heart towards his household servants, his neighbours, but especially towards scholars and students." True, in spite of his military retinue, he was, as Fuller described him, "far from violence, and his political patience was blessed in a high proportion."

A Scotch Expression.
Very few people who use the expression "Ca' cunn" have any idea what it means, or for the matter of that, how it is pronounced. A writer in "Way and Main" has endeavored, as the nearest approach to the sound of the Scottish "ca' cunn" which stands for call—in this instance having nothing to do with calling a halt, but referring to action, not speech, such for instance as turning a skipping rope or working a pump handle. Thus, if we take pumping as an illustration, the phrase "Ca' cunn" would mean to work cautiously, not to pump so vigorously that the water is stopped over and wanted; the man pumping is asked not to squander his time by doing his job badly. It is noted as a curious fact that curious old phrase embodying nothing but good sound ideas should have been retained on the south side of the border to use based on an economic fallacy.

A Blind Gaffer.
An English Victoria Cross officer, who was blinded in the war, still plays golf. He goes on the course accompanied by his wife, and his ball is teed for him by a caddy. His wife assists him to get his feet into exactly the right position. The caddy then rings a tiny bell to which he must aim. On the green he relies also upon touch.

One Continent Is Lost

EVIDENCE is coming to light recently that if Columbus had set forth on his great voyage a few thousand or hundred of thousands of years earlier he would have found three instead of two continents of America. That is to say, the world is shy at least one continent which has never been seen. It is the lost continent of Atlantis; but whether the missing continent really disappeared in the Atlantic is not known. Further research may show that there has been a deduction to the extent of several continents. What seems to be established is that the present island of Japan was not always a part of the continent of Asia, but was a separate island. The only alternative theory is that the larger West Indian Islands were once part of Central America.

It is not too much to assume that many readers at present are unaware that between an island and a continent there is a greater difference than in mere size. Islands are of quite different formation, for the most part. Excepting those situated along what may be called the shelf of the continents, and were once part of the mainland, islands are of volcanic origin. They come to exist as a result of coral growth or some volcanic disturbance. They are either built up by insects or are thrown up by some tremendous convulsion of the earth. Continents do not thus come into being. Continents are of the older lineage. Islands are more numerous. This is proved by the animal life found on continents and islands. Oceanic islands have rarely any large mammals. Their animal life consists largely, if not wholly, of winged insects that found it possible to cross large expanses of salt water from the continents to the islands. They have also those lower forms of life the eggs of which happen to have been carried by hurricanes, water, or other natural agencies.

The discovery with regard to the lost continent of Atlantis was made by H. E. K. Moseley, who headed an expedition sent out by the American Museum of Natural History, and who spent several months in the Indies. The object of the search was fossils, and the seekers were richly rewarded. They found fossil remains of many mammals now extinct, some of them being of varieties not elsewhere encountered. They were found in Pleistocene formations and date back probably one hundred thousand years. Most of the fossils were found in limestone caves, imbedded in a hard limestone block, and were not out after many hours hard work. Most of the specimens were brought back in the limestone blocks, and it is said that an immense amount of labor will be necessary before the specimens are properly identified and classified. One of the curiosities was a monster rodent, much larger than any now in existence. There is also a great collection of bats, reptiles and birds, interesting to naturalists, but not giving evidence that the West Indies were once a continent or part of it.

At the present time, the only wild mammals in Jamaica are the coney and the mongoose. The coney was imported many years ago and flourished. Unfortunately rats flourished also. The coney was exterminated to exterminate the rats a large importation of Indian mongooses was made. They were more or less successful, but the mongooses then turned their ferocious attention to the coney and they have become almost extinct. Capt. Anthony found some living in a restricted area in the mountains of Jamaica, and brought home skeletons and skins in proof thereof. An interesting fact is that among the fossil mammals, the explorers were unable to find any closely related to those in Cuba and Porto Rico. It has suggested the speculation of an eastern peninsula jutting out from Honduras, and that Jamaica may not have been part of the Antillean continent. The idea that Jamaica once was a part of the Antillean continent is not confined to zoologists. If there is a lost continent, Capt. Anthony says that it must have been an important mass of land, with great rivers and huge mountains, the latter rising perhaps 20,000 feet above the sea. The expedition also did some checking up on Herbert Spencer's theory, that in tertiary times the present bottom of the sea was from a pile and a half to two miles higher than it is now from its present conformation. "If this be so," says Capt. Anthony, as quoted in the Boston Transcript, by J. Olin Howe, "it gives us our continent there which our fossils seem to indicate. The ridges of the sea bottom seem to follow the general direction of the mountain ranges we find on the larger islands, and Spence concluded that the ridges now under water and the mountain ranges which rear themselves above it were formerly all parts of the same system." He believes that the mountains of the lost continent were higher than any now on the American continent, but does not say that the high roads may have become eroded by this exaltation and have thus been invited to abolish a continent.

SOME AUTO DRIVERS.

To fine an automobilist for running his car while in an intoxicated condition is an inadequate penalty. He should not be allowed to operate a car. We require of a man who runs a locomotive many years of training and experience, knowledge of machinery and absolute sobriety. The locomotive runs in a given track and cannot well diverge from that. The requirements of a man who runs an automobile, which goes anywhere, are small, but they should include sobriety.

A drunken man has no right to be at the wheel of an automobile, whether the machine is running in the country or on the streets of a town or city. The automobile itself is a source of sufficient danger without its

potentialities being increased by a mentally dazed man in charge. A man who does not realize his responsibilities enough to keep him from when he is driving an automobile does not deserve to be right to run one. As a measure of protection, not alone to himself but to the sober users of our streets and highways he should be prevented from handling a machine. Therefore not only should he be punished for the given offence, but steps should also be taken to prevent him from becoming an offender a second time, and that would mean to not allow him to run a car.—Ex.

GET OUT ON THE OPEN ROAD

These are the weeks when the open road and the open sea and the open air makes their greatest appeal, an appeal which should be heeded by everybody whenever and wherever possible. Invigoration and health are gained in the open, and all that is necessary is to take yourself out into the open. There is nothing more free in this world than fresh air, nothing easier of access. ONE MILLION FROM CROWN LANDS

Record Receipts from the Department for Year—More Yet Expected.

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 23.—Col. T. G. Laggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, reports that receipts from stumpage, fire-tax and mileage, to date is about one million dollars. This amount will be considerably exceeded as there are numerous amounts still to be received. A record year is expected as announced previously.

Manufactured lumber on the North Shore is moving very slowly. This is on account of shortage of shipping. Bathurst is said to be the only port which is displaying shipping activity. The Miramichi and Restigouche ports want ships badly. The car-shortage on the railways also is delaying a movement of lumber. The American market would take much more lumber than it is if cars were available. It is believed that time will rectify the shortage of both cars and ships. In the meantime the lumbermen must accumulate stock and wait.

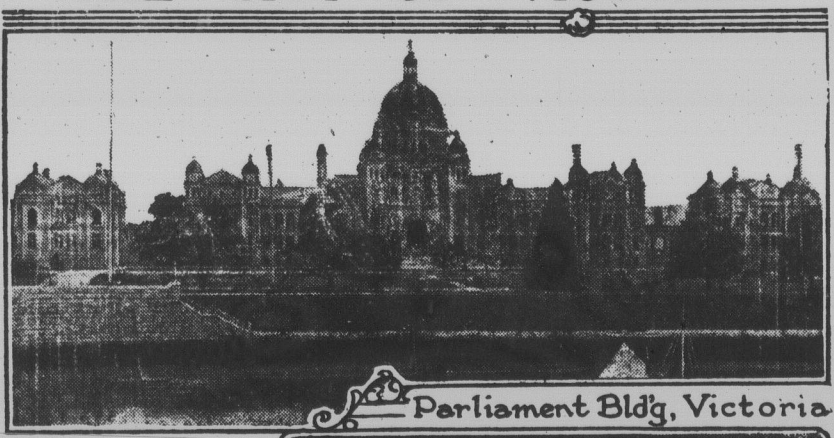

THE CITY OF VICTORIA



Parliament Bldg, Victoria

The charming city of Victoria, on Vancouver Island, the portal to the Pacific, the ocean gateway to the Orient, is one of the most favored spots in the world in beauty of situation, equability of climate and magnificence of scenery. Surrounded by water on three sides, the city is situated in a setting of low-lying wooded hills, in a foreground of the loftier ranges of the Island Cascades. Across the Georgian Straits, the Olympian range is distinctly visible the crowning peak of the range being Mount Baker, which lifts its dazzling cone in solitary splendor, to a height of 11,000 feet.

Victoria is recognized as possessing one of the finest climates in the world. The winters are very mild and the summers cool. In May and June Victoria is especially enchanting with the cascades of roses, bushes of laurel, bushes of sweet briar. In the statly groves, the air is laden with the pungent odor of the pine.

The city is approached through a channel of wooded islands. On the left stretches the harbor, sheltered from all climates. Directly in front, behind a crescent-shaped embankment, the Empress Hotel stands out from its surroundings of lawns and gardens. This stately C.P.R. hotel could not better have interpreted the character of the city.

Victoria is the new home-centre for hundreds of English folk, a reminder of the British Isles in Canada. Rockland avenue, with its lovely homes and enclosed gardens, is one of the most picturesque winding driveways in the city. To the northwest, Victoria is the gateway to the land of pleasure, for Vancouver Island is entered by miles of excellent roads and pleasant scenes. There are many places of interest—the Dominion Experimental farm at Buxton Bay, the high explosives works at James Island; the big cement plant at Tod Inlet; the provincial prison farm; the naval station at Esquimalt; the cosmopolitan and meteorological observatories, and numerous mountains and lakes. The trip over the Mahahat Mountain is one of the most famous expeditions the tourist can embark upon. Within easy access to the city are innumerable beaches. A pleasant memory picture is the view obtained from the yacht clubhouse overlooking the Cadboro Bay.—C. G.

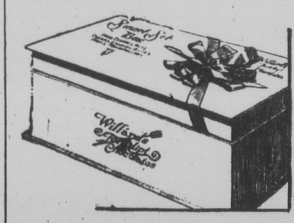

THE VALUE OF LIME STONE ON EASTERN SOILS.

Few crops thrive well on acid soils. Especially is this true of clover, which is one of the most important crops considered, both from the standpoint of food value and as an improver of soil fertility. Hence, if we expect to increase the yield and at the same time improve fertility, we must first study our soils and be reasonably sure that they have been treated in such a manner as will facilitate a maximum growth. Examinations show that the soil of many comparatively large areas in Eastern Canada is acid.

To determine the most economical and effective method for the correction of this soil acidity an experiment was started at the Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S., using ground limestone at different rates per acre. This soil has been tested and found to be distinctly acid.

The field used for this test was cleared during the fall of 1915 and spring of 1916. The land was ploughed and given an even dressing of barnyard manure at the rate of twelve tons per acre. In the spring of 1917 the thirteen-acre field was divided into five plots, receiving an application of ground limestone ranging into acre lots, from one to five tons per acre, respectively. Plot six was left as a check, while plots seven to eleven inclusive were duplicates of one and five, and plots twelve and thirteen were checks.

All plots were sown to grain the spring of 1917 and seeded down with the ten pounds of red clover, ten pounds of timothy and two pounds of alfalfa. In 1918 it was in clover and in 1919 timothy.

Calculating the returns from the average of the two plots, over a period of three years, charging the ground limestone at \$4.50 per ton, grain, straw and hay at \$0.75 per bushel, \$6.00 and \$12.00 per ton respectively, the following results were obtained. Where one ton was used the loss over the cost of limestone was \$0.38 per acre. Two tons gave a profit of \$3.56 per acre. Three tons gave a profit of \$2.71 per acre, four a loss of \$2.85 per acre and five gave a profit of \$1.69 per acre.

The returns from the first three acre plots are about as one would expect to see, but numbers four and five are just the reverse. This can be accounted for by plots eleven and twelve being more fertile than any other plots in the field, consequently, the yields were heavier.

The first six-acre plots were very uniform in fertility throughout, and in comparing results obtained from these plots each year for three consecutive years, the beneficial effect of the ground limestone was most marked, especially between the limed and unlimed plots.

Very little difference in yield was noted between the plots where three, four and five tons of lime had been applied. One of the most outstanding differences between the limed and unlimed plots was the amount of clover

In evidence. On the former the first year it was two-thirds clover and the balance good timothy, while on the latter there was not much more than one-half of a good timothy. The balance brown-top and no clover. The average yield for two years on the limed area was 4602 pounds per acre in favour of the limed area.
Similar results were obtained from the grain and straw, for example on the limed area the average yield for the five plots was 19.4 bushels grain, 2336 pounds of straw, on the unlimed area it was 16 bushels of grain and 1806 pounds of straw, a difference of 3.4 bushel of grain and 530 pounds of straw in favour of the limed area.
There is satisfactory evidence from these results that from two to two and one-half tons of ground limestone could be advantageously used on soils showing marked acidity and that the stronger the acidity shown by a soil, the greater the need of liming.

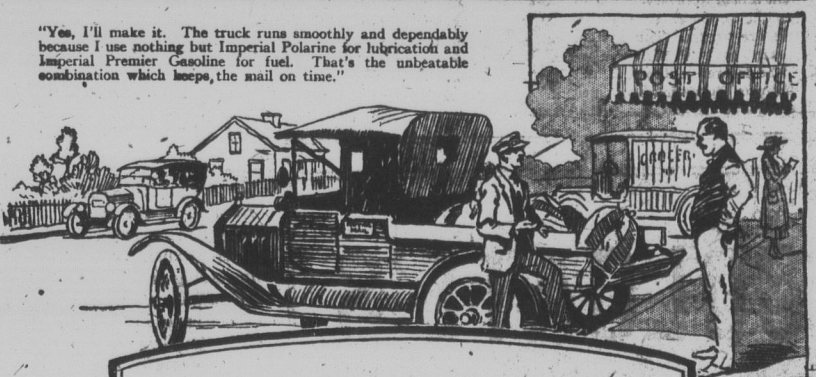

Statement Shows That Last Winter Was a Record Breaker.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT BRIDGETOWN

Edward Sinclair Lumber Co. Suffer Loss on Saturday.

Newcastle, N. B., Aug. 22.—A disastrous fire which consumed property estimated to be worth \$300,000, broke out yesterday afternoon in the lumber yards of the Edward Sinclair Lumber Company about three miles from Newcastle. The fire started in a lumber pile and the strong wind blowing at the time quickly fanned it into a big conflagration.

The fire broke out about 12.30 and the wind was blowing a terrific gale from the southwest. It was not long before the blaze was beyond the control of the means at hand for fighting it. An alarm was sent in and the firemen from Newcastle and Chatham responded and also men from the various mills and villages. About four hundred men were soon on the scene and engaged in fighting the fire. Tugboats also took a hand and pumped water from the river.

About four million feet of lumber was burned, including boards, deals and laths. Four houses belonging to the Sinclair Company were also burned.

The estimated loss is about \$300,000, and is partly covered by insurance.

The fire was not under control until about ten o'clock Saturday night. The fire fighters had hard work to keep the flames from spreading to the woods.

The Sinclair mill was also in great danger and if the wind had shifted could hardly have been saved.

Sparks were carried down the road a mile and set fire to a barn owned by Alex. Blue which was completely destroyed along with the fifteen tons of hay, including a loss in the barn floor just hauled in, farming implements. No live stock was lost except a pig which escaped from the burning barn only to be run over and killed by an automobile.

It is understood Mr. Blue had no insurance and his loss will be severely felt.
